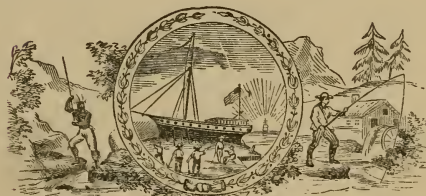




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A RECORD OF GRANTS.

Acworth. This town was probably *Number 3* in the line of towns from Merrimack to Connecticut river, granted by Massachusetts, Jan. 16, 1735-6. Granted by New Hampshire as *Burnet* to Col. Sampson Stoddard and others, Dec. 28, 1752, and named for Gov. William Burnet. Re granted as *New Burnet*, Nov. 17, 1761, to Stoddard and others. Incorporated as Acworth (sometimes spelled *Ackworth*), Sept. 19, 1766, and named probably for Lord Acworth. The charter was renewed May 30, 1772. The first settlements were made in 1767, by William Keyes, Joseph Chatterton, and Samuel Smith.

Albany. Granted as *Burton*, Nov. 6, 1766, to Clement March and others. Among the first settlers were Orlando Weed, Jeremiah Gilman, and Benjamin Knowles. The line between Burton and Tamworth was established Dec. 30, 1796. Burton was taken from Grafton County and annexed to Carroll, Nov. 27, 1800. The name of the town was changed to Albany, July 2, 1833, probably for Albany, N. Y.

Alexandria. Granted by the Masonian Proprietors, June 1, 1753, to Joseph Butterfield, Jr., and others. Charter renewed March 13, 1767. Re granted July 7, 1773, to Jonas Minot and others. Incorporated by its present name, Nov. 23, 1782. A large addition was granted July 7, 1773, which was incorporated into the town of New London, June 25, 1779. The first settlements were made in 1769, by William, Jonathan, and John Moor Corliss. A portion of Alexandria was severed and combined with a part of Hill to make up the town of Bridgewater, Feb. 11, 1788. Danbury was set off and incorporated June 18, 1795. A tract was severed from Orange and annexed to Alexandria, Dec. 7, 1820. A portion of Alexandria was annexed to Hill, Dec. 20, 1820.

Allenstown. Granted May 11, 1722, to the children of Gov. Samuel Allen, and named in honor of Governor Allen. Incorporated July 2, 1831. A portion of Allenstown was incorporated with Pembroke, Nov. 1, 1759. The first settlements were made previous to 1748, by John Wolcott, Andrew Smith, Daniel Evans, Robert Buntin, and others. A part of Bow east of the Merrimack river was annexed to Allenstown in June, 1815.

Alstead. This town was probably *Number 4* in the line of towns from Merrimack to Connecticut river, granted by Massachusetts, Jan. 16, 1735-6. Granted by New Hampshire as *Newton*, Dec. 28, 1752, to John Towle and others. Re granted Aug. 6, 1763, to Samuel

Chase and others, and incorporated as Alstead. The charter was renewed Jan. 25, 1772.

Alton. Formerly known as *New Durham Gore*. Incorporated as Alton, June 16, 1796. Named for an English town. The first settlement was made about 1770, by Jacob Chamberlain and others. In the petition for incorporation, the inhabitants asked to have the town named Roxbury. Barndoor Island was annexed in 1799. Portions of the town were severed and annexed to Barnstead in 1840, and to Wolfeborough in 1849.

Amherst. Granted by Massachusetts as *Narragansett No. 3*, Dec. 18, 1728. It was afterwards called *Salem Narragansett* and *Souhegan West*. The grant was confirmed by the Masonian Proprietors, Dec. 1, 1759. Incorporated as Amherst, Jan. 18, 1760, and named in honor of Lord Jeffry Amherst. The charter was renewed in April, 1762. Samuel Lamson and Samuel Walton of Reading, Mass., settled about 1735. A large part of Monson was annexed in 1770. A portion was combined with parts of Hollis and Mile Slip to make up the town of Milford, Jan. 11, 1794. Mont Vernon was set off and incorporated Dec. 15, 1803.

Andover. Granted by the Masonian Proprietors, Nov. 20, 1751, to Edmund Brown and others, and named *New Breton* in honor of the captors of Cape Breton, some of whom were grantees. Also called *Brown's-town* and *Emery's-town*. The charter was renewed Nov. 6, 1771. Incorporated as Andover, June 25, 1779, and named directly or indirectly from an English town. The first settlement was made in 1761, by Joseph Fellows of Boscawen.

Antrim. This town was part of a tract of land called *Cumberland*, afterwards *Society Land*. Incorporated March 22, 1777, and named for a town in Ireland. The first settlement was made by Philip Riley, of Londonderry, in 1744. He left in 1746 on account of the Indians, and returned in 1761.

Ashland. Set off from Holderness and incorporated, July 1, 1868. Named for Henry Clay's home.

Atkinson. This town was a part of a tract of land purchased from the Indians, by inhabitants of Haverhill, Mass., Nov. 15, 1642. Set off from Plaistow and incorporated by its present name, Sept. 3, 1767. Named in honor of Theodore Atkinson. The first settlements

were made in 1728, by Benjamin Richards, of Rochester, Jonathan and Edmund Page, and John Dow, of Haverhill, Mass.

Auburn. This town was a part of Chester known as *Long Meadow*. Set off from Chester and incorporated June 23, 1845. Named for an English town.

Barnstead. Granted by Lt. Gov. John Wentworth, May 20, 1727, to Rev. Joseph Adams of Newington, and others. But few settlements were made until 1767.

Barrington. Granted by Gov. Samuel Shute, May 10, 1722, to the proprietors of the Iron Works on Lamprey river, John Wentworth, George Jaffrey, Archibald McPheadris, and Robert Nelson. The first settlements were made in 1732. Strafford was set off and incorporated June 17, 1820.

Bartlett. Made up of grants to Lt. Andrew McMillan, Capt. William Stark, Lt. Vere Royce, Adjt. Philip Bailey, and Maj. James Gray. Incorporated June 16, 1790, and named in honor of Josiah Bartlett, then President of the state. A tract of land belonging to the state, situated in Jackson, was annexed June 19, 1806. Another small tract annexed from Jackson, June 22, 1819. Land owned by Nathaniel Carlton was severed from Bartlett and annexed to Jackson, July 3, 1822. A large tract of land on the west and south was annexed July 1, 1823. Land belonging to Jonathan McIntire was annexed June 18, 1836. The farms of Nathaniel Tufts and Stephen Carlton, 2d, were severed from Bartlett and annexed to Jackson, July 3, 1839. A tract of land was severed from Chatham and annexed to Bartlett, June 30, 1869, and another from Hart's Location, July 2, 1878. Bartlett was annexed to Carroll county, from Coös, Jan. 5, 1853.

Bath. Granted Sept. 10, 1761, to Rev. Andrew Gardner and others. Regranted March 29, 1769, to John Sawyer and others. Named for an English town. The first settlement was made in 1765, by John Harriman of Haverhill, Mass. Moses Pike and John Sawyer settled in 1766 or 1767.

Bedford. Granted by Massachusetts as *Narragansett No. 5*, Feb. 12, 1733-4. Afterwards called *Souhegan East*. The grant was confirmed by the Masonian Proprietors, Nov. 9, 1748. Incorporated as Bedford, May 19, 1750, and named in honor of the Duke of Bed-

ford. The first settlement was made by a man named Stebbins, from Braintree, Mass., in 1736. Robert and James Walker settled in 1737, and Matthew and Samuel Patten the following year.

Belmont. Set off from Gilmanton and incorporated as *Upper Gilmanton*, June 29, 1859. The name was changed to Belmont, June 24, 1869, in honor of August Belmont.

Bennington. This town was made up from parts of Greenfield, Francestown, Deering, and Hancock, and was incorporated Dec. 15, 1842. A part of the farm of Samuel B. Collins was annexed Dec. 20, 1842.

Benton. Granted as *Coventry*, Jan. 31, 1764, to Theophilus Fitch and others. Settlements were made during the Revolutionary War. The name was changed to Benton, Dec. 4, 1840, in honor of Thomas H. Benton.

Berlin. Granted Dec. 31, 1771, to Sir William Mayne and others, and named *Maynesborough* in honor of Sir William. Incorporated as Berlin, July 1, 1829. The first settlement was made by William Sessions in 1821.

Bethlehem. Granted as *Lloyd Hills* in 1774. Incorporated by the name of Bethlehem, Dec. 27, 1799. Additions of territory were made in 1848 and 1873.

Boscawen. Granted by Massachusetts as *Contoocook*, Dec. 8, 1732, to John Coffin and others, of Newbury, Mass. The grant was confirmed by the Masonian Proprietors Jan. 10, 1758. Incorporated as Boscawen, April 22, 1760, and named in honor of Admiral Edward Boscawen, of the British Navy. The charter was renewed Oct. 7, 1763. The first settlements were made by some of the proprietors in 1734. Webster was set off and incorporated July 4, 1860. This division was attempted in 1791, when the inhabitants of the west part of the town asked to be set off and incorporated by the name of Bristol.

Bow. Granted by Lt. Gov. John Wentworth, May 10, 1727, to Jonathan Wiggin and others, and was so named on account of a bend in the river within the town limits. A portion of Bow was combined with Suncook and Buckstreet to make up the parish of Pembroke, Nov. 1, 1759. Two tracts of land were severed from Bow, and annexed, one to Concord, and the other to Pembroke, Dec. 13, 1804. A portion was severed and annexed to Allentown, June 22, 1815.

Bradford. This town was probably *Number 2* in the line of towns from Merrimack to Connecticut river, granted by Massachusetts, Jan. 16, 1735-6. Afterwards granted by New Hampshire to John Peirce and George Jaffrey, and first settled in 1771, by William Presbury. Later, it was called *New Bradford* by settlers from Bradford, Mass. Incorporated as Bradford, Sept. 27, 1787, and included New Bradford, Washington Gore, and a part of Washington. A tract of land was severed from Newbury and annexed to Bradford, Dec. 6, 1796, and another, June 22, 1859.

Brentwood. Set off from Exeter as the parish of *Brintwood*, June 26, 1742. Incorporation was asked for May 26, 1744, and Oct. 1, it was voted to advise the Governor to grant it. Poplin [Fremont] was set off and incorporated as a parish, June 22, 1764.

Bridgewater. Set off from Hill and incorporated Feb. 12, 1788. Named for an English town. The first settlement was made in 1766, by Thomas Crawford. Jonathan Crawford and others came soon after. The southerly portion of the town was combined with the northerly part of Hill to make up the town of Bristol, June 24, 1819.

Bristol. Made up from parts of Bridgewater and Hill, and incorporated June 24, 1819. Named for an English town.

Brookfield. Set off from Middleton, and incorporated Dec. 30, 1794. The first town meeting was held March 10, 1795, at the house of Richard Hanson.

Brookline. This was a part of the Old Dunstable grant. Incorporated by the name of *Raby*, March 30, 1769, and included parts of Hollis and the Mile Slip. Samuel Farley was authorized to call the first town meeting. The present name was adopted Dec. 1, 1798. A portion of Hollis was annexed Feb. 17, 1786.

Campton. Granted Oct. 9, 1761, to Christopher Holmes and others. Regranted Jan. 5, 1767, to Ebenezer Little and others. So named because surveying parties camped in that vicinity. The first settlements were made in 1765, by the Taylor and Fox families. The first town meeting was held Dec. 16, 1771. A portion of this town was annexed to Plymouth, June 27, 1860. Campton was annexed to Grafton county, Sept. 14, 1782.

Canaan. Granted July 9, 1761, to Thomas Gustin and others. The charter was renewed Feb. 23, 1769. Named for Canaan, Conn.,

whence came some of the grantees. The town boundaries were settled June 18, 1802. The first settlement was made by John Scofield in the winter of 1766-7. George Harris, Joshua Harris, Thomas Miner, and Samuel Meacham settled soon after. Dame's Gore was annexed July 2, 1846. State's or Gates's Gore was annexed July 4, 1851.

Candia. This town was a part of Chester, known as *Charming-fare*. Set off and incorporated as Candia, Dec. 17, 1763. It was named by Governor Wentworth for the island of Candia, in Crete, where he was once held a prisoner. Samuel Emerson was authorized to call the first meeting. The first settlement was made in 1748, by William Turner, and John Sargent and others settled in 1755. The line between Candia and Raymond was established June 23, 1848.

Canterbury. Granted May 20, 1727, to Richard Waldron and others, and then included the territory of Loudon and Northfield. Settlements were made soon after but they were much troubled by Indians. Full town privileges were granted March 19, 1741. Named for an English town. An addition was made on the southwest side June 13, 1765. Loudon was set off and incorporated Jan. 23, 1773. Northfield was set off and incorporated June 19, 1780. A small tract was severed and annexed to Concord, June 2, 1784, and another to Loudon, Jan. 7, 1853.

Carroll. Granted as *Bretton-Woods*, Feb. 8, 1772, to Sir Thomas Wentworth and others. Incorporated as Carroll, June 22, 1832. Portions of Nash & Sawyer's Location were annexed June 22, 1848, and July 2, 1878. A tract of land on the south of the town was annexed June 27, 1857.

Centre Harbor. Set off from New Hampton and incorporated Dec. 7, 1797. So called because it contained the middle one of three harbors, Moultonborough Harbor or Bay being on the east, and Meredith Harbor or Bay on the west. Nathan Hoit was authorized to call the first meeting. A part of Meredith was annexed to Centre Harbor, July 3, 1873.

Charlestown. This town was *Number 4*, in the line of towns on the east side of the Connecticut river granted by Massachusetts, Dec. 31, 1735. Incorporated as Charlestown, July 2, 1753, and named in honor of Sir Charles Knowles, Commodore in the English Navy. The first settlements were made by Samuel, David, and Stephen Farnsworth in 1740. A portion of the town was combined with a

part of Walpole to make up the town of Langdon, Jan. 11, 1787. Three families were severed from Unity and annexed to Charlestown, June 20, 1810. The same day, the town was divided into two parishes for parochial purposes.

Chatham. Granted Feb. 7, 1767, to Peter Livius and others, and named for Lord Chatham. The first settlements were made in 1781, by Samuel Phipps, Increase Robinson, and Isaac Cox. A tract of land near the centre of the town was granted by Gov. John Wentworth to his private secretary, Thomas McDonough, July 2, 1772. Samuel Gilman's grant, on the north, was annexed June 23, 1817. The farms of Jonathan Hardy and Edward Shirley were severed from Conway and annexed to Chatham, June 26, 1823. The farm of Judah Dana was annexed July 2, 1838. A portion of Chatham was annexed to Bartlett, June 30, 1869. Chatham was severed from Coös county and annexed to Strafford and so remained until the formation of Carroll county, in which it was then included.

Chester. Granted as *Cheshire* Aug. 26, 1720. Regranted May 8, 1722, to Capt. Henry Sherburne and others, and incorporated as Chester. The first meeting was held March 28, 1723. Candia was set off and incorporated Dec. 15, 1763. Raymond was set off and incorporated May 9, 1764. A considerable portion was set off and made a part of what is now Manchester. A portion of the town was combined with parts of Goffstown and Dunbarton, to make up the town of Hooksett, July 2, 1822. Auburn was set off and incorporated June 23, 1845.

Chesterfield. This town was *Number 1* in the line of towns on the east side of Connecticut river, granted by Massachusetts, Dec. 31, 1735. Granted by New Hampshire, Feb. 11, 1752, to Col. Josiah Willard and others. The charter was renewed June 11, 1760. Named for an English town. The first settlements were made in 1761, by Moses Smith and William Thomas. Simon Davis and Abel Emmons settled the next year.

Chichester. Granted May 20, 1727, to Nathaniel Gookin and others, and named for an English town. The first settlement was made in 1758, by Paul Morrill. Pittsfield was set off and incorporated March 27, 1782. Union School District, comprising portions of Chichester and Epsom, was incorporated Nov. 30, 1842, and an addition was made in 1847.

Claremont. Granted Oct. 26, 1764, to Col. Josiah Willard and others, and named for the country seat of Lord Robert Clive. The first settlements were made in 1762, by Moses Spafford and David Lynde. The Governor's reservation in the southwest corner was granted by him to Col. Joseph Wait.

Clarksville. Formerly known as *Dartmouth College Grant*. Incorporated as Clarksville, June 30, 1853, and named for Benjamin Clark, who first settled it in 1822.

Colebrook. Granted Dec. 1, 1770, to Sir George Colebrooke, Sir James Cockburne, and John Stewart, Esq., of London, Eng., and John Nelson, Esq., of Grenada, West Indies. First called *Colebrooke Town* after Sir George Colebrooke, and occasionally *Colburn*. Incorporated as Colebrook, June 11, 1796.

Columbia. Granted Dec. 1, 1770, to the same grantees as was Colebrook, and named *Cockburne Town*, for Sir James Cockburne. Incorporated as *Cockburne*, Dec. 16, 1797. The name of the town was changed to Columbia June 19, 1811. Wales's Location was annexed Nov. 30, 1804.

Concord. This territory, known as *Penacook*, was granted by Massachusetts, May 18, 1659, to Richard Waldron and others. Again granted by Massachusetts, Jan. 17, 1725-6, to Ebenezer Eastman and others, and the first settlement was made by Ebenezer Eastman in 1727. Incorporated by Massachusetts as *Rumford*, Feb. 27, 1733-4. Incorporated by New Hampshire as Concord, June 7, 1765. The grant of Bow by New Hampshire, May 20, 1727, conflicted with this grant, and the dispute was decided by the King in favor of *Rumford*, Dec. 27, 1762. A gore of land was severed from Canterbury and Loudon and annexed to Concord, Jan. 2, 1784. A portion of Bow was annexed Dec. 13, 1804. The first state house was built in 1816, and was remodeled in 1865. It was first occupied by the Legislature in June, 1819. A city charter was granted July 6, 1849, but was not adopted until March 10, 1853.

Conway. Originally known as *Pigwacket* or *Pequawket*. Granted as Conway, Oct. 1, 1765, to Daniel Foster, and named for an English town. The first settlements were made in 1764. James Osgood, Benjamin Osgood, Ebenezer Burbank, and John Dolloff settled before 1766. Grants to Lt. Hugh Sterling, Lt. Samuel Stark, and Lt. Archibald Stark were annexed June 14, 1800. The farms of Jonathan

Hardy and Edward Shirley were severed from Conway and annexed to Chatham, June 26, 1823.

Cornish. Formerly known as the *Mast Camp*. Granted as Cornish, June 21, 1763, to Rev. Samuel McClintock and others, and named for an English town. The first settlements were made in 1765, by families from Sutton, Mass. The town charter was renewed, Dec. 21, 1768. The first town meeting was held March 10, 1767. The inhabitants voted, June 2, 1778, to join the State of Vermont. The line between Cornish and Grantham was established Dec. 3, 1808. A portion of Croydon was annexed June 24, 1809, and a portion of Grantham, Dec. 25, 1844.

Croydon. Granted May 31, 1763, to Samuel Chase and others, and named for an English town. The charter was renewed Dec. 21, 1768. The first settlements were made in 1766, by families from Grafton and Sutton, Mass. The line between this town and Grantham was established Dec. 3, 1808, by which Croydon lost some territory to Grantham. A tract was severed and annexed to Cornish, June 24, 1809. Croydon was one of the towns which voted to join Vermont.

Dalton. This was a portion of the territory granted as *Chiswick* (afterwards *Apthorp*), to James Avery and others, Nov. 17, 1764. Set off from *Apthorp* and incorporated Nov. 4, 1784. Named for Tristram Dalton, one of the proprietors. At the time of the division, the rest of *Apthorp* became the present town of Littleton. The first settlements were made by Moses Blake and Walter Bloss.

Danbury. Set off from Alexandria and incorporated June 18, 1795. The town was taken from Grafton county and annexed to Merrimack, July 10, 1874. Land belonging to George W. Dudley and Archibald Ford was severed from Wilmot and annexed to Danbury, Dec. 19, 1848. A portion of Hill was annexed June 26, 1858. Another lot was severed from Wilmot and annexed to Danbury, July 26, 1878.

Danville. Set off from Kingston and incorporated by the name of *Hawke*, Feb. 22, 1760. Named in honor of Admiral Hawke of the English Navy. Settlements were made previous to 1739, by Jonathan Sanborn, Jacob Hook, and others. Daniel Brown and twenty others were severed from Fremont and annexed to *Hawke*, June

20, 1783. The name was changed to Danville, June 18, 1836. A small tract from Hampstead was annexed June 28, 1877.

Deerfield. Set off from Nottingham and incorporated Jan. 8, 1766. Said to be named from the large number of deer seen in that vicinity. The first settlements were made 1756-8, by Isaac Shepard, Benjamin Batchelder, Jacob Smith, John Robertson, and others.

Deering. Formerly a part of *Cumberland*, or *Society Land*. Incorporated Jan. 17, 1774, and named by Gov. John Wentworth, in honor of his wife, whose maiden name was Frances Deering. The first settlement was made in 1765, by Alexander Robinson, and soon after, came William McKean, William Forsaith, Thomas Aiken, Francis Grimes, William Aiken, and others.

Derry. Set off from Londonderry and incorporated July 2, 1827. Named in honor of Derry, Ireland.

Dorchester. Granted July 8, 1761, to Henry Thompson and others. Re granted Nov. 21, 1766, to Samuel Hobart and others. Again re granted May 1, 1772, to John House and others. Settlements were made under the last grant by Benjamin Rice and Stephen Murch, of Hanover. Named for an English town.

Dover. Formerly known as *Cochecho* and *Northam*. The town was never formally incorporated but was a corporation from settlement. The first settlement was made by Edward Hilton in 1623. Submitted to the Massachusetts government in 1641. The name of Dover was taken from an English town. Newington was set off as a parish in 1713, and was given town privileges in 1764. Somersworth, including Rollinsford, was set off as a parish, Dec. 19, 1729, and incorporated April 22, 1754. Durham, including Lee and a part of Madbury, was set off and incorporated May 15, 1732. Madbury, made up partly from Dover and partly from Durham, was set off as a parish, May 31, 1755, and was given town privileges May 26, 1768. Dover was incorporated as a city, June 29, 1855.

Dublin. Granted by the Masonian Proprietors as *Monadnock No. 3* or *North Monadnock*, Nov. 3, 1749, to Matthew Thornton and others. Incorporated as Dublin, March 29, 1771, and named for Dublin, Ireland. The first settlements were made about 1762, by Thomas Morse, John Alexander, Henry Strongman, and William Scott. A part of this town was annexed to Marlborough, June 13, 1818.

Dummer. Granted March 8, 1773, to Mark Hunking Wentworth

and others. Incorporated Dec. 19, 1848. William Lovejoy, John Hodgdon, and Jotham S. Lary were authorized to call the first meeting, which was held Feb. 20, 1849. A part of Stark was annexed July 1, 1868.

Dunbarton. Granted by Massachusetts, June 19, 1735, to Capt. John Gorham's men, and called *Gorham-town*. Granted by the Masonian Proprietors, Dec. 17, 1748, to Archibald Stark and others, and called *Stark's-town*. Regranted March 2, 1752. Incorporated as Dunbarton, Aug. 10, 1765, and named for a town in Scotland. The first settlements were made before 1746, by Joseph Putney and James Rogers, who were driven away by Indians, but returned in 1749. A portion of Dunbarton was included in the limits of Hooksett, incorporated July 2, 1822. The line between Dunbarton and Goffstown was established Jan. 7, 1853.

Durham. Set off from Dover as a parish by the name of *Oyster River*, May 27, 1669. Incorporated as Durham, May 15, 1732. Lee was set off and incorporated Jan. 16, 1766. A portion of Durham was severed and annexed to Newmarket, July 2, 1870.

East Kingston. Set off from Kingston Nov. 17, 1738, and incorporated as *Kingston East Parish*. The line between this town and Kingston was established Aug. 7, 1740, and re-established June 16, 1798. William and Abraham Smith were among the first settlers. Small portions of the town were annexed to South Hampton, Dec. 6, 1824, and to Newton, July 2, 1845.

Easton. Set off from Landaff and incorporated July 20, 1876.

Eaton. Granted Nov. 7, 1766, to Clement March and others. The line between Eaton and Tamworth was settled Feb. 8, 1797. Five grants of land to retired officers who served in the French War, were annexed Dec. 24, 1795. Madison was set off and incorporated Dec. 17, 1852.

Effingham. Granted by the Masonian Proprietors, June 28, 1749, to Nathaniel Gookin and others, and called *Leavitt's-town*. An addition was granted Dec. 20, 1749. The charter was renewed Sept. 29, 1766. Incorporated as Effingham, Aug. 18, 1778. A gore of land was severed from Wakefield and annexed in 1820. North Effingham (Freedom) was set off and incorporated June 16, 1831.

Ellsworth. Granted as *Trecothick*, May 1, 1769, to Barlow Tre-

cotthick and others, and named for Barlow Trecotthick. Incorporated as Ellsworth, June 16, 1802. The first settlement was made in 1790, by Jonathan T. Downing, of Gilmanton.

Enfield. Granted as *Endfield*, July 4, 1761, to Jedediah Dana and others. Re granted as *Relhan*, Aug. 8, 1768, to Simon Stevens and others. Incorporated Aug. 18, 1778. The act incorporating the town as *Relhan* was repealed Jan. 3, 1784. The first settlers were Nathaniel Bicknell, Jonathan Paddleford, and Elisha Bingham. The town boundaries were settled June 18, 1802. A portion of Grantham was severed and annexed to Enfield Jan. 13, 1837.

Epping. Set off from Exeter and incorporated Feb. 23, 1741-2. Named for an English town. Nathan Sanborn, Jonathan Norris, and Samuel Smith were authorized to call the first meeting, which was held the following year. The line between this town and Lee was established June 19, 1818.

Epsom. Granted May 18, 1727, to Theodore Atkinson and others, and named for an English town. The first meeting was held in 1743. Among the first settlers were Andrew McCleary, Charles McCoy, William Blazo, and Samuel Blake.

Errol. Granted Feb. 28, 1774, to Timothy Ruggles and others. A large part of the grant was purchased by men from Salem and Danvers, Mass. Few settlements were made before 1800. Incorporated Dec. 28, 1836.

Exeter. This territory was a part of the Squamscot or Swamps cot Patent, and was first settled in 1638, by Rev. John Wheelwright and others. It was never formally incorporated but was a corporation from settlement. Wheelwright and his company made an agreement of self-government, July 4, 1639, under which they lived until 1642, when they submitted to the government of Massachusetts. New Market was set off and incorporated Dec. 15, 1727; Epping, Feb. 23, 1741-2; Brentwood, June 26, 1742.

Farmington. Set off from Rochester and incorporated Dec. 1, 1798. The first proprietors' meeting was held Feb. 23, 1799.

Fitzwilliam Granted by the Masonian Proprietors, as *Monadnock No. 4*, Jan. 15, 1752, to Roland Cotton and others. Re granted May 2, 1765, to Col. Sampson Stoddard and others, and sometimes called *Stoddard's-town*. Incorporated as Fitzwilliam, May 17, 1773,

and named in honor of the Earl of Fitzwilliam. Settlements were commenced in 1760, by Jonas Reed, John Fassett, and Benjamin Bigelow. A portion of this town was included in the limits of Troy, incorporated June 23, 1815. The line between Fitzwilliam and Rindge was established June 17, 1847.

Francestown. This town included *New Boston Addition* and a part of Society Land. Incorporated June 8, 1772, and named by Gov. John Wentworth in honor of his wife whose maiden name was Frances Deering. The first settlements were made about 1760, by John Carson and others. A portion of Greenfield was annexed Dec. 11, 1792, and a portion of Society Land, June 17, 1802.

Franconia. Granted as Franconia, Feb. 14, 1764, to Jesse Searle and others. No settlements were made under this grant and the town was regranted June 8, 1772, to Sir Francis Bernard and others. It was named *Morristown* in honor of Corbin Morris, one of the grantees. Settlements were made in 1774, by Zebedee Applebee, Capt. Artemas Knight, and Lemuel Barnett. The name of Franconia was reassumed in 1782.

Franklin. Made up from parts of Andover, Salisbury, Northfield, and Sanbornton, and incorporated Dec. 24, 1828. Named for Benjamin Franklin. John and Ezekiel Webster settled in 1759-60.

Freedom. Set off from Effingham and incorporated as *North Effingham*, June 16, 1831. The name was changed to Freedom, Dec. 6, 1832.

Fremont. Set off from Brentwood and incorporated as *Poplin*, June 22, 1764. James Merrill was authorized to call the first meeting. A number of inhabitants in the south part were set off to Danville for parochial purposes, June 20, 1783. The name was changed to Fremont, July 8, 1854, in honor of Gen. John C. Fremont.

Gilford. This was formerly a part of Gilmanton, known as *Gunstock Parish*. Set off and incorporated June 16, 1812. A portion of Gilmanton was severed and annexed to Gilford, July 5, 1851, and a portion of Laconia, July 13, 1876.

Gilmanton. Granted May 20, 1727, to Nicholas Gilman and others. The grant was confirmed by the Masonian Proprietors, June 30, 1752. Settlements were commenced in 1761, by Benjamin and John Mudgett. Governor's Island was annexed Dec. 30, 1799. Gil-

ford was set off and incorporated June 16, 1812. A tract of land was severed and annexed to Gilford, July 5, 1851. Belmont was set off and incorporated as Upper Gilmanton, June 29, 1859.

Gilsum. Granted as *Boyle*, Dec. 28, 1752, to Joseph Osgood and others. No settlements were made under this grant. Regranted July 13, 1763, to Samuel Gilbert, Thomas Sumner, and others, and named Gilsum, by combining the first syllables of the two names. Settlements were commenced in 1762, by Jonathan Bliss and Josiah Kilburn. The west part of the town was combined with a portion of Westmoreland to make up the town of Surry, March 9, 1769. The southeast part was combined with parts of Keene, Stoddard, and Nelson, to make up the town of Sullivan, Sept. 27, 1787. The line between Gilsum and Stoddard was settled June 27, 1797, by which Gilsum lost a tract of land. A small lot was taken from Sullivan and annexed to Gilsum in 1873.

Goffstown. Granted by Massachusetts as *Narragansett No. 4*, Feb. 9, 1733-4. Granted by the Masonian Proprietors, Dec. 3, 1748, to Rev. Thomas Parker, of Dracut, Mass., and others. It was also known as *Piscataquog Township*. Incorporated as Goffstown, June 16, 1761, and named for Col. John Goffe. The charter was renewed April 5, 1763. A portion of the town was combined with parts of Dunbarton and Chester to make up the town of Hooksett, July 2, 1822. Some islands in Merrimack river were annexed June 20, 1825. Isaac Parker's farm was severed from New Boston and annexed June 18, 1836. The line between Dunbarton and Goffstown was established Jan. 7, 1853. A portion of Goffstown was annexed to Manchester, July 1, 1853.

Gorham. Granted as *Shelburne Addition*, Nov. 21, 1770, to Mark Hunking Wentworth and others. Incorporated as Gorham, June 18, 1736, and named for an English town. First settled in 1775.

Goshen. Made up from parts of Newport, Sunapee, Newbury, Lempster, and Unity, and incorporated Dec. 27, 1791. The boundary lines were established June 22, 1797, and in part changed June 17, 1806. A part of Unity was annexed July 6, 1837. The first settlement in these limits was made in 1769, by Capt. Benjamin Rand, William Lang, and Daniel Grindle.

Grafton. Granted Aug. 14, 1761, to Ephraim Shearman and others. This grant was surrendered Dec. 27, 1762. Regranted Sept.

12, 1769, to Josiah Willard and others. Incorporated Nov. 11, 1778. The first settlement was made in 1772, by Capt. Joseph Hoyt, of Poplin, now Fremont. Daniel Sanders was authorized to call the first meeting. The boundaries were established June 18, 1802.

Grantham. Granted July 11, 1761, to John Kathan and others. No settlements were made under this grant. Regranted as *New Grantham*, June 8, 1767, to Col. William Simms and others. The westerly part of this town and the easterly part of Plainfield were made the parish of Meriden, June 23, 1780. The line between this town and Cornish and Croydon was established Dec. 2, 1808. A tract of land was severed from Grantham and annexed to Enfield, Jan. 13, 1837. A portion was severed and annexed to Cornish, Dec. 25, 1844. The gore between Grantham and Springfield was annexed June 25, 1858. This was one of the towns which voted to join Vermont.

Greenfield. Made up of Lyndeborough Gore, and parts of Society Land, Peterborough, and Lyndeborough. Incorporated June 15, 1791. Daniel Emerson was authorized to call the first meeting. The first settlements of this territory were made in 1771, by Major A. Whittemore, Capt. Alexander Parker, Simeon Fletcher, and others. The boundaries were changed and established Dec. 28, 1791. A portion of the town was annexed to Frankestown, Dec. 11, 1792, and another, July 4, 1872.

Greenland. Set off from Portsmouth as a parish in 1704, and granted full town privileges in 1721. Land belonging to Brackett Weeks was severed from Stratham and annexed Dec. 18, 1805, and a tract owned by Samuel Hatch was also annexed July 2, 1847. The line between Greenland and Stratham was established June 23, 1859, but the act was amended June 27, 1860.

Greenville. Set off from Mason and incorporated June 28, 1872. The line between Greenville and Mason was established in 1873.

Groton. Granted as *Cockermouth*, July 8, 1761, to George Abbott and others. No settlements were made under this grant. Regranted Nov. 22, 1766, to John Hale and others. The charter was renewed Jan. 24, 1772. Settlements were made in 1770, by James Gould, Capt. Ebenezer Melvin, Jonas Hobart, Phineas Bennett, and Samuel Farley. A portion of the town was combined with a portion of Plymouth, to make up the town of Hebron, June 15, 1792. The name was changed to Groton, Dec. 7, 1796. A portion of Hebron was annexed to Groton, June 26, 1845.

Hampstead. This was formerly a part of Haverhill and Amesbury, Mass., known as *Timberlane*. Incorporated as Hampstead, Jan. 19, 1749, and named for an English town. Settlements were begun in 1728. A portion of Atkinson was annexed June 23, 1859. A small tract was severed and annexed to Danville, June 28, 1877.

Hampton. Granted by Massachusetts as *Winnicunnet*, March 3, 1635. Settlements were made in 1638, and the name was changed to Hampton, Sept. 4, 1639. North Hill Parish was set off and incorporated as North Hampton, Nov. 26, 1742.

Hampton Falls. Set off from Hampton and incorporated Nov. 23, 1726. Kensington was set off and incorporated April 1, 1737. Seabrook was set off and incorporated June 3, 1768. A portion of South Hampton was annexed Dec. 4, 1742. A small tract was severed and annexed to Seabrook, Dec. 7, 1816.

Hancock. Originally a part of *Society Land*. Incorporated Nov. 5, 1779, and named for John Hancock. John Grimes made the first settlement in 1765. Joseph Putnam's farm was taken from Society Land and annexed Jan. 16, 1794. John Flint's farm was taken from Antrim and annexed Jan. 1, 1849.

Hanover. Granted July 4, 1761, to Edmund Freeman and others. Col. Freeman made a settlement in 1765, and was followed by Benjamin Davis and Benjamin Rice. Dartmouth College was chartered Dec. 13, 1769. An additional grant was made Jan. 9, 1775. Three hundred acres in the southwest corner were granted to Dartmouth College, Dec. 19, 1771, and two hundred acres adjoining to Rev. Dr. Eleazer Wheelock.

Harrisville. Made up from parts of Dublin and Nelson and incorporated July 2, 1870. Named in honor of Milan Harris, who established mills there.

Hart's Location. Granted to Thomas Chadbourne, April 27, 1772.

Haverhill. Formerly known as *Lower Coös*. Granted May 18, 1763, to John Hazzen and others, and incorporated as Haverhill. Named for Haverhill, Mass. The first settlement was made by Capt. John Hazzen in 1764. The town was divided into two parishes June 21, 1815.

Hebron. Made up from parts of *Cockermouth* and Plymouth, and incorporated June 15, 1792.

Henniker. This town was *Number 6*, in the line of towns from Merrimack to Connecticut river, granted by Massachusetts, Jan. 16, 1735-6. As some of the grantees came from Marlborough, Mass., it was sometimes called *New Marlborough* or *Marlborough Town*. Granted by the Masonian Proprietors, July 16, 1752, to Andrew Todd and others, and sometimes called *Todd's-town*. Incorporated as Henniker, Nov. 10, 1768, and named in honor of John Henniker, M. P.

Hill. Granted by the Masonian Proprietors, Sept. 14, 1753, to Chester men. Incorporated as *New Chester*, Nov. 20, 1778. The first settlements were made in 1768, by Cutting Favour and Carr Huse. Bridgewater was set off and incorporated Feb. 12, 1788. Portions of Hill and Bridgewater were incorporated as Bristol, June 24, 1819. A portion of Alexandria was annexed Dec. 21, 1820. A tract was severed from *New Chester* and annexed to Wilmot, Dec. 21, 1832. The name of the town was changed to Hill, Jan. 14, 1837, in honor of Gov. Isaac Hill. A portion was severed and annexed to Danville, June 26, 1858. The town was annexed to Merrimack county from Grafton, July 1, 1868.

Hillsborough. This town was *Number 7* in the line of towns from Merrimack to Connecticut river, granted by Massachusetts, Jan. 16, 1735-6. Granted by the Masonian Proprietors, Jan. 26, 1748-9, to John Hill and others, and named for Col. John Hill. Incorporated Nov. 14, 1772.

Hinsdale. This town was included in the original grant of Northfield, Mass. Incorporated as *Hindsdale*, Sept. 3, 1753, and named for Col. Ebenezer Hinsdale. September 26, 1753, the Governor decided that the east line should extend to Chesterfield, thus taking off a portion of Winchester. On the formation of Vermont the town lost all its territory west of the Connecticut.

Holderness. Granted Nov. 10, 1751, to John Shepard and others. Regranted as *New Holderness*, Oct. 24, 1761, to Maj. John Wentworth and others. The town was named in honor of the Earl of Holderness. The name was changed to Holderness, June 12, 1816. The town was taken from Strafford county and annexed to Grafton, Sept. 14, 1782. Ashland was set off and incorporated July 1, 1868.

Hollis. This town was a part of the Old Dunstable grant. Set off by Massachusetts as *West Dunstable*, Dec. 28, 1739. Incorporated by New Hampshire as *Holles*, April 3, 1746, and named in honor of

Thomas Pelham Holles, Duke of Newcastle. The name was changed to Hollis, in honor of Thomas Hollis, benefactor of Harvard College. "One Pine Hill" was annexed Dec. 13, 1763. A portion of the town was combined with part of Mile Slip to make up the town of Raby, now Brookline, March 30, 1769. A small portion of Dunstable was annexed May 14, 1773. A strip of land on the west side was annexed Feb. 17, 1786.

Hooksett. This locality was formerly known as *Isle au Hooksett* and *Isle au Hooksett Falls*. The town was made up from parts of Goffstown, Dunbarton, and Chester, and incorporated July 2, 1822. A small portion of Hooksett was annexed to Allentown, Jan. 5, 1853.

Hopkinton. This town was *Number 5* in the line of towns from Merrimack to Connecticut river, granted by Massachusetts, Jan. 16, 1735-6. Some of the grantees being from Hopkinton, Mass., the town was also called *New Hopkinton*. Granted by the Masonian Proprietors, Nov. 30, 1750, to Henry Mellen and others. Incorporated as Hopkinton, Jan. 10, 1765, and named for Hopkinton, Mass. A portion of Bow was annexed Dec. 13, 1763, to settle a dispute between the two towns. John Jones was one of the first settlers. The town was taken from Hillsborough county and annexed to Merrimack on the formation of that county in 1823.

Hudson. This was a part of the Old Dunstable grant, and was afterwards included in the limits of Nottingham. Incorporated as *Nottingham West*, July 5, 1746. The name was changed to Hudson, July 1, 1830. The southwest part of Londonderry was annexed March 6, 1778.

Jackson. Incorporated as *Adams*, Dec. 4, 1800, in honor of John Adams, and consisted of grants to Lt. Samuel Gilman, Capt. Richard Gridley, Capt. Robert Rogers, Wentworth, Rogers & Treadwell, Fowle's Location, and some state land. A tract of state land was granted the town for school purposes, June 14, 1806. The farm of William Stevens was severed from *Adams* and annexed to Bartlett, June 22, 1819. The farm of Nathaniel Carlton was severed from Bartlett and annexed to *Adams*, July 3, 1822. The farms of Nathaniel Tufts and Stephen Carlton, 2d, were also annexed from Bartlett, July 3, 1839. The name was changed to Jackson, July 4, 1829, in honor of Andrew Jackson.

Jaffrey. Granted by the Masonian Proprietors, Nov. 30, 1749, to Jonathan Hubbard and others, and variously known as *Monadnock No. 2*, *Middle Monadnock*, and *Middletown*. The grant was renewed March 13, 1767. Incorporated as Jaffrey, Aug. 17, 1773, and named in honor of George Jaffrey. The first settlements were made in 1752, by Moses Stickney and others, but were soon abandoned. Permanent settlements were made in 1758, by John Grout and others.

Jefferson. Granted as *Dartmouth*, Oct. 3, 1765, to Col. John Goffe and others. Re-granted June 26, 1772, to Theodore Atkinson and others. Settlements were made soon after by Col. Joseph Whipple and Samuel Hart, of Portsmouth. Incorporated as Jefferson, Dec. 8, 1796, and named for Thomas Jefferson. A portion of Kilkenny was annexed, Dec. 7, 1842.

Keene. Granted by Massachusetts as *Upper Ashuelot*, April 20, 1733. A few settlements were made, but the town was abandoned in 1746, on account of the depredations of the Indians. Again occupied in 1750. Incorporated as Keene, April 11, 1753, and named in honor of Sir Benjamin Keene. The northeast corner was comprised in the limits of Sullivan, incorporated Sept. 27, 1787. Another portion, with parts of Nelson and Marlborough, went to make up the town of Roxbury, Dec. 9, 1812. A city charter was granted in 1865, but was refused. The charter was adopted July 3, 1873.

Kensington. Set off from Hampton Falls and incorporated, April 1, 1737. Named for an English town. John Weare, Joseph Wadleigh, and Ezekiel Dow were authorized to call the first meeting. A mistake in the description of the bounds in the act of incorporation was rectified Aug. 26, 1737.

Kilkenny. Granted, June 4, 1774, to Jonathan Warner and others. A portion of Kilkenny was annexed to Lancaster, Dec. 15, 1842.

Kingston. Granted as *King's-town*, Aug. 6, 1694, to James Prescott and others, and was so called until about 1800, when the present spelling came into use. Settlements were begun soon after, but little progress was made until after the treaty of peace with the Indians, July 11, 1713. East Kingston was set off and incorporated as Kingstown East Parish, Nov. 17, 1738. Sandown was set off and incorporated, April 6, 1756. Danville was set off and incorporated as Hawke, Feb. 22, 1760.

Laconia. Set off from Meredith and incorporated, July 14, 1855. A portion of Gilford was annexed July 2, 1874, and a portion of Laconia was annexed to Gilford, July 13, 1876.

Lancaster. Formerly known as *Upper Coös*. Granted July 5, 1763, to David Page and others, and incorporated as Lancaster. Named for Lancaster, Mass. The charter was renewed Sept. 20, 1769. Settlements were commenced in 1764, by David Page, Edwards Bucknam, and others. Barker's Location was annexed, June 22, 1819. The farm of E. Winchester was severed from Stark and annexed Dec. 4, 1840. A portion of Kilkenny was annexed, Dec. 15, 1842.

Landaff. Granted Jan. 31, 1764, to James Avery and others. Regranted to Dartmouth College, Jan. 19, 1770. Reincorporated Nov. 11, 1774. Settlements were made to some extent under the Dartmouth College grant. After the Revolution, the first grantees claimed that the forfeiture was illegal and the College had to give up its title. A portion of Lincoln was annexed July 2, 1845. All that part of Landaff northwest of Ammonoosuc river was annexed to Lisbon, June 23, 1859. Easton was set off and incorporated, July 20, 1876.

Langdon. Made up from parts of Charlestown and Walpole, and incorporated June 11, 1787. Named in honor of Gov. John Langdon. The first settlements were made in 1773, by Seth Walker, and the next year by Nathaniel Rice and Jonathan Willard. In 1795, the town refused an addition extending to Connecticut river.

Lebanon. Granted July 4, 1761, to Nehemiah Estabrook and others, and named for Lebanon, Conn., whence came some of the grantees. The first settlements were made by William Dana, Silas Waterman, William Downer, and Nathaniel Porter. This was one of the towns that voted to unite with Vermont, and was the first town settled on Connecticut river, north of Charlestown.

Lee. Set off from Durham and incorporated, Jan. 16, 1766. Joseph Sias was authorized to call the first meeting. The line between Lee and Durham was established, June 19, 1818.

Lempster. This was *Number 9* in the line of towns from Merrimack to Connecticut river, granted by Massachusetts, Jan. 16, 1735-6. Granted by New Hampshire as *Dupplin*, Jan. 1, 1753, to Samuel Clark Pain and others. No settlements were made under this grant. Regranted Oct. 5, 1761, to Benadam Gallop and others, and incorpo-

rated as Lempster. Regranted Jan. 5, 1767, to Dudley Woodbridge and others. Settlements were made about 1770, by people from Connecticut. The charter was renewed Jan. 21, 1772. A portion of this town was included in the incorporation of Goshen, Dec. 27, 1791. The line between Lempster and Washington was established, Nov. 27, 1812.

Lincoln. Granted Jan. 31, 1764, to James Avery and others. It is a mountainous tract of land and but few settlements have ever been made.

Lisbon. Granted as *Concord*, Aug. 6, 1763, to Joseph Burt and others. The same territory was granted as *Chiswick*, Jan. 31, 1764, to John Fansher and others. Regranted as *Gunthwaite*, Oct. 20, 1768, to Leonard Whiting and others. Settlements were made under the grants of 1763 and 1768, which led to a controversy. The name was changed to Lisbon, June 14, 1824. All that part of Landaff north-west of Ammonoosuc river was annexed to Lisbon, June 23, 1859.

Litchfield. This was originally a part of Old Dunstable, known as *Naticook*. Granted by Massachusetts, July 9, 1729, and called *Brenton's Farm*. The present name was adopted July 3, 1734. Incorporated as Litchfield, June 5, 1749. The first settlements were made about 1720, by people from Billerica and Chelmsford, Mass.

Littleton. This was a part of *Chiswick* (afterwards *Apthorp*), which was granted Nov. 17, 1764, to James Avery and others. Regranted as *Apthorp*, Jan. 18, 1770, to Moses Little and others, and named in honor of George Apthorp, of London, England, one of the grantees. Dalton was set off from *Apthorp* and incorporated Nov. 4, 1784, and the remainder of *Apthorp* was incorporated as Littleton at the same time, receiving its name in honor of Moses Little. The first settlement was made by Capt. Nathan Caswell in 1770.

Livermore. This town was made up of grants to Elkins, Sargent & Elkins, Hatch & Cleaves, the two Raymonds, and Bean & Gilman. Incorporated July 11, 1876, and named in honor of the Livermore family.

Londonderry. Formerly known as *Nutfield*. Granted June 21, 1722, to John Moor and others, and named Londonderry for Londonderry in Ireland. The town was divided into two parishes, Feb. 25, 1740-1. Windham was set off and incorporated, Feb. 12, 1742-3. The northwest portion of the town, with other territory was incorporated

as Derryfield (now Manchester), Sept. 3, 1751. A portion was annexed to Hudson, March 6, 1778. A portion of Londonderry was severed and annexed to Windham, Sept. 26, 1777, and Samuel Clark with his estate was also annexed to Windham, Nov. 26, 1778. The line between these two towns was established, Nov. 22, 1782. Another portion was annexed to Windham, Dec. 25, 1805. Derry was set off and incorporated, July 2, 1827.

Loudon. Set off from Canterbury and incorporated Jan. 23, 1773. Named in honor of the Earl of Loudon. The first settlements were made in 1760, by Jethro and Abraham Bachelder and Moses Ordway. A portion of Loudon was annexed to Concord, Jan. 2, 1784. A small tract was severed from Canterbury and annexed to Loudon, Jan. 7, 1853.

Lyman. Granted Nov. 10, 1761, to Daniel Lyman and others, eleven of whom bore the name of Lyman, and for whom the town was named. The charter was renewed July 20, 1769. But few settlements were made before the Revolution. Monroe was set off and incorporated July 13, 1854.

Lyme. Granted July 8, 1761, to John Thompson and others. Settlements were commenced in 1764, by William and John Sloan, and Walter Fairfield. They named the town for Lyme, Conn. The charter was renewed Feb. 21, 1770.

Lyndeborough. Granted by Massachusetts, June 19, 1735, to Capt. Samuel King and others, and called *Salem-Canada*. Granted by the Masonian Proprietors, Dec. 5, 1753, to Benjamin Lynde and others, and named Lyndeborough in honor of Benjamin Lynde. Incorporated April 23, 1764. The first settlements were made in 1750. A portion of the town, with other territory, was incorporated as Greenfield, June 15, 1791. Another portion was annexed to Temple, June 11, 1796. The northeasterly part was annexed to Mont Vernon, Jan. 5, 1853. A tract from the southerly side was annexed to Milford, June 27, 1873.

Madbury. Made up from parts of Dover and Durham, and incorporated as a parish, May 31, 1755. Granted full town privileges, May 20, 1768. This territory was called Madbury previous to its incorporation. An unsuccessful attempt was made to procure an act of incorporation in 1743.

Madison. Set off from Eaton and incorporated Dec. 17, 1852. Named in honor of James Madison. This included, also, land belonging to various proprietors, between Eaton and Albany.

Manchester. This territory was originally known as *Harrytown* or *Old Harry Town*. Granted by the Masonian Proprietors, April 17, 1735, to Capt. William Tyng's "snow-shoe men," and hence called *Tyng's-town*. Incorporated as *Derryfield*, Sept. 3, 1751. The first town meeting was held at John Hall's house Sept. 23, 1751. A gore of land was annexed to the north side, Dec. 4, 1795. The name of the town was changed to Manchester, June 13, 1810. A city charter was granted July 10, 1846. "Amoskeag" was severed from Goffstown, and "Piscataquog" or "Squog" from Bedford, and annexed July 1, 1853.

Marlborough. Granted by the Masonian Proprietors as *Monadnock No. 5*, May 20, 1752, to James Morrison and others. Many of the settlers came from Marlborough, Mass., and it was sometimes called *New Marlborough*. Incorporated as Marlborough, Dec. 13, 1776, and named for Marlborough, Mass. The first settlements were made about 1760, by Abel Woodward, Benjamin Tucker, Daniel Goodenough, and others. A small portion of Swanzey was annexed Jan. 8, 1794. A part of the town, with other territory, was incorporated as Roxbury, Dec. 9, 1812. Another portion was incorporated in the limits of Troy, June 23, 1815. Joel Porter, Phineas Farrar, Jr., and Ezra Porter, with their estates were severed from Dublin and annexed June 13, 1818. A tract belonging to William Tenney and Luther Hemenway, was severed from Swanzey and annexed, Dec. 15, 1842.

Marlow. Granted as *Addison*, Jan. 1, 1753, to Elias Alexander and others. Regranted as Marlow, Oct. 7, 1761, to William Noyes and others. The charter was renewed Jan. 24, 1772. Named for an English town. Among the first settlers were Thomas and Samuel Gustin, Elisha and Solomon Mack, Jasper and Nathan Huntley, and Joseph Tubbs. All that part of the town east of the "Curve Line" was annexed to Stoddard, June 21, 1797.

Mason. Granted by the Masonian Proprietors as *Number 1*, Nov. 1, 1749, to William Lawrence and others. Incorporated as Mason, Aug. 26, 1768, and named in honor of Capt. John Mason. The inhabitants voted June 22, 1768, to call the town "Sharon," but the Governor named it Mason. Greenville was set off and incorporated June 28, 1872.

Meredith. Granted by the Masonian Proprietors, Dec. 31, 1748, to Samuel Palmer and others, and called *Palmer's-town* afterwards *New Salem*, some of the settlers coming from Salem. This territory was previously mentioned as *Second Township*. Incorporated as Meredith, Dec. 30, 1768. Stone-dam and Bear Islands were annexed Dec. 30, 1799. Laconia was set off and incorporated July 14, 1855.

Merrimack. This was a part of the Old Dunstable grant. Incorporated April 2, 1746. Col. Joseph Blanchard was authorized to call the first meeting. An addition of all that part of the town north of the Souhegan river was granted Jan. 1, 1750.

Middleton Granted as *Middletown* by the Masonian Proprietors, April 27, 1749, to Ebenezer Varney and others. The charter was renewed March 21, 1770. Incorporated as Middleton, March 4, 1778. The inhabitants of the north part attempted to get incorporation as a separate township in 1785, but were unsuccessful. They succeeded later, and were incorporated as Brookfield, Dec. 30, 1794.

Milan. Granted as *Paulsbourg*, Dec. 31, 1771, to Sir William Mayne and others, and named in honor of Paul Wentworth. Incorporated as Milan, Dec. 16, 1824.

Milford. Made up from parts of Hollis, Amherst, and the Mile Slip, and included Charlestown and Duxbury School Farms. Incorporated Jan. 11, 1794. Unsuccessful attempts at incorporation were made in 1779 and 1780. A portion of Amherst was annexed Dec. 20, 1842, and a portion of Lyndeborough, June 27, 1873.

Millsfield. Granted March 1, 1774, to George Boyd and others, and named in honor of Thomas Mills.

Milton. Set off from Rochester and incorporated June 11, 1802. A portion of Wakefield was annexed June 22, 1820.

Monroe. Set off from Lyman and incorporated July 13, 1854. This territory was naturally separated from Lyman by Gardner Mountain.

Mont Vernon. Set off from Amherst and incorporated Dec. 15, 1803. A portion of Lyndeborough was annexed Jan. 5, 1853.

Moultonborough. Granted by the Masonian Proprietors, Nov. 17, 1763, to Col. Jonathan Moulton and others, for whom it was named. Moultonborough Gore was annexed Jan. 24, 1765. Incorporated Nov. 24, 1777. Long Island was annexed Dec. 30, 1799.

Nashua. This was a part of the Old Dunstable grant. Incorporated as *Dunstable*, April 1, 1746. "One Pine Hill," belonging to *Dunstable*, was annexed to Hollis, Dec. 13, 1763. The farms of Daniel Merrill and Ebenezer Jacquith were taken from *Dunstable* and annexed to Hollis, May 14, 1773. The name was changed to Nashua Dec. 8, 1836. Nashville was set off and incorporated June 23, 1842, but was reunited and the two incorporated as a city, June 27, 1853.

Nelson. Granted by the Masonian Proprietors as *Monadnock No. 6*, May 10, 1752, to John Hutchinson and others. The grant was renewed Sept. 30, 1767. Again renewed Feb. 23, 1774. Incorporated as *Packersfield*, Feb. 22, 1774, and named for Thomas Packer. The present name was adopted Oct. 1, 1814, in honor of Lord Nelson. In 1777, an unsuccessful attempt was made to change the name to "Sullivan." The first settlements were made in 1767-8, by Breed Batchelder and Nathaniel Breed. The northwest part of the town, combined with other territory, was incorporated as Sullivan, Sept. 27, 1787. The southwest corner was combined with other territory to make up the town of Roxbury, Dec. 9, 1812. The line between Nelson and Roxbury was changed June 15, 1820, by which Nelson lost a small tract. The farm of Ebenezer Tarbox was severed from Stoddard and annexed to Nelson, June 25, 1835.

New Boston. Granted by Massachusetts, Jan. 14, 1735-6, to John Simpson and others. The grant was confirmed by the Masonian Proprietors, Feb. 2, 1748-9. Sometimes called *Lane's-town*. Regranted Dec. 24, 1751, to Job Lewis and others. Incorporated as New Boston, Feb. 18, 1763, and named for Boston, Mass. Col. John Goffe was authorized to call the first meeting. The farm of Isaac Parker was severed and annexed to Goffstown, June 18, 1836.

Newbury. Granted by the Masonian Proprietors as *Dantzick*, June 4, 1753. Regranted Feb. 5, 1772, to John Fisher and others. Incorporated as *Fishersfield*, Nov. 27, 1778, and named for John Fisher. The present name was adopted July 4, 1837. The Masonian grant of *Hereford* was included within these limits. Newbury was taken from Cheshire county and annexed to Hillsborough at the time of incorporation, and became part of Merrimack county on its formation. A portion of the town was included in the incorporation of Goshen, Dec. 27, 1791. Two tracts of land were severed and annexed to Bradford, one Dec. 6, 1796, and the other June 22, 1859.

Newcastle. Originally a part of Portsmouth, known as *Great Island*. Set off and incorporated as Newcastle, May 30, 1693. Named in honor of the Duke of Newcastle. David Thompson settled in 1623, and built "Mason's Hall" on Odiorne's Point. That part of the town southwest of the river was annexed to Rye, Dec. 22, 1791.

New Durham. Granted by the Masonian Proprietors, May 5, 1749, to Jonathan Chesley and others, and sometimes called *Cochecho Township*. Incorporated Dec. 7, 1762. The town was settled partly by people from Durham, whence it derived its name. New Durham Gore was incorporated as Alton, June 16, 1796.

New Hampton. Granted as *Moultonborough Addition*, Jan. 24, 1765, to Jonathan Moulton and others, proprietors of Moultonborough. Incorporated as New Hampton, Nov. 27, 1777, named for Hampton. Centre Harbor was set off and incorporated Dec. 7, 1797.

Newington. Formerly a part of Dover, known as *Bloody Point*. The date of incorporation is doubtful, but is given by some as July, 1764. A small portion of the town was severed and annexed to Portsmouth, June 26, 1821.

New Ipswich. Granted by Massachusetts, Jan. 15, 1735-6, to John Wainwright, John Choate, and others, inhabitants of Ipswich, Mass. Granted by the Masonian Proprietors, April 17, 1750, to Reuben Kidder and others. Incorporated as *Ipswich*, Sept. 9, 1762. Incorporated as New Ipswich, March 6, 1766.

New London. Granted by the Masonian Proprietors, as *Heidlebourg*, June 5, 1753. Re-granted as *Alexandria Addition*, July 7, 1773, to Jonas Minot and others. Incorporated as New London, June 25, 1779, and named for London, Eng. The first meeting was called by Samuel Messer, and held Aug. 3, 1779. A part of Kearsarge Gore was annexed June 19, 1793. Portions of Sunapee were annexed Dec. 11, 1804, and June 19, 1817. The northerly part was combined with a part of Kearsarge Gore, and incorporated as Wilnot, June 18, 1807.

Newmarket. Set off from Exeter and incorporated as a parish, Dec. 15, 1727. Granted town privileges Aug. 26, 1737. The boundary line was extended Dec. 28, 1805. This act was repealed June 17, 1807. The north line was established June 19, 1818. South Newmarket was set off and incorporated June 27, 1849. The farm of William Lyford was severed from South Newmarket and annexed Dec. 17, 1852. A portion of Durham was annexed July 2, 1870.

Newport. Granted as *Grenville*, Jan. 1, 1753, to Isaac Pennell and others. Granted Oct. 6, 1761, to Nathaniel Fish and others, and incorporated as Newport. Named for Newport, R. I. The first permanent settlements were made in June, 1766. The charter was renewed Feb. 2, 1769.

Newton. Incorporated as *Newtown*, Dec. 6, 1749. An addition was granted March 22, 1749-50. Capt. Josiah Bartlett was authorized to call the first meeting. The boundary line between Newton and South Hampton was established, Jan. 4, 1772. A portion of East Kingston was annexed, July 2, 1845. The name of the town was changed to Newton, July 10, 1846.

Northfield. Set off from Canterbury and incorporated, June 19, 1780. The first meeting was held July 17, 1780. Settlements were made in 1760 by Blanchard and others. A portion of the town was combined with other territory to make up the town of Franklin, Dec. 24, 1828, but the same territory was reannexed to Northfield, July 3, 1830. The same territory was again annexed to Franklin, June 26, 1858. The lands of Samuel Heath and Edward Leighton were severed and annexed to Franklin, June 27, 1861.

North Hampton. Set off from Hampton, as *North Hill Parish*, Nov. 17, 1738. Incorporated as North Hampton, Nov. 26, 1742. The line between this town and Rye was established Jan. 17, 1793.

Northumberland. Granted as *Stonington*, Oct. 20, 1761, to John Hogg and others. Regranted Jan. 25, 1771, to Daniel Warner and others, and incorporated as Northumberland, Nov. 16, 1779. Named for an English town. The first settlements were made in June, 1767, by Thomas Burnside and Daniel Spaulding. John Brown was authorized to call the first meeting.

Northwood. Originally known as *North-woods*. Set off from Nottingham and made a parish, Feb. 6, 1773. The first settlements were made in 1763, by Increase Bachelder, John Bachelder, and Moses Godfrey of North Hampton, and Solomon Bickford of Durham. The first meeting was called by Benjamin Johnson, and held at Valentine Kenneson's house, March 23, 1773.

Nottingham. Incorporated May 10, 1722, and named for an English town. The inhabitants desired to have the town named New Boston. The first meeting was held at Maj. John Gilman's house, June 13, 1722. Deerfield was set off and incorporated, Jan. 8, 1766. Northwood was set off and incorporated, Feb. 6, 1773.

Orange. Granted as *Cardigan*, Feb. 6, 1769, to Isaac Fellows and others. Incorporated as Orange, June 18, 1790. The inhabitants petitioned to have the town incorporated as "Bradford" in 1779; as "Middleton" in 1783; as "Liscomb" in 1789. "Liscomb" was crossed, and "Orange" inserted in the last petition. A portion of Orange was annexed to Hebron, and a portion of Hebron to Orange, Dec. 13, 1804. The line between the two towns was established Dec. 2, 1808. A portion of Orange was annexed to Alexandria, Dec. 6, 1820.

Orford. Granted Sept. 25, 1761, to Jonathan Moulton, Jr., and others. The charter was renewed, Feb. 8, 1772. The first settlements were made about 1765, by Daniel Cross, Gen. Israel Morey, John Mann and others, who came from Connecticut. The farm of John Dana, Jr., was severed from Orford, and annexed to Wentworth, June 28, 1837. This was one of the towns which voted to unite with Vermont in 1778.

Ossipee. Formerly known as *Ossipee Gore*, and *New Garden*. Incorporated as Ossipee, Feb. 22, 1785. That part of Ossipee Gore which was not included in Ossipee, was annexed to Effingham, Dec. 23, 1820. Named for a tribe of Indians who once lived in that vicinity. The farm of Wentworth Lord, with other territory, was severed from Ossipee and annexed to Tamworth, Jan. 13, 1837. A portion of the same was reannexed to Ossipee, June 22, 1859.

Pelham. Made up from parts of Old Dunstable and Dracut, Mass., and incorporated July 5, 1746. Named in honor of Thomas Pelham Holles, Duke of Newcastle. The charter was confirmed by the Masonian Proprietors, April 27, 1774. The first settlements were made about 1722, by John Butler and William Richardson. The town was divided into two parishes, Jan. 4, 1787, but the act was repealed in 1792. The town was severed from Rockingham county and annexed to Hillsborough, Dec. 10, 1824.

Pembroke. Granted by Massachusetts, Aug. 6, 1728, to Capt. John Lovewell and others, and known as *Suncook* and *Lovewell's-town*. Incorporated as Pembroke, Nov. 1, 1759, and named probably in honor of the Earl of Pembroke. Walter Bryant was authorized to call the first meeting. The town was divided into two parishes, Dec. 17, 1763. The boundary line was extended to the bank of Suncook

river, Dec. 24, 1798, to settle a dispute between Pembroke and Allenstown. All that part of Bow on the east side of Merrimack river was annexed to Pembroke and Concord, Dec. 13, 1804.

Peterborough. Formerly known as *Souhegan*. Granted by Massachusetts, Jan. 16, 1737-8, to Samuel Hayward and others. Incorporated as Peterborough, Jan. 17, 1760, and named probably in honor of the Earl of Peterborough. The charter was renewed, Jan. 8, 1762. No permanent settlements were made until about 1749. A small portion of the southeast corner was annexed to Temple, Jan. 29, 1789. A part of this town was included in the limits of Greenfield, incorporated June 15, 1791.

Piermont. Granted Nov. 6, 1764, to John Temple and others. The first settlements were made about 1768, by Daniel Tyler, Levi Root, Ebenezer White, and David Tyler. Thomas Clark, Daniel Clark, Jonathan Herbert, and Asa Boynton, with their estates, were severed from Piermont and annexed to Wentworth, Jan. 15, 1787. The same territory was reannexed to Piermont, July 1, 1819.

Pittsburg. This was formerly known as the *Indian Stream* territory. Incorporated as Pittsburg, Dec. 10, 1840. The boundary lines were established Dec. 30, 1848. This is the most northerly town in the state.

Pittsfield. Set off from Chichester and incorporated, March 27, 1782. John Cram was authorized to call the first meeting. A school district in Pittsfield, and school district No. 6 in Epsom were united as Republican School District, July 3, 1841. A fire district was established July 1, 1870.

Plainfield. Granted Aug. 14, 1761, to Benjamin Hutchins and others, and named for Plainfield, Conn. The first settlements were made in 1764. A portion of this town and a portion of Grantham were constituted the parish of Meriden, June 23, 1780. The Grantham portion of this parish was annexed to Plainfield, July 12, 1856.

Plaistow. This was originally a part of Haverhill, Mass., and after the running of the province line, was part of Haverhill District, until incorporated as *Plastow*, Feb. 28, 1749. Atkinson was set off and incorporated Sept. 3, 1767. A portion of James George's farm was severed from Kingston and annexed June 28, 1831.

Plymouth. Granted July 15, 1763, to Joseph Blanchard and others, and sometimes called *New Plymouth*. The first settlements

were made in 1764, by Zachariah Parker, James Hobart, Stephen Webster, David Webster, and others. Portions of Plymouth and Cocker-mouth were combined and incorporated as Hebron, June 15, 1792. A tract of land formerly severed by a boundary line committee was restored to Plymouth, June 21, 1793. The "Everett Farm" and "Withey Lot," owned by Nathaniel Peabody, were annexed at the same time. A portion of Hebron was annexed June 26, 1845, and a portion of Campton, June 27, 1860.

Portsmouth. This territory was granted for a township by the Council of Plymouth in 1631, and was called *Piscataqua* and *Strawberry Bank*. Incorporated by Massachusetts as Portsmouth, May 28, 1653. Newcastle was set off and incorporated, May 30, 1693. Greenland was set off partially in 1704, and completely in 1721. A city charter was adopted in 1849.

Randolph. Granted Aug. 20, 1772, to John Durand and his son, Edward Parry, Thomas Brown, and Charles Henzell, and named *Durand*, in honor of its principal proprietor. Incorporated by the name of Randolph, June 16, 1824. Named in honor of John Randolph.

Raymond. This territory was purchased of an Indian, in 1717, by Col. Stephen Dudley, and was called *Freetown*. Was included in the incorporation of Chester, Aug. 27, 1726, and so remained until set off and incorporated as a parish by the name of Raymond, May 9, 1764. First town meeting called by Samuel Emerson, and held May 29, 1764. Boundary line between Raymond and Candia was established, June 23, 1848.

Richmond. Granted by Massachusetts, June 20, 1735, to Capt. Joseph Sylvester's men, and called *Sylvester-Canada*. Granted Feb. 28, 1752, to Joseph Blanchard and others in 71 shares, and incorporated as Richmond. The charter was renewed June 11, 1760. A triangular tract in the north part of the town was severed and annexed to Swanzey, Dec. 11, 1762. Another portion taken off June 23, 1815, and combined with portions of Marlborough, Fitzwilliam, and Swanzey, to make the town of Troy. The northwest corner was severed and annexed to Winchester, July 2, 1850.

Rindge. Granted by Massachusetts, Feb. 3, 1736-7, to inhabitants of Rowley, Mass., who were in the Canada expedition.

Hence called *Rowley-Canada*. Granted by the Masonian Proprietors, Feb. 14, 1749-50, to Solomon Stewart and others, and known as *Monadnock No. 1*, or *South Monadnock*. Incorporated as Rindge, Feb. 11, 1768, and named in honor of Daniel Rindge. The line between Rindge and Fitzwilliam was established June 17, 1847.

Rochester. This town, as incorporated May 10, 1722, included the present towns of Farmington and Milton. First permanent settlement was made by Capt. Timothy Roberts in December, 1728. Not generally settled until after 1760, on account of depredations by Indians. The westerly part was set off and incorporated as Farmington, Dec. 1, 1798. Milton was set off and incorporated, June 11, 1802. A part of Rufus C. Varney's farm was severed and annexed to Barrington, July 10, 1846. City charter granted March 31, 1891. First city election, Dec. 1, 1891.

Rollinsford. Set off from Somersworth and incorporated, July 3, 1849. So named in honor of the Rollins family. This town contains the village of Salmon Falls.

Roxbury. This town was made up from parts of Nelson, Keene, and Marlborough, and incorporated Dec. 9, 1812. The estate of Samuel Griffin was severed from Nelson and annexed to Marlborough, June 15, 1820. By an act passed July 1, 1868, the entire town of Roxbury was annexed to Keene, but the act was not adopted by a majority vote of each town, and Roxbury remained separate.

Rumney. Granted Oct. 4, 1761, to Samuel Olmstead and others and regranted March 18, 1767, to Daniel Brainard and others. First settled in the fall of 1765, by Jonathan Cummings, and the next year by James Heath, Daniel Brainard, and Moses Smart. Rumney and Wentworth Union School District established, June 22, 1842, and its boundaries defined June 28, 1847.

Rye. First known as *Sandy Beach*. Settlements were made on this territory in 1635. Was a part of Portsmouth until the incorporation of Newcastle, May 30, 1693, after which it was a part of the latter until separated, and, with portions of Portsmouth and Hampton, incorporated as Rye, April 30, 1726. All that portion of the town southwest of the river was annexed, Dec. 22, 1791. Gosport or Star Island was annexed, July 20, 1876.

Salem. This town was made up from parts of Haverhill District, Methuen, and Dracut, Mass., and was incorporated May 11,

1750. A new line between Salem and Windham was established Jan. 9, 1752-3. The charter was confirmed by the Masonian Proprietors, March 8, 1759.

Salisbury. Granted by Massachusetts, Feb. 3, 1736-7, and called *Baker's-town*. Granted by the Masonian Proprietors, Oct. 25, 1749, to Ebenezer Stevens and others, and called *Stevens'-town*. Also called at times, *Gerrish-town* and *New Salisbury*. Incorporated as Salisbury, March 1, 1768. Among the first settlers were Ebenezer Webster, John Webster, Edward Eastman, Nathaniel Meloon, and Philip Call, some of whom settled in 1750. A tract of land from the east part of the town, with portions of Andover, Northfield, and Sanbornton, was erected into the town of Franklin, Dec. 24, 1828. A part of Franklin was severed and annexed to Salisbury, July 7, 1869.

Sanbornton. Granted by the Masonian Proprietors, Dec. 31, 1748, to John Sanborn, of Hampton, and others, and called *Sanborn-town*. This territory was previously mentioned as *First Township*. Incorporated as Sanbornton, March 1, 1770. No permanent settlements were made until 1764, on account of Indian troubles. Sanbornton Academy was incorporated Dec. 20, 1820. "Sanbornton Bridge" was set off and incorporated as Tilton, June 30, 1869. Part of Tilton was severed and annexed to Sanbornton, July 1, 1870. Part of Sanbornton was severed and annexed to Tilton, July 3, 1872.

Sandown. Set off from Kingston and incorporated April 6, 1756. Col. Ebenezer Stevens was appointed to call the first meeting. By return of the selectmen in September, 1775, 34 men out of a total population of 635, were in the army.

Sandwich. Granted Oct. 25, 1763, to Samuel Gilman and others, and incorporated. Part of the town being mountainous and rocky, Sandwich Addition was granted Sept. 5, 1764. A committee was appointed Feb. 22, 1785, to fix the lines between Sandwich, Tamworth, and Moultonborough. Another committee was appointed Dec. 23, 1808, to establish the lines between Sandwich, Tamworth, Eaton, and Albany. Reported in favor of no change and the report was adopted.

Seabrook. Originally a part of Hampton, and was included in the limits of Hampton Falls. Set off from Hampton Falls, and

incorporated by its present name, June 3, 1768. A small tract of land was severed from Hampton Falls and annexed to Seabrook, Dec. 7, 1816. The western boundary line was established June 26, 1822, and a portion of South Hampton declared within the jurisdiction of Seabrook.

Sharon. Made up from a part of Peterborough Slip, and incorporated June 24, 1791. Incorporation petitioned for, however, May 27, 1777. The entire town was annexed to Peterborough by an act passed July 5, 1867, to take effect when adopted by a majority of voters in each town. It has never yet been adopted.

Shelburne. Granted May 3, 1769, to Mark Hunking Wentworth, Daniel Peirce, Daniel Rogers, and John, Daniel, Isaac, and Jotham Rindge. Shelburne Addition was granted Nov. 21, 1770. Incorporated as Shelburne, Dec. 13, 1820. Shelburne Addition was incorporated by the name of Gorham, June 18, 1836. Settlements were commenced in 1775, but the town contained only 35 inhabitants in 1790.

Somersworth. Set off from Dover as a parish, Dec. 19, 1729, but was not entirely separated and incorporated as a town until April 22, 1754. Probably the first manufacturing company in the state was incorporated at Salmon Falls in 1761. Rollinsford was set off and incorporated July 3, 1849.

South Hampton. Made up from parts of Amesbury and Salisbury, Mass., and incorporated May 25, 1742. The east end of the town was severed and annexed to Hampton Falls, Dec. 4, 1742. Thirty men were set off to Newton, March 22, 1749. The line between South Hampton and Newton was established, Jan. 4, 1772. A tract of land belonging to Richard Fitz was severed from East Kingston and annexed to South Hampton, Nov. 30, 1824.

South Newmarket. Originally a part of Exeter, but was included in the limits of Newmarket, when that town was incorporated Dec. 15, 1727. Set off from Newmarket and incorporated June 27, 1849. It was known at times as *Lamprey River Village*, and *Newfield*.

Springfield. Granted Jan. 3, 1769, to John Fisher of Portsmouth, and others, and called by the name of *Protectworth*. The first settlements were made in 1772. It was incorporated as Springfield, Jan. 23, 1794. A tract of land between this town and Enfield, known as Heath's Gore, was annexed June 20, 1817.

Stark. Granted Aug. 3, 1774, to Jacob Walden and others, by the name of *Percy*. Named probably for the King's chaplain, Thomas Percy. Incorporated Jan. 9, 1795, and the name spelled *Piercy*. A tract of land was severed from the southeast part of Stratford, and annexed to this town, June 21, 1832. Gen. John Winslow's grant was annexed Dec. 21, 1832. The name of the town was changed to Stark, Dec. 28, 1832, in honor of Gen. John Stark. Elhanan Winchester's land was severed and annexed to Lancaster, Dec. 4, 1840. A small tract was severed from Stark and annexed to Dummer, July 1, 1868.

Stewartstown. Granted Dec. 1, 1770, to Sir James Cockburne, Sir George Colebrooke, and John Stuart, of London, and John Nelson of the island of Grenada. Called *Stuart* or *Stuart-town*, in honor of John Stuart. Incorporated Dec. 22, 1795, as *Stuart*, but the legality of the proceedings being doubted, it was again incorporated by its present name, Dec. 24, 1799. No permanent settlements were made until after the Revolution. A fort was built here during the war of 1812.

Stoddard. Granted by the Masonian Proprietors, May 10, 1752, to Col. Sampson Stoddard and others, and known as *Monadnock No. 7*, and *Limerick*. The charter was renewed Nov. 4, 1767. Incorporated as Stoddard, Nov. 4, 1774, and named in honor of Col. Stoddard. The first settlements were made in 1769, by John Taggart and others. The southwest corner was combined with portions of Gilsum, Keene, and Nelson, to make up the town of Sullivan, Sept. 27, 1787. The line between Stoddard, and Gilsum and Marlow was settled, June 16, 1797. The farm of Ebenezer Tarbox was severed and annexed to Nelson, June 25, 1835.

Strafford. Set off from Barrington and incorporated June 17, 1820. No changes in the boundary lines are found on record. Named directly, or indirectly, for an English town.

Stratford. Granted June 26, 1762, to John Prindle and others, and incorporated as *Woodbury*. The charter was renewed Jan. 15, 1770. Granted May 26, 1773, to Joshua Wentworth and others, and incorporated as Stratford. Named for an English town. Re-incorporated Nov. 16, 1779. First settlements were made by Isaac Johnson, Archippus Blodgett, and others. The southeast part of the town was severed and annexed to Stark, June 21, 1832.

Stratham. Originally a portion of the "Squamscott Patent," granted to Edward Hilton, March 12, 1629, and known as *Winnicott*. Incorporated as Stratham, March 14, 1715-16. The first town meeting was held April 10, 1716. The farm of Brackett Weeks was severed and annexed to Greenland, Dec. 18, 1805. The line between Stratham and Newmarket was established Dec. 28, 1805, but this act was repealed June 17, 1807. A small tract was severed and annexed to Greenland, July 2, 1847.

Sullivan. Made up from portions of Keene, Gilsum, Stoddard, and Nelson, and incorporated Sept. 27, 1787. Named in honor of Gen. John Sullivan. A portion of Keene was annexed to Sullivan, Jan. 10, 1794. A few acres of land were severed and annexed to Gilsum, July 7, 1874.

Sunapee. Originally known as *Corey's-town*. Granted Nov. 7, 1768, to Oliver Corey and others, and named *Saville*. Incorporated as *Wendell*, April 4, 1781. Named in honor of John Wendell, of Portsmouth, one of the grantees. The south end of the town was combined with portions of Newport, Newbury, Lempster, and Unity, and erected into the town of Goshen, Dec. 27, 1791. Small tracts were severed and annexed to New London, Dec. 11, 1804, and June 19, 1817. The name of the town was changed to Sunapee, July 12, 1850.

Surry. Made up from parts of Gilsum and Westmoreland, and incorporated March 9, 1769. Named for an English town. That portion taken from Westmoreland was previously known as "Westmoreland Leg." The first meeting was called by Peter Hayward, the first settler. Surry was one of the towns that voted to unite with Vermont.

Sutton. Granted by the Masonian Proprietors, Nov. 30, 1749, to Obediah Perry and others, and called *Perry's-town*. The charter was renewed Feb. 24, 1752, and again, Aug. 18, 1773. Incorporated as Sutton, April 13, 1784. Named for Sutton, Mass. David Peaslee, who settled in 1767, found traces of an Indian settlement on the west side of Kezar's Pond.

Swanzy. Granted by Massachusetts, April 20, 1733, to Nathaniel Hammond and others, and known as *Lower Ashuelot*. In 1747, owing to the withdrawal of the guards on the frontier, the settlement was abandoned. The settlers returned about three years afterward.

Incorporated as Swanzey, July 2, 1753. Named for Swanzey, Mass. A triangular tract severed from Richmond and annexed to Swanzey, Dec. 11, 1762. A portion of the northeast part severed and annexed to Marlborough, Jan. 8, 1794. Thomas Thompson and Thomas Thompson, Jr., with their estates, severed and annexed to Keene, Dec. 10, 1812. A tract severed and combined with portions of other towns, to make up the town of Troy, June 23, 1815. A small tract severed and annexed to Marlborough, Dec. 15, 1842.

Tamworth. Granted Oct. 14, 1766, to Lt. John Webster and others. Named for an English town. First settled in 1771, by William Eastman, Richard Jackman, David Philbrick, and Jonathan Choate. A committee was appointed to settle the line between Tamworth and Sandwich, Feb. 22, 1785; also one to settle the line between Tamworth, and Albany and Eaton, Jan. 10, 1796; also another to settle both lines, Dec. 23, 1808. A tract of land was severed from Ossipee and annexed to Tamworth, Jan. 13, 1837. The same territory was again annexed to Ossipee, June 25, 1859.

Temple. Granted by the Masonian Proprietors, June 30, 1750, as *Peterborough Slip*, also known as *Sliptown*, which included the town of Sharon. Incorporated as Temple, Aug. 26, 1768. Named for John Temple. The first meeting was called by Ephraim Heald, and held Oct. 10, 1768. A dispute about a strip of land between this town and New Ipswich, terminated in favor of Temple. "Borland's Farm" was annexed Jan. 12, 1781. A tract was severed from Peterborough and annexed to Temple, Jan. 29, 1789. A large tract was severed from Lyndeborough and annexed to Temple, June 11, 1796.

Thornton. Granted July 6, 1763, to Matthew Thornton and others, and named in honor of Matthew Thornton. Regranted Oct. 21, 1768, including a large tract of additional territory. Settlements were made in 1770. Incorporated Nov. 24, 1781. Moses Baker was authorized to call the first meeting. Blanchard's Gore was annexed June 16, 1807. Waterville Gore was severed from Waterville and annexed to Thornton, June 23, 1842.

Tilton. This was formerly a part of Sanbornton, known as *Sanbornton Bridge*. Set off and incorporated June 30, 1869. Named at the suggestion of Charles E. Tilton, a descendant of the first settler, Nathaniel Tilton, who settled in 1768.

Troy. Made up from parts of Marlborough, Fitzwilliam, Swanzev, and Richmond, and incorporated June 23, 1815. Named for ancient Troy. The line between Troy and Marlborough was established June 28, 1847. A portion was severed and annexed to Marlborough, June 24, 1870.

Tuftonborough. Granted by the Masonian Proprietors to John Tufton Mason, and named for him. Woodbury Langdon subsequently purchased a large portion. No permanent settlements were made until after the Revolution. Incorporated Dec. 17, 1795, and Nathan Hoit was authorized to call the first meeting. Cow Island was annexed, Dec. 30, 1799. Whortleberry, Birch, Farm, and Little Bear Islands were annexed, June 25, 1858. Benjamin Wiggin's farm was severed and annexed to Wolfeborough, June 26, 1858.

Unity. Granted as *Buckingham*, Jan. 1, 1753, to John Bissell and others. Regranted July 13, 1764, to Timothy Goodwin and others, and incorporated as Unity. A portion was included in the limits of Goshen, incorporated Dec. 27, 1791. A small tract was severed and annexed to Goshen, July 6, 1837. A tract was severed from the southwest corner, and annexed to Charlestown, June 20, 1810. A small tract was severed from the northwest corner and annexed to Claremont, Dec. 29, 1828.

Wakefield. Granted by the Masonian Proprietors, April 27, 1749, to John Ham and others, and variously known as *Ham's-town*, *East-town*, and *Watertown*. Incorporated as Wakefield, Aug. 30, 1774. All that part of Wakefield north of Province Pond, was severed and annexed to Effingham, June 22, 1820. A portion of Milton was severed and annexed to Wakefield, June 23, 1858.

Walpole. This town was *Number 3* in the line of towns on the east side of Connecticut river, granted by Massachusetts, Jan. 1735-6, to John Flint and others. Granted by New Hampshire, Feb. 13, 1752, to Benjamin Bellows and others, and incorporated as Walpole. Named for an English town. It was also sometimes called *Great Falls* and *Bellows-town*. The charter was renewed March 12, 1761. The privilege of a ferry across the Connecticut at this place was granted to Benjamin Bellows, Aug. 18, 1773. Col. Enoch Hale, of Rindge, was authorized to build a toll-bridge over the Connecticut at

Bellows Falls, Dec. 31, 1783. A tract of land from the north part of the town was combined with a part of Charlestown to make up the town of Langdon, Jan. 11, 1787.

Warner. This town was *Number 1* in the line of towns from Merrimack to Connecticut river, and was granted by Massachusetts, Jan. 16, 1735-6, to Thomas Stevens and others, many of whom were from Amesbury, Mass. The town was called *New Amesbury*. Granted by the Masonian Proprietors, March 14, 1749-50, to Richard Jenness and others, inhabitants of Rye, and called *Jenness-town* and *Ryetoyn*. Re-granted Dec. 24, 1767, to Jonathan Barnard and others. Incorporated as Warner, Sept. 3, 1774, and named in honor of Col. Jonathan Warner, of Portsmouth. Kearsarge Gore was annexed June 13, 1818.

Warren. Granted July 14, 1763, to John Page and others, and incorporated by its present name, in honor of Admiral Sir Peter Warren, of the British Navy. The charter was renewed and a tract of additional territory granted, July 5, 1770. The boundaries of the town were settled by a committee, which reported Sept. 4, 1784. The first settlement was made by Joseph Patch in 1767.

Washington. This town was *Number 8* in the line of towns from Merrimack to Connecticut river, granted by Massachusetts, Jan. 16, 1735-6. Granted by the Masonian Proprietors, Dec. 11, 1752, to Capt. Peter Prescott and others. Re-granted March 17, 1768, to Reuben Kidder and others. The charter was renewed Feb. 5, 1772. The town was variously known as *Monadnock No. 8*, *New Concord*, and *Camden*, until it was incorporated as Washington, Dec. 13, 1776, and named in honor of George Washington. A portion was combined with New Bradford and Washington Gore to make up the town of Bradford, Sept. 27, 1787. The line between Washington and Lempster was established Nov. 27, 1812.

Waterville. This town comprised Gillis & Foss's Grant and a grant to John Raymond, and was incorporated July 1, 1829. A portion of this town was severed and annexed to Sandwich in 1864. The first settlement was made by Moses Foss in 1819.

Weare. This town was granted by Massachusetts, June 19, 1735, to Robert Hale, petitioning for Capt. John Raymond's men, and was called *Beverly-Canada*, and *Hale's-town*. Granted by the Masonian Proprietors, Sept. 20, 1749, to Ichabod Robie and others,

and called at times *Robie's-town* and *Weare's-town*. Incorporated as Weare, Sept. 21, 1764, and named in honor of Meshech Weare. The line between Weare and Dunbarton was established July 2, 1853.

Webster. Set off from Boscawen and incorporated July 3, 1860. The town was named in honor of Daniel Webster.

Wentworth. Granted Nov. 1, 1766, to John Page and others, and incorporated by its present name in honor of Gov. Benning Wentworth. Regranted March 30, 1772, to Asa Porter and others. Thomas Clark, Daniel Clark, Jonathan Herbert, and Asa Boynton, with their estates, were severed from Piermont and annexed to Wentworth, Jan. 15, 1787. A small piece of land owned by John Dana, Jr., was severed from Orford and annexed to Wentworth, June 28, 1837.

Westmoreland. This town was *Number 2* in the line of towns on the east side of Connecticut river, granted by Massachusetts, in 1735-6. Also called *Great Meadows*. Granted by New Hampshire, Feb. 12, 1752, to Thomas Chamberlain and others, and incorporated by its present name. The charter was renewed June 11, 1760. The first settlements were made in 1741, but progress was hindered by the Indians. "Westmoreland Leg" was included in the limits of Surry, incorporated March 9, 1769.

Whitefield. Granted as *Whitefields*, July 4, 1774, to Josiah Moody and others. Incorporated as Whitefield, Dec. 1, 1804. The first settlements were made in 1801, by Col. Joseph Kimball, Maj. John Burns, and John McMaster. The first town meeting was held March 12, 1805, at the house of Maj. John Burns. The first post-office was established in 1824, with William Dodge as first post-master.

Wilmot. This town was made up from parts of New London, Hill, and Kearsarge Gore, and incorporated June 18, 1807. A portion of Hill was annexed, Dec. 21, 1832. A tract of land was severed and annexed to Danbury, Dec. 19, 1848.

Wilton. Granted as *Number 2*, by the Masonian Proprietors, Oct. 1, 1749, to Thomas Read and others. Incorporated as Wilton, June 25, 1762, to continue until Jan. 1, 1765. Re-incorporated Jan. 2, 1765. Named for an English town. A portion of Lyndeborough was set off and annexed to Wilton by Joseph Blanchard, agent for Masonian Proprietors.

Winchester. Granted by Massachusetts, April 6, 1733, to Josiah Willard and others, and called *Earlington*, afterwards *Arlington*. Incorporated as Winchester, July 2, 1753. Named for an English town. Settlements were made in 1732 by Josiah Willard and others. The line between Winchester and Hinsdale was established Sept. 26, 1753. The northwest corner of Richmond was severed and annexed to Winchester, July 2, 1850.

Windham. Set off from Londonderry and incorporated Feb. 12, 1741-2. Named for an English town. The first town meeting was called by Robert Dinsmore, Joseph Waugh, and Robert Thompson, and was held March 8, 1741-2. The line between Windham and Salem was established Jan. 9, 1752. Several persons were severed from Londonderry and annexed to Windham, Sept. 26, 1777. The estate of Samuel Clark was changed in like manner, Nov. 26, 1778. The line between Londonderry and Windham was established Nov. 22, 1782. A portion of Londonderry was severed and annexed to Windham, Dec. 25, 1805.

Windsor. This town was formerly known as *Campbell's Gore*. Wheeler's Gore, situated between *Campbell's Gore* and Washington, was annexed to *Campbell's Gore*, June 21, 1797. Incorporated as Windsor, Dec. 27, 1798. Named for an English town. Joshua Lovejoy was authorized to call the first meeting of the inhabitants. This is one of the smallest towns in the state, both in area and population.

Wolfeborough. Granted by the Masonian Proprietors, Oct. 5, 1759, to William Earl Treadwell and others. Incorporated as Wolfeborough, July 9, 1770, and named in honor of General Wolfe. Wolfeborough Addition was annexed Dec. 4, 1800. A portion of Alton was severed and annexed to Wolfeborough, June 27, 1849. The farm of Benjamin Wiggin was severed from Tuftonborough and annexed to Wolfeborough, June 26, 1858.

Woodstock. Granted Sept. 23, 1763, to Eli Demerit and others and incorporated by the name of *Peeling*. Regranted Dec. 17, 1771, to Nathaniel Cushman and others, and named *Fairfield*. The name was changed to Woodstock, June 19, 1840.

PORTRAITS IN THE STATE HOUSE.

There are now in possession of the state one hundred and thirty-one portraits of men prominent in the history of New Hampshire. These portraits have been secured mainly through the efficient and continued efforts of Hon. Benjamin F. Prescott, to whom the state is greatly indebted. The collection, including Governors, jurists, legislators, military heroes, and others, is one of great interest, and will be held by the state as a sacred trust. The following record, although brief, has not been compiled without labor involving a prolonged inquiry.

NEW HAMPSHIRE DELEGATES

NATIONAL POLITICAL CONVENTIONS.

Throughout the first half century of the history of the United States, the candidates for President and Vice-President were named by Congressional caucus or other method without the intervention of a National Political Convention.

The first convention for the nomination of candidates for President and Vice-President was the Anti-Masonic Convention, held in Baltimore in September, 1831, at which William Wirt, of Maryland, was nominated for President, and Amos Ellmaker, of Pennsylvania, for Vice-President. At this convention New Hampshire was represented by one delegate, Caleb Emery, of Lyman. Other conventions followed. Congressional dictation and other assumed authority in the selection of candidates was succeeded by the more democratic method of selection of candidates by delegates chosen for that purpose. During the past sixty years the political parties of this state have been represented in National Nominating Conventions as follows:

PRESIDENTIAL ELECTORS. — 1788-1892.

In 1788, the voters of New Hampshire for the first time gave in their votes for five electors of President and Vice-President of the United States. The election was holden under a special act of the Legislature, approved December 10, 1788, calling an election on the third Monday of December. The returns of the election were laid before the joint convention of the Senate and House of Representatives on the first Wednesday of January, 1789, and a declaration was made as appears in the following table. In the special act calling and directing the election in 1792, the Governor and Council were directed to canvass the vote for electors instead of the joint convention. In other particulars the act closely resembled the act of 1788. By terms of the act the election was holden on the last Monday of August. None of the candidates received a majority of the votes, and a second election was holden November 12 following. At the second trial only the twelve persons receiving the highest number of votes at the first election were eligible as candidates. By a special act approved June 16, 1796, the third election in this state was holden on the first Monday in November, and the joint convention was directed to canvass the vote on or before the fourth Thursday in November.

In 1800, the Legislature took a new departure and directed the Legislature to choose six electors. No general election was called. In 1804, the election was holden the first Monday, and in 1808 the first Friday, and in 1812, 1816, and 1820 the first Monday in November. These elections were each holden under a special act enacted for that purpose.

In 1824, the Legislature for the first time passed a general law controlling the election of that and of succeeding years. The election was to be holden on the first Monday in November, and in case of a failure to elect by the people, the Legislature was directed to complete the election.

By the provisions of an act of January 7, 1837, the Governor and Council were instructed to canvass and declare the vote, but the act was repealed before the succeeding election in 1840. In 1840, the election for the first time was holden the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November. The joint convention of the Senate and House of Representatives continued to canvass the vote for electors until and including the election of 1852.

Under the provisions of the act of July 8, 1854, the Governor and Council were made a returning board, and to the present time have continued to canvass and declare the vote. The table exhibits the vote after corrections by the board of canvassers.

Since the adoption of a federal constitution there have been twenty-seven presidential elections. In the following exhibit appear the names of candidates for electors, the vote each candidate received, names of the successful candidates for President and Vice-President, and the vote of New Hampshire in each electoral college.

Post-offices at Hillville, Shaker Village, Copperville, Mascoma, and Morse have been abandoned.

FEDERAL COURT OFFICERS IN NEW HAMPSHIRE.

JUSTICES OF THE UNITED STATES SUPREME COURT PRESIDING IN THIS CIRCUIT.

Until the passage of an act in 1869, which provided for the appointment of circuit judges, and practically established the present United States Circuit Court as a court distinct from the United States Supreme Court, the work of the present Circuit Court was done by the justices of the Supreme Court, each one being assigned to a circuit, and sitting during the intermissions of the Supreme Court. He usually sat together with the judge of the District Court for the district in which the Circuit Court was held.

The first Circuit Court of the United States for the district of New Hampshire was organized at Portsmouth, May 20, 1790, and presided over by John Jay, chief justice of the United States Supreme Court, who also held the next term, Nov. 20, of the same year. Judge Jay also appeared at the term in 1791, and again at the May term in 1792, but not afterwards.

The October term, in 1792, was presided over by James Wilson, of Pennsylvania, and James Iredell, of North Carolina, associate justices of the United States Supreme Court. Associate Justice William Cushing, of Massachusetts, also frequently held this court. The stated terms have been held by the following named judges: Samuel Chase, John Pickering (district judge), Chief Justice Oliver Ellsworth, Associate Justice William Patterson, John Lowell, chief justice in 1801 (the ancestor of the present Judge Lowell, of Massachusetts), Jeremiah Smith, and Benjamin Bourne, circuit judges, and John S. Sherburne, district judge. An attempt was made by Congress under the administration of John Adams, in 1801, to establish a Circuit Court, and John Lowell, Jeremiah Smith, and Benjamin Bourne were appointed judges of such a court, but the court was abolished by Congress

under the administration of Thomas Jefferson soon after Jefferson entered upon the duties of his office, and the work was done by the justices of the Supreme Court as before.

At the May term in 1812, Joseph Story, of Massachusetts, who had been appointed in November, 1811, and assigned to this circuit, appeared and held his first term. He continued to hold this court regularly from this time till his death. He was succeeded by Levi Woodbury, of New Hampshire, appointed Sept. 20, 1845, who held his first term Oct. 8 of the same year.

Judge Woodbury was succeeded by Benjamin Robbins Curtis, of Massachusetts, appointed Dec. 20, 1851, who presided until his resignation, Oct. 1, 1857. He held his first term in this district in October, 1852.

Judge Curtis was succeeded by Nathan Clifford, of Maine, who was appointed Jan. 12, 1858, and held his first court in this district in May, 1859.

The act of Congress of April 10, 1869, modified this system, and provided for the appointment of a circuit judge for each circuit, who should have the same power and jurisdiction therein as the justice of the Supreme Court had had before. But the system of allotting the justices of the Supreme Court among the circuits was continued until 1883, and the authority and duty of each of those justices to attend at least one term of the Circuit Court in each district of his circuit, during every period of two years, was expressly declared.

John M. Harlan, of Kentucky, commissioned Nov. 29, 1877, was assigned to this circuit in October, 1880, in addition to his own, and continued therein until the appointment of Judge Clifford's successor, Horace Gray, of Massachusetts, who was appointed Dec. 20, 1881, and still retains his seat.

JUDGES OF THE UNITED STATES CIRCUIT COURT FOR THIS CIRCUIT.

The first Circuit Court was established, as mentioned above, in 1801, with John Lowell, Jeremiah Smith, and Benjamin Bourne as judges, but the act was repealed by Congress in March, 1802. From that time until the act of Congress of April 10, 1869, the terms of this court were presided over by the justices of the United States Supreme Court.

Under the act of 1869, George F. Shepley, of Maine, was, on the 22d of December, 1869, appointed judge for the first circuit, which included Maine, New Hampshire, Massachusetts, and Rhode Island. He held his first term in this district Oct. 8, 1870, and continued in this office until his death, July 20, 1878.

Judge Shepley was succeeded by John Lowell, of Massachusetts, appointed Dec. 18, 1878. Judge Lowell first came into this district, May 16, 1879.

Le Baron B. Colt, of Rhode Island, was appointed in 1884 to succeed Judge Lowell, and holds this office at the present time.

Under the act of Congress passed March 3, 1891, which provided for a Circuit Court of Appeals and an additional judge to each circuit, William L. Putnam, of Maine, was appointed March 17, 1892, and is now in office.

JUDGES OF THE UNITED STATES DISTRICT COURT FOR THE DISTRICT OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

The District Court was organized Dec. 15, 1789, with John Sullivan, of Durham, as judge, appointed Sept. 26, 1789. He held office about five and a half years, and was succeeded by John Pickering, of Portsmouth, appointed in 1795. On one occasion, Jeremiah Smith, of Exeter, circuit judge, held the court on account of the illness of Judge Pickering.

Judge Pickering was succeeded in 1804 by John Samuel Sherburne, who held court from May, 1804, to 1830. The next incumbent of this office was Matthew Harvey, of Hopkinton, appointed Dec. 16, 1830, who served until his death. Judge Harvey was Governor of this state at the time of his appointment, and resigned that office in February, 1831, to accept the judgeship of the District Court. The vacancy caused by the death of Judge Harvey was filled by the appointment of Daniel Clark, of Manchester, July 27, 1866. Judge Clark held the office nearly twenty-five years, and until his death, when he was succeeded by Edgar Aldrich, of Littleton, the present incumbent, who qualified March 3, 1891.

CLERKS OF THE CIRCUIT COURT.

The first clerk of the Circuit Court was Jonathan Steele, of Durham, who was appointed Nov. 10, 1789. His successors were Richard Cutts Shannon, of Portsmouth, appointed May 1, 1804; George Washington Prescott, of Portsmouth, in 1814; Peyton Randolph Freeman, of Portsmouth, March 18, 1817; William Claggett, of Portsmouth, May 8, 1820; Samuel Cushman, of Portsmouth, March 10, 1825; Charles W. Cutter, of Portsmouth, March 13, 1826; John L. Hayes, of Portsmouth, after serving as assistant clerk, appointed clerk, May, 1841; Albert R. Hatch, of Portsmouth, Oct. 9, 1848; William H. Hackett, of Portsmouth, June 1, 1873; Charles E. Batchelder, of Portsmouth, acted as clerk from Sept. 29, 1891, to Oct. 6, 1891; Fremont E. Shurtleff, of Concord, was appointed Oct. 6, 1891, and holds the office at the present time.

During John L. Hayes's term of office, A. J. Penhallow was appointed assistant clerk and served during the busy times caused by the Bankrupt Act of 1841. Wallace Hackett, of Portsmouth, was appointed deputy clerk, May 30, 1879. Several others have served as assistants, but for short periods only.

CLERKS OF THE DISTRICT COURT.

From the organization of the United States courts in 1789, until 1847, the same person held both the offices of clerk of the Circuit Court and clerk of the District Court. In 1847, Charles H. Bartlett, of Manchester, was appointed clerk of the District Court. He was succeeded by Benjamin F. Clark, of Manchester, who qualified by taking the oath of office June 5, 1883. Fremont E. Shurtleff, of Concord, was appointed to this office Aug. 17, 1891, and holds the office at the present time.

UNITED STATES MARSHALS.

The first United States marshal in this district was John Parker, of Portsmouth, appointed Sept. 26, 1789. His successors have been: Nathaniel Rogers, of Newmarket, appointed Nov. 17, 1791; Bradbury Cilley, of Nottingham, 1798; Michael McClary, of Epsom, 1802; Pearson Cogswell, of Gilmanton, 1827; Charles Lane, of Sanbornton,

March, 1836; Israel W. Kelley, of Salisbury, April 12, 1841; Cyrus Barton, of Concord, July, 1845; Samuel Garfield, of Langdon, Aug. 6, 1850; Samuel Tilton, of Saubornton Bridge (now Tilton). April 10, 1854; Stephen W. Dearborn, of Exeter, May 15, 1858; Joseph Gilman, of Tamworth, April 29, 1861; Jacob H. Ela, of Rochester, Aug. 23, 1861; Russell Jarvis, of Claremont, Oct. 22, 1866; Joab N. Patterson, of Concord, March 21, 1867; Fred A. Barker, of Keene, Jan. 13, 1887; Adams T. Pierce, of Dover, Aug. 3, 1890, who is now in office.

UNITED STATES DISTRICT ATTORNEYS.

The office of United States attorney for this district was first held by John Samuel Sherburne, of Portsmouth, who was appointed Sept. 26, 1789. He resigned Dec. 1, 1793, and was succeeded by Edward St. Loe Livermore, of Portsmouth, appointed Feb. 17, 1794. Jeremiah Smith, of Exeter, was appointed to this office in 1798, and resigned in 1801, to accept the office of circuit judge. John Samuel Sherburne was reappointed Jan. 26, 1802, and served until March, 1804, when he resigned to accept the office of district judge. Daniel Humphreys, of Portsmouth, succeeded him. He was followed by Daniel M. Christie, of Dover, appointed April 24, 1828; Samuel Cushman, of Portsmouth, April 20, 1829; Daniel M. Durell, of Dover, April 30, 1830; John P. Hale, of Dover, April 8, 1834; Joel Eastman, of Conway, April 12, 1841; Franklin Pierce, of Hillsborough, March 22, 1845; Josiah Minot, of Bristol, May 17, 1847; William W. Stickney, of Exeter, Aug. 27, 1850; John H. George, of Concord, April 28, 1853; Anson S. Marshall, of Concord, April 19, 1858; Charles W. Rand, of Littleton, July 26, 1861; Henry P. Rolfe, of Concord, July 2, 1869; Joshua G. Hall, of Dover, April 7, 1874; Ossian Ray, of Lancaster, Feb. 22, 1879; Charles H. Burns, of Wilton, March 2, 1885; John S. H. Frink, of Greenland, Oct. 30, 1885; James W. Remick, of Littleton, Feb. 12, 1890, who is now in office.

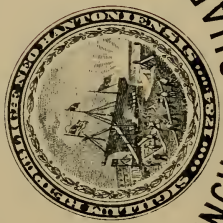

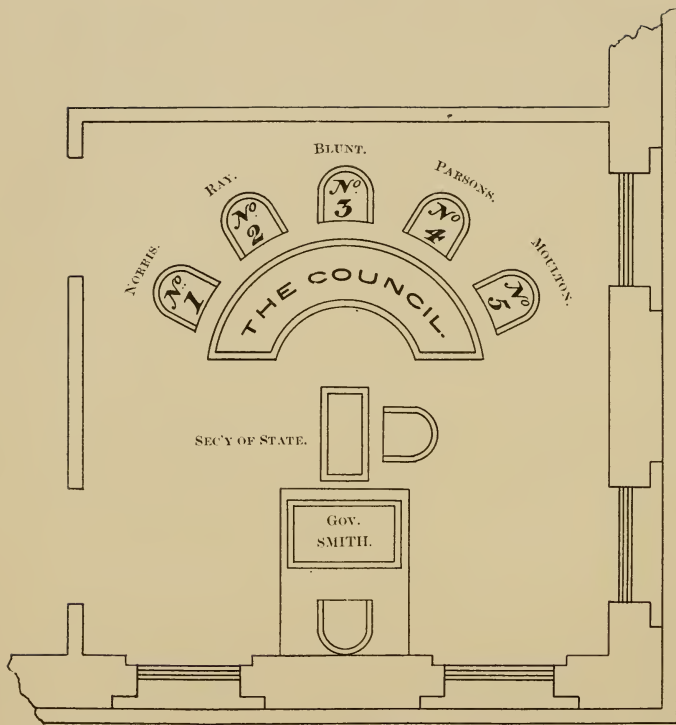


DIAGRAM OF COUNCIL CHAMBER

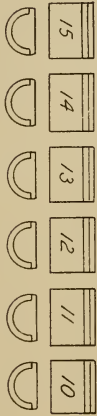
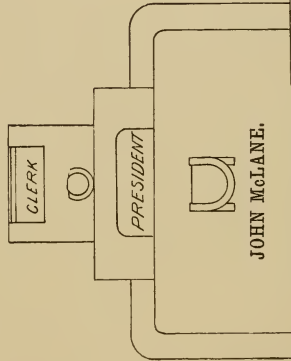


DIAGRAM OF THE SENATE CHAMBER.

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JOINT RULES

OF THE

SENATE AND HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

1. When a convention of the two houses is to be formed, whether by a requirement of the constitution, or by a vote or resolve of the two houses, a message shall be sent from the house of representatives to the senate, giving notice when the house will meet the senate in convention. As soon thereafter as the convenience of the senate will permit, they will attend in the house. The speaker of the house shall be chairman of the convention, and shall state the reasons for forming the convention. When the house and senate are thus formed in convention, the rules adopted as the rules of the house shall be considered the rules of the convention, so far as they may be deemed applicable, and the convention shall accordingly be governed thereby.

2. Messages shall be sent by such person or persons as each house may deem to be proper.

3. Messages from either house shall be received by the other at all times, except when engaged in putting a question, in calling the yeas and nays, in counting the ballots, or in reading the journal.

4. When a message shall be sent from either house to the other, it shall be announced at the door of the house to which it may be sent, by the doorkeeper.

5. While bills are on their passage between the two houses, they shall be under the signature of the clerk of each house respectively.

6. There shall be a committee for the purpose of engrossing bills, consisting of two members of each house. All bills that pass both houses shall be delivered to said committee, be by them engrossed, carefully examined, and reported to the respective houses; and shall be signed first by the speaker of the house of representatives, and then by the president of the senate.

7. There shall be a committee, to consist of three members of the house and one of the senate, on each of the following subjects, to wit: On all matters relative to the state library, and on all matters relative to the state house and state-house yard.

8. Every bill or joint resolution, repealing or modifying any act or statute, shall refer to the same by the chapter, title, and section of the general laws, if contained therein, otherwise by its title and the session of the legislature when the same was passed, and shall also be expressed in words clearly, so that it shall not be necessary to refer to any other act or statute to ascertain the meaning thereof; and it shall be the duty of the presiding officer of each branch of the legislature to require all such bills and resolutions to be made in conformity therewith, before putting any vote thereon, except to commit or amend.

9. When a bill or resolve which shall have passed in one house is rejected in the other, notice thereof shall be given to the house in which the same shall have passed.

10. Each house shall transmit to the other all papers on which any bill or resolve may be founded.

11. Each house shall transmit to the other all bills which have passed their several stages in the house in which they originated, at least twenty-four hours before the time fixed for adjournment.

12. After each house shall have adhered to their disagreement, a bill or resolve shall be considered lost.

13. No bill, joint resolution, claim outstanding on the first day of the session, or petition relating to new business shall be received in either branch of the legislature after the fifth week of the session unless reported from a committee; provided, that this rule may be suspended in either house whenever two thirds of the whole number of members shall actually vote in favor thereof, and not otherwise.

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1. The president having taken the chair, and a quorum being present, the journal of the preceding day shall be read, and any erroneous entry shall be corrected.

2. No member shall hold conversation with another during the reading of the journal, or while a member is speaking in debate.

3. Every member, rising to speak, shall address the president, and when he has finished shall sit down.

4. No member shall speak more than twice on the same question, on the same day, without leave of the senate.

5. More than one member rising to speak at the same time, the president shall decide who shall speak first.

6. If any member transgress the rules of the senate, the president shall, or any member may, call him to order; — in which case the member so called to order shall sit down, and the senate, if appealed to, shall decide in the case; but if there be no appeal, the decision of the president shall be conclusive.

7. No member shall absent himself without permission from the senate.

8. A motion shall be seconded before it is debated, and, if required by the president or any member, it shall be reduced to writing.

9. When a question is under debate, no motion shall be received but to adjourn, to postpone indefinitely, to lay on the table, to postpone to a certain day, to commit, or to amend, which several motions shall take precedence in the order in which they are arranged. And no motion to postpone indefinitely, to postpone to a certain day, or to commit, being decided, shall be in order at the same stage of the bill or proposition until after an adjournment.

10. If the question under debate will admit of division, any member may have it divided; and in filling blanks, the longest time and the largest sum shall be put first.

11. When the reading of a paper is called for, and the same is objected to, it shall be decided by a vote of the senate, and without debate.

12. When the yeas and nays are required, each member shall declare his assent or dissent to the question, unless, for special reasons, he be excused by the senate.

13. When a motion is made to shut the doors of the senate, on the discussion of any business which in the opinion of any member may require secrecy, the president shall desire the gallery to be closed; and the doors shall remain closed until the subject is disposed of.

14. After a motion has been decided, it shall be in order for any member who voted with the majority, or, if the senate be equally divided, any member voting on the side prevailing, to move for a reconsideration thereof, unless the bill, resolution, report, amendment, or motion on which the vote was taken, has gone from the possession of the senate; but no motion to reconsider shall be in order unless made the same day on which the vote was taken, or the next day after that on which the vote was taken, on which the senate shall be in session.

15. Before any petition or memorial addressed to the senate shall be received and read, a brief statement of the contents thereof shall be made by the member introducing the same.

16. Any member, on giving notice of asking leave to bring in a bill, shall state the nature of the bill he proposes to introduce, and at least one day's notice shall be given before a motion for leave shall be in order.

17. Every bill shall be read three times before its passage, and the president shall give notice at each time whether it be the first, second, or third reading; and no bill, after it has been read a second time, shall have a third reading before an adjournment.

18. All resolutions which may require the signature of the governor shall be treated in the same manner as bills.

19. When a bill shall have been read a first time and ordered to a second reading, it shall be immediately read a second time by its title, and by the president referred to the appropriate standing committee, unless otherwise ordered by the senate.

20. All bills introduced in the senate, to repeal or modify an existing statute, shall refer to the act proposed to be repealed or modified by the title and the session at which it was passed; and no bill shall refer to any statutes by the number of the chapter of the pamphlet laws.

21. The senate may resolve itself into a committee of the whole at any time on motion made for that purpose; and in forming a committee of the whole, the president shall leave the chair, and appoint a chairman to preside in committee. The president may at any time name any member to perform the duties of the chair; but such substitution shall not extend beyond one legislative day.

22. The last question, upon the second reading of a bill or resolution, shall always be, Shall it be read a third time? — and no amendment shall be received or discussed on the third reading of any bill or resolution unless by consent of sixteen members present, but it shall all times be in order, before the final passage of a bill or resolution,

to move its commitment; and should such commitment take place, and an amendment be reported, the bill or resolution shall again be read a second time, and considered as in committee of the whole.

23. The titles of bills, and such parts thereof as may be affected by proposed amendments, shall be entered on the journals.

24. All bills, resolutions, and addresses, after passing the senate, shall be signed by the president; and all warrants and other processes issued by order of the senate shall be under his hand and seal, attested by the clerk.

25. The following standing committees, to consist of five members each, shall be appointed at the commencement of any session, with leave to report by bill or otherwise: A committee on the judiciary; a committee on incorporations; a committee on labor; a committee on military affairs; a committee on roads, bridges, and canals; a committee on claims; a committee on railroads; a committee on banks; a committee on agriculture; a committee on manufactures; a committee on elections; a committee on education; a committee on finance; a committee on state prison and industrial school; a committee on asylum for the insane; a committee on revision of the laws; and a committee on towns.

26. All committees shall be appointed by the president, unless a member request that the appointment shall be by ballot, in which case it shall be so done.

27. When the senate shall concur with the house of representatives in the appointment of a joint committee, consisting of not more than five members of the house, two members shall be added on the part of the senate; but when more than five, three members of the senate shall be added.

28. Messages shall be sent to the house of representatives by the clerk of the senate.

29. Messages from the governor or house of representatives may be received at all times, except when the senate is engaged in putting the question, in calling the yeas and nays, in counting the ballots, or in reading the journal.

30. All questions shall be put by the president, and each member of the senate shall signify his assent or dissent by answering *yea* or *nay*. If the president doubts, or a division is called for, the senate shall divide. Those in the affirmative of the question shall first rise from their seats and stand till they be counted, and afterwards those in the negative shall rise and stand till they be counted. The president shall then rise and state the decision of the senate.

31. No person except the members of the executive, or members of the house of representatives and its officers, shall be admitted within the bar of the senate, except by invitation of the president, or some member with his consent.

32. The senate shall adjourn to meet at ten o'clock in the morn-

ing and three o'clock in the afternoon of each day, unless the senate shall otherwise order.

33. Motions to adjourn shall be decided without debate.

34. No standing rule of the senate shall be suspended unless two thirds of the members present vote in favor thereof, and no rule shall be rescinded unless one day's notice of the motion has been given and two thirds of those present vote therefor.

35. Every bill and joint resolution, except private acts, originating in the senate, which has been favorably reported upon by the committee having it in charge, shall be declared by the president laid upon the table, and the clerk directed to procure a sufficient number of printed copies thereof for the use of the senate; and that when said bills and joint resolutions are printed and distributed, the clerk shall cause a copy of the same to be laid on the president's table, and they shall be taken up in their order without motion, and disposed of in the same manner as they would have been had they not been declared laid on the table. And every bill or joint resolution so introduced shall be headed senate bill, or joint resolution, as the case may be.

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RULES OF THE HOUSE.

OF THE DUTY OF THE SPEAKER.

1. The speaker shall take the chair at precisely the hour to which the house shall have adjourned, and shall immediately call the members to order.

2. He shall preserve decorum and order, may speak on points of order in preference to other members, rising from his seat for that purpose, and shall decide questions of order, subject to an appeal to the house by any two members.

3. Questions shall be distinctly put in this form, to wit, "As many as are of opinion that [as the case may be] say Aye"; and after the affirmative vote is expressed, "Those of a contrary opinion say No." If the speaker doubts, or a division is called for, the house shall divide. Those in the affirmative of the question shall first rise from their seats and stand till they be counted, and afterwards those in the negative shall rise and stand till they be counted. The speaker shall then rise and state the decision of the house.

4. He shall rise to put a question, but may state it sitting.

5. All committees shall be appointed by the speaker unless otherwise directed by the house.

6. The speaker shall designate to which of the standing committees all memorials, petitions, accounts, or other matters shall be referred, unless otherwise ordered by the house.

7. The speaker shall not be called upon to vote unless the house be equally divided, or unless his vote, if given to the minority, will make the division equal; and in case of such equal division the question shall be lost.

8. All acts, addresses, and joint resolutions shall be signed by the speaker; and all writs, warrants, or subpoenas, issued by order of the house, shall be under his hand and seal, attested by the clerk.

9. In case of any disturbance or disorderly conduct in the galleries, the speaker, or chairman of the committee of the whole house, shall have the power to order the same to be cleared.

10. No person but the members and officers of the house, members of the council, and members of the senate, the secretary of the state, treasurer, and clerks of the senate, shall be admitted within the door of the representatives' chamber unless by invitation of the speaker,

or some member of the house with the consent of the speaker, except in public hearings, parties, their counsel and witnesses, under the direction of the speaker.

11. The speaker shall have power to substitute any member to perform the duties of the chair, such substitution not to extend beyond one legislative day.

OF DECORUM AND DEBATE.

12. When any member is about to speak in debate, make a motion, or deliver any matter to the house, he shall rise from his seat and respectfully address himself to the speaker.

13. If any member transgress the rules of the house, the speaker shall, or any member may, call him to order; in which case the member so called to order shall immediately sit down, and the question of order shall then be distinctly stated from the chair; and in all cases where a member shall be called to order for uttering disrespectful words, upon the request of any member the words objected to shall be reduced to writing by the member so calling to order; after which the member so called to order may explain, and the question shall be open to debate, as in other cases, and decided by the speaker, whose decision shall be submitted to unless an appeal be made to the house, by a member, in which case the only question shall be, "Is the speaker's decision correct?" which shall be decided without debate. If the decision be in favor of the member called to order, he may proceed; if otherwise, and the case may require it, he shall be liable to the censure of the house.

14. In all cases the member first rising shall speak first. When two members rise at the same time, the speaker shall name the person to speak.

15. No member shall speak more than twice on the same question without leave of the house; nor more than once, until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken.

16. While the speaker is putting any question, or addressing the house, no one shall walk out of or across the house; nor in such case, or when a member is speaking, shall entertain private discourse; nor, while a member is speaking, shall pass between him and the chair; nor shall any member leave his seat while the yeas and nays are calling.

17. No member shall vote on any question in the event of which he is directly interested; nor in any case where he was not present when the question was put; nor sit upon any committee when he is directly interested in the question under consideration. In case of such interest of a member of a committee, the fact shall be reported to the house, and another person substituted on that question in his place.

18. Every member who shall be in the house when a question is

put shall give his vote, unless the house, for special reason, shall excuse him.

19. No motion shall be debated until the same shall be seconded and stated from the chair; and when a motion shall be made and seconded, it shall be reduced to writing, if desired by the speaker or any member, and delivered in at the table, and read by the speaker, before the same shall be debated.

20. No petition shall be received by the house unless it be presented by a member thereof, and upon motion made for that purpose; nor until the substance of said petition be concisely minuted, and the name of the member, and the town he represents, recorded upon the back thereof; and it shall be the duty of the speaker, whenever any motion relative to a petition is to be stated to the house, to state, in the first place, the substance of the petition as minuted on the back thereof.

21. After a motion is stated by the speaker, it shall be in possession of the house, but may be withdrawn at any time before an amendment.

22. When any question is under debate, no motion shall be received, but, first, to adjourn; second, to lay on the table; third, for the previous question; fourth, to postpone indefinitely; fifth, to postpone to a certain day; sixth, to commit; and seventh, to amend; which several motions shall have precedence in the order in which they are arranged. Motions to adjourn, to lay on the table, and take from the table, shall be decided without debate.

23. The speaker shall put the previous question in the following form: "Shall the main question now be put?" and all debate upon the main question shall be suspended until the previous question has been decided. After the adoption of the previous question, the sense of the house shall forthwith be taken upon pending amendments, in their regular order, and then upon the main question.

24. On the previous question no member shall speak more than once without leave; and all incidental questions of order, arising after a motion for the previous question, shall be decided without debate, excepting on appeal, and on such appeal no member shall be allowed to speak more than once without leave of the house. No member shall be allowed to speak more than five minutes on the motion, nor on appeal on questions of order.

25. If the previous question is decided in the negative, it shall not be again in order till after adjournment, but the main question shall be left before the house and disposed of as though the previous question had not been put.

26. When a question is postponed indefinitely, the same shall not be acted upon during the session except by unanimous consent.

27. Any member may call for a division of the question when the sense will admit of it; and upon a motion to amend, a refusal to

strike out words shall neither preclude amendment to such words nor a motion to strike out and insert.

28. A motion for commitment, until it is decided, shall preclude all amendment to the main question, and all motions and reports may be committed at the pleasure of the house.

29. No new motion shall be admitted, under color of amendment, as a substitute for the motion under debate.

30. No vote shall be reconsidered, unless the motion for reconsideration be made by a member who voted with the majority, nor unless the notice of such motion be given on the same day on which the vote passed, or on the next day on which the house shall be in session, between the hours of ten and twelve o'clock.

31. When the reading of a paper is called for and objected to by any member, it shall be determined by a vote of the house.

32. Any member may excuse himself from serving on any committee at the time of his appointment, if he is then a member of two other committees who have not reported.

33. Each member shall seasonably and punctually attend to his duty in the house, and no one shall absent himself from the service of the house unless he have leave, or be sick and unable to attend.

34. The speaker shall appoint a teller for each division of the house, whose duty it shall be to report to the chair the state of the vote, whenever a division of the house is called for.

OF STANDING COMMITTEES.

35. The following standing committees shall be appointed early in the January session :

A committee on revising and compiling the laws of the state ; a committee on national affairs ; a committee on elections ; a committee on the judiciary ; a committee on banks ; a committee on the state prison ; a committee on insurance ; a committee on the state agricultural college ; a committee on agriculture ; a committee on manufactures ; a committee on finance ; a committee on retrenchment and reform ; a committee on military affairs ; a committee on education ; a committee on the state normal school ; a committee on incorporations ; a committee on towns ; a committee on county affairs ; a committee on labor ; a committee on the asylum for the insane ; a committee on railroads ; a committee on roads, bridges, and canals ; a committee on unfinished business ; a committee on mileage ; a committee on fisheries and game ; a committee on the industrial school ; a committee on soldiers' home ; a committee on claims ; a committee on forestry ; a committee on public health ; and a committee on public improvements, — to consist of twelve members each ; a committee on printer's accounts ; a committee on military accounts, — to consist of nine members each ; a committee on journal of the house, to consist of three members, one of whom shall be the speaker.

It shall be the duty of the committee on revising and compiling the laws to consider all matters relating to those subjects, and recommend such changes, modifications, and additions as may be desirable; also to consider all bills, resolutions, and reports of committees relating to those subjects which may be referred to them, and report by bill or otherwise.

It shall be the duty of the committee on national affairs to consider all matters of national concern, all matters referred to the state by the general government, and all matters pertaining to our federal relations, that may be referred to them by the house, and to report thereon.

It shall be the duty of the committee on elections to examine and report upon the certificates or other credentials of the election of the members returned to serve in this house, and to take into consideration all such petitions and other matters in relation to elections or returns as shall or may be presented, or come into question, and shall be referred to them by the house.

It shall be the duty of the committee on the judiciary to take into their consideration all matters in relation to the judiciary system of the state; to examine and report what laws have expired, or are near about expiring, and require to be revived or further continued, and report their opinion on all constitutional questions that may be referred to them by the house.

It shall be the duty of the committee on banks to consider all applications for the incorporation of banks, and all subjects relating to such institutions that may be referred to them by the house, and to report thereon.

It shall be the duty of the committee on the state prison to take into consideration all matters in relation to the state prison, to examine all reports and accounts that may be submitted by the warden, and make such report, either by bill or otherwise, as they think the interest of the state requires.

It shall be the duty of the committee on insurance to consider all applications for the incorporation of insurance companies, and all subjects relating to insurance companies, domestic and foreign, and whether life, fire, marine, accidental, or of any other character, that may be referred to them by the house, and to report thereon.

It shall be the duty of the committee on the state agricultural college to examine in relation to the rules and government of the New Hampshire College of Agriculture and the Mechanic Arts, and all matters connected therewith, and all such other matters as may be referred to them by the house, and to make such report thereon, either by bill or otherwise, as they think the interest of the state requires.

It shall be the duty of the committee on agriculture to take into consideration all matters concerning the agricultural interests and public lands of the state, and the incorporation of agricultural

societies, that shall be referred to them by the house, and to report thereon.

It shall be the duty of the committee on manufactures to consider all matters concerning the manufacturing interests of the state, and all applications for incorporation for manufacturing purposes, which shall be referred to them by the house, and to report thereon.

It shall be the duty of the committee on finance to examine and take into consideration the state of the treasury, to report what sum it may be necessary to raise as a state tax, and on every subject touching the financial interests of the state that may be referred to them by the house.

It shall be the duty of the committee on retrenchment and reform to take into consideration the public expenditures, and all questions relating thereto; and also to consider all questions relating to the subject of administrative reforms in the various departments of the state government, and report thereon.

It shall be the duty of the committee on military affairs to consider all applications for altering and amending laws regulating the militia of this state, and for the removal of military officers, and to report thereon.

It shall be the duty of the committee on education to consider all subjects relative to the regulation of school districts and schools, and all matters concerning education, that may be referred to them by the house, and report thereon.

It shall be the duty of the committee on the state normal school to examine in relation to the government of the state normal school, and all matters connected therewith, and all such other matters as may be referred to them by the house, and to make such report thereon, either by bill or otherwise, as they think the interests of the state require.

It shall be the duty of the committee on incorporations to consider and report on all applications for acts of incorporation, and all other matters which may come in question relative to bodies corporate, that may be referred to them by the house, excepting those relating to towns, parishes, turnpikes, railroads, canals, banks, agricultural societies, and factories. And upon every application for an act of incorporation referred to them, they shall inquire whether the object of the applicants may not be conveniently obtained by voluntary incorporation under the general laws of the state, and they shall report accordingly.

It shall be the duty of the committee on towns to consider all applications for the alteration of town lines by the annexation of one portion of a town to another, and all applications for incorporation of towns by division of towns or otherwise, that may be referred to them by the house, and to report thereon.

It shall be the duty of the committee on county affairs to consider all applications for the alteration of county lines or the creation of

new counties, the salaries of county officers, the settlement of paupers, and all other matters relating to county affairs that may be referred to them by the house, and report thereon.

It shall be the duty of the committee on labor to consider all petitions relating to labor and wages, and all other matters relating thereto that may be referred to them by the house, and report thereon.

It shall be the duty of the committee on the asylum for the insane to examine all accounts, particularly of those relating to the expenditure of moneys appropriated by the state; to examine in relation to the rules and government of the institution, and all matters of general interest connected therewith, and all such matters as shall be referred to them by the house, and to report thereon.

It shall be the duty of the committee on railroads to consider all petitions for the incorporation of railroads, for alterations, and all matters relative thereto that may be referred to them by the house, and to report thereon.

It shall be the duty of the committee on roads, bridges, and canals to consider all applications for the incorporation of turnpikes, bridges, or canals, and for the alteration of tolls, and all matters relative thereto that may be referred to them by the house, and to report thereon.

It shall be the duty of the committee on unfinished business to examine and report, from the journals of the last session, all such matters as were then pending and undetermined.

It shall be the duty of the committee on mileage to ascertain the distance traveled by each member of the house, computing the same by the nearest traveled highway, and report to the house, with the names of the several members and the distance traveled by each.

It shall be the duty of the committee on fisheries and game to consider all matters concerning the location, growth, cultivation, protection, improvement, and preservation of fish and game within the state, and all matters relative thereto which may be referred to them by the house, and make such report thereon, either by bill or otherwise, as they think the interest of the state requires.

It shall be the duty of the committee on the industrial school to examine in relation to the rules and government of the institution, and all matters of general interest connected therewith, and all such matters as may be referred to them by the house, and make such report, either by bill or otherwise, as they think the interest of the state requires.

It shall be the duty of the committee on forestry to consider all matters relating to the forests of the state and public parks, and to report thereon.

It shall be the duty of the committee on public health to consider all matters relating to the health of the inhabitants of the state and vital statistics, and to report thereon.

It shall be the duty of the committee on printer's accounts to examine and adjust all accounts against the state for printing, and every subject relating to such accounts that may be referred to them by the house, and to report thereon.

It shall be the duty of the committee on military accounts to examine, adjust, and report on all accounts relative to the militia that may be referred to them by the house.

It shall be the duty of the committee on claims to audit, adjust, and report on all accounts and claims that may be presented for allowance, except accounts for printing, military accounts, and accounts for engrossing bills.

It shall be the duty of the committee on journal of the house, from day to day, and before the commencement of the morning session, to examine the journal of the preceding day, and report to the house at once any imperfection they may observe; provided, however, that the journal of the preceding day shall be read at the opening of any morning session whenever requested by any ten members.

36. All other committees shall consist of three members, unless otherwise ordered.

37. The standing committees shall attend at their respective committee-rooms two hours before the meeting of the house in the morning, and at such other times as the house shall order; and no committee shall sit during the sitting of the house, unless when the speaker shall consider it necessary.

38. The first-named member of any committee appointed by the speaker of the house shall be chairman; and in case of his absence, or being excused by the house, the next named member, and so on, as often as the case may happen, unless the committee, by a majority of the number, elect a chairman. And when any committee shall report otherwise than by bill, they shall, if the subject admit of it, subjoin to their report a resolution making such disposition of the matter committed to them as to the committee shall seem expedient.

39. Whenever it shall not be convenient for any standing committee to attend promptly to all the business which may be properly referred to it, the speaker may, on a vote of the house to that effect, appoint an additional committee on the same subject, to consist of the same number of members as the original committee, whose duty it shall be to take into consideration all matters in relation to that subject which shall be referred to them by the house, and to report thereon.

ON BILLS.

40. Every bill and joint resolution shall be introduced by motion for leave, or by an order of the house on the report of the committee; and no bill or joint resolution shall be introduced by any member (except on the report of a committee) unless he shall have given

at least one day's notice of intention, and of the object of the bill or joint resolution to be introduced.

41. Every bill and resolution originally introduced into the house shall be expressed in words clearly, so that it shall not be necessary to refer to any other act or statute to ascertain the meaning thereof.

42. Every bill shall have three several readings in the house previous to its passage. The first reading shall be for information; and thereupon, when the bill shall have been introduced by a committee, if not rejected or otherwise disposed of, a time shall be assigned for a second reading; and upon the second reading, if not rejected or otherwise disposed of by the house, a time shall be assigned for a third reading. When a bill shall have been introduced by a member upon leave, or by message from the senate, and read a first time, if it be not rejected or otherwise disposed of by the house, the question shall be "Shall the bill be read a second time?" And if ordered to a second reading it shall immediately be read a second time by its title, and be by the speaker referred to the appropriate standing committee, unless otherwise ordered by the house. No bill, after it has been read a second time, shall have a third reading until after an adjournment. The time assigned for the second and third readings of bills and resolutions shall be eleven o'clock in the forenoon and three o'clock in the afternoon, unless otherwise ordered by the house.

43. No amendment shall be made but upon the second reading of a bill or joint resolution; and all resolutions shall be in writing, with the name of the member and the town he represents on the back thereof. The orders of the day for the reading of bills and joint resolutions shall hold for every succeeding day until disposed of.

44. All bills, and all votes and resolutions that are necessary to be carried to the senate for their concurrence, may be sent by the assistant clerk.

45. Every bill shall be marked on the first page "house bill," and every joint resolution shall be marked "house joint resolution," and each bill and resolution shall be regularly numbered, beginning with No. 1, and continuing consecutively, as each bill or joint resolution is introduced into the house.

46. Every bill and joint resolution, except private acts, originating in the house, which has been favorably reported upon by the committee having it in charge, shall be declared by the speaker laid upon the table, and the clerk shall procure a sufficient number of printed copies thereof for the use of the house, and cause the same to be distributed to the members; and the clerk shall cause said bills and joint resolutions to be printed on paper of uniform size; and when said bills and joint resolutions are so printed and distributed, the clerk shall after one day cause the same to be laid on the speaker's table, and they shall be taken up in their order, without motion, and disposed of in the same manner as they would have been had they not been declared laid on the table.

OF THE COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE HOUSE.

47. The house may resolve itself into committee of the whole house at any time, on the motion of a member made for that purpose; and in forming a committee of the whole house the speaker shall leave the chair, and a chairman to preside in committee shall be appointed by the speaker.

48. Upon bills and resolutions committed to a committee of the whole house, the bill or resolution shall first be read throughout by the clerk, and then again read and debated by clauses, leaving the preamble of the bill to be last considered; the body of the bill or resolution shall not be defaced or interlined, but all amendments, noting the page and line, shall be duly entered by the clerk on a separate paper, as the same shall be agreed to by the committee, and so reported to the house. After report, the bill or resolution shall again be subject to be debated and amended by clauses, before a question to pass it to a third reading be taken.

49. The rules of proceeding in the house shall be observed in committee of the whole house, so far as they may be applicable, except the rule limiting the time of speaking.

50. No standing rule or order of the house shall be rescinded without one day's notice being given of the motion therefor; nor suspended, unless by a vote therefor of two thirds of the members present, to be ascertained by actual count, when any member shall request the same.

ORDER OF BUSINESS OF THE DAY.

51. The speaker shall call for petitions from members of the house. The petitions having been presented and disposed of, reports, first from the standing and then from the select committees, shall be called for and disposed of. And the above business shall be done in no other part of the day, except by permission of the house.

52. The unfinished business in which the house was engaged at the last preceding adjournment, if called for by any member, shall have the preference over all other business except the general order of the day; and no motion, or any other business except the general order of the day, shall be received without special leave of the house, until the former is disposed of.

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
