CONSTITUTION

OF THE

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

ESTABLISHED OCTOBER 31, 1783, TO TAKE EFFECT JUNE 2, 1784, AS
SUBSEQUENTLY AMENDED AND IN FORCE JANUARY 1, 1923.*

All amendments are shown by notes at the bottom of the page, indicating the year in which they took effect. The amendments of 1792, "so far as relates to the choice of the members of the legislature and the executive officers of the state, county treasurer, and recorder of deeds," took effect on February 1, 1793, and all others on the first Wednesday of June, 1793. The amendments of 1850 took effect September 16, 1852; those of 1876, August 1, 1877, October 1, 1878, and the first Wednesday of June, 1879, as indicated in the foot notes; those of 1889, April 2, 1889; those of 1902 on March 26, 1903; and those of 1912 on November 20, 1912.

The numbering of the sections of Part II first appeared in the Revised Statutes of 1842. In 1889, when the tenth section of Part II was stricken out, all subsequent sections were moved forward, with the result of making much confusion in citations. In this copy the former numbering has been placed in parenthesis at the side of the present number.

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PART FIRST

BILL OF RIGHTS.

ARTICLE 1ST. All men are born equally free and independent; therefore, all government of right originates from the people, is founded in consent, and instituted for the general good.

[ART.] 2d. All men have certain natural, essential, and inherent rights, among which are the enjoying and defending life and liberty, acquiring, possessing, and protecting property, and, in a word, of seeking and obtaining happiness.

[ART.] 3d. When men enter into a state of society, they surrender up some of their natural rights to that society, in order to insure the protection of others; and, without such an equivalent, the surrender is void.

[ART.] 4th. Among the natural rights, some are in their very nature unalienable, because no equivalent can be given or received for them. Of this kind are the rights of conscience.

[ART.] 5th. Every individual has a natural and unalienable right to worship God according to the dictates of his own conscience and reason; and no subject shall be hurt, molested, or restrained, in his person, liberty, or estate, for worshipping God in the manner and season most agreeable to the dictates of his own conscience, or for his religious profession, sentiments, or persuasion, provided he doth not disturb the public peace or disturb others in their religious worship.

[ART.] 6th. As morality and piety, rightly grounded on evangelical principles, will give the best and greatest security to government, and will lay in the hearts of men the strongest obligations to due subjection, and as the knowledge of these is most

likely to be propagated through a society by the institution of the public worship of the Deity and of public instruction in morality and religion, therefore to promote those important purposes, the people of this state have a right to empower, and do hereby fully empower, the legislature to authorize, from time to time, the several towns, parishes, bodies corporate, or religious societies within this state to make adequate provision, at their own expense, for the support and maintenance of public Protestant teachers of piety, religion, and morality.

Provided, notwithstanding, that the several towns, parishes, bodies corporate, or religious societies shall at all times have the exclusive right of electing their own public teachers and of contracting with them for their support and maintenance. And no person of any one particular religious sect or denomination shall be compelled to pay towards the support of the teacher or teachers of another persuasion, sect, or denomination.

And every denomination of Christians, demeaning themselves quietly and as good subjects of the state, shall be equally under the protection of the law; and no subordination of any one sect or denomination to another shall ever be established by law.

And nothing herein shall be understood to effect any former contracts made for the support of the ministry; but all such contracts shall remain and be in the same state as if this constitution had not been made.

[ART.] 7th. The people of this state have the sole and exclusive right of governing themselves as a free, sovereign, and independent state, and do, and forever hereafter shall, exercise and enjoy every power, jurisdiction, and right pertaining thereto which is not or may not hereafter be by them expressly delegated to the United States of America in congress assembled.

[ART.] 8th. All power residing originally in, and being derived from, the people, all the magistrates and officers of government are their substitutes and agents and at all times accountable to them.

[ART.] 9th. No office or place whatsoever in government shall be hereditary, the abilities and integrity requisite in all not being transmissible to posterity or relations.

[ART.] 10th. Government being instituted for the common benefit, protection, and security of the whole community, and not for the private interest or emolument of any one man, family, or class of men, therefore, whenever the ends of government are perverted and public liberty manifestly endangered and all other means of redress are ineffectual, the people may, and of right ought to, reform the old or establish a new government. The doctrine of nonresistance against arbitrary power and oppression is absurd, slavish, and destructive of the good and happiness of mankind.

[ART.] 11th. All elections ought to be free; and every inhabitant of the state, having the proper qualifications, has equal right to elect and be elected into office; [but no person shall have the right to vote, or be eligible to office under the constitution of this state, who shall not be able to read the constitution in the English language, and to write; *provided, however*, that this provision shall not apply to any person prevented by a physical disability from complying with its requisitions, nor to any person who now has the right to vote, nor to any person who shall be sixty years of age or upwards on the first day of January, A. D., 1904,]* [and *provided further*, that no person shall have the right to vote or be eligible to office under the constitution of this state who shall have been convicted of treason, bribery, or any wilful violation of the election laws

of this state or of the United States; but the supreme court may, on notice to the attorney general restore the privileges of an elector to any person who may have forfeited them by conviction of such offences.]†

Protection and taxation reciprocal. [ART.] 12th. Every member of the community has a right to be protected by it in the enjoyment of his life, liberty, and property. He is, therefore, bound to contribute his share in the expense of such protection, and to yield his personal service, when necessary, or an equivalent. But no part of a man's property shall be taken from him or applied to public uses without his own consent or that of the representative body of the people. Nor are the inhabitants of this state controllable by any other laws than those to which they or their representative body have given their consent.

Conscientiously scrupulous, not compellable to bear arms. [ART.] 13th. No person who is conscientiously scrupulous about the lawfulness of bearing arms shall be compelled thereto, provided he will pay an equivalent.

Legal remedies to be free, complete, and prompt. [ART.] 14th. Every subject of this state is entitled to a certain remedy, by having recourse to the laws, for all injuries he may receive in his person, property, or character, to obtain right and justice freely, without being obliged to purchase it; completely and without any denial; promptly and without delay; conformably to the laws.

Accused entitled to full and substantial statement of charge; not obliged to furnish evidence; may produce proofs and be fully heard, etc. [ART.] 15th. No subject shall be held to answer for any crime or offense until the same is fully and plainly, substantially and formally, described to him, or be compelled to accuse or furnish evidence against himself. And every subject shall have a right to produce all proofs that may be favorable to himself, to meet the witnesses against him face to face, and to be fully heard in his defense by himself,

and counsel. And no subject shall be arrested, imprisoned, despoiled, or deprived of his property, immunities, or privileges, put out of the protection of the law, exiled, or deprived of his life, liberty, or estate, but by the judgment of his peers or the law of the land.

[ART.] 16th. No subject shall be liable to be tried, after an acquittal, for the same crime or offense; nor shall the legislature make any law that shall subject any person to a capital punishment (excepting for the government of the army and navy, and the militia in actual service) without trial by jury.

[ART.] 17th. In criminal prosecutions, the trial of facts in the vicinity where they happened is so essential to the security of the life, liberty, and estate of the citizen, that no crime or offense ought to be tried in any other county than that in which it is committed, except in cases of general insurrection in any particular county, when it shall appear to the judges of the superior court that an impartial trial cannot be had in the county where the offense may be committed, and, upon their report, the [legislature]* shall think proper to direct the trial in the nearest county in which an impartial trial can be obtained.

[ART.] 18th. All penalties ought to be proportioned to the nature of the offense. No wise legislature will affix the same punishment to the crimes of theft, forgery, and the like, which they do to those of murder and treason. Where the same undistinguishing severity is exerted against all offenses, the people are led to forget the real distinction in the crimes themselves and to commit the most flagrant with as little compunction as they do† the lightest [offenses].‡ For the same reason, a multitude of sanguinary laws is both impolitic and un-

[ART.] 19th.* [Every subject hath a right to be secure from all unreasonable searches and seizures of his person, his houses, his papers, and all his possessions. Therefore, all warrants to search suspected places or arrest a person for examination or trial, in prosecutions for criminal matters, are contrary to this right, if the cause or foundation of them be not previously supported by oath or affirmation, and if the order, in a warrant to a civil officer, to make search in suspected places or to arrest one or more suspected persons or to seize their property, be not accompanied with a special designation of the persons or objects of search, arrest, or seizure; and no warrant ought to be issued but in cases and with the formalities prescribed by law.]

[ART.] 20th. In all controversies concerning property and in all suits between two or more persons, except in cases in which it has been heretofore otherwise used and practiced [and except in cases in which the value in controversy does not exceed one hundred dollars and title of real estate is not concerned]† the parties have a right to a trial by jury; and this method of procedure shall be held sacred, unless, in cases arising on the high seas and such as relates to mariners' wages, the legislature shall think it necessary hereafter to alter it.

Only qualified persons to serve as jurors, and to be fully compensated.

[ART.] 21st. In order to reap the fullest advantage of the inestimable privilege of the trial by jury, great care ought to be taken that none but qualified persons should be appointed to serve; and such ought to [be]‡ fully compensated for their travel, time, and attendance.

[ART.] 22d. The *liberty of the press* is essential to the security of freedom in a state; it ought, therefore, to be inviolably preserved.

[ART.] 23d. Retrospective laws are highly injurious, oppressive, and unjust. No such laws, therefore, should be made, either for the decision of civil causes or the punishment of offenses.

[ART.] 24th. A well regulated militia is the proper, natural, and sure defense of a state.

[ART.] 25th. Standing armies are dangerous to liberty, and ought not to be raised or kept up without the consent of the legislature.

[ART.] 26th. In all cases and at all times, the military ought to be under strict subordination to, and governed by, the civil power.

[ART.] 27th. No soldier, in time of peace, shall be quartered in any house without the consent of the owner; and, in time of war, such quarters ought not to be made but by the civil magistrate, in a manner ordained by the legislature.

[ART.] 28th. No subsidy, charge, tax, impost or duty shall be established, fixed, laid, or levied under any pretext whatsoever, without the consent of the people or their representatives in the legislature, or authority derived from that body.

[ART.] 29th. The power of suspending the laws or the execution of them ought never to be exercised but by the legislature, or by authority derived therefrom, to be exercised in such particular cases only as the legislature shall expressly provide for.

[ART.] 30th. The freedom of deliberation, speech and debate in either house of the legislature is so essential to the rights of the people, that it cannot be the foundation of any action, complaint, or prosecution in any other court or place whatsoever.

[ART.] 31st. [The legislature shall assemble for the redress of public grievances and for making such laws as the public good may require.]*

Rights of assembly, [ART.] 32d. The people have a right, in an orderly instruction, and petition. lxxi, 471. and peaceable manner, to assemble and consult upon the common good, give instructions to their representatives, and to request of the legislative body, by way of petition or remonstrance, redress of the wrongs done them and of the grievances they suffer.

Excessive bail, fines, and punishments prohibited. [ART.] 33d. No magistrate or court of law shall demand excessive bail or sureties, impose excessive fines, or inflict cruel or unusual punishments. i, 374. xxv, 541.

Martial law limited. [ART.] 34th. No person can in any case be subjected to law martial or to any pains or penalties by virtue of that law, except those employed in the army or navy, and except the militia in actual service, but by authority of the legislature.

The judiciary; tenure of office, etc. [ART.] 35th. [It is essential to the preservation of the rights of every individual, his life, liberty, property, and character, that there be an impartial interpretation of the laws and administration of justice. It is the right of every citizen to be tried by judges as impartial as the lot of humanity will admit. It is, therefore, not only the best policy, but for the security of the rights of the people, that the judges of the supreme judicial court should hold their offices so long as they behave well, subject, however, to such limitations on account of age as may be provided by the constitution of the state, and that they should have honorable salaries, ascertained and established by standing laws]*

Pensions.

[ART.] 36th. Economy being a most essential virtue in all states, especially in a young one, no pension shall be granted but in consideration of actual services; and such pensions ought to be granted with great caution by the legislature, and never for more than one year at a time.

The legislative, executive, and judicial departments to be kept separate. [ART.] 37th. In the government of this state, the three essential powers thereof—to wit, the legislative, executive, and judicial—ought to be kept as separate from, and independent of, each other as the

nature of a free government will admit or as is consistent with that chain of connection that binds the whole fabric of the constitution in one indissoluble bond of union and amity.

[ART.] 38th. A frequent recurrence to the fundamental principles of the constitution and a constant adherence to justice, moderation, temperance, industry, frugality, and all the social virtues, are indispensably necessary to preserve the blessings of liberty and good government. The people ought, therefore, to have a particular regard to all those principles in the choice of their officers and representatives; and they have a right to require of their law-givers and magistrates an exact and constant observance of them in the formation and execution of the laws necessary for the good administration of government.

PART SECOND

FORM OF GOVERNMENT

[ART. 1.]* The people inhabiting the territory formerly called the province of New Hampshire do hereby solemnly and mutually agree with each other to form themselves into a free, sovereign, and independent body politic, or state, by the name of the STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

[ART. 2.] The supreme legislative power within this state shall be vested in the senate and house of representatives, each of which shall have a negative on the other.

[ART. 3.] The senate and house shall assemble [biennially],† on the first Wednesday of [January]‡ and at such other times as they may judge neces-

sary, and shall dissolve and be dissolved seven days next preceding the said first Wednesday of [January]‡ [biennially],** and shall be styled THE GENERAL COURT OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

[ART. 4.] The general court shall forever have full power and authority to erect and constitute judicatories and courts of record or other courts, to be holden in the name of the state, for the hearing, trying, and determining all manner of crimes, offenses, pleas, processes, complaints, actions, causes, matters, and things whatsoever, arising or happening within this state, or between or concerning persons inhabiting, or residing, or brought within the same, whether the same be criminal or civil, or whether the crimes be capital or not capital, and whether the said pleas be real, personal, or mixed, and for the awarding and issuing execution thereon; to which courts and judicatories are hereby given and granted full power and authority from time to time to administer oaths or affirmations for the better discovery of truth in any matter in controversy or depending before them.

[ART. 5.] And, further, full power and authority are hereby given and granted to the said general court, from time to time to make, ordain, and establish all manner of wholesome and reasonable orders, laws, statutes, ordinances, directions, and instructions, either with penalties or without, so as the same be not repugnant or contrary to this constitution, as they may judge for the benefit and welfare of this state and for the governing and ordering thereof and of the subjects of the same, for the necessary support and defense of the government thereof; and to name and settle [biennially],* or provide by fixed laws for the naming and settling,

all civil officers within this state, such officers excepted the election and appointment of whom are hereafter in this form of government otherwise provided for; and to set forth the several duties, powers, and limits of the several civil and military officers of this state, and the forms of such oaths or affirmations as shall be respectively administered unto them for the execution of their several offices and places, so as the same be not repugnant or contrary to this constitution; and, also, to impose fines, mulcts, imprisonments, and other punishments; and to impose and levy proportional and reasonable assessments, rates, and taxes upon all the inhabitants of, and residents within, the said state, and upon all estates within the same, to be issued and disposed of by warrant, under the hand of the [government]* of this state for the time being, with the advice and consent of the council, for the public service, in the necessary defense and support of the government of this state and the protection and preservation of the subjects thereof, according to such acts as are or shall be in force within the same; [provided, that the general court shall not authorize any town to loan or give its money or credit, directly or indirectly, for the benefit of any corporation having for its object a dividend of profits, or in any way aid the same by taking its stock or bonds.]†

[ART. 6.] [The public charges of government or any part thereof may be raised by taxation upon polls, estates, and other classes of property, including franchises and property when passing by will or inheritance; and there shall be a valuation of the estates within the state taken anew once in every five years, at least, and as much oftener as the general court shall order.]‡

[ART. 7.] [No member of the general court shall take fees, be of counsel, or act as advocate in any cause before either branch of the legislature; and, upon due proof thereof, such member shall forfeit his seat in the legislature.]**

[ART. 8.] [The doors of the galleries of each house of the legislature shall be kept open to all persons who behave decently except when the welfare of the state, in the opinion of either branch, shall require secrecy.]**

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.*

[ART. 9.] [There shall be, in the legislature of this state, a representation of the people, biennially elected, and founded upon principles of equality, and, in order that such representation may be as equal as circumstances will admit, every town, or place entitled to town privileges, and wards of cities having six hundred inhabitants by the last general census of the state, taken by authority of the United States or of this state, may elect one representative; if eighteen hundred such inhabitants, may elect two representatives; and so proceeding in that proportion, making twelve hundred such inhabitants the mean increasing number for any additional representative: *provided*, that no town shall be divided or the boundaries of the wards of any city so altered as to increase the number of representatives to which such town or city may be entitled by the next preceding census, *and provided further*, that, to those towns and cities which since the last census have been divided or had their boundaries or ward lines changed, the general court in session next before these amendments shall take effect shall equitably apportion representation in such manner that

the number shall not be greater than it would have been had no such division or alteration been made.]†

[ART. 10.]‡

[ART. 10 (11)§] [Whenever any town, place, or city ward shall have less than six hundred such inhabitants,** the general court [shall]†† authorize such town, place, or ward to elect and send to the general court [a representative]‡‡ such proportionate part of the time as the number of its inhabitants shall bear to six hundred; but the general court shall not authorize any [such]* town, place, or ward to elect and send such representative, except as herein provided.]†††

Small towns may elect a proportionate part of time.

ART. 11 (12.)] The members of the house of representatives shall be chosen [biennially]††† in the month of [November],§§ and shall be the second branch of the legislature.

 the time being, shall be commander-in-chief of the army and navy and all the military forces of the state by sea and land; and shall have full power, by himself or by any chief commander or other officer or officers, from time to time to train, instruct, exercise, and govern the militia and navy; and for the special defense and safety of this state, to assemble in martial array and put in warlike posture the inhabitants thereof, and to lead and conduct them, and with them to encounter, repulse, repel, resist, and pursue by force of arms, as well by sea as by land, within and without the limits of this state; and also to kill, slay, destroy, if necessary; and conquer, by all fitting ways, enterprise, and means, all and every such person and persons as shall at any time hereafter, in a hostile manner, attempt or enterprise the destruction, invasion, detriment, or annoyance of this state; and to use and exercise over the army and navy and over the militia in actual service the law martial, in time of war, invasion, and also in rebellion declared by the legislature to exist, as occasion shall necessarily require; and surprise by all ways and means whatsoever, all and every such person or persons, with their ships, arms, ammunition, and other goods, as shall, in a hostile manner, invade or attempt the invading, conquering, or annoying this state; and in fine, the governor hereby is intrusted with all other powers incident to the office of captain-general and commander-in-chief and admiral, to be exercised agreeably to the rules and regulations of the constitution and the laws of the land; *provided*, that the governor shall not at any time hereafter, by virtue of any power by this constitution granted, or hereafter, to

be granted to him by the legislature, transport any of the inhabitants of this state or oblige them to march out of the limits of the same without their free and voluntary consent or the consent of the general court, nor grant commissions for exercising the law martial in any case without the advice and consent of the council.

charity, industry and economy, honesty and punctuality, sincerity, sobriety, and all social affections and generous sentiments, among the people: [*provided, nevertheless*, that no money raised by taxation shall ever be granted or applied for the use of the schools or institutions of any religious sect or denomination.]* [Free and fair competition in the trades and industries is an inherent and essential right of the people and should be protected against all monopolies and conspiracies which tend to hinder or destroy it. The size and functions of all corporations should be so limited and regulated as to prohibit fictitious capitalization, and provision should be made for the supervision and government thereof:—Therefore, all just power possessed by the state is hereby granted to the general court to enact laws to prevent the operations within the state of all persons and associations, and all trusts and corporations, foreign and domestic, and the officers thereof, who endeavor to raise the price of any article of commerce or to destroy free and fair competition in the trades and industries through combination, conspiracy, monopoly, or any other unfair means; to control and regulate the acts of all such persons, associations, corporations, trusts, and officials doing business within the state; to prevent fictitious capitalization; and to authorize civil and criminal proceedings in respect to all the wrongs herein declared against.]**

Constitutional Convention, 1918-21

The Convention to Revise the Constitution, which is still in legal existence, subject to reconvention by its president or by the governor, is the 10th such convention that has been held.

The New Hampshire legislature in 1915 passed a resolution to take a vote of the people on the expediency of revising the constitution, the seven-year period provided for in Article 99 of that document having elapsed since the question was previously considered. The vote was taken at the general state election in 1916 and resulted in an affirmative decision by 21,589 to 14,520.

The legislature of 1917, in accordance with this vote, provided that a convention should be held in June, 1918, and that delegates should be elected to it at the annual town meetings in March, and at special elections on the same day in cities. An appropriation of \$35,000 was made to pay the cost of this convention.

The election resulted in the choice of 434 delegates, each ward and town being entitled to a delegate for each representative in the legislature and every town to have at least one delegate whether represented in the legislature or not. The towns of Livermore and Bridgewater, however, failed to elect a delegate and in the towns of Hanover and Ashland there were tie votes and failure to elect. Between the election and the assembling of the convention, delegates-elect George W. Gordon, Republican, of the first ward in Berlin, and Edson J. Hill, Democrat, of the eighth ward in Concord, died, and delegate-elect Frank J. Peaslee of Bradford resigned. New elections were held in Concord and Bradford, which resulted in the choice of William A. Lee of the former and Everett Kittridge of the latter, both Democrats.

FIRST SESSION.

The convention met at the State House Wednesday, June 5, 1918. The delegates were called to order by Major William H. Trickey of Tilton, Commandant of the Soldiers' Home. Prayer was offered by the Rev. Dr. William H. Pound of Wolfeboro, a Congregational minister.

Former Congressman Hosea W. Parker of Claremont was elected temporary president. The convention seated the delegates elected at special elections and those candidates who were tied, the latter being Horace F. Hoyt and Prof. Frank A. Updyke of Hanover, and Albion Kahler and the Rev. Theodosius S. Thyng of Ashland, these four being seated with one-half vote each.

Albert O. Brown of Manchester, chairman of the Tax Commission, was elected president, Judge A. Chester Clark of Concord, secretary of the previous convention (1912), secretary, and Judge Bernard W. Carey of Newport, assistant secretary. Minor officers were elected as follows:

Chaplain, Rev. Archibald Black of Concord; sergeant-at-arms, Walter J. A. Ward of Hillsborough; doorkeepers, Guy S. Neal of Acworth, George Lawrence of Manchester, Albert P. Davis of Concord and Edward K. Webster of Concord; warden of coat room, George Goodhue of Concord; assistant warden, John C. O'Hare of Nashua; messenger, Frank L. Aldrich of Manchester; pages, Joseph H. Lane of Concord and Walter Pillsbury of Derry; stenographers, Misses Margaret Conway of Concord and Bessie Goodwin of Newport.

Two motions were made and voted upon, after considerable debate, to adjourn the convention until after the war, one proposition being to do so immediately, which was defeated by 167½ votes to 180½.

On the second day of the convention seats were drawn and the committee of the whole considered amendments on taxation. The timber taxation amendment was defeated and on the third day a resolution to adjourn until after the war was reintroduced and adopted by 230 votes to 79½. It provided that the convention should reassemble after the war and not later than a year after it, upon the call of the president and a committee

of ten delegates, John Scammon of Exeter, Leslie P. Snow of Rochester, Arthur E. Kenison of Ossipee, Judge William A. Plummer of Laconia, James O. Lyford of Concord, Charles S. Emerson of Milford, Harris H. Rice of Rindge, Judge Jesse M. Barton of Newport, Prof. Edwin J. Bartlett of Hanover and John C. Hutchins of Stratford.

The delegates adopted resolutions in support of the war and voted to pay their salaries in thrift stamps. A number of proposed amendments to the constitution were introduced. The Convention adjourned June 7, 1918.

SECOND SESSION.

The second session of the Convention was called by the committee for reconvening the convention on November 10, 1919, and the convention met January 13, 1920. Since the convention had previously adjourned the following 28 delegates had died:

After full discussion, the convention voted to submit seven proposed amendments to the vote of the people. The Convention adjourned January 29, 1920.

The proposed amendments were voted upon at the biennial election November 2, 1920 and rejected, as follows. (Two-thirds affirmative vote necessary for ratification).

FIRST VOTE ON AMENDMENTS.

QUESTION 1.

Do you approve of empowering the legislature to impose and levy taxes on incomes, which taxes may be classified, graduated and progressive, with reasonable exemptions?—

Yes, 49,018. No, 32,173.

QUESTION 2.

Do you approve of providing in terms that taxes on property when passing by will or inheritance may be classified, graduated and progressive, and with reasonable exemptions?—

Yes, 47,947. No, 25,681.

QUESTION 3.

Do you approve of giving the Governor authority to approve or disapprove any separate appropriation contained in any bill or resolution?—

Yes, 48,063. No, 27,833.

QUESTION 4.

Do you approve of providing that the whole number of members in the House of Representatives shall not be less than 300, nor more than 325; that representation shall be in proportion to the average total number of ballots cast in presidential elections, the legislature to make the apportionment of representatives at definite periods; and of providing that there shall be required for each representative additional to the first, three times the number of ballots required for one representative, with the proviso that a town, ward or place which has cast less than the number of ballots required to entitle it to a representative all of the time may send a representative a proportionate part of the time?—

Yes, 51,441. No, 29,639.

QUESTION 5.

Do you approve of amending the Bill of Rights by striking out the provision that no person who is conscientiously scrupulous about the lawfulness of bearing arms shall be compelled thereto provided he will pay an equivalent?—

Yes, 37,873. No, 33,567.

QUESTION 6.

Do you approve of amending the Bill of Rights by striking out the words "rightly grounded on evangelical principles" after the words "As morality and piety", and striking out the word "Protestant" before the words "teachers of piety, religion and morality"?—

Yes, 37,100. No, 44,750.

QUESTION 7.

Do you approve of amending the Bill of Rights by striking out the provision that pensions shall not be granted for more than one year at a time?—

Yes, 47,054. No, 33,796.

THIRD SESSION.

In January, 1921, the legislature provided funds for a third session of the convention and on January 20 the president, Albert O. Brown of Manchester, who had since the previous adjournment, become governor of the state, reconvened the convention on January 28. There were 322 delegates in attendance.

To fill vacancies, Lizzie H. Sanborn of Laconia was appointed official stenographer and William M. Haggett of Concord, assistant stenographer.

After discussion, the convention voted to resubmit the first two amendments, which had been rejected, to resubmit the fourth amendment in a different form and to submit a new amendment, providing for equal suffrage.

The convention adjourned at the close of its first day's session and the four proposed amendments were voted upon at the annual March elections, March 8, 1921, and rejected, as follows:

SECOND VOTE ON AMENDMENTS.

QUESTION 1.

Do you approve of empowering the legislature to impose and levy taxes on incomes which taxes may be classified, graduated and progressive, with reasonable exemptions?

Yes, 21,440. No, 33,819.

QUESTION 2.

Do you approve of providing in terms that taxes on property when passing by will or inheritance may be classified, graduated and progressive, and with reasonable exemptions?

Yes, 23,354. No, 29,473.

QUESTION 3.

Do you approve of providing that the whole number of members in the House of Representatives shall not be less than three hundred nor more than three hundred and twenty-five; that representation shall be in proportion to the population, the legislature to make the apportionment of representatives at the session following each federal census; and of providing that there shall be required for each representative additional to the first three times the number of inhabitants required for one representative, with the proviso that a town or ward which has less than the number of inhabitants required to entitle it to a representative all of the time may send a representative a proportionate part of the time?

Yes, 30,275. No, 23,271.

QUESTION 4.

Do you approve of striking out the word male in Article 27 relating to the qualification for voting; and of providing that women may hold office?

Yes, 30,285. No, 24,142.

during the sessions of the Portsmouth Peace Conference; secretary to the chairman of the Republican State Committee 1890; member and secretary of the New Hampshire Forestry Commission 1893-1907; member board of education, Concord, 1902-1903, 1906-1909, 1913-1916; delegate at large Republican National Convention 1908 and 1916; American minister to Greece and Montenegro during the administration of President Taft; editor "Concord Evening Monitor" 1892-1918; was elected November 5, 1918, to fill the unexpired term of the late Hon. Jacob H. Gallinger; re-elected in 1920; his term will expire March 3, 1927.

HENRY WILDER KEYES, Republican, of Haverhill, was born at Newbury, Vt., in 1863; graduated, degree of A. B., Harvard University 1887; also recipient of B. S. and LL. D. degrees New Hampshire College, and A. M. Dartmouth; member New Hampshire House of Representatives 1891-1895, 1915-1917; member New Hampshire Senate 1903-1905; treasurer State License Commission 1903-1915; chairman State Excise Commission 1915-1917; governor 1917-1919; elected to the United States Senate November 5, 1918, by a plurality rising 5,000; the first time for nearly a hundred years that a Senator has been elected while holding the office of governor; married Frances Parkinson Wheeler and has three sons; is a farmer, and president of the Woodsville National Bank; his term of office will expire March 4, 1925.

He was educated in the town schools at Brewster Free Academy, Wolfeboro, Dartmouth College and the University of Maine Law School. He was admitted to the bar of New Hampshire in 1916 and has been in the active and successful

practice of his profession since that time. He was a member of the state house of representatives in 1917 and 1919, the candidate of his party for speaker at the latter session, and was the Democratic candidate for Congress in 1918. On November 7, 1922, he was elected to the 68th Congress.

After holding various city and county offices, he was a member of the State House of Representatives in 1899, 1909 and 1913 and of the Constitutional Conventions of 1902 and 1912. First chosen to a seat in Congress in 1914, he has been re-elected consecutively since that time and is a member of the Committee on Appropriations of the National House.

Population of New Hampshire

TOTAL POPULATION, INCREASE, AND DISTRIBUTION.

Population of the state.—New Hampshire was one of the original thirteen states. According to the Fourteenth Census, taken as of January 1, 1920, its population is 443,083, which represents an increase of 12,511, or 2.9 per cent, over the population in 1910. During the same period the population of the United States increased 14.9 per cent. The following summary shows the population of New Hampshire from 1790, the first Federal census, to 1920, inclusive, together with the number and per cent of increase in each decade, in comparison with the per cent of increase for the United States as a whole.

Counties.—New Hampshire has 10 counties, 5 of which increased in population during the last decade, and 5 decreased. The largest percentage of decrease was in Carroll County—8 per cent. There have been no changes in county boundaries since 1910.

Density of population.—The total land area of the state in 1920 was 9,031 square miles and the average number of persons to the square mile was 49.1; in 1910 and 1900 the averages were 47.7 and 45.6, respectively.

Minor civil divisions.—In New Hampshire the primary division of the county is the town or city, and in 1920 these numbered 224 and 11, respectively; but, in addition to the town or city, Carroll County has 1 location and Coos County has 3 locations, 10 grants, 7 townships, and 6 purchases, making the total number of primary divisions in the state 262. Besides these primary divisions, there are 2 secondary divisions, or incorporated villages, which are not independent minor civil

divisions, but form parts of the towns in which they are located (see Table 2).

Of the 262 primary divisions referred to above, 9 of those in Coos County have had no population returned at the last three censuses, and are not included in Table 2 in the minor civil divisions of the county.

Cities.—Manchester, the largest of the 11 cities of New Hampshire, had a population of 78,384 in 1920. Nashua, the next largest, had a population of 28,379 and Concord, the capital of the state, 22,167. (See Tables 3 and 4.)

The following summary shows, for each city having 10,000 inhabitants or more in 1920, the population at each census for which figures are available, together with the increase during each decade.

Urban and rural population.—The Census Bureau defines urban population as that residing in cities and other incorporated places of 2,500 inhabitants or more. As New Hampshire has no incorporated villages of 2,500 or more and no city of less than 6,000 inhabitants, it has been considered advisable to include in the urban territory not only the population of the 11 cities of New Hampshire, but also that of all towns having over 2,500 inhabitants. This probably results in the “urban area” of New Hampshire including some population which in other states would be segregated as “rural,” but as this inclusion covers only 16 towns out of a total of 227, there is no reason to suppose that the proportion of urban population is greatly overstated.

Urban population in New Hampshire being thus defined, the rural population, therefore, consists of the population outside of towns and cities having 2,500 inhabitants or more.

The following summary presents, for the last three censuses, the urban and rural population of the state distributed among cities and towns grouped according to specified limits of population. The classification is based upon the population of each place as it existed at each census. The percentage of the population of New Hampshire living in cities and towns of 2,500 or more at the three census periods was 63.1, 59.2 and 55, respectively, there being during each decade practically the same increase in the proportion of urban population.

CHANGES IN CANDIDATES.

After the primary, upon petition of H. Carroll Field of Bristol, the state ballot law commission considered the nomination of John W. Barker of Lebanon as Republican candidate for the state senate in the fifth district and decided that he was ineligible through not having been a sufficient time a citizen. The vacancy on the ballot thus created was filled by the executive committee of the Republican state committee, who named Ora A. Brown of Ashland as the candidate. Through a writ of certiorari the matter was taken to the supreme court of the state which confirmed the action of the ballot law commission.

Charles C. Guernsey of Keene, nominated by both Republicans and Democrats for register of deeds of Cheshire county, died after the primary. The county committees of the two parties named Winfield M. Chaplin of Keene as the Republican candidate and Elgin A. Jones of Keene as the Democratic candidate.

Frank A. Gay of Hillsborough, nominated as the Republican candidate for sheriff of Hillsborough county, resigned, and the party committee named Warren A. Bodwell of Manchester in his place. In like manner Jerry J. Haggerty of Nashua was made the Democratic candidate for register of deeds of Hillsborough county.

REPUBLICAN ORGANIZATION, 1922.

The Republican state convention met at Concord, Tuesday, September 26, 1922, with Judge Chester B. Jordan of Keene as president, and adopted the following platform:

The Republican Platform.

We, the Republicans of New Hampshire, submit for review and appraisal the record of our Party made during the past two years, both in state and national affairs, with a sense of pride and that feeling of confidence of popular approval which flows from the consciousness of onerous duties courageously faced, and of arduous tasks well done.

The major achievements of a Republican Administration of national affairs, under the courageous and statesmanlike leadership of President Harding, include:

The restoration of the sovereignty of the people operating through their duly elected representatives.

The re-establishment of normal conditions in government, industry and trade.

The adoption of the budget system in government appropriation and expenditure, a fiscal reform not exceeded in importance in the financial history of the United States.

The revision of federal taxation accompanied by the elimination of many forms of oppressive and obnoxious war taxes.

The enactment of a genuinely protective tariff law which makes secure our domestic market in a time of greatly upset world trade conditions, and which

extends to the farmer, no less than to the workingmen and the manufacturer. that measure of protection which is essential to a prosperous agriculture and the maintenance of an American standard of living.

We take a great and just pride in the achievements of the present Republican National Administration in promoting the cause of world peace through the limitation of armaments and the removal of the causes of war in the Far East, and we commend to the world the recent Washington Conference as a finger post on the road to universal good understanding among nations.

For the past two years our state affairs have been conducted under the direction of a conspicuously able administrator.

The character of administration which Governor Albert O. Brown has given the state supplies ample warrant alone for a popular endorsement of Republican administration of state affairs at the impending election. His administration has made a reduction of the state indebtedness of more than a million dollars, has kept every state department and institution within its appropriation, and has prevented the issue of \$630,000 of bonds authorized by the legislatures of 1919 and 1921 by paying for additional buildings at the State Sanatorium and for the Memorial Bridge at Portsmouth out of current revenue.

We regard with grave concern numerous manifestations of violence and disorder attendant upon recent industrial disputes, both within and without the state, and we declare, unequivocally, for the maintenance of law and order as essential to the preservation of all our liberties and rights as a free people under a popular form of government. We maintain, unflinchingly, the entire equality of the right to work and the right to cease work; and we pledge the full power and authority of the state to protect the worker from all forms of unlawful interference in the exercise of either of these rights. We commend both state and local authorities for the measures they have taken to maintain law and order and to suppress violence, and we deprecate the weakness, wherever displayed by responsible officials who put political expediency before the discharge of their primary duty, which is to impartially enforce the law and preserve order.

We heartily sympathize, and will aggressively coöperate, with all those who would put an end to all forms of child labor and who seek to abridge the hours of labor of women employed in industry. We recognize, however, that reforms of this character when applied to competitive industries, must be imposed upon all if justice is done. We, therefore, pledge the votes of our representatives in Congress in support of a National forty-eight hour bill for women employed in industry already introduced in Congress by the Senior Senator from New Hampshire.

In view of the vital importance of a just and fair conclusion of a problem which involves the health and welfare of the industrial worker and the prosperity and successful operation of our leading industry we regard the clear understanding of the actual facts in the situation to be a primary essential to just action. We, therefore, favor the creation by the state of a Fact Finding Commission which will impartially and exhaustively investigate all of the essential and comparative conditions bearing on the controversy over the

length of the working week for women employed in industry in this state, to report to the incoming legislature before its adjournment.

New Hampshire has large undeveloped resources in water power and flood storage. Developed, these resources will largely take the place of coal for power in running the state's industrial plants. To assist our manufacturing interests in their competition with the manufacturing interests of the South and West, we recommend to the legislature the beginning of a policy for developing water power and storage, either as recommended by the Conservation Commission, or in some other comprehensive way.

We recognize that the future welfare and prosperity of the state depends largely upon the spirit of enterprise of its citizens. We regard the present as offering exceptional opportunities for the expansion of our industrial life, the rehabilitation of our agriculture and the promotion of our state as a great summer resort region. In order that a maximum of efficiency may be attained in the promotion of these purposes, we declare it to be sound public policy for the state to lend its assistance in providing information and publicity to the country at large concerning the opportunities in New Hampshire for industrial activities, the advantages of New Hampshire as an agricultural region, and the attractions of New Hampshire as a summer and winter resort.

We recognize and deplore the injustice and inequity of our present system of state taxation, due largely to constitutional restrictions. We pledge ourselves to remedy the defects in our tax system if possible by legislation, but if the legislature has not now the power necessary for that purpose, we recommend the early removal of those constitutional limitations which prevent the legislature from taking the action needed to equalize and fairly to distribute the burden of taxation, including an equitable method of taxation of growing timber.

We rejoice in the progress already made toward the restoration of our basic industry—agriculture—to a profitable basis. We commend the varied activities of the farm organizations within the state, designed to promote this end, and we pledge the fullest coöperation of the Republican Party in every intelligent and well-directed effort to increase food production within the state through the medium of a more profitable agriculture.

We commend the progress already made toward the elimination of tubercular disease in the dairy herds of the state and urge the legislature of 1923 to provide an adequate appropriation for the prosecution of this important work.

The amendment of the federal constitution prohibiting the manufacture or sale of intoxicating liquors has come to stay; and we are opposed to any legislation which under the guise of licensing the sale of beer and wine will neutralize the laws passed for the enforcement of this amendment, or which will tend to invalidate this fundamental law of the land.

For the purpose of avoiding possible litigation and confusion, we urge the legislature of 1923 to take appropriate action for the ratification and confirmation of the right of women to be elected and appointed to public office.

In the coming campaign, as always, the Democratic Party in glittering generalities will denounce the administration of state affairs by the Republican Party and promise a reduction of state expenses. We join issue as usual

with this arraignment and request our opponents to point out specifically what expenditures they condemn, wherein they would retrench, what state undertaking they would eliminate, and what state office they would abolish, and what state undertaking and office the Democratic Party by its votes in legislatures of the past has not helped to create.

Since the debt created by the Civil War was paid, the Republican Party, with the aid of Democratic votes in the legislature, has within the limit of the revenue of the state, made steady progress in developing the resources of the state, in promoting agriculture, in extending the benefits of education, in building highways of travel, in caring for the unfortunate wards of New Hampshire, in guarding the public health, in protecting the people from corporate extortions, in passing legislation for the protection of labor, and in all reasonable ways advancing the public interests.

Except for indebtedness incurred in the World War and in compensating New Hampshire soldiers serving therein, the state's indebtedness has constantly decreased for the past 17 years.

We stand by all that we have done and invite the closest scrutiny of our management of state affairs.

DEMOCRATIC ORGANIZATION, 1922.

The Democratic state convention met at Concord, Wednesday, September 26, 1922, with Major Robert C. Murchie as president, and adopted the following

Democratic State Platform.

We, the Democrats of New Hampshire, send greetings to our great leader, Woodrow Wilson, and assure him of our steadfast adherence to those Democratic principles of equality, justice and service which he has so ably championed. It felicitates him upon the splendid and unusual record of constructive legislation accomplished during his administration and it looks forward to the eventual triumph of his great ideals of world peace and international good will.

The Democratic party has always stood for law and order. We condemn violence and lawlessness in the settlement of any controversy, industrial or otherwise. The right to work and the right to cease work are sacred rights and there must be no unlawful interference with either.

We demand the preservation of freedom of speech and freedom of press and the right of peaceable assembly. We condemn any interference with these constitutional rights.

In order to secure equal opportunity and humane standards of employment, we favor a national law fixing the hours of labor and conditions of employment of women and children in industry. Such a law can only be secured after an amendment to the federal constitution. In the meantime, we do not propose to wait for the adoption of such an amendment before giving justice to our own women and children. Therefore, we advocate immediately the enactment of a law in this state fixing a 48-hour week for women and children in manufacturing plants.

There are serious inequalities in our present system of state taxation. Property subject to taxation is unequally assessed. Practically the whole burden is placed upon real estate and certain forms of tangible property and the great wealth of the state represented by investments in securities practically escapes all taxation. This system is especially unjust to farmers and the owners of homes. We pledge the party to remedy these defects in our tax system as far as the legislature has the power to act under the limitations of the constitution and we favor the removal at the earliest opportunity of those constitutional limitations which prevent the legislature from levying just taxes.

We favor such appropriations to our state department of agriculture as will enable it to carry on the work of its several departments more effectively and because of the value to the entire community we especially endorse its work in the eradication of bovine tuberculosis.

We rejoice in the growth of our State College and assure it of such appropriations as will enable it to maintain its standards and enlarge its usefulness.

We believe that the practice, generally adopted for partisan reasons, of depriving cities of the right of selecting their own officials is contrary to sound democratic principles and in the long run destructive to good government. We pledge ourselves to re-establish for the cities of New Hampshire genuine home rule.

We advocate the abolition of the Governor's council and increasing the membership of the senate, and basing the representation on population and not as now upon wealth.

We demand the strictest economy in state expenditures. Any new sources of revenue which may be secured by the necessary changes in our tax laws must be used for the purpose of reducing the unjust burden now laid upon real estate and tangible property rather than authorization for increased expenditures.

We demand the re-enactment of the wholesome usury law repealed by the last Republican legislature.

We condemn the Republican party for seating Truman H. Newberry in the senate although his seat was purchased by illegal use of money. The same resolution which declared him entitled to his seat declared "the expenditure of such excessive sums in behalf of a candidate, either with or without his knowledge and consent, being contrary to sound public policy, harmful to the honor and dignity of the Senate, and dangerous to the perpetuity of free government, such excessive expenditures are hereby severally condemned and disapproved." Senator Newberry should be expelled from the United States Senate.

The Republican party promised to reduce the burden of federal taxation and it pledged itself to "discharge to the fullest the obligations which a grateful nation justly should fulfill in appreciation of the services rendered by its defenders on sea and on land." In taxation it has relieved the rich by the repeal of the Excess Profits Tax and by reducing rates of taxation upon large incomes, and finds itself, consequently, without the means to meet the obligations to the soldiers.

At a time when the people are still suffering from the high cost of living and when increased foreign trade is essential to our national prosperity, the Republican party has passed the highest tariff bill in the history of the country. The Ford-Macumber tariff bill contains rates in many instances far in excess of any legitimate needs of any American industry. It has been generally condemned by leading Republican papers. To quote the words of the Republican "Boston Transcript," "It is a disgrace to the party in power and a menace to the nation. It is a piece of patchwork from start to finish. Pork barrel politicians scrambling for renomination and re-election have permitted special interests to write many of its provisions."

We condemn the Ship Subsidy Bill advocated by the Republican administration as a scheme to loot the treasury of the United States for the benefit of a few private corporations.

We condemn the Republican administration for its whole course of conduct in the railroad strike and the coal strike. Its policy of meddling, wabbling and wavering delayed the settlement in both controversies.

We advocate the strict enforcement of the 18th amendment of the Constitution of the United States.

The Democratic party favors the abolition of the poll tax on women.

On these issues and principles we ask the support and co-operation in the coming campaign of all independent, public-spirited men and women of New Hampshire.
