



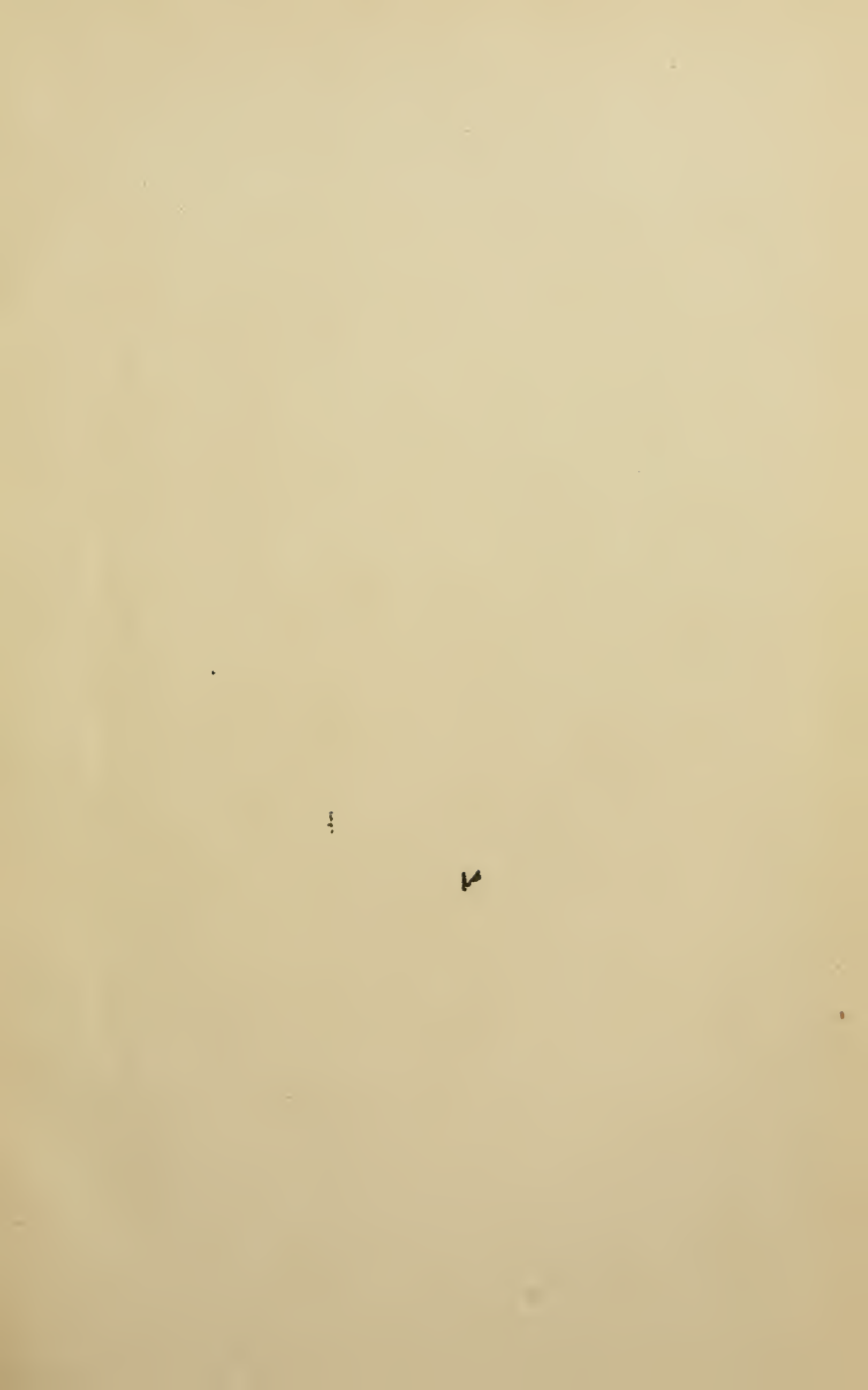


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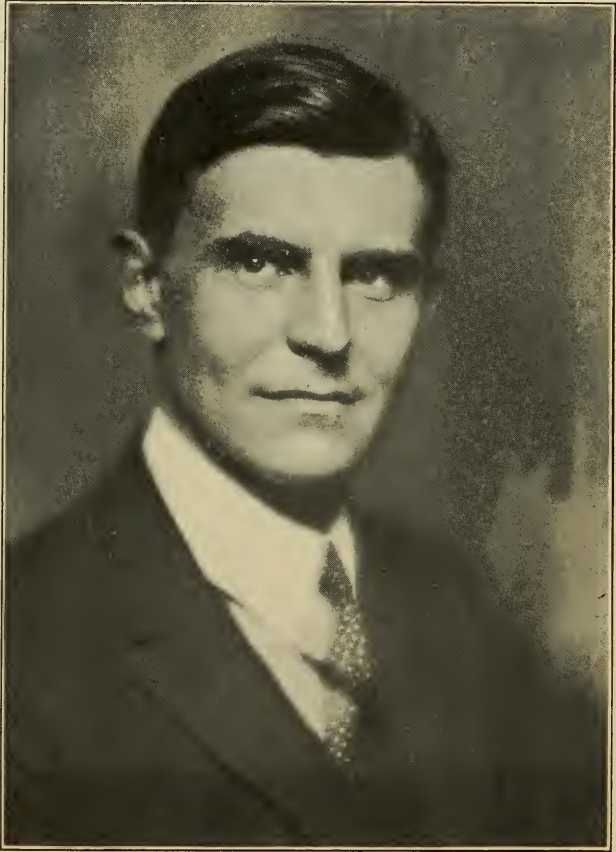

All amendments are shown by notes at the bottom of the page indicating the year in which they took effect. The amendments of 1792, "so far as relates to the choice of the members of the legislature and the executive officers of the state, county treasurer and recorder of deeds," took effect on February 1, 1793, and all others on the first Wednesday of June, 1793.

The amendments of 1850 took effect September 16, 1852; those of 1876, August 1, 1877, October 1, 1878, and the first Wednesday of June, 1879, as indicated in the foot notes; those of 1889, April 2, 1889; those of 1902 on March 26, 1903; and those of 1912 on November 20, 1912.

The numbering of the sections of Part II first appeared in the Revised Statutes of 1842. In 1889, when the tenth section of Part II was stricken out, all subsequent sections were moved forward, with the result of making much confusion in citations. In this copy the former numbering has been placed in parenthesis at the side of the present number.

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# PART FIRST

## BILL OF RIGHTS.

ARTICLE 1ST. All men are born equally free and independent; therefore, all government of right originates from the people, is founded in consent, and instituted for the general good.

[ART.] \*2d. All men have certain natural, essential, and inherent rights, among which are the enjoying and defending life and liberty, acquiring, possessing, and protecting property, and, in a word, of seeking and obtaining happiness.

[ART.] 3d. When men enter into a state of society, they surrender up some of their natural rights to that society, in order to insure the protection of others; and, without such an equivalent, the surrender is void.

[ART.] 4th. Among the natural rights, some are in their very nature unalienable, because no equivalent can be given or received for them. Of this kind are the rights of conscience.

[ART.] 5th. Every individual has a natural and unalienable right to worship God according to the dictates of his own conscience and reason; and no subject shall be hurt, molested, or restrained, in his person, liberty, or estate, for worshipping God in the manner and season most agreeable to the dictates of his own conscience, or for his religious profession, sentiments, or persuasion, provided he doth not disturb the public peace or disturb others in their religious worship.

[ART.] 6th. As morality and piety, rightly grounded on evangelical principles, will give the best and greatest security to government, and will lay in the hearts of men the strongest obligations to due subjection, and as the knowledge of these is

most likely to be propagated through a society by the institution of the public worship of the Deity and of public instruction in morality and religion, therefore to promote those important purposes, the people of this state have a right to empower, and do hereby fully empower, the legislature to authorize, from time to time, the several towns, parishes, bodies corporate, or religious societies within this state to make adequate provision, at their own expense, for the support and maintenance of public Protestant teachers of piety, religion, and morality.

*Provided, notwithstanding,* that the several towns, parishes, bodies corporate, or religious societies shall at all times have the exclusive right of electing their own public teachers and of contracting with them for their support and maintenance. And no person of any one particular religious sect or denomination shall be compelled to pay towards the support of the teacher or teachers of another persuasion, sect, or denomination.

And every denomination of Christians, demeaning themselves quietly and as good subjects of the state, shall be equally under the protection of the law; and no subordination of any one sect or denomination to another shall ever be established by law.

And nothing herein shall be understood to affect any former contracts made for the support of the ministry; but all such contracts shall remain and be in the same state as if this constitution had not been made.

[ART.] 7th. The people of this state have the sole and exclusive right of governing themselves as a free, sovereign, and independent state, and do, and forever hereafter shall, exercise and enjoy every power, jurisdiction, and right pertaining thereto which is not or may not hereafter be by them expressly delegated to the United States of America in congress assembled.

[ART.] 8<sup>th</sup>. All power residing originally in, and being derived from, the people, all the magistrates and officers of government are their substitutes and agents and at all times accountable to them.

[ART.] 9<sup>th</sup>. No office or place whatsoever in government shall be hereditary, the abilities and integrity requisite in all not being transmissible to posterity or relations.

[ART.] 10<sup>th</sup>. Government being instituted for the common benefit, protection, and security of the whole community, and not for the private interest or emolument of any one man, family, or class of men, therefore, whenever the ends of government are perverted and public liberty manifestly endangered and all other means of redress are ineffectual, the people may, and of right ought to, reform the old or establish a new government. The doctrine of nonresistance against arbitrary power and oppression is absurd, slavish, and destructive of the good and happiness of mankind.

[ART.] 11<sup>th</sup>. All elections ought to be free; and every inhabitant of the state, having the proper qualifications, has equal right to elect and be elected into office; [but no person shall have the right to vote, or be eligible to office under the constitution of this state, who shall not be able to read the constitution in the English language, and to write; *provided, however*, that this provision shall not apply to any person prevented by a physical disability from complying with its requisitions, nor to any person who now has the right to vote, nor to any person who shall be sixty years of age or upwards on the first day of January A. D. 1904,]\* [and *provided further*, that no person shall have the right to vote or be eligible to office under the constitution of this state who shall have been convicted of treason, bribery, or any wilful violation of the election laws

of this state or of the United States; but the supreme court may, on notice to the attorney general restore the privileges of an elector to any person who may have forfeited them by conviction of such offences.]†

[ART.] 12<sup>th</sup>. Every member of the community has a right to be protected by it in the enjoyment of his life, liberty, and property. He is, therefore, bound to contribute his share in the expense of such protection, and to yield his personal service, when necessary, or an equivalent. But no part of a man's property shall be taken from him or applied to public uses without his own consent or that of the representative body of the people. Nor are the inhabitants of this state controllable by any other laws than those to which they or their representative body have given their consent.

[ART.] 13<sup>th</sup>. No person who is conscientiously scrupulous about the lawfulness of bearing arms shall be compelled thereto, provided he will pay an equivalent.

[ART.] 14<sup>th</sup>. Every subject of this state is entitled to a certain remedy, by having recourse to the laws, for all injuries he may receive in his person, property, or character, to obtain right and justice freely, without being obliged to purchase it; completely and without any denial; promptly and without delay; conformably to the laws.

[ART.] 15<sup>th</sup>. No subject shall be held to answer for any crime or offense until the same is fully and plainly, substantially and formally, described to him, or be compelled to accuse or furnish evidence against himself. And every subject shall have a right to produce all proofs that may be favorable to himself, to meet the witnesses against him face to face, and to be fully heard in his defense by himself,

and counsel. And no subject shall be arrested, imprisoned, despoiled, or deprived of his property, immunities, or privileges, put out of the protection of the law, exiled, or deprived of his life, liberty, or estate, but by the judgment of his peers or the law of the land.

[ART.] 16<sup>th</sup>. No subject shall be liable to be tried, after an acquittal, for the same crime or offense; nor shall the legislature make any law that shall subject any person to a capital punishment (excepting for the government of the army and navy, and the militia in actual service) without trial by jury.

[ART.] 17<sup>th</sup>. In criminal prosecutions, the trial of facts in the vicinity where they happened is so essential to the security of the life, liberty, and estate of the citizen, that no crime or offense ought to be tried in any other county than that in which it is committed, except in cases of general insurrection in any particular county, when it shall appear to the judges of the superior court that an impartial trial cannot be had in the county where the offense may be committed, and, upon their report, the [legislature]\* shall think proper to direct the trial in the nearest county in which an impartial trial can be obtained.

[ART.] 18<sup>th</sup>. All penalties ought to be proportioned to the nature of the offense. No wise legislature will affix the same punishment to the crimes of theft, forgery, and the like, which they do to those of murder and treason. Where the same undistinguishing severity is exerted against all offenses, the people are led to forget the real distinction in the crimes themselves and to commit the most flagrant with as little compunction as they do† the lightest [offenses].‡ For the same reason, a multitude of sanguinary laws is both impolitic and

[ART.] 19th.\* [Every subject hath a right to be secure from all unreasonable searches and seizures of his person, his houses, his papers, and all his possessions. Therefore, all warrants to search suspected places or arrest a person for examination or trial, in prosecutions for criminal matters, are contrary to this right, if the cause or foundation of them be not previously supported by oath or affirmation, and if the order, in a warrant to a civil officer, to make search in suspected places or to arrest one or more suspected persons or to seize their property, be not accompanied with a special designation of the persons or objects of search, arrest, or seizure; and no warrant ought to be issued but in cases and with the formalities prescribed by law.]

[ART.] 20th. In all controversies concerning property and in all suits between two or more persons, except in cases in which it has been heretofore otherwise used and practiced [and except in cases in which the value in controversy does not exceed one hundred dollars and title of real estate is not concerned]† the parties have a right to a trial by jury; and this method of procedure shall be held sacred, unless, in cases arising on the high seas and such as relates to mariners' wages, the legislature shall think it necessary hereafter to alter it.

[ART.] 21st. In order to reap the fullest advantage of the inestimable privilege of the trial by jury, great care ought to be taken that none but qualified persons should be appointed to serve; and such ought to [be]‡ fully compensated for their travel, time, and attendance.

Liberty of the press.

[ART.] 22d. The *liberty of the press* is essential to the security of freedom in a state; it ought, therefore, to be inviolably preserved.

[ART.] 23<sup>d</sup>. Retrospective laws are highly injurious, oppressive, and unjust. No such laws, therefore, should be made, either for the decision of civil causes or the punishment of offenses.

[ART.] 24<sup>th</sup>. A well regulated militia is the proper, natural, and sure defense of a state.

[ART.] 25<sup>th</sup>. Standing armies are dangerous to liberty, and ought not to be raised or kept up without the consent of the legislature.

[ART.] 26<sup>th</sup>. In all cases and at all times, the military ought to be under strict subordination to, and governed by, the civil power.

[ART.] 27<sup>th</sup>. No soldier, in time of peace, shall be quartered in any house without the consent of the owner; and, in time of war, such quarters ought not to be made but by the civil magistrate, in a manner ordained by the legislature.

[ART.] 28<sup>th</sup>. No subsidy, charge, tax, impost or duty shall be established, fixed, laid, or levied under any pretext whatsoever, without the consent of the people or their representatives in the legislature, or authority derived from that body.

[ART.] 29<sup>th</sup>. The power of suspending the laws or the execution of them ought never to be exercised but by the legislature, or by authority derived therefrom, to be exercised in such particular cases only as the legislature shall expressly provide for.

[ART.] 30<sup>th</sup>. The freedom of deliberation, speech and debate in either house of the legislature is so essential to the rights of the people, that it cannot be the foundation of any action, complaint, or prosecution in any other court or place whatsoever.

[ART.] 31<sup>st</sup>. [The legislature shall assemble for the redress of public grievances and for making such laws as the public good may require.]\*

[ART.] 32<sup>d</sup>. The people have a right, in an orderly and peaceable manner, to assemble and consult upon the common good, give instructions to their representatives, and to request of the legislative body, by way of petition or remonstrance, redress of the wrongs done them and of the grievances they suffer.

[ART.] 33<sup>d</sup>. No magistrate or court of law shall demand excessive bail or sureties, impose excessive fines, or inflict cruel or unusual punishments.

[ART.] 34<sup>th</sup>. No person can in any case be subjected to law martial or to any pains or penalties by virtue of that law, except those employed in the army or navy, and except the militia in actual service, but by authority of the legislature.

[ART.] 35<sup>th</sup>. [It is essential to the preservation of the rights of every individual, his life, liberty, property, and character, that there be an impartial interpretation of the laws and administration of justice. It is the right of every citizen to be tried by judges as impartial as the lot of humanity will admit. It is, therefore, not only the best policy, but for the security of the rights of the people, that the judges of the supreme judicial court should hold their offices so long as they behave well, subject, however, to such limitations on account of age as may be provided by the constitution of the state, and that they should have honorable salaries, ascertained and established by standing laws.]\*

Pensions.

[ART.] 36<sup>th</sup>. Economy being a most essential virtue in all states, especially in a young one, no pension shall be granted but in consideration of actual services; and such pensions ought to be granted with great caution by the legislature, and never for more than one year at a time.

[ART.] 37<sup>th</sup>. In the government of this state, the three essential powers thereof—to wit, the legislative, executive, and judicial—ought to be kept as

separate from, and independent of, each other as the nature of a free government will admit or as is consistent with that chain of connection that binds the whole fabric of the constitution in one indissoluble bond of union and amity.

[ART.] 38<sup>th</sup>. A frequent recurrence to the fundamental principles of the constitution and a constant adherence to justice, moderation, temperance, industry, frugality, and all the social virtues, are indispensably necessary to preserve the blessings of liberty and good government. The people ought, therefore, to have a particular regard to all those principles in the choice of their officers and representatives; and they have a right to require of their law-givers and magistrates an exact and constant observance of them in the formation and execution of the laws necessary for the good administration of government.

## PART SECOND

### FORM OF GOVERNMENT

[ART. 1.]\* The people inhabiting the territory formerly called the province of New Hampshire do hereby solemnly and mutually agree with each other to form themselves into a free, sovereign, and independent body politic, or state, by the name of the STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

[ART. 2.] The supreme legislative power within this state shall be vested in the senate and house of representatives, each of which shall have a negative on the other.

sary, and shall dissolve and be dissolved seven days next preceding the said first Wednesday of [January]‡ [biennially],\*\* and shall be styled THE GENERAL COURT OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

[ART. 4.] The general court shall forever have full power and authority to erect and constitute judicatories and courts of record or other courts, to be holden in the name of the state, for the hearing, trying, and determining all manner of crimes, offenses, pleas, processes, complaints, actions, causes, matters, and things whatsoever, arising or happening within this state, or between or concerning persons inhabiting, or residing, or brought within the same, whether the same be criminal or civil, or whether the crimes be capital or not capital, and whether the said pleas be real, personal, or mixed, and for the awarding and issuing execution thereon; to which courts and judicatories are hereby given and granted full power and authority from time to time to administer oaths or affirmations for the better discovery of truth in any matter in controversy or depending before them.

[ART. 5.] And, further, full power and authority are hereby given and granted to the said general court, from time to time to make, ordain, and establish all manner of wholesome and reasonable orders, laws, statutes, ordinances, directions, and instructions, either with penalties or without, so as the same be not repugnant or contrary to this constitution, as they may judge for the benefit and welfare of this state and for the governing and ordering thereof and of the subjects of the same, for the necessary support and defense of the government thereof; and to name and settle [biennially],\* or provide by fixed laws for the naming and settling,

all civil officers within this state, such officers excepted the election and appointment of whom are hereafter in this form of government otherwise provided for; and to set forth the several duties, powers, and limits of the several civil and military officers of this state, and the forms of such oaths or affirmations as shall be respectively administered unto them for the execution of their several offices and places, so as the same be not repugnant or contrary to this constitution; and, also, to impose fines, mulcts, imprisonments, and other punishments; and to impose and levy proportional and reasonable assessments, rates, and taxes upon all the inhabitants of, and residents within, the said state, and upon all estates within the same, to be issued and disposed of by warrant, under the hand of the [governor]\* of this state for the time being, with the advice and consent of the council, for the public service, in the necessary defense and support of the government of this state and the protection and preservation of the subjects thereof, according to such acts as are or shall be in force within the same; [provided, that the general court shall not authorize any town to loan or give its money or credit, directly or indirectly, for the benefit of any corporation having for its object a dividend of profits, or in any way aid the same by taking its stock or bonds.]†

[ART. 6.] [The public charges of government or any part thereof may be raised by taxation upon polls, estates, and other classes of property, including franchises and property when passing by will or inheritance; and there shall be a valuation of the estates within the state taken anew once in every five years, at least, and as much oftener as the general court shall order.]‡

[ART. 7.] [No member of the general court shall take fees, be of counsel, or act as advocate in any cause before either branch of the legislature; and, upon due proof thereof, such member shall forfeit his seat in the legislature.]\*\*

[ART. 8.] [The doors of the galleries of each house of the legislature shall be kept open to all persons who behave decently except when the welfare of the state, in the opinion of either branch, shall require secrecy.]\*\*

#### SENATE.†

[ART. 24 (25).] The senate shall consist of [twenty-four]‡ members, who shall hold their office for [two years]§ from the first Wednesday of [January]\*\* next ensuing their election.

And every officer impeached for bribery, corruption, malpractice, or maladministration in office shall be served with an attested copy of the impeachment and order of senate thereon, with such citation as the senate may direct, setting forth the time and place of their sitting to try the impeachment; which service shall be made by the sheriff or such other sworn officer as the senate may appoint, at least fourteen days previous to the time

of trial; and, such citation being duly served and returned, the senate may proceed in the hearing of the impeachment, giving the person impeached, if he shall appear, full liberty of producing witnesses and proofs and of making his defense by himself and counsel; and may, also, upon his refusing or neglecting to appear, hear the proofs in support of the impeachment, and render judgment thereon, his non-appearance notwithstanding; and such judgment shall have the same force and effect as if the person impeached had appeared and pleaded in the trial.

[ART. 38 (39).] Their judgment, however, shall not extend further than removal from office, disqualification to hold or enjoy any place of honor, trust, or profit under this state; but the party so convicted shall, nevertheless, be liable to indictment, trial, judgment, and punishment, according to the laws of the land.

it become a law, be presented to the governor; if he approve, he shall sign it, but if not he shall return it, with his objections, to that house in which it shall have originated, who shall enter the objections at large on their journal and proceed to reconsider it. If, after such reconsideration, two thirds of that house shall agree to pass the bill, it shall be sent, together with such objections, to the other house, by which it shall likewise be reconsidered: and, if approved by two thirds of that house, it shall become a law. But, in all such cases, the votes of both houses shall be determined by yeas and nays, and the names of persons voting for or against the bill shall be entered on the journal of each house respectively. If any bill shall not be returned by the governor within five days (Sundays excepted) after it shall have been presented to him, the same shall be a law in like manner as if he had signed it, unless the legislature, by their adjournment, prevent its return, in which case it shall not be a law.

[ART. 44 (45).] Every resolve shall be presented to the governor, and, before the same shall take effect, shall be approved by him, or, being disapproved by him, shall be repassed by the senate and house of representatives, according to the rules and limitations prescribed in the case of a bill.

[ART. 50 (51).] The governor of this state, for the time being, shall be commander-in-chief of the army and navy and all the military forces of the state by sea and land; and shall have full power, by himself or by any chief commander or other officer or officers, from time to time to train, instruct, exercise, and govern the militia and navy; and for the special defense and safety of this state, to assemble in martial array and put in warlike posture the inhabitants thereof, and to lead and conduct them, and with them to encounter, repulse, repel, resist, and pursue by force of arms, as well by sea as by land, within and without the limits of this state; and also to kill, slay, destroy, if necessary; and conquer, by all fitting ways, enterprise, and means, all and every such person and persons as shall at any time hereafter, in a hostile manner, attempt or enterprise the destruction, invasion, detriment, or annoyance of this state; and to use and exercise over the army and navy and over the militia in actual service the law martial, in time of war, invasion, and also in rebellion declared by the legislature to exist, as occasion shall necessarily require; and surprise by all ways and means whatsoever, all and every such person or persons, with their ships, arms, ammunition, and other goods, as shall, in a hostile manner, invade or attempt the invading, conquering, or annoying this state; and in fine, the governor hereby is intrusted with all other powers incident to the office of captain-general and commander-in-chief and admiral, to be exercised agreeably to the rules and regulations of the constitution and the laws of the land; *provided*, that the governor shall not at any time hereafter, by virtue of any power by this constitution granted, or hereafter, to

be granted to him by the legislature, transport any of the inhabitants of this state or oblige them to march out of the limits of the same without their free and voluntary consent or the consent of the general court, nor grant commissions for exercising the law martial in any case without the advice and consent of the council.

And the commanding officer shall exhibit to the governor, when required by him, true and exact plans of such forts, and of the land and sea, or harbor or harbors adjacent.

#### ENCOURAGEMENT OF LITERATURE, TRADE, ETC.

charity, industry and economy, honesty and punctuality, sincerity, sobriety, and all social affections and generous sentiments, among the people: [*provided, nevertheless*, that no money raised by taxation shall ever be granted or applied for the use of the schools or institutions of any religious sect or denomination.]\* [Free and fair competition in the trades and industries is an inherent and essential right of the people and should be protected against all monopolies and conspiracies which tend to hinder or destroy it. The size and functions of all corporations should be so limited and regulated as to prohibit fictitious capitalization, and provision should be made for the supervision and government thereof:—Therefore, all just power possessed by the state is hereby granted to the general court to enact laws to prevent the operations within the state of all persons and associations, and all trusts and corporations, foreign and domestic, and the officers thereof, who endeavor to raise the price of any article of commerce or to destroy free and fair competition in the trades and industries through combination, conspiracy, monopoly, or any other unfair means; to control and regulate the acts of all such persons, associations, corporations, trusts, and officials doing business within the state; to prevent fictitious capitalization; and to authorize civil and criminal proceedings in respect to all the wrongs herein declared against.]\*\*

tary, treasurer of the state, attorney-general, commissary-general, military officers receiving pay from the continent or this state (excepting officers of the militia called forth on an emergency), register of deeds, sheriff, or officers of the customs, including naval officers, collectors of excise and state and continental taxes hereafter appointed, and not having settled their accounts with the respective officer; with whom it is their duty to settle such accounts, members of congress, or any person holding any office under the United States, shall at the same time hold the office of governor, or have a seat in the senate or house of representatives or council; but his being chosen and appointed to and accepting the same shall operate as a resignation of their seat in the chair, senate, or house of representatives, or council, and the place so vacated shall be filled up. # Constitutional Convention, 1918-1923

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The tenth Convention to Revise the Constitution, approved by the voters in the November, 1916, election, held four sessions and submitted for ratification by the voters twelve proposed amendments, all of which failed of adoption. Several of the questions had a majority in favor, but none had the necessary two-thirds affirmative vote.

The convention met in the first session in the State House, Wednesday, June 5, 1918. Former Congressman Hosea W. Parker of Claremont was elected temporary president, and Albert O. Brown of Manchester, then chairman of the State Tax Commission and later Governor, was elected President, serving throughout the life of the convention. Several resolutions were introduced, but on the third day the convention adjourned to reassemble not later than a year after the War.

The second session of the convention opened January 13, 1920. Forty resolutions, including those introduced at the first session, were considered. More than one-half of these related to taxation, reorganization of the Legislature, and to new methods of submitting amendments to the constitution. The convention voted to submit seven proposed amendments to the constitution, and adjourned January 29, 1920.

The proposed amendments were voted upon at the biennial election November 2, 1920, and rejected, as follows. (Two-thirds affirmative vote necessary for ratification).

## FIRST VOTE ON AMENDMENTS.

### QUESTION 1.

Do you approve of empowering the legislature to impose and levy taxes on incomes, which taxes may be classified, graduated and progressive, with reasonable exemptions?—

Yes, 49,018. No, 32,173.

## QUESTION 2.

Do you approve of providing in terms that taxes on property when passing by will or inheritance may be classified, graduated and progressive, and with reasonable exemptions?—

Yes, 47,947. No, 25,681.

## QUESTION 3.

Do you approve of giving the Governor authority to approve or disapprove any separate appropriation contained in any bill or resolution?—

Yes, 48,063. No, 27,833.

## QUESTION 4.

Do you approve of providing that the whole number of members in the House of Representatives shall not be less than 300, nor more than 325; that representation shall be in proportion to the average total number of ballots cast in presidential elections, the legislature to make the apportionment of representatives at definite periods; and of providing that there shall be required for each representative additional to the first, three times the number of ballots required for one representative, with a proviso that a town, ward or place which has cast less than the number of ballots required to entitle it to a representative all of the time may send a representative a proportionate part of the time?—

Yes, 51,441. No, 29,639.

## QUESTION 5.

Do you approve of amending the Bill of Rights by striking out the provision that no person who is conscientiously scrupulous about the lawfulness of bearing arms shall be compelled thereto provided he will pay an equivalent?—

Yes, 37,873. No, 33,567.

## QUESTION 6.

Do you approve of amending the Bill of Rights by striking out the words "rightly grounded on evangelical principles" after the words "As morality and piety," and striking out the word "Protestant" before the words "teachers of piety, religion and morality?"—

Yes, 37,100. No, 44,750.

## QUESTION 7.

Do you approve of amending the Bill of Rights by striking out the provision that pensions shall not be granted for more than one year at a time?—

Yes, 47,054. No, 33,796.

Governor Albert O. Brown, in his capacity as president of the convention, reassembled the delegates on January 29, 1921, after the Legislature then in session had provided funds for the session. The convention voted to resubmit the first two proposed amendments which had been rejected in November, 1920, and to resubmit the fourth proposed amendment, (also rejected) in different form, and to propose another designed to bring the State Constitution into conformity with the Federal Constitution after the adoption of the Nineteenth amendment. These were all rejected, the vote being as follows:

## SECOND VOTE ON AMENDMENTS.

## QUESTION 1.

Do you approve of empowering the legislature to impose and levy taxes on incomes which taxes may be classified, graduated and progressive, with reasonable exemptions?

Yes, 21,440. No, 33,819.

## QUESTION 2.

Do you approve of providing in terms that taxes on property when passing by will or inheritance may be classified, graduated and progressive, and with reasonable exemptions?

Yes, 23,354. No, 29,473.

## QUESTION 3.

Do you approve of providing that the whole number of members in the House of Representatives shall not be less than three hundred nor more than three hundred and twenty-five; that representation shall be in proportion to the population, the legislature to make the apportionment of representatives at the session following each federal census; and of providing that there shall be required for each representative additional to the first three times the number of inhabitants required for one representative, with the proviso that a town or ward which has less than the number of inhabitants required to entitle it to a representative all of the time may send a representative a proportionate part of the time?

Yes, 30,275. No, 23,271.

## QUESTION 4.

Do you approve of striking out the word male in Article 27 relating to the qualification for voting; and of providing that women may hold office?

Yes, 30,285. No, 24,142.

The Legislature of 1923, having under consideration various measures relating to changes in the taxation Laws, concerning which there was question of constitutionality, adopted a resolution requesting that the Convention be reassembled and that another effort should be made to so amend the constitution that the Legislature would have broader power to enact taxation legislation.

The Convention met for the fourth and final session on February 16, 1923. The action was limited to the submission of

one amendment, to be voted on at the following March meetings in the towns and at special elections in the cities on the same day. The question submitted and the vote follows:

#### QUESTION.

Do you approve of empowering the Legislature to impose and levy assessments, rates and taxes, for the public charge of government with no restrictions except that they be reasonable, as proposed in the amendment to the Constitution?

Yes, 21,006. No, 40,737.

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## Proclamation

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT.

Concord, March 27, 1923.

Be it known, that I, Fred H. Brown, Governor of the State of New Hampshire, in obedience to the request of the Constitutional Convention, held February 16, 1923, do hereby proclaim to the people of New Hampshire that the Constitution of the State is not amended, as proposed by said Convention, because the question covering the amendment submitted to vote of the people at the election, March 13, 1923, was not approved by the necessary two-thirds vote.

Given under my hand and the seal of the state, at the Council Chamber, this 27th day of March, 1923, and of the Independence of the United States of America, the one hundred and forty-seventh.

- Morrill was elected by the legislature in 1824.
- Harvey resigned in 1831. Joseph M. Harper of Canterbury filled out the term as acting governor.
- Colby elected by the legislature in 1846.
- Dinsmoor elected by the legislature in 1851.
- Metcalf elected by the legislature in 1856.
- Gilmore elected by the legislature in 1863.
- Weston elected by the legislature both times.
- Head was the first governor under the constitution as amended in 1879 providing for a two-year term of office.

This was the period of the permanent provincial government. From 1692 to 1775, in all 83 years.

# New Hampshire Congressional Delegation

## Senators.

GEORGE HIGGINS MOSES, Republican, of Concord, was born in Lubec, Me., February 9, 1869, the son of Rev. Thomas Gannett and Ruth (Smith) Moses; educated in the public schools of Eastport, Me., and Franklin, N. H., at the Phillips Exeter Academy (class of 1887), and at Dartmouth College (A. B. 1890, A. M. 1893); served as private secretary to Gov. David H. Goodell 1889-1891 and to Gov. John McLane 1905, during the sessions of the Portsmouth Peace Conference; secretary to the chairman of the Republican State Committee 1890; member and secretary of the New Hampshire Forestry Commission 1893-1907; member board of education, Concord, 1902-1903, 1906-1909, 1913-1916; delegate at large Republican National Convention 1908 and 1916; American minister to Greece and Montenegro during the administration of President Taft; editor "Concord Evening Monitor" 1892-1918; was elected November 5, 1918, to fill the unexpired term of the late Hon. Jacob H. Gallinger; re-elected in 1920; his term will expire March 3, 1927.

HENRY WILDER KEYES, Republican, of Haverhill, was born at Newbury, Vt., in 1863; graduated, degree of A. B., Harvard University 1887; also recipient of B. S. and LL. D. degrees New Hampshire College, and A. M. Dartmouth; member New Hampshire House of Representatives 1891-1895, 1915-1917; member New Hampshire Senate 1903-1905; treasurer State License Commission 1903-1915; chairman State Excise Commission 1915-1917; governor 1917-1919; elected to the United States Senate November 5, 1918, the first time for nearly a hundred years that a Senator has been elected while holding the office of governor; re-elected November 4, 1924; married Frances Parkinson (Wheeler) and has three sons; is a farmer, and president of the Woodsville National Bank; his term of office will expire in March, 1931.

## Representatives.

FLETCHER HALE, Republican, of Laconia, was born in Portland, Me., January 22, 1883. He was graduated from Boston English High School and from Dartmouth College in 1905. He studied law at Littleton, in the office of the late Hon. A. S. Batchellor, and was admitted to the New Hampshire bar in 1908, being connected with the office of Batchellor and Mitchell until 1912, when he went to Laconia, where he is still in practice. He has served as Laconia City Solicitor; Belknap County Solicitor, and when elected to Congress, was secretary of the State Tax Commission, and chairman of the Laconia School Board. He was a delegate to the 1918 Constitutional Convention and of the Special Committee appointed by New England Governors in 1920, to investigate railroad rates.

SECOND DISTRICT.—COUNTIES: Cheshire, Coos, Grafton and Sullivan. HILLSBORO COUNTY: City of Nashua, towns of Amherst, Antrim, Bennington, Brookline, Deering, Francestown, Greenfield, Greenville, Hancock, Hillsboro, Hollis, Lyndeboro, Mason, Milford, Mont Vernon, New Boston, New Ipswich, Peterboro, Sharon, Temple, Weare, Wilton and Windsor. MERRIMACK COUNTY: Cities of Concord and Franklin, towns of Andover, Boscawen, Bow, Bradford, Danbury, Dunbarton, Henniker, Hill, Hopkinton, Newbury, New London, Salisbury, Sutton, Warner, Webster and Wilmot.

EDWARD H. WASON, Republican, of Nashua, was born in New Boston, September 2, 1865; graduate of New Hampshire College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts and Boston University School of Law, since which time he has practiced law in Nashua. After holding various city and county offices, he was a member of the State House of Representatives in 1899, 1909 and 1913 and the Constitutional Conventions of 1902 and 1912. First chosen to a seat in Congress in 1914, he has been re-elected consecutively since that time and is a member of the Committee on Appropriations of the National House.

### TOTAL POPULATION, INCREASE, AND DISTRIBUTION

Population of the state.—New Hampshire was one of the original thirteen states. According to the Fourteenth Census, taken as of January 1, 1920, its population is 443,083, which represents an increase of 12,511, or 2.9 per cent, over the population in 1910. During the same period the population of the United States increased 14.9 per cent. The following summary shows the population of New Hampshire from 1790, the first Federal census, to 1920, inclusive, together with the number and per cent. of increase in each decade, in comparison with the per cent. of increase for the United States as a whole.

**Counties.**—New Hampshire has 10 counties, 5 of which increased in population during the last decade, and 5 decreased. The largest percentage of decrease was in Carroll County—8 per cent. There have been no changes in county boundaries since 1910.

**Density of population.**—The total land area of the state in 1920 is 9,031 square miles and the average number of persons to the square mile is 49.1 (see Table 1); in 1910 and 1900 the averages were 47.7 and 45.6, respectively.

**Minor civil divisions.**—In New Hampshire the primary division of the county is the town or city, and in 1920 these number 224 and 11, respectively; but, in addition to the town or city, Carroll County has 1 location and Coos County has 3 locations, 10 grants, 7 townships, and 6 purchases, making the total number of primary divisions in the state 262. Besides these primary divisions, there are 2 secondary divisions, or incorporated villages which are not independent minor civil divisions, but form parts of the towns in which they are located (see Table 2).

Of the 262 primary divisions referred to above, 9 of those in Coos County have had no population returned at the last three censuses, and are not included in Table 2 in the minor civil divisions of the county.

**Cities.**—Manchester, the largest of the 11 cities of New Hampshire, has a population of 78,384 in 1920. Nashua, the next largest, has a population of 28,379 and Concord, the capital of the state, 22,167. (See Tables 3 and 4.)

The following summary shows, for each city having 10,000 inhabitants or more in 1920, the population at each census for which figures are available, together with the increase during each decade.

**Urban and rural population.**—The census Bureau defines urban population as that residing in cities and other incorporated places of 2,500 inhabitants or more. As New Hampshire has no incorporated villages of 2,500 or more and no city of less than 6,000 inhabitants, it has been considered advisable to include in the urban territory not only the population of the 11 cities of New Hampshire, but also that of all towns having over 2,500 inhabitants. This probably results in the “urban area” of New Hampshire including some population which in other states would be segregated as “rural,” but as this inclusion covers only 16 towns out of a total of 227, there is no reason to suppose that the proportion of urban population is greatly overstated.

Urban population in New Hampshire, being thus defined, the rural population, therefore, consists of the population outside of towns and cities having 2,500 inhabitants or more.

The following summary presents, for the last three censuses, the urban and rural population of the state distributed among cities and towns grouped according to specified limits of population. The classification is based upon the population of each place as it existed at each census. The percentage of the population of New Hampshire living in cities and towns of 2,500 or more at the three census periods was 63.1, 59.2 and 55, respectively, there being during each decade practically the same increase in the proportion of urban population.

# World War Memorial

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Chapter 140 of the Laws of 1919 provided for a memorial in the form of a roll of honor bearing the names of New Hampshire residents who died in the military, naval or auxiliary service of the United States, or any of the Allied Countries, during the World War, and directed the Governor and Executive Council to obtain the memorial.

Acting under this statute, Governor John H. Bartlett and the Council appointed a committee to invite designs of memorials and to select a suitable location in the state house or on the state house grounds and to report to the Governor and Council. The members of the committee were Councilor Arthur G. Whittemore of Dover, State Senator George H. Eames of Keene and Representative Frank H. Challis of Manchester.

Difficulty in obtaining a complete list of the names of New Hampshire residents who lost their lives in the various branches of the service and while serving in the armies of other nations than the United States caused delay in carrying out the project. The committee in a report to Governor Albert O. Brown and his Council on October 26, 1921, announced that after a study of numerous designs and estimates of the cost, they would recommend acceptance of the design of the John Polacheak Bronze and Iron Company and that the contract be awarded to that firm at a price of \$4100. The committee also recommended that the memorial be placed in Doric Hall, at the then entrance to the general committee room and that a new entrance to the committee room be made.

The recommendations of the committee were approved by the Governor and Council. There were further delays, mainly owing to the necessity of adding newly reported names of residents who gave their lives in the war and the memorial was not finally placed until the fall of 1924. The tablet is made of cast bronze with marble and slate base, surmounted by a cast bronze wreath.

## Presidential Primary

A Presidential Primary was held March 11, 1924, the Republican and Democratic parties electing delegates to the National Conventions. Each party, as a result of action by their National Committees, sent delegations of increased membership. The Republicans had seven delegates-at-large, three more than New Hampshire hitherto had been entitled to, and the Democrats had eight delegates-at-large, four more than the usual number. Each party sent the customary two delegates from each district.

The additional Republican delegates-at-large were the state's quota based upon the vote for the Presidential electors in the preceding election, and the delegates had full votes. The Democrats, however, sent eight delegates, each entitled to one-half vote in the convention.

The Republicans had contests for delegates-at-large and for first district delegates. The Democrats had contests for district delegates in both districts. Those elected are indicated by asterisks.

# Presidential Conventions

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Three sets of Presidential electors appeared on the New Hampshire ballots used in the general election in November, 1924. The Democratic and Republican electors were named at State conventions held in September, and the "Progressive" electors were named on petitions filed with the Secretary of State, as provided by the election Laws.

## REPUBLICAN NATIONAL CONVENTION

The Republican National Convention was held at Cleveland the second week in June, delegates and alternates elected at the Presidential Primary attending. Fred W. Estabrook was re-elected National Committeeman and State Chairman Dwight Hall was made Chairman of the Delegation.

The Convention nominated President Calvin Coolidge for President and Charles R. Dawes of Illinois for Vice-President. The Coolidge and Dawes electors named at the State convention were Mary L. C. Schofield of Peterborough, Annie B. Shepard of Derry, William Robinson Brown of Berlin and George A. Carpenter of Wolfeboro.

## DEMOCRATIC NATIONAL CONVENTION

The Democratic National Convention was held at New York the fourth week in June, continuing into the first week in July. Robert C. Murchie was re-elected National Committeeman and State Chairman Robert Jackson was made Chairman of the Delegation.

John W. Davis of West Virginia was nominated for President and Governor Charles R. Bryan of Nebraska for Vice-President by the Convention. The Davis and Bryan Electors named at the State convention were Frances T. Bingham of Littleton, William O. Corbin of Manchester, Albert Wellington Noone of Peterborough, and Patrick H. Sullivan of Manchester.

## "PROGRESSIVE" CONVENTION

A Convention of representatives of various minor Political Parties, Labor and other Organizations was held at Cleveland on July Fourth, at which Senator Robert M. LaFollette of Wisconsin was nominated for President and Senator Burton K. Wheeler of Montana was nominated for Vice-President.

Socialists in New Hampshire, who in previous Presidential elections had named tickets, joined with others in signing nomination petitions for LaFollette and Wheeler. The Presidential electors named were: Lela B. Sanborn of Laconia, Edgar D. Mank of Manchester, Fred E. Sawyer of Concord and Charles A. Wheeler of Nashua.

# Direct Primary 1924

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The direct primary election was held September 2, 1924, with candidates of the Democratic and Republican parties participating. The towns of Bridgewater and Wentworth's Location were the only ones where no votes were cast.

The returns are given in detail in the following tables. In the summary the full names and addresses of the candidates, with their total vote, is given. The other tables, carrying the vote in detail, give only the last name of the candidates.

The first table gives, by counties, the votes for governor, United States senator and representative in Congress of each party. The second table gives the votes for county officers. The third table gives the votes for councilors, by districts; and the fourth table the votes for state senators by districts.

# Republican Organization

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The Republican state convention met at Concord, Thursday, September 18, 1924, with Norris H. Cotton of Warren as president, and adopted the following platform:

## Platform of the Republican Party

This is presented as a result of conference with all parties interested.

The Republicans, in common with all others of the country, deplore the untimely death of President Harding under whose leadership the party won the most remarkable triumph in its history. But we rejoice that the leadership thus taken away fell into the capable hands of one well known to us as a neighbor and fellow Republican.

To Calvin Coolidge, the President that is and the President that is to be, and to Charles C. Dawes, our next Vice President, we pledge our unflinching loyalty and united support.

We recognize that the task of reconstruction made necessary by the reaction following the great war, though well advanced, is by no means finished. Under the policies advocated by Calvin Coolidge we recognize the meanings for carrying these tasks to complete fulfillment, and we pledge ourselves to redeem this state from Democratic rule, to take back to ourselves the Congressional district now held by our opponents, to return a faithful Republican senator and congressmen in office, and to give to the President a governor and legislature in New Hampshire which will be responsive to his leadership.

We endorse the platform of the Republican party adopted by the national convention at Cleveland.

The Republican party pledges itself to the furtherance of the sound financial policies inaugurated under Republican administration, as a result of which the state debt has been reduced to a vanishing point.

We further pledge that the expenses of our government shall be placed and kept at the lowest mark consistent with a successful and efficient conduct of the business of the state.

New Hampshire supported prohibition prior to the adoption of the Federal amendment. The amendment was adopted after half a century of agitation. It undoubtedly represents the will of the majority of the people of the United States. We are opposed either to the modification or repeal of our state law or of the Volstead Act. We pledge the Republican party to a vigorous enforcement of these laws.

We favor an amendment of the law reducing the poll tax from three dollars to two dollars.

We pledge ourselves to support agriculture in all its branches to the end that the upbuilding of the rural communities of our state may be developed to their fullest extent, and we reaffirm the position taken by the Republican party in 1922 toward the elimination of tubercular disease in the dairy herds of the state, and recommend that adequate appropriation be made for the further prosecution of the work.

We endorse the excellent work which has been accomplished by the normal schools, and the university of our state, and we favor appropriations adequate to properly meet the requirements of the natural growth of these institutions.

We are opposed to any increase in the present tax burden of the towns or the state. In case additional authority is obtained by amendment of the Constitution, we urge the adoption of laws which will more justly distribute the tax burden between different classes of property. All changes which will have this effect will have our support.

We recommend to the legislature the beginning of a policy for developing water power, and storing it, either as recommended by the Conservation Commission, or in some other comprehensive way.

Our President, Calvin Coolidge, as governor of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts in 1919 signed a 48-hour bill designed to safeguard the vital interests of women and children engaged in manufacturing industries. Our candidate for governor, John G. Winant, introduced the first 48-hour bill presented to the New Hampshire legislature in 1917. We recommend the action of these men, who are the leaders of our party in nation and state, as we submit our cause to the judgment of the people and declare it to be in harmony with the spirit of the Republican national platform, which affirms its faith in the principles of the eight-hour day, and the protection of women and children employed in industry.

We commend the Republican Congress in submitting to the states for ratification the Federal Child Labor amendment, and we recommend it to the serious consideration of the legislature in 1925.

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 DEMOCRATIC ORGANIZATION, 1924

The Democratic state convention met at Concord, Monday, September 29, 1924, with Raymond B. Stevens of Landaff as president, and adopted the following:

## Democratic State Platform

We, the Democratic Party of New Hampshire, in convention assembled, proclaim these principles on which we stand before the people of this state, and to the support of which we pledge our every effort, whether it be as the party entrusted with the welfare of that people by their franchise, or as a constructive cooperating minority.

### Endorse National Party and Candidates

We heartily endorse the platform of our party in the nation, believing it to embody those principles which are not alone conducive but essential to our national welfare. Its candidates we commend, and should they, as we believe they will, be given in trust the leadership of our country, we are assured of an honest and capable administration of that trust. We can truly say that the promises and pledges of our party in both state and nation have always been faithfully kept.

### Points With Pride to War Record

The Democratic Party points with justifiable pride to the account of its stewardship of this nation's affairs from 1912 to 1920. In common with all good Americans, we blush with shame at the record of the past four years. We deplore the fact that it was necessary for the minority party to ferret out and expose the corruption in the executive family and that these efforts were not given the fullest cooperation from our nation's head, and that today, no offender has been brought to justice and never has the party charged with responsibility recognized the fact that a wrong has been done or a trust violated.

### Condemns Pledge of Republicans

The pledges of the Republican Party have in the past proved mere phrases to catch the votes of the public. They have never been redeemable at par. Its policies have always led to the enrichment of the few at the expense of the many.

### Advocate State 48-Hour Law

In order to secure equal opportunity and humane standards of employment, we favor a national law fixing the hours of labor and conditions of employment of women and children in industry. Such a law can only be secured after an amendment to the federal constitution. In the meantime, we do not propose to wait for the adoption of such an amendment before giving justice to our own women and children. Therefore, we advocate immediately the enactment of a law in this state fixing a 48-hour week for women and children in manufacturing plants.

### Advocate Child Labor Amendment

We earnestly advocate the ratification by our legislature of the amendment to the federal constitution, giving congress the power to legislate

against the enslaving of little children by unscrupulous employers of labor, and call attention to the fact that under the last National Democratic administration such legislation was enacted but declared unconstitutional by our Federal Supreme Court.

### **Endorse Davis Statement on Klan**

We endorse and stand by the declaration of our standard bearer, John W. Davis, "if any organization, no matter whether called Ku Klux Klan or any other name, raises the standard of racial and religious prejudice or attempts to make racial origins or religious beliefs the test of fitness for public office, it does violence to the spirit of American institutions and must be condemned by all those who believe in American ideals."

### **Commend Tuberculosis Work**

We commend the progress already made toward the elimination of bovine tuberculosis in the dairy herds of the state, and urge the Legislature of 1925 to provide an adequate appropriation for the prosecution of this highly important work.

### **Favor University Appropriation**

We favor sufficient appropriation for the University of New Hampshire and the Agricultural Extension Service connected therewith to enable them to carry on the excellent work they are now doing.

### **Recommend Constitutional Convention**

We recommend a new constitutional convention to submit an amendment which will permit the Legislature to equalize tax burdens.

### **Pledges Home Rule for Cities**

We believe that the practice, generally adopted for partisan reasons, of depriving cities of the right of selecting their own officials is contrary to sound democratic principles and in the long run destructive to good government. We pledge ourselves to re-establish for the cities of New Hampshire genuine home rule.

### **Advocate Abolishment of Council**

We advocate the abolition of the Governor's council and increasing the membership of the Senate, and basing the representation on population and not as now upon wealth.

### **Favor Strict Law Enforcement**

We favor the strict enforcement of the 18th amendment of the Constitution of the United States.

### **Favor Abolishing Woman's Poll Tax**

The Democratic party favors the abolition of the poll tax on women.

### Favor Inheritance Tax Refund

The inheritance tax law of 1919 having been declared unconstitutional and the rights of those against whom the tax was illegally assessed having been proscribed, we advocate the enactment of legislation to repay to them the sums thus illegally assessed without sending them to the courts for redress.

### Point to Administration Record

We present to the people of New Hampshire a record of two years' administration of the state government that speaks for itself. That alone is more than sufficient to justify the return of our party to power. For the first time in history the state of New Hampshire has no net debt, but instead a surplus of \$700,000. At the same time the state tax has been reduced a million dollars. It is inconceivable that with such a record the electorate should desire a change based only on the equivocal promises of the party that failed in its many years of administration to approach the record on which we stand.

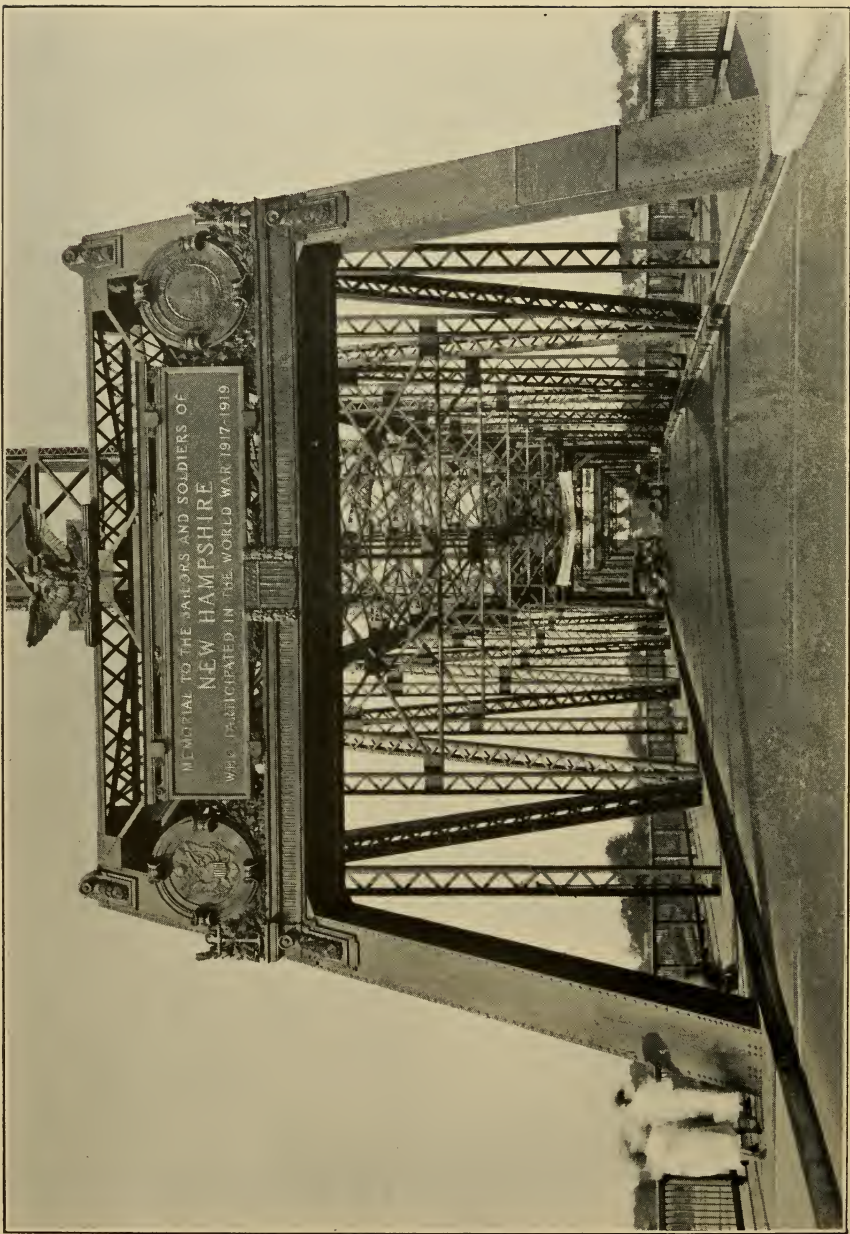

MEMORIAL BRIDGE AT PORTSMOUTH

## Memorial Bridge at Portsmouth, N. H.

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By act of the New Hampshire Legislature, approved March 27, 1919, the State of New Hampshire was authorized to join with the State of Maine and the United States Government for the joint construction of a memorial bridge over the Piscataqua River, and \$500,000.00 was appropriated as New Hampshire's portion of the cost. The bridge to be known as a Memorial Bridge to the Sailors and Soldiers of the states of New Hampshire and Maine who participated in the World War.

Under this act a joint building commission consisting of the Secretary of the Navy, representing the United States, and the Governors of New Hampshire and Maine, to provide for the construction of the bridge. This commission appointed as a Board of Engineers, Ernest H. Brownell, representing the United States Government, Walter H. Norris, representing the State of Maine, and William A. Grover, representing the State of New Hampshire.

The Governor and Council of New Hampshire appointed a committee, consisting of Hon. Arthur G. Whittmore, of Dover, Chairman, Major Orville E. Cain of Keene, Major Reginald C. Stevenson of Exeter, Hon. William D. Swart of Nashua, and Captain Frederick R. Hoyt of Portsmouth, to select and place upon the New Hampshire end of the bridge a tablet which shall be a special memorial to the sailors and soldiers of the State of New Hampshire.

The contract for the construction of the bridge was signed in December, 1920, and the bridge was opened to public travel on August 17, 1923. The Memorial tablet was placed in position on August 4, 1924.

This bridge consists of three 300-foot spans or a total span length of 900 feet, while the distance from land to land measures 1,200 feet. The floor of the bridge is of reinforced concrete while the structure is designed to carry a load of a 50-ton electric car, a string of 20-ton trucks and a two-side work load of 82 pounds to a square foot. The center span

is a vertical lift draw and when closed is used as a highway with 21 feet clearance over water, while with the opening of the draw at high tide there is a clearance of 150 feet. The draw is balanced by two concrete counter weights of 1,000,000 pounds each suspended by sixty-four wire cables. It is raised or lowered in the remarkably short time of three minutes by two 100-horsepower motors. The piers are anchoed on a bed of solid ock and at some places it was necessary to go to a depth of 82 feet at high water.

The structure is a splendid tribute to the Federal Government and the states of New Hampshire and Maine, constructed at an aggregate cost of approximately fifteen hundred thousand dollars and shared equally by the three parties.

## VOTERS IN NEW HAMPSHIRE

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The following tables give, by counties, the comparative figures for every town and ward, on number of voters and votes cast. The first column gives the population of the town, the second gives the number of legal voters at the time of the election November 4, 1924; the third gives the total number of votes cast at that election; the fourth gives the number of ballots required at future elections; the fifth gives the vote on the expediency of calling a constitutional convention.

The population totals are slightly less than the totals given in the 1920 census tables in a preceding chapter. This is accounted for by the population of unincorporated places.

The total vote figures are slightly in excess of the total vote cast for any office, as shown in the election returns. This is accounted for by the failure of a small percentage of voters to vote for all the offices.

## NEW HAMPSHIRE TURNPIKE ROADS

By Otis G. Hammond, Supt. N. H. Historical Society

**Amherst Turnpike, incorporated June 18, 1812.**

Beginning at the end of the Second New Hampshire Turnpike on Amherst plain, thence running to the line between the State of New Hampshire and the Commonwealth of Massachusetts in a direction to meet the turnpike road in Tyngsborough in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, conforming to the survey lately made by Daniel Warner as near as the nature of the ground will permit.

**Andover Turnpike, incorporated June 17, 1812.**

From Republican bridge, so called, in Salisbury to the Fourth New Hampshire Turnpike in Andover, at or near the dwelling house of Samuel Kimball.

**Ashuelot Turnpike, incorporated June 18, 1807.**

From the turnpike road in Winchester to Fitzwilliam Village, leading to Boston.

**Bath Turnpike, incorporated December 11, 1804.**

From Connecticut River, at or near the southerly line of Lyman, through the towns of Lyman, Bath, Landaff, Coventry\*, Peeling†, and Thornton to the easterly line of Sandwich.

\*Now Benton.

†Now Woodstock.

**Charlestown Turnpike, incorporated December 27, 1803.**

From the eastwardly bank of Connecticut River, near the center part of Charlestown, to the Second Turnpike road in Lempster.

**Cheshire Turnpike, incorporated December 13, 1804.**

From Connecticut River, near Charlestown meeting-house, where a bridge may be erected over said river, through said Charlestown, Langdon and Surry to the Third New Hampshire Turnpike near the court-house in Keene.

**Chester Turnpike, incorporated June 19, 1804.**

From the highway leading to Pembroke, about a mile above Chester east meeting-house, unto Chester line on a direction to Pembroke Street.

Charter extended Dec. 5, 1804, to permit passing through Allentown about one mile, and through land in Pembroke about one quarter of a mile, in a line to Pembroke Street.

**Chesterfield Turnpike, incorporated June 21, 1804.**

From Connecticut River in Chesterfield, or from the village near the meeting-house in said Chesterfield, through said Chesterfield and Winchester to the line of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts.

**Chocorua Mountain Road, incorporated August 9, 1889.**

From near the dwelling-house of Charles Durrell in said Tamworth (where said road is now located and constructed) to the line between the towns of said Tamworth and Albany, thence to the top of Chocorua Mountain in said town of Albany.

**Coos Turnpike, incorporated December 19, 1805.**

Beginning at Haverhill Corner, so called, thence in such route or tract as shall in their best skill and judgment combine shortness of distance with the most practicable ground, through a part of said Haverhill, Piermont, and Warren to the waters of Baker's River, so called, at or near Merrill's mill in said Warren.

**Coos Turnpike, incorporated July 1, 1837.**

From or near the mouth of John's River in the town of Dalton, thence following the valley of said John's River through said Dalton, Whitefield, to Jefferson, thence on the most practicable route through said Jefferson, Killenney, Randolph, to the Androscoggin River near Gilman Lang's in the town of Gorham.

**Cornish Turnpike, incorporated December 9, 1808.**

From or near Cornish bridge, so called, in Cornish to intersect the Croydon Turnpike road in Newport.

**Coventry Turnpike, incorporated December 29, 1803.**

From or near the guide post in Warren (at the fork of the roads, one leading to Haverhill Corner, the other to Coventry\*) unto or near the old court-house in Haverhill.

\*Now Benton.

**Coventry Turnpike, incorporated July 6, 1839.**

From the east line of the town of Haverhill to the north line of the town of Warren through the Oliverian Valley in said Coventry.\*

\*Now Benton.

**Croydon Turnpike, incorporated June 21, 1804.**

From or near the branch turnpike road from Hanover, where it intersects the Fourth Turnpike road in Lebanon, thence southerly through part of Lebanon, part of Enfield or Plainfield, New Grantham\*, Croydon, Newport, until it strikes the Second New Hampshire Turnpike road in Lempster or Washington.

\*Now Grantham.

**Dalton Turnpike, incorporated December 11, 1804.**

From the mouth of John's River in said Dalton to meet the Tenth Turnpike road in this state.

**Dover Turnpike, incorporated December 23, 1803.**

From Dover Landing, near the bridge, through Somersworth to Salmon Falls River, to such a place on said river as shall by them be thought best and most convenient for public travelling, to meet the turnpike road leading from Kennebeck River through Portland in the District of Maine to New Hampshire line.

In an amendment to the charter, passed Dec. 1, 1804, the Maine turnpike mentioned is described as "contemplated."

**Fifth New Hampshire Turnpike, incorporated June 17, 1802.**

From Plymouth to Piscataqua bridge, (Durham.)

**Fitzwilliam Village Turnpike, incorporated December 9, 1808.**

From Fitzwilliam Village to the Worcester Turnpike, on the Massachusetts line.

**Fourth Turnpike, incorporated December 8, 1800.**

From the east bank of Connecticut River in the town of Lebanon, nearly opposite to the mouth of White River, eastwardly to the west bank of Merrimack River in the town of Salisbury or Boscawen, and also from the east abutment of White River Falls bridge in Hanover southeastwardly till it intersects the road first mentioned, and to be a branch thereof.

**Franconia Turnpike, incorporated December 29, 1828.**

Beginning near the dwelling-house of Jonas Tyler in Franconia, following in the valley through which the mountain and pond brooks pass, to the fishing pond, thence round said pond intersecting the road as now travelled in the most convenient place in the Franconia Notch.

**Franconia and White Mountain Notches Turnpike, incorporated June 24, 1870.**

From such a point near Sawyer's bridge, so called, in the town of Bethlehem, by such route and to such point in or near the notch of the Franconia Mountains as may be deemed best by said corporation.

**Grafton Turnpike, incorporated June 21, 1804.**

From or near Orford bridge on Connecticut River to the Fourth Turnpike road in Andover at or near Harriman's bridge, so called.

**Great Ossipee Turnpike, incorporated December 11, 1804.**

From the most convenient place in the town of Sandwich to the line of the District of Maine in Effingham, to meet the contemplated turnpike from the counties of York and Cumberland.

**Great Sunapee Turnpike, incorporated June 23, 1809.**

From the Croydon Turnpike in Newport southeasterly through Wendell\*, Fishersfield†, Bradford, and Sutton to Bean's mills in Warner.

\* Now Sunapee.

† Now Newbury.

**Hampton Causeway Turnpike, incorporated December 23, 1808.**

From Sanborn's Hill, so called, in Hampton Falls to the causeway in Hampton, and from said causeway to the town or corner of the road near the house of James Leavitt in Hampton.

**Hancock Turnpike, incorporated June 18, 1805.**

From Stoddard through Hancock, Greenfield, and Lyndeborough to Milford.

**Hillsborough Turnpike, incorporated December 13, 1804.**

From the Fourth New Hampshire Turnpike road in Andover, by the easterly end of Kearsarge Mountain, to the line of Massachusetts in a direction for Boston.

**Hinsdale Bridge and the Sixth New Hampshire Turnpike, incorporated June 17, 1802.**

To erect a bridge over Connecticut River at any place from Dummer's ferry to the ferry at Barrett's Island, so called, and also at any place on said island or within one mile above the same.

Road from Connecticut River in Hinsdale, intending to meet the aforesaid bridge when erected, through said Hinsdale and Winchester to the line of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts at Warwick.

**Jefferson Turnpike, incorporated December 11, 1804.**

From the northern extremity of the Tenth Turnpike road through Bretton Woods\*, Jefferson, and Lancaster to Lancaster meeting-house.

\* Now Carroll.

**Kearsarge Summit Road, incorporated July 14, 1864.**

From such a point in the vicinity of Kearsarge as it may deem the most favorable to the top of the said mountain by such route and in such direction as it may deem best, said road to begin, however, near the east part of Kearsarge Village in Bartlett, and thence to the top of Kearsarge Mountain.

**Lincoln Turnpike, incorporated July 11, 1871.**

From such point near the Flume House on the main road in Lincoln, by such route and to such point near the Flume, so called, as may be deemed best by said corporation.

**Litchfield Turnpike, incorporated June 10, 1808.**

From the termination of the Second New Hampshire Turnpike in the town of Amherst to the state line, in direction with Andover bridge.

**Littleton Turnpike, incorporated December 8, 1804.**

From the termination of the Tenth New Hampshire Turnpike road near the notch of the White Hills, through the towns of Bretton Woods\*, Bethlehem, and Littleton, to strike Connecticut River at the place agreed upon to build Littleton bridge.

The charter was amended June 13, 1807, by adding after "Littleton bridge" the words "or at any other place on the eastwardly bank of said river which shall be directly opposite to the termination of the Northern Vermont Turnpike road on the westwardly bank of said river;" again amended June 19, 1812, providing that instead of extending to Connecticut River the road go only to Noah Sweat's house in Bethlehem.

\*Now Carroll.

**Londonderry Turnpike, incorporated June 20, 1804.**

From Butler's Corner in Concord to the state line near Andover bridge.

The charter was amended Dec. 20, 1805, to allow the proprietors to build a bridge over Merrimack River near Hooksett Falls.

**Londonderry Branch Turnpike, incorporated June 17, 1812.**

From or near Moses Bailey's in Hopkinton through said Hopkinton, Bow, and Dunbarton to the Londonderry Turnpike road at or near Isle of Hooksett Falls in Dunbarton.

**Mayhew Turnpike, incorporated December 29, 1803.**

From or near Peter Peaslee's in New Chester\* to the east side of Newfound Pond, from thence on to a road leading from Plymouth to Coos in Rumney.

\*Now Hill.

**Milford Turnpike, incorporated June 23, 1815.**

From the line dividing the town of Pepperell in Massachusetts from the town of Hollis in this State, through Hollis, Milford, and Mont Vernon to the Second New Hampshire Turnpike, and to meet the same at a point which may be deemed most suitable somewhere between the meeting-house of Mont Vernon and the first turnpike gate.

**Monadnoc Turnpike, incorporated December 19, 1805.**

From the head of the canal at the county bridge in Milford, through the towns of Wilton, Temple, and through the notch of the mountain dividing Temple from Peterborough to the Third New Hampshire Turnpike road at the foot of Marlborough hills, near Phineas Farrar's dwelling-house in said Marlborough.

**Moosilauke Mountain Road, incorporated June 24, 1870.**

From such a point in the vicinity of the dwelling-house of Nathaniel Merrill, 2d, in the town of Warren as they may deem most favorable to the top of said Moosilauke Mountain, by such route and in such direction as they may deem best.

**Moosilauke Mountain Road, incorporated July 22, 1881.**

From such point in the vicinity of the dwelling-house of Amos Merrill in the town of Warren as they may deem most favorable to the top of said Moosilauke Mountain, by such route and in such direction as they may deem best; and may in a similar manner also lay out, construct, and keep in repair a bridle-path and carriage road from such point in the vicinity of the Tunnel Stream road, so called, in the town of Benton to the top of said Moosilauke Mountain; and in a similar manner may lay out, construct, and keep in repair a bridle-path and carriage road from such point in the vicinity of the High Street school-house, so called, in said Benton to the top of Moosilauke Mountain.

**Mount Hayes Turnpike, incorporated July 7, 1866.**

From such a point as may be selected by it on the county road, so called, in Shelburne or Gorham, by such route as may be deemed best, to the summit of Mount Hayes.

**Mount Lafayette Road, incorporated July 3, 1866.**

From such a point in the vicinity of Mount Lafayette, in the town of Franconia, as they may deem most favorable to the top of said mountain, by such route and in such direction as they may deem best, said path and road to begin, however, in or near the highway on which the Profile and Flume houses are situated, and proceed thence to the top of Mount Lafayette.

**Mount Washington Road, incorporated July 1, 1853.**

From such a point in the vicinity of Mount Washington as they may deem most favorable to the top of said mountain, by such route and in such direction as they may deem best, said road to begin, however, in or near Peabody River Valley, and thence to the top of Mount Washington, and from thence to some point on the northwesterly side of said mountain between the Notch of the White Mountains, in Crawford's Grant, and the Cherry Mountain.

**Mount Washington Summit Road, incorporated June 27, 1859.**

From such point in the vicinity of Mount Washington as it may deem most favorable to the top of said mountain, by such route and in such direction as it may deem best, said road to begin, however, in or near Peabody River Valley, and thence to the top of Mount Washington, and thence down the northwesterly side thereof to the road leading through the Crawford Notch of the White Mountains at some point between Cherry Mountain and the Notch, so called.

**Mount Washington Turnpike, incorporated July 3, 1838.**

Commencing at or near the northwesterly termination of the Tenth Turnpike road in New Hampshire, and thence running in an easterly direction to the Table Rock, so called, on Mount Washington.

**Mount Washington Turnpike, incorporated July 5, 1867.**

From such a point near the site of the Fabyan Hotel, formerly so known, by such a route and to such a point at or near the foot of Mount Washington as may be deemed best, with the right to connect with any railroad\* extending on to Mount Washington on such terms and conditions as may be agreed upon by the parties.

\*This charter included the right to build a horse railroad.

**Mount Willard Turnpike, incorporated July 7, 1869.**

From such a point near the Crawford House at the White Mountain Notch by such a route, and to such a point on or near the summit of Mount Willard as may be deemed best by said corporation.

**New Chester and Danbury Turnpike, incorporated Dec. 6, 1808.**

From New Chester\* Union bridge, so called, to Grafton Turnpike at or near George Niles's in Danbury.

\*Now Hill.

**New Hampshire Turnpike, incorporated June 14, 1796.**

From Piscataqua bridge in Durham to Merrimack River in Concord.

**Newport Turnpike, incorporated December 10, 1805.**

From the Croydon Turnpike road in Newport southerly through Newport, Unity, and Lempster until it intersects the Second New Hampshire Turnpike road near the meeting-house in Lempster, thence southerly through part of Lempster and Marlow until it intersects the Stoddard Turnpike road in Marlow, thence southwardly through part of Marlow, in that route or tract which said corporation shall judge best, until it intersects the Third New Hampshire Turnpike road in Keene.

**Northern Haverhill Turnpike, incorporated June 14, 1808.**

From a point in the public highway near the dwelling-house of Stephen Morse, Jr., in Haverhill, thence north or northeasterly till it shall strike Wild Ammonoosuc River, so called, at Sargent's sawmill, or within a mile east of it, and from thence to the Bath Turnpike.

**Orford Turnpike, incorporated December 27, 1803.**

From Orford bridge on Connecticut River through Orford and a part of Wentworth to Aiken's bridge on Baker's River.

The charter was amended June 18, 1805, to permit the use of the county road, "as now laid out," between Orford bridge and said Aiken's bridge for said intended turnpike.

**Pemigewasset Turnpike, incorporated December 21, 1820.**

From the north line of Peeling\* to the upper pond in Franconia Notch, so called, in the town of Franconia.

\*Now Woodstock.

**Pemissewasset Middle Branch Turnpike, incorporated June 26, 1809.**

Beginning at the northern line of Thornton and running thence through Peeling\*, Lincoln, and Franconia, along the passage in Franconia Mountain near the iron works, and on the most direct route to Lancaster.

\*Now Woodstock.

**Piermont Turnpike Branch, incorporated December 21, 1805.**

From the Orford Turnpike road at Baker's Pond in the easterly part of Orford, extending and passing through a part of Orford and Piermont until the same shall intersect or form a connection with the Coos Turnpike road.

**Pinkham Turnpike, incorporated July 4, 1834.**

From the south line of the lot or farm now occupied by George Perkins in the town of Jackson, through the Pinkham Grant to the north line of a lot of land owned by Jonas Green, lying on the Pinkham road in Randolph, being a distance of thirteen miles.

**Pittsfield Turnpike, incorporated June 13, 1806.**

From Charles Hodgdon's in Barnstead to Jenness's Pond, so called, in Pittsfield near the line of Northwood.

**Richmond Turnpike, incorporated June 21, 1804.**

From the northerly line of Royalston, in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, near a turnpike road in said Royalston leading to Worcester and Providence, to the south line of Swanzey, to such place on said line as by them shall be thought best and convenient for public travelling, to the plain land in said Swanzey in the most direct route to Keene and Charlestown.

**Rindge Turnpike, incorporated June 12, 1807.**

From the state line between Massachusetts and New Hampshire at or near the southwest corner of New Ipswich to the branch turnpike which leads from Keene to the north line of Fitzwilliam.

**Saco and Swift River Turnpike, incorporated July 2, 1873.**

From such a point as may be selected by it on the White Mountain Notch road, so called, in Bartlett, by such route as may be deemed best, to such a point on the main road in Albany as may be deemed advisable.

**Sanborn Turnpike, incorporated July 3, 1872.**

From such point on the highway leading by the dwelling-house of Ephraim S. Wadleigh in Northfield, by such route and to such point on the highway leading by the dwelling-house formerly occupied by Demore Wyatt in said town as may be deemed best by said corporation.

**Sanbornton Turnpike, incorporated June 13, 1808.**

From Pemigewasset bridge on Pemigewasset River through New Hampton, part of Meredith, and to Jonathan Calley's in Sanbornton.

**Sandwich Turnpike, incorporated December 13, 1804.**

From Sandwich to Norway Plain in Rochester, and from thence to Dover Landing.

**Second Turnpike, incorporated December 26, 1799.**

From the Lottery bridge in Claremont to the plain in Amherst near the court-house.

**Seventh Turnpike, incorporated June 18, 1802.**

From the north part of Charlestown, near William Henry's tavern, by Alstead meeting-house to Asa Wilcox's tavern in Surry.

**Sixth New Hampshire Turnpike.**

See Hinsdale Bridge.

**Starr King Mountain Road, incorporated July 7, 1881.**

From such point on the Jefferson road in the town of Jefferson, by such route and to such point on said Starr King Mountain as may be deemed best by said corporation.

**Stoddard Turnpike, incorporated June 21, 1804.**

From the Third Turnpike road near Whiteman's tavern in Walpole to the Second Turnpike road near Gibson's tavern in Francestown, and from thence to the Amoskeag Falls in Merrimack River.

### Sunapee Turnpike, incorporated June 21, 1804.

From the south end of Sunapee Pond through that part of the towns of Fishersfield\*, Bradford, and Hillsborough to unite with the Second Turnpike road where it will best accommodate the public.

### Sunapee Turnpike, incorporated June 23, 1815.

Through the town of Fishersfield\*, beginning at the southerly line of said town near Maxfield's mills in Bradford, thence by the south end of Great Sunapee Pond to the easterly line of Wendell† near the dwelling house of Benjamin Chandler.

### Tenth Turnpike, incorporated December 28, 1803.

From the upper line in Bartlett through the notch in the White Hills, containing twenty miles.

### Third Turnpike, incorporated December 27, 1799.

Charter amended Dec. 13, 1808, to permit the construction of a road commencing at or near the house of Paul Newton in Marlborough, and terminating in said turnpike road at or near a bridge about one hundred rods south-east of Marlborough meeting-house.

### Uncanoonuck Road, incorporated June 26, 1877.

From some point on the highway known as the "Mountain Road," on the southerly side of the Uncanoonuck Mountains, near the residence of Charlton K. Pierce in Goffstown, to the summit of the South Uncanoonuck Mountain in said Goffstown, by such route and in such direction as is most practicable.

### Union Turnpike, incorporated June 21, 1804.

From the Second New Hampshire Turnpike road in Hillsborough thence through Henniker and Hopkinton to Concord Main Street.

### Upper Coos Turnpike, incorporated December 21, 1820.

From the southerly end of the upper pond in Franconia Notch, so called, in the town of Franconia, to Ammonoosuc River near Whipple's mills in Bethlehem.

### Warner and Kearsarge Road, incorporated July 6, 1866.

From some point on the southerly side of Kearsarge Mountain, deemed most favorable, to the top of said mountain by such route and in such direction as is most practicable, said road to begin, however, near the residence of Caleb Wells in Warner, or of George F. Quimby in Salisbury, and thence to the summit of Kearsarge Mountain.

The charter was revived and amended March 9, 1893, to include a branch road from some point on the southeast side of Kearsarge Mountain, connecting with the highway near Smith's Corner, so called, deemed most favorable, in the town of Salisbury, to some point on Kearsarge Mountain so as to intersect with the main line of the present road.

#### **Waumbek Road, incorporated July 2, 1868.**

From or near the Stillings place, so called, in Jefferson southerly to the line of the Mount Washington railroad.

The charter was amended June 24, 1869, by substituting the word "Randolph" for the word "Jefferson."

#### **Westmoreland Turnpike, incorporated June 21, 1804.**

From the Third Turnpike road in Walpole through Westmoreland, Chesterfield, and Hinsdale to the line of Massachusetts.

#### **White Mountains Plank Road, incorporated January 8, 1853.**

A plank road from the track of the White Mountains railroad, as surveyed in the town of Littleton or Whitefield, to or near the notch of the White Mountains, on such route as said corporation deem best to accommodate the public.

#### **Wilmot and Kearsarge Road, incorporated July 1, 1873.**

From some point of the northerly side of Kearsarge Mountain deemed most favorable to the top of said mountain, by such route and in such direction as is most practicable, said road to begin, however, at the Winslow House in the town of Wilmot, and thence to the summit of Kearsarge Mountain.

#### **Winnipisseogee Turnpike, incorporated June 14, 1808.**

From the foot of Currier's Hill in the town of Gilmanton to the Pemigewasset River nearly opposite the dwelling-house of Robert Craig in Bridgewater.

#### **Winnipisseogee and White Mountain Turnpike, incorporated January 7, 1853.**

Commencing at such point as they may deem expedient near Birch Intervale, so called, in Tamworth, and extending through a portion of Albany and Elkins's Grant, a distance of about fourteen miles to the White Mountain Turnpike road in Hart's Location, about two miles below the old Crawford House.

#### **Woodsville and Lincoln Turnpike, incorporated August 13, 1885.**

From some convenient point near the terminus of the Pemigewasset Valley railroad at North Woodstock to the summit of the Pemigewasset Mountain (so called) in Lincoln, and to such other points of interest in the towns of Woodstock and Lincoln and vicinity (where roads do not now exist) as the directors of said corporation shall deem the public convenience to require to accommodate the summer pleasure travel.
