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# CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

ESTABLISHED OCTOBER 31, 1783, TO TAKE EFFECT JUNE 2, 1784,  
AS SUBSEQUENTLY AMENDED AND IN FORCE JANUARY 1, 1929.\*

All amendments are shown by notes at the bottom of the page indicating the year in which they took effect. The amendments of 1792, "so far as relates to the choice of the members of the legislature and the executive officers of the state, county treasurer and recorder of deeds," took effect on February 1, 1793, and all others on the first Wednesday of June, 1793.

The amendments of 1850 took effect September 16, 1852; those of 1876, August 1, 1877, October 1, 1878, and the first Wednesday of June, 1879, as indicated in the foot notes; those of 1889, April 2, 1889; those of 1902 on March 26, 1903; and those of 1912 on November 20, 1912.

The numbering of the sections of Part II first appeared in the Revised Statutes of 1842. In 1889, when the tenth section of Part II was stricken out, all subsequent sections were moved forward, with the result of making much confusion in citations. In this copy the former numbering has been placed in parenthesis at the side of the present number.

# PART FIRST

## BILL OF RIGHTS

ARTICLE 1ST. All men are born equally free and independent; therefore, all government of right originates from the people, is founded in consent, and instituted for the general good.

[ART.] \*2<sup>d</sup>. All men have certain natural, essential, and inherent rights, among which are the enjoying and defending life and liberty, acquiring, possessing, and protecting property, and, in a word, of seeking and obtaining happiness.

[ART.] 3<sup>d</sup>. When men enter into a state of society, they surrender up some of their natural rights to that society, in order to insure the protection of others; and, without such an equivalent, the surrender is void.

[ART.] 4<sup>th</sup>. Among the natural rights, some are in their very nature unalienable, because no equivalent can be given or received for them. Of this kind are the rights of conscience.

[ART.] 5<sup>th</sup>. Every individual has a natural and unalienable right to worship God according to the dictates of his own conscience and reason; and no subject shall be hurt, molested, or restrained, in his person, liberty, or estate, for worshipping God in the manner and season most agreeable to the dictates of his own conscience, or for his religious profession, sentiments, or persuasion, provided he doth not disturb the public peace or disturb others in their religious worship.

[ART.] 6<sup>th</sup>. As morality and piety, rightly grounded on evangelical principles, will give the best and greatest security to government, and will lay in the hearts of men the strongest obligations to due subjection, and as the knowledge of these is

most likely to be propagated through a society by the institution of the public worship of the Deity and of public instruction in morality and religion, therefore to promote those important purposes, the people of this state have a right to empower, and do hereby fully empower, the legislature to authorize, from time to time, the several towns, parishes, bodies corporate, or religious societies within this state to make adequate provision, at their own expense, for the support and maintenance of public Protestant teachers of piety, religion, and morality.

*Provided, notwithstanding,* that the several towns, parishes, bodies corporate, or religious societies shall at all times have the exclusive right of electing their own public teachers and of contracting with them for their support and maintenance. And no person of any one particular religious sect or denomination shall be compelled to pay towards the support of the teacher or teachers of another persuasion, sect, or denomination.

And every denomination of Christians, demeaning themselves quietly and as good subjects of the state, shall be equally under the protection of the law; and no subordination of any one sect or denomination to another shall ever be established by law.

And nothing herein shall be understood to affect any former contracts made for the support of the ministry; but all such contracts shall remain and be in the same state as if this constitution had not been made.

[ART.] 7<sup>th</sup>. The people of this state have the sole and exclusive right of governing themselves as a free, sovereign, and independent state, and do, and forever hereafter shall, exercise and enjoy every power, jurisdiction, and right pertaining thereto which is not or may not hereafter be by them expressly delegated to the United States of America in congress assembled.

[ART.] 8<sup>th</sup>. All power residing originally in, and being derived from, the people, all the magistrates and officers of government are their substitutes and agents and at all times accountable to them.

[ART.] 9<sup>th</sup>. No office or place whatsoever in government shall be hereditary, the abilities and integrity requisite in all not being transmissible to posterity or relations.

[ART.] 10<sup>th</sup>. Government being instituted for the common benefit, protection, and security of the whole community, and not for the private interest or emolument of any one man, family, or class of men, therefore, whenever the ends of government are perverted and public liberty manifestly endangered and all other means of redress are ineffectual, the people may, and of right ought to, reform the old or establish a new government. The doctrine of nonresistance against arbitrary power and oppression is absurd, slavish, and destructive of the good and happiness of mankind.

[ART.] 11<sup>th</sup>. All elections ought to be free; and every inhabitant of the state, having the proper qualifications, has equal right to elect and be elected into office; [but no person shall have the right to vote, or be eligible to office under the constitution of this state, who shall not be able to read the constitution in the English language, and to write; *provided, however*, that this provision shall not apply to any person prevented by a physical disability from complying with its requisitions, nor to any person who now has the right to vote, nor to any person who shall be sixty years of age or upwards on the first day of January A. D. 1904,]\* [and *provided further*, that no person shall have the right to vote or be eligible to office under the constitution of this state who shall have been convicted of treason, bribery, or any wilful violation of the election laws

[ART.] 12<sup>th</sup>. Every member of the community has a right to be protected by it in the enjoyment of his life, liberty, and property. He is, therefore, bound to contribute his share in the expense of such protection, and to yield his personal service, when necessary, or an equivalent. But no part of a man's property shall be taken from him or applied to public uses without his own consent or that of the representative body of the people. Nor are the inhabitants of this state controllable by any other laws than those to which they or their representative body have given their consent.

[ART.] 13<sup>th</sup>. No person who is conscientiously scrupulous about the lawfulness of bearing arms shall be compelled thereto, provided he will pay an equivalent.

[ART.] 14<sup>th</sup>. Every subject of this state is entitled to a certain remedy, by having recourse to the laws, for all injuries he may receive in his person, property, or character, to obtain right and justice freely, without being obliged to purchase it; completely and without any denial; promptly and without delay; conformably to the laws.

[ART.] 15<sup>th</sup>. No subject shall be held to answer for any crime or offense until the same is fully and plainly, substantially and formally, described to him, or be compelled to accuse or furnish evidence against himself. And every subject shall have a right to produce all proofs that may be favorable to himself, to meet the witnesses against him face to face, and to be fully heard in his defense by himself,

and counsel. And no subject shall be arrested, imprisoned, despoiled, or deprived of his property, immunities, or privileges, put out of the protection of the law, exiled, or deprived of his life, liberty, or estate, but by the judgment of his peers or the law of the land.

[ART.] 16<sup>th</sup>. No subject shall be liable to be tried, after an acquittal, for the same crime or offense; nor shall the legislature make any law that shall subject any person to a capital punishment (excepting for the government of the army and navy, and the militia in actual service) without trial by jury.

[ART.] 17<sup>th</sup>. In criminal prosecutions, the trial of facts in the vicinity where they happened is so essential to the security of the life, liberty, and estate of the citizen, that no crime or offense ought to be tried in any other county than that in which it is committed except in cases of general insurrection in any particular county, when it shall appear to the judges of the superior court that an impartial trial cannot be had in the county where the offense may be committed, and, upon their report, the [legislature]\* shall think proper to direct the trial in the nearest county in which an impartial trial can be obtained.

[ART.] 18<sup>th</sup>. All penalties ought to be proportioned to the nature of the offense. No wise legislature will affix the same punishment to the crimes of theft, forgery, and the like, which they do to those of murder and treason. Where the same undistinguishing severity is exerted against all offenses, the people are led to forget the real distinction in the crimes themselves and to commit the most flagrant with as little compunction as they do† the lightest [offenses].‡ For the same reason, a multitude of sanguinary laws is both impolitic and

unjust, the true design of all punishments being to reform, not to exterminate, mankind.

[ART.] 19<sup>th</sup>. [Every subject hath a right to be secure from all unreasonable searches and seizures of his person, his houses, his papers, and all his possessions. Therefore, all warrants to search suspected places or arrest a person for examination or trial, in prosecutions for criminal matters, are contrary to this right, if the cause or foundation of them be not previously supported by oath or affirmation, and if the order, in a warrant to a civil officer, to make search in suspected places or to arrest one or more suspected persons or to seize their property, be not accompanied with a special designation of the persons or objects of search, arrest, or seizure; and no warrant ought to be issued but in cases and with the formalities prescribed by law.]

[ART.] 20<sup>th</sup>. In all controversies concerning property and in all suits between two or more persons, except in cases in which it has been heretofore otherwise used and practiced [and except in cases in which the value in controversy does not exceed one hundred dollars and title of real estate is not concerned]† the parties have a right to a trial by jury; and this method of procedure shall be held sacred, unless, in cases arising on the high seas and such as relates to mariners' wages, the legislature shall think it necessary hereafter to alter it.

[ART.] 21<sup>st</sup>. In order to reap the fullest advantage of the inestimable privilege of the trial by jury, great care ought to be taken that none but qualified persons should be appointed to serve; and such ought to [be]‡ fully compensated for their travel, time, and attendance.

[ART.] 22<sup>d</sup>. The *liberty of the press* is essential to the security of freedom in a state; it ought, therefore, to be inviolably preserved.

- [ART.] 24<sup>th</sup>. A well regulated militia is the proper, natural, and sure defense of a state.

- [ART.] 25<sup>th</sup>. Standing armies are dangerous to liberty, and ought not to be raised or kept up without the consent of the legislature.

- [ART.] 26<sup>th</sup>. In all cases and at all times, the military ought to be under strict subordination to, and governed by, the civil power.

- [ART.] 27<sup>th</sup>. No soldier, in time of peace, shall be quartered in any house without the consent of the owner, and, in time of war such quarters ought not to be made but by the civil magistrate, in a manner ordained by the legislature.

- [ART.] 28<sup>th</sup>. No subsidy, charge, tax, impost or duty shall be established, fixed, laid, or levied under any pretext whatsoever, without the consent of the people or their representatives in the legislature, or authority derived from that body.

- [ART.] 29<sup>th</sup>. The power of suspending the laws or the execution of them ought never to be exercised but by the legislature, or by authority derived therefrom, to be exercised in such particular cases only as the legislature shall expressly provide for.

- [ART.] 30<sup>th</sup>. The freedom of deliberation, speech and debate in either house of the legislature is so essential to the rights of the people, that it cannot be the foundation of any action, complaint, or prosecution in any other court or place whatsoever.

- [ART.] 31<sup>st</sup>. [The legislature shall assemble for the redress of public grievances and for making such laws as the public good may require.]\*

[ART.] 32<sup>d</sup>. The people have a right, in an orderly and peaceable manner, to assemble and consult upon the common good, give instructions to their representatives, and to request of the legislative body, by way of petition or remonstrance, redress of the wrongs done them and of the grievances they suffer.

[ART.] 33<sup>d</sup>. No magistrate or court of law shall demand excessive bail or sureties, impose excessive fines, or inflict cruel or unusual punishments.

[ART.] 34<sup>th</sup>. No person can in any case be subjected to law martial or to any pains or penalties by virtue of that law, except those employed in the army or navy, and except the militia in actual service, but by authority of the legislature.

[ART.] 35<sup>th</sup>. [It is essential to the preservation of the rights of every individual, his life, liberty, property, and character, that there be an impartial interpretation of the laws and administration of justice. It is the right of every citizen to be tried by judges as impartial as the lot of humanity will admit. It is, therefore, not only the best policy, but for the security of the rights of the people, that the judges of the supreme judicial court should hold their offices so long as they behave well, subject, however, to such limitations on account of age as may be provided by the constitution of the state, and that they should have honorable salaries, ascertained and established by standing laws.]\*

Pensions.

[ART.] 36<sup>th</sup>. Economy being a most essential virtue in all states, especially in a young one, no pension shall be granted but in consideration of actual services; and such pensions ought to be granted with great caution by the legislature, and never for more than one year at a time.

The legislative, executive, and judicial departments to be kept separate.

[ART.] 37<sup>th</sup>. In the government of this state, the three essential powers thereof—to wit, the legislative, executive, and judicial—ought to be kept as

separate from, and independent of, each other as the nature of a free government will admit or as is consistent with that chain of connection that binds the whole fabric of the constitution in one indissoluble bond of union and amity.

[ART.] 38<sup>th</sup>. A frequent recurrence to the fundamental principles of the constitution and a constant adherence to justice, moderation, temperance, industry, frugality, and all the social virtues, are indispensably necessary to preserve the blessings of liberty and good government. The people ought, therefore, to have a particular regard to all those principles in the choice of their officers and representatives; and they have a right to require of their law-givers and magistrates an exact and constant observance of them in the formation and execution of the laws necessary for the good administration of government.

## PART SECOND

### FORM OF GOVERNMENT

[ART. 1.]\* The people inhabiting the territory formerly called the province of New Hampshire do hereby solemnly and mutually agree with each other to form themselves into a free, sovereign, and independent body politic, or state, by the name of the STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

[ART. 2.] The supreme legislative power within this state shall be vested in the senate and house of representatives, each of which shall have a negative on the other.

necessary, and shall dissolve and be dissolved seven days next preceding the said first Wednesday of [January]‡ [biennially],\*\* and shall be styled THE GENERAL COURT OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

[ART. 4.] The general court shall forever have full power and authority to erect and constitute judicatories and courts of record or other courts, to be holden in the name of the state, for the hearing, trying, and determining all manner of crimes, offenses, pleas, processes, complaints, actions, causes, matters, and things whatsoever, arising or happening within this state, or between or concerning persons inhabiting, or residing, or brought within the same, whether the same be criminal or civil, or whether the crimes be capital or not capital, and whether the said pleas be real, personal, or mixed, and for the awarding and issuing execution thereon; to which courts and judicatories are hereby given and granted full power and authority from time to time to administer oaths or affirmations for the better discovery of truth in any matter in controversy or depending before them.

all civil officers within this state, such officers excepted the election and appointment of whom are hereafter in this form of government otherwise provided for; and to set forth the several duties, powers, and limits of the several civil and military officers of this state, and the forms of such oaths or affirmations as shall be respectively administered unto them for the execution of their several offices and places, so as the same be not repugnant or contrary to this constitution; and, also, to impose fines, mulcts, imprisonments, and other punishments; and to impose and levy proportional and reasonable assessments, rates, and taxes upon all the inhabitants of, and residents within, the said state, and upon all estates within the same, to be issued and disposed of by warrant, under the hand of the [governor]\* of this state for the time being, with the advice and consent of the council, for the public service, in the necessary defense and support of the government of this state and the protection and preservation of the subjects thereof, according to such acts as are or shall be in force within the same; [provided, that the general court shall not authorize any town to loan or give its money or credit, directly or indirectly, for the benefit of any corporation having for its object a dividend of profits, or in any way aid the same by taking its stock or bonds.]†

[ART. 7.] [No member of the general court shall take fees, be of counsel, or act as advocate in any cause before either branch of the legislature; and, upon due proof thereof, such member shall forfeit his seat in the legislature.]\*\*

[ART. 23 (24).] The journals of the proceedings and all public acts of both houses of the legislature shall be printed and published immediately after adjournment or prorogation, and, upon motion made by any one member, the yeas and nays upon any question shall be entered on the journal, and any member of the senate or house of representatives shall have a right, on motion made at the time for that purpose, to have his protest or dissent, with the reasons, against any vote, resolve, or bill passed, entered on the journal.

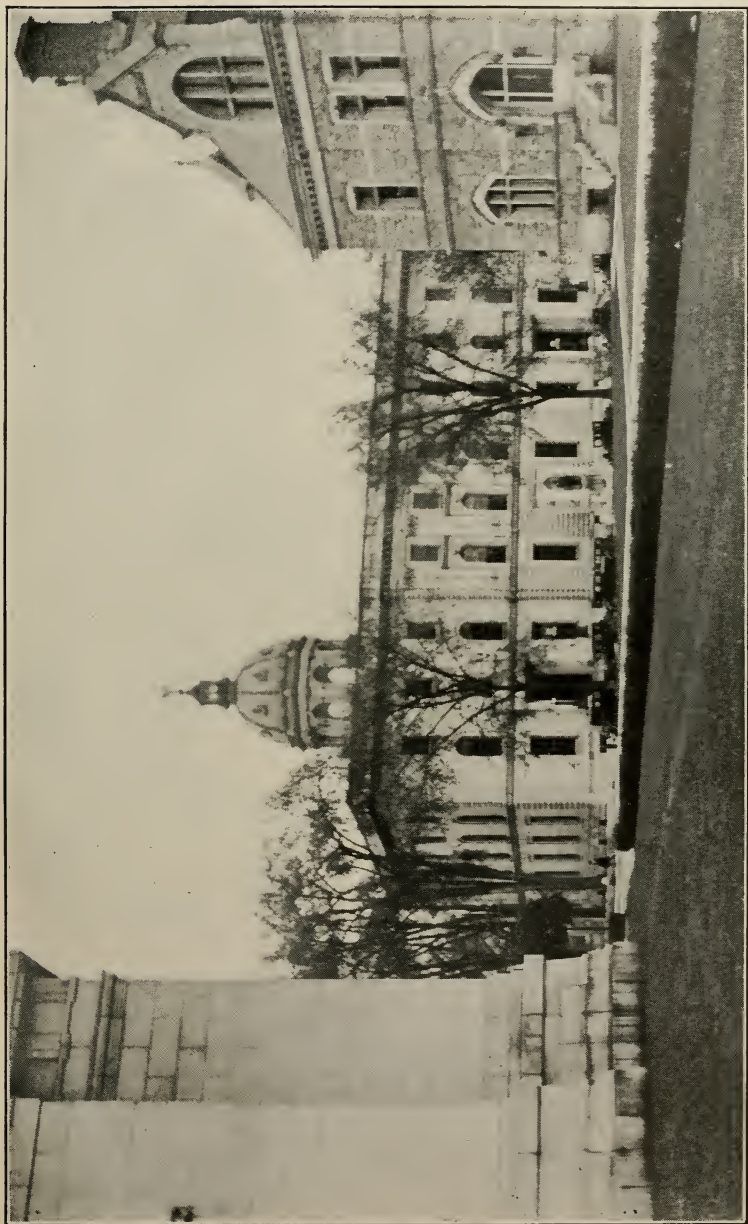

[ART. 27 (28).] The senate shall be the first branch of the legislature, and the senators shall be chosen in the following manner, viz.: every male inhabitant of each town, and parish with town privileges, and places unincorporated, in this state, of twenty-one years of age and upward, excepting paupers and persons excused from paying taxes at their own request, shall have a right, at the [biennial]‡ or other meetings of the inhabitants of said towns and parishes, to be duly warned and holden [biennially],\* forever in the month of [November],† to vote, in the town or parish wherein he dwells, for the senator in the district whereof he is a member.

[ART. 31 (32).] The meetings for the choice of governor, council, and senators shall be warned by warrant from the selectmen, and governed by a moderator, who shall, in the presence of the selectmen (whose duty it shall be to attend), in open meeting, receive the votes of all the inhabitants of such towns and parishes present and qualified to vote for senators; and shall, in said meetings, in presence of the said selectmen and of the town clerk in said meetings, sort and count the said votes, and make a public declaration thereof, with the name of every person voted for and the number of votes for each person; and the town clerk shall make a fair record of the same, at large, in the town book, and shall make out a fair attested copy thereof, to be by him sealed up and directed to the secretary of the state, with a superscription expressing the purport thereof; and the said town clerk shall cause such attested copy to be delivered to the sheriff of the county in which such town or parish shall lie thirty days, at least, before the first Wednesday of [January],‡ or to the secretary of the state at least twenty days before the said first Wednesday of [January];‡ and the sheriff of each county or his deputy shall deliver all such certificates by him received into the secretary's office at least twenty days before the first Wednesday of [January].‡

[ART. 34 (35).] The senate shall have power to adjourn themselves, provided such adjournment do not exceed two days at a time: *provided, nevertheless*, that, whenever they shall sit on the trial of any impeachment, they may adjourn to such time and place as they may think proper, although the legislature be not assembled on such day or at such place.

[ART. 36 (37).] The senate shall appoint their president and other officers, and determine their own rules of proceedings. And not less than [thirteen]\* members of the senate shall make a quorum for doing business; and, when less than [sixteen]† senators shall be present, the assent of [ten],‡ at least, shall be necessary to render their acts and proceedings valid.

[ART. 37 (38).] The senate shall be a court, with full power and authority to hear, try, and determine all impeachments made by the house of representatives against any officer or officers of the state, for bribery, corruption, malpractice, or maladministration in office, with full power to issue summons or compulsory process for convening witnesses before them; but, previous to the trial of any such impeachment, the members of the senate shall respectively be sworn truly and impartially to try and determine the charge in question, according to evidence. And every officer impeached for bribery, corruption, malpractice, or maladministration in office shall be served with an attested copy of the impeachment and order of senate thereon, with such citation as the senate may direct, setting forth the time and place of their sitting to try the impeachment; which service shall be made by the sheriff or such other sworn officer as the senate may appoint, at least fourteen days previous to the time

of trial; and, such citation being duly served and returned, the senate may proceed in the hearing of the impeachment, giving the person impeached, if he shall appear, full liberty of producing witnesses and proofs and of making his defense by himself and counsel; and may, also, upon his refusing or neglecting to appear, hear the proofs in support of the impeachment, and render judgment thereon, his non-appearance notwithstanding; and such judgment shall have the same force and effect as if the person impeached had appeared and pleaded in the trial.

[ART. 38 (39).] Their judgment, however, shall not extend further than removal from office, disqualification to hold or enjoy any place of honor, trust, or profit under this state; but the party so convicted shall, nevertheless, be liable to indictment, trial, judgment, and punishment, according to the laws of the land.

it become a law, be presented to the governor; if he approve, he shall sign it, but if not he shall return it, with his objections, to that house in which it shall have originated, who shall enter the objections at large on their journal and proceed to reconsider it. If, after such reconsideration, two thirds of that house shall agree to pass the bill, it shall be sent, together with such objections, to the other house, by which it shall likewise be reconsidered: and, if approved by two thirds of that house, it shall become a law. But, in all such cases, the votes of both houses shall be determined by yeas and nays, and the names of persons voting for or against the bill shall be entered on the journal of each house respectively. If any bill shall not be returned by the governor within five days (Sundays excepted) after it shall have been presented to him, the same shall be a law in like manner as if he had signed it, unless the legislature, by their adjournment, prevent its return, in which case it shall not be a law.

[ART. 44 (45).] Every resolve shall be presented to the governor, and, before the same shall take effect, shall be approved by him, or, being disapproved by him, shall be repassed by the senate and house of representatives, according to the rules and limitations prescribed in the case of a bill.

[ART. 50 (51).] The governor of this state, for the time being, shall be commander-in-chief of the army and navy and all the military forces of the state by sea and land; and shall have full power, by himself or by any chief commander or other officer or officers, from time to time to train, instruct, exercise, and govern the militia and navy; and for the special defense and safety of this state, to assemble in martial array and put in warlike posture the inhabitants thereof, and to lead and conduct them, and with them to encounter, repulse, repel, resist, and pursue by force of arms, as well by sea as by land, within and without the limits of this state; and also to kill, slay, destroy, if necessary; and conquer, by all fitting ways, enterprise, and means, all and every such person and persons as shall at any time hereafter, in a hostile manner, attempt or enterprise the destruction, invasion, detriment, or annoyance of this state; and to use and exercise over the army and navy and over the militia in actual service the law martial, in time of war, invasion, and also in rebellion declared by the legislature to exist, as occasion shall necessarily require; and surprise by all ways and means whatsoever, all and every such person or persons, with their ships, arms, ammunition, and other goods, as shall, in a hostile manner, invade or attempt the invading, conquering, or annoying this state; and in fine, the governor hereby is entrusted with all other powers incident to the office of captain-general and commander-in-chief and admiral, to be exercised agreeably to the rules and regulations of the constitution and the laws of the land; *provided*, that the governor shall not at any time hereafter, by virtue of any power by this constitution granted, or hereafter, to

be granted to him by the legislature, transport any of the inhabitants of this state or oblige them to march out of the limits of the same without their free and voluntary consent or the consent of the general court, nor grant commissions for exercising the law martial in any case without the advice and consent of the council.

Pardoning power.

[ART. 51 (52).] The power of pardoning offenses, except such as persons may be convicted of before the senate, by impeachment of the house shall be in the governor, by and with the advice of council; but no charter or pardon, granted by the governor, with advice of council, before conviction, shall avail the party pleading the same, notwithstanding any general or particular expressions contained therein, descriptive of the offense or offenses intended to be pardoned.

[ART. 52 (53).] No officer, duly commissioned to command in the militia, shall be removed from his office but by the address of both houses to the governor or by fair trial in courtmartial pursuant to the laws of the state for the time being.

[ART. 53 (54).] The commanding officers of the regiments shall appoint their adjutants and quartermasters; the brigadiers, their brigade-majors; the major-generals, their aids; the captains and subalterns, their non-commissioned officers.

Division of militia into brigades, regiments, and companies.

[ART. 54 (55).] The division of the militia into brigades, regiments, and companies, made in pursuance of the militia laws now in force, shall be considered as the proper division of the militia of this state, until the same shall be altered by some future law.

[ART. 55 (56).] No moneys shall be issued out of the treasury of this state and disposed of (except such sums as may be appropriated for the redemption of bills of credit or treasurer's notes, or for the payment of interest arising thereon) but by war-

rant under the hand of the governor for the time being, by and with the advice and consent of the council, for the necessary support and defense of this state and for the necessary protection and preservation of the inhabitants thereof, agreeably to the acts and resolves of the general court.

[ART. 56 (57).] All public boards, the commissary-general, all superintending officers of public magazines and stores belonging to this state, and all commanding officers of forts and garrisons within the same shall, once in every three months, officially and without requisition, and at other times when required by the governor, deliver to him an account of all goods, stores, provisions, ammunition, cannon with their appendages, and all small arms with their accoutrements, and of all other public property under their care respectively, distinguishing the quantity and kind of each as particularly as may be, together with the condition of such forts and garrisons. And the commanding officer shall exhibit to the governor, when required by him, true and exact plans of such forts, and of the land and sea, or harbor or harbors adjacent.

[ART. 57 (58).] The governor and council shall be compensated for their services, from time to time, by such grants as the general court shall think reasonable.

[ART. 62 (63).] The members of the council may be impeached by the house and tried by the senate for bribery, corruption, malpractice, or maladministration.

[ART. 63 (64).] The resolutions and advice of the council shall be recorded by the secretary in a register, and signed by all the members present agreeing thereto; and this record may be called for at any time by either house of the legislature; and any member of the council may enter his opinion contrary to the resolutions of the majority, with the reasons for such opinion.

[ART. 64 (65).] The legislature may, if the public good shall hereafter require it, divide the state into five districts, as nearly equal as may be, governing themselves by the number of [population],\* each district to elect a councilor; and, in case of such division, the manner of the choice shall be conformable to the present mode of election in counties.

All judicial officers, duly appointed, commissioned, and sworn, shall hold their offices during good behavior, excepting those concerning whom there is a different provision made in this constitution: *provided, nevertheless, the [governor]\*\* with consent of council, may remove them upon the address of both houses of the legislature.*

#### ENCOURAGEMENT OF LITERATURE, TRADE, ETC.

[ART. 82 (83).] Knowledge and learning generally diffused through a community being essential to the preservation of a free government, and spreading the opportunities and advantages of education through the various parts of the country being highly conducive to promote this end, it shall be the duty of the legislators and magistrates, in all future periods of this government, to cherish the interest of literature and the sciences, and all seminaries and public schools; to encourage private and public institutions, rewards, and immunities for the promotion of agriculture, arts, sciences, commerce, trades, manufactures, and natural history of the country; to countenance and inculcate the principles of humanity and general benevolence, public and private

charity, industry and economy, honesty and punctuality, sincerity, sobriety, and all social affections and generous sentiments, among the people: [*provided, nevertheless*, that no money raised by taxation shall ever be granted or applied for the use of the schools or institutions of any religious sect or denomination.]\* [Free and fair competition in the trades and industries is an inherent and essential right of the people and should be protected against all monopolies and conspiracies which tend to hinder or destroy it. The size and functions of all corporations should be so limited and regulated as to prohibit fictitious capitalization, and provision should be made for the supervision and government thereof:—Therefore, all just power possessed by the state is hereby granted to the general court to enact laws to prevent the operations within the state of all persons and associations, and all trusts and corporations, foreign and domestic, and the officers thereof, who endeavor to raise the price of any article of commerce or to destroy free and fair competition in the trades and industries through combination, conspiracy, monopoly, or any other unfair means; to control and regulate the acts of all such persons, associations, corporations, trusts, and officials doing business within the state; to prevent fictitious capitalization; and to authorize civil and criminal proceedings in respect to all the wrongs herein declared against.]\*\*

tary, treasurer of the state, attorney-general, commissary-general, military officers receiving pay from the continent or this state (excepting officers of the militia called forth on an emergency), register of deeds, sheriff, or officers of the customs, including naval officers, collectors of excise and state and continental taxes hereafter appointed, and not having settled their accounts with the respective officer; with whom it is their duty to settle such accounts, members of congress, or any person holding any office under the United States, shall at the same time hold the office of governor, or have a seat in the senate or house of representatives or council; but his being chosen and appointed to and accepting the same shall operate as a resignation of their seat in the chair, senate, or house of representatives, or council, and the place so vacated shall be filled up. No member of the council shall have a seat in the senate or house of representatives.]†

[ART. 98 (99).] It shall be the duty of the selectmen and assessors of the several towns and places in this state, in warning the first annual meetings for the choice of senators, after the expiration of seven years from the adoption of this constitution as amended, to insert expressly in the warrant this purpose among the others for the meeting, to wit: to take the sense of the qualified voters on the subject of a revision of the constitution; and, the meeting being warned accordingly, and not otherwise, the moderator shall take the sense of the qualified voters present as to the necessity of a revision; and a return of the number of votes for and against such necessity shall be made by the clerk, sealed up, and directed to the general court at their then next session; and if it shall appear to the general court by such return that the sense of the people of the state has been taken, and that, in the opinion of the majority of the qualified voters in the state present and voting at said meetings, there is a necessity for a revision of the constitution, it shall be the duty of the general court to call a convention for that purpose; otherwise, the general court shall direct the sense of the people to be taken, and then proceed in the manner before mentioned; the delegates to be chosen in the same manner and proportioned as the representatives to the general court; *provided*, that no alterations shall be made in this constitution before the same shall be laid before the towns and unincorporated places and approved by two thirds of the qualified voters present and voting on the subject.

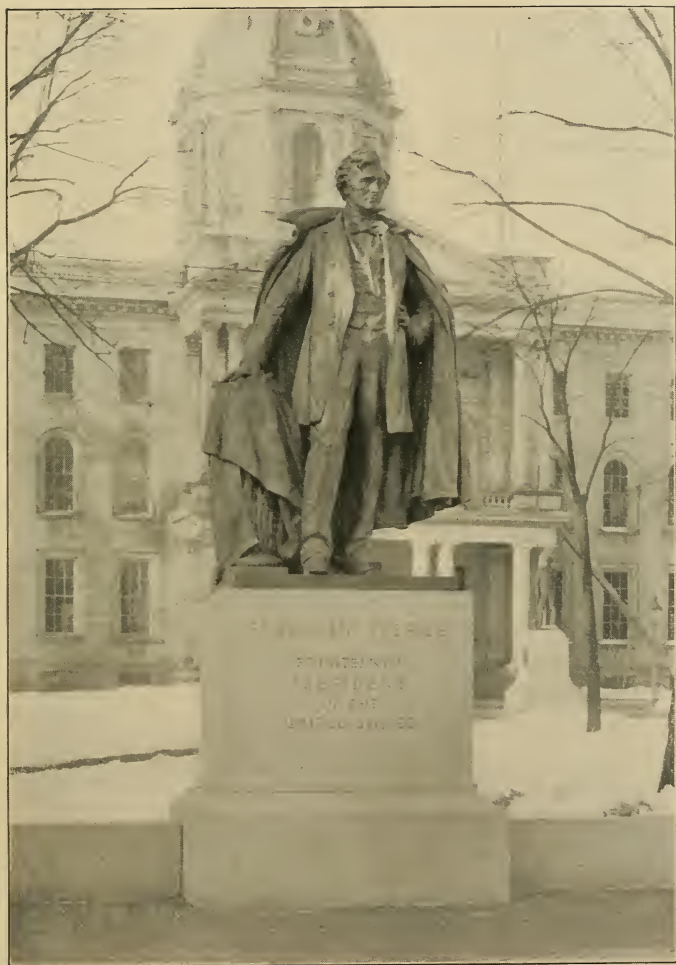

## HISTORY OF THE CONSTITUTION

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After the withdrawal of the royal governor, John Wentworth, in May, 1775, this province was governed, so far as there was any state government, by a convention, of which Matthew Thornton was president.

On the fifth day of January, 1776, a temporary constitution was adopted, which was the first written constitution adopted by any of the states now constituting the American Union. Under this constitution, Meshech Weare was unanimously elected president of the council and chairman of the committee of safety; and the state was prosperously governed for eight years.

In June, 1784, a new constitution, which had been approved by the people and established by the convention, October 31, 1783, took effect, and continued in force until 1793. In 1792, a new constitution was submitted to the people and adopted by them, and took effect in June, 1793. Most of its provisions were similar to those in the constitution of 1784, with several important amendments. This constitution remained unchanged until 1852.

The constitutional convention of 1850 proposed several important amendments, but they were all rejected by the people. At an adjourned meeting in 1851, the convention proposed three amendments, only one of which was adopted, the one removing the property qualification in the case of governor, senator, and representative. The governor, by his proclamation of September 16, 1852, gave notice that this amendment had been adopted.

In 1876, a new convention was called and holden, which proposed amendments changing the constitution in thirteen particulars, all of which, except two, were adopted by the people in March, 1877, as appeared by the proclamation of the governor of April 17, 1877. By the legislative enactment, most of these amendments took effect on the first day of August, 1877, and the rest were to take effect at such times that the election in March, 1878, should be held under the old constitution, and the officers then elected should hold one year, till June, 1879, and that, in November, 1878, the first election should be held under the new constitution, and officers elected who should hold two years from June, 1879.

The constitutional convention of 1889 proposed seven amendments, five of which were adopted. The governor gave notice of their adoption by proclamation dated April 2, 1889.

The sense of the people on the question of holding a constitutional convention was taken in 1894 and again in 1896, in each instance with a negative result.

In 1900, a majority voted in favor of a convention, and the legislature called one to meet on the first Tuesday in December, 1902. This convention proposed ten amendments, four of which were adopted in March, 1903.

In 1910, the vote was in favor of a convention, which was called and held on the first Wednesday in June, 1912. It submitted twelve amendments, four of which were adopted in November, 1912.

In 1916, the vote was again for a convention. It was called to be held on the first Wednesday in June, 1918. After a session of three days, it adjourned, to reassemble at the call of a committee consisting of the president and one delegate from each county. It reassembled at the call of the committee on Tuesday, January 13, 1920. It proposed seven amendments, and adjourned to the call of the president. All the proposed amendments were rejected in November, 1920.

In January, 1921, the legislature appropriated funds for the expenses of the convention, and, on the call of the president, it met on Friday, January 28, 1921. It proposed four amendments, all of which were rejected in March, 1921.

In 1924, the vote was against calling a convention.

M. 1893); served as private secretary to Gov. David H. Goodell 1889-1891 and to Gov. John McLane 1905, during the sessions of the Portsmouth Peace Conference; secretary to the chairman of the Republican State Committee 1890; member and secretary of the New Hampshire Forestry Commission 1893-1907; member board of education, Concord, 1902-1903, 1906-1909, 1913-1916; delegate at large Republican National Convention 1908 and 1916; American minister to Greece and Montenegro during the administration of President Taft; editor "Concord Evening Monitor" 1892-1918; was elected November 5, 1918, to fill the unexpired term of the late Hon. Jacob H. Gallinger; re-elected in 1920 and 1926; his term will expire March 3, 1933. Elected President Pro-tempore of the senate in 1926; re-elected in 1927.

HENRY WILDER KEYES, Republican, of Haverhill, was born at Newbury, Vt., in 1863; graduated, degree of A. B., Harvard University 1887; also recipient of B. S. and LL. D. degrees New Hampshire College, and A. M. Dartmouth; member New Hampshire House of Representatives 1891-1895, 1915-1917; member New Hampshire Senate 1903-1905; treasurer State License Commission 1903-1915; chairman State Excise Commission 1915-1917; governor 1917-1919; elected to the United States Senate November 5, 1918, the first time for nearly a hundred years that a Senator has been elected while holding the office of governor; re-elected November 4, 1924; married Frances Parkinson (Wheeler) and has three sons; is a farmer, and president of the Woodsville National Bank; his term of office will expire in March, 1931.

He was a delegate to the 1918 Constitutional Convention and of the Special Committee appointed by New England Governors in 1920, to investigate railroad rates.

### TOTAL POPULATION, INCREASE, AND DISTRIBUTION

**Population of the state.**—New Hampshire was one of the original thirteen states. According to the Fourteenth Census, taken as of January 1, 1920, its population is 443,083, which represents an increase of 12,511, or 2.9 per cent, over the population in 1910. During the same period the population of the United States increased 14.9 per cent. The following summary shows the population of New Hampshire from 1790, the first Federal census, to 1920, inclusive, together with the number and per cent. of increase in each decade, in comparison with the per cent. of increase for the United States as a whole.

**Counties.**— New Hampshire has 10 counties, 5 of which increased in population during the last decade, and 5 decreased.

The largest percentage of decrease was in Carroll County—8 per cent. There have been no changes in county boundaries since 1910.

**Density of population.**—The total land area of the state in 1920 is 9,031 square miles and the average number of persons to the square mile is 49.1 (see Table 1); in 1910 and 1900 the averages were 47.7 and 45.6, respectively.

**Minor civil divisions.**—In New Hampshire the primary division of the county is the town or city, and in 1920 these number 224 and 11, respectively; but, in addition to the town or city, Carroll County has 1 location and Coos County has 3 locations, 10 grants, 7 townships, and 6 purchases, making the total number of primary divisions in the state 262. Besides these primary divisions, there are 2 secondary divisions, or incorporated villages which are not independent minor civil divisions, but form parts of the towns in which they are located (see Table 2).

Of the 262 primary divisions referred to above, 9 of those in Coos County have had no population returned at the last three censuses, and are not included in Table 2 in the minor civil divisions of the county.

**Cities.**—Manchester, the largest of the 11 cities of New Hampshire, has a population of 78,384 in 1920. Nashua, the next largest, has a population of 28,379 and Concord, the capital of the state, 22,167. (See Tables 3 and 4.)

The following summary shows, for each city having 10,000 inhabitants or more in 1920, the population at each census for which figures are available, together with the increase during each decade.

**Urban and rural population.**—The census Bureau defines urban population as that residing in cities and other incorporated places of 2,500 inhabitants or more. As New Hampshire has no incorporated villages of 2,500 or more and no city of less than 6,000 inhabitants, it has been considered advisable to include in the urban territory not only the population of the 11 cities of New Hampshire, but also that of all towns having over 2,500 inhabitants. This probably results in the “urban area” of New Hampshire including some population which in other states would be segregated as “rural,” but as this inclusion covers only 16 towns out of a total of 227, there is no reason to suppose that the proportion of urban population is greatly overstated.

Urban population in New Hampshire, being thus defined, the rural population, therefore, consists of the population outside of towns and cities having 2,500 inhabitants or more.

The following summary presents, for the last three censuses, the urban and rural population of the state distributed among cities and towns grouped according to specified limits of population. The classification is based upon the population of each place as it existed at each census. The percentage of the population of New Hampshire living in cities and towns of 2,500 or more at the three census periods was 63.1, 59.2 and 55, respectively, there being during each decade practically the same increase in the proportion of urban population.

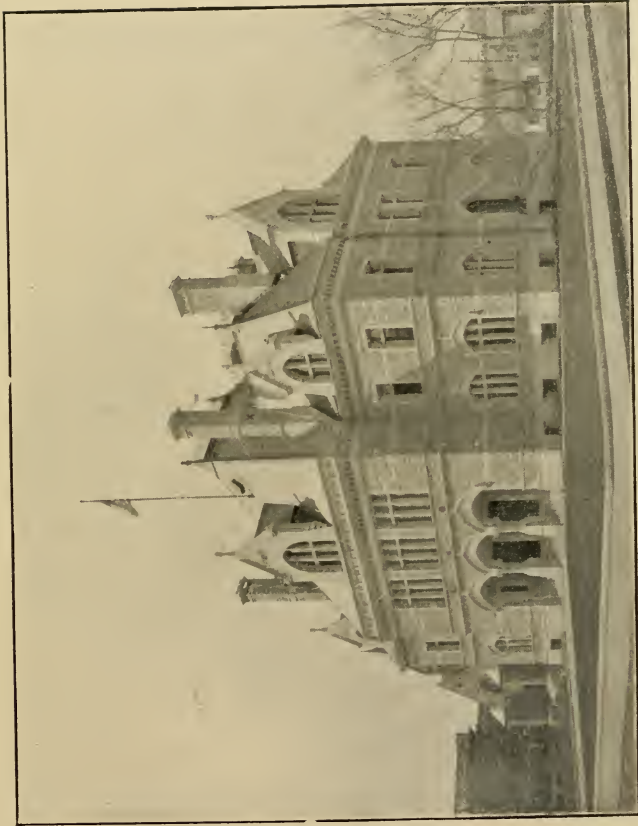

## NEW HAMPSHIRE STATE FLAG

The state flag was authorized by an act of the Legislature of 1909, New Hampshire prior to that never having had a state flag duly authorized and described by law.

The provisions of the act were that "the body or field of the flag shall be blue, and shall bear upon its center in suitable proportion and colors a representation of the state seal. The motto shall include the date 1784. Said seal shall be surrounded by a wreath of laurel leaves with nine stars interspersed. When used for military purposes said flag shall conform to the regulations of the United States."

In this act which was approved February 24, 1909, it was further provided:

"Said flag shall be displayed upon the State House whenever the legislature is in session, and during meetings of the Governor and Council when expedient, and upon such other occasions as the Governor may designate."

The inscription upon the field of blue, together with the wreath surrounding it, is laid on in gilt. A gold fringe surrounds the body of the flag, and either a yellow silk or gold cord is used to attach it to the staff.

## NEW HAMPSHIRE STATE GOVERNMENT

The constitution divides the government into three branches. They are the executive branch, the legislative branch, and the judicial branch. The executive department consists of the governor and council, the secretary of state, the deputy secretary of state, the treasurer, the commissary-general and such other officers as the legislature has established. The legislative branch consists of a senate and house of representatives. The judicial branch consists of a system of courts established by the legislature. The military establishment is part of the executive branch and the governor is commander-in-chief of the military establishment.

In addition to the several constitutional officers mentioned above, the legislature has, from time to time, arranged and organized new offices so that the government now includes the following departments:

In subsequent chapters will be given brief sketches of the histories of these departments in order given, together with a list of the men who have occupied the more important posts in the government from the time of earliest provincial days to the present. Colonial government began in 1680 and state government under the constitution began in 1784. The colonial period included about ninety-five years down to the revolution in 1775. The revolutionary period included about nine years to the constitution and the history of the state is now in its one hundred and forty-third year.

## THE GOVERNOR

The governor is the chief executive and his title is "His Excellency." Provincial governors were appointed by the king of England and they had various titles such as "president," "lieutenant-governor," "deputy-governor" and "governor." For the first eighty years governors frequently did not reside in the province.

When the revolution broke out the royal governor withdrew, in 1775, and the province was ruled by a revolutionary convention headed by a president. The next year a temporary constitution provided for a president of a council and chairman of a committee of safety to be the chief executive. The constitution of 1784 provided for a president to be elected by popular vote and in 1792 the title was changed to governor. In 1913 the election of the governor was changed from the majority-vote system to the plurality-vote system. Previous to that the failure of a candidate to receive a majority vote threw the election into the legislature.

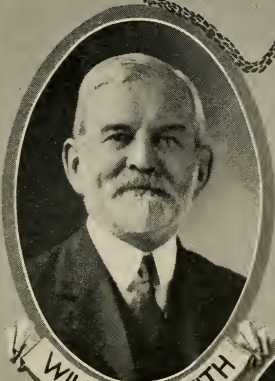
### Revolutionary Councilors, 1776-84. .

Article 60 of the second part of the constitution provides for an executive council of five men to advise and act with the governor. Before the constitution there was a council both under the temporary constitution of the Revolution and under the provincial government. Since 1913 councilors have been elected by plurality vote to represent population but previously to that they were elected by majority vote to represent property, and in the colonial days they were appointed.

The following is a complete list of all the councilors since the Revolution giving the name of each and the year in which he was elected or appointed.

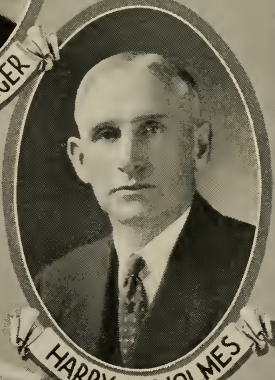

## DEPARTMENT OF STATE

Articles 67, 68 and 69 of the second part of the constitution provide for a department of state with a secretary of state who is elected biennially by the legislature and a deputy secretary of state appointed by the secretary. In the colonial period there was a secretary appointed by the chief executive, but no deputy. During the revolutionary period and under the constitution of 1784 the secretary was chosen by the legislature and given authority to have several deputies, but in 1793 the constitution was changed to provide for a single deputy.

The following is a list of the forty secretaries of state from the beginning, together with the term which each served and a list of the thirty-eight deputy secretaries.

Article 67 of the second part of the constitution provides for a treasurer who is elected biennially by the legislature. In the colonial period the treasurer was appointed by the chief executive and frequently the same man was secretary of the province and treasurer. In 1891 the legislature created the office of deputy treasurer.

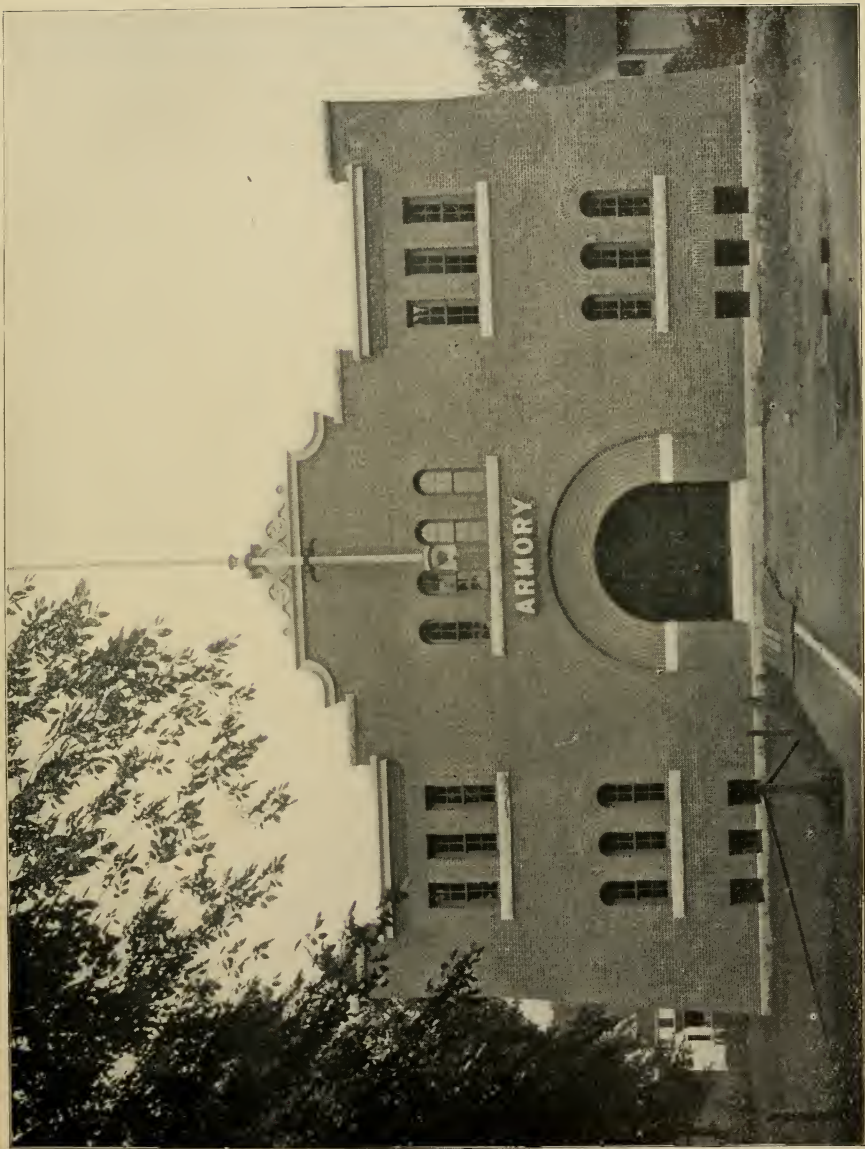
## THE MILITIA.

The constitution vests all military authority in the governor, who is by virtue of his office commander-in-chief of the militia or national guard. He appoints an adjutant-general as his chief of staff and active head of the military establishment, and the office carries with it the rank of brigadier-general. ## THE LEGISLATURE.

Part second of the constitution provides for a legislature to be known as the "general court," to consist of a senate and house of representatives. Before the constitution was made there was a legislature, before the legislature a colonial house of representatives, and before that a provincial congress or convention.

## THE SENATE

The senate began under the constitution and first met in 1784. There were at first twelve senators who represented the five counties that then existed, five senators from Rockingham county, two from Strafford, two from Hillsborough, two from Cheshire, and one from Grafton. In 1793 senatorial districts were created to take the place of county representation and each district elected one senator. The elections during the early years took place in March and the legislature met in June annually.

The senatorial districting of 1793 was changed over in 1803 and several times subsequently. In 1878 the senate was doubled in size. In 1915 the senators were elected by plurality instead of majority vote. The following is a complete list of the senators from the beginning, showing the name and residence of each member of each senate, arranged in the order of districts from 1793, when the districts were created, and previous to that year, in the order of counties.

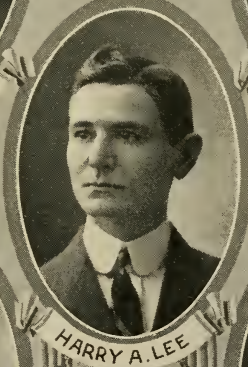

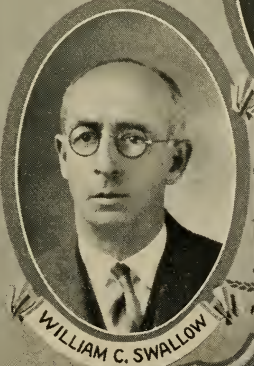

## HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

## THE JUDICIARY

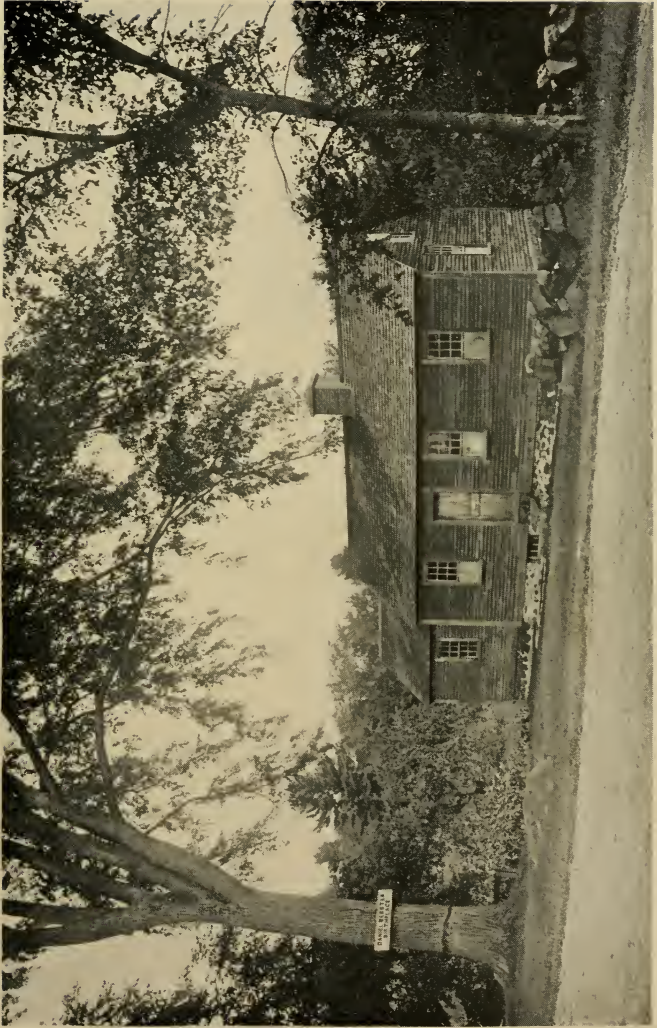
The Constitution in article 4, part 2, gives the legislature full authority to establish courts. There is a supreme court and a superior court, each with a chief and four associate justices; a probate court in each county, with a probate judge and municipal police courts in the cities and most of the towns.

Previous to the Revolution there was a superior court of judicature for the Province, which sat from 1693 to 1776, eighty-three years. This was succeeded by the superior court of judicature, which sat from 1776 to 1813, thirty-seven years. The supreme judicial court took its place in 1813 and lasted three years, until 1816. Then the superior court of judicature was re-established and sat until 1855, thirty-nine years. This was succeeded in 1855 by the supreme judicial court, which lasted until 1874, nineteen years. Then the superior court of judicature was restored for two years, to be succeeded in 1876 by the supreme court, which has since, during a period of forty years, been the highest court in the state.

The superior court was first known as the court of common pleas, which was established in 1813 with two circuits, eastern and western. In 1816 the circuits were abolished and two districts were established, and in 1820 these were merged into the court of sessions. In 1824 the court of common pleas was re-established to sit, until in 1833, after an existence of nine years, the court went out of existence. In 1842 the circuit court was re-established without any circuits or districts, and it sat for seven years, until 1849, when it was abolished. In 1851 it was again re-established and was reorganized in 1855 and abolished in 1859. It was once more re-established in 1874 and lasted two years. In 1901, after a lapse of twenty-five years, a secondary court was established under the name of superior court, which has been since maintained.

The following is a list of the chief justices of the supreme court under its various names and organizations from the beginning, with the residence and term of service of each chief justice. All judges under the Constitution are appointed by the governor and council and hold office until they are seventy years of age.

## LAW DEPARTMENT

The attorney-general is head of the law department and the prosecuting officer and legal adviser of the state. ## BANK COMMISSIONERS

The first act relating to the bank commissioners was passed in 1837. It provided for the appointment of three commissioners for a term of one year each. Prior to 1837, such examination of the banks of the state as was made, was performed by committees of the legislature. As early as 1814, the banks were required to make returns of their condition to the governor and council, who submitted the same to the legislature.

The work of these legislative committees and of the bank commissioners was confined to banks of issue and discount until 1841, when the commissioners were directed by the legislature to make examinations of the savings banks of the state. There were, however, only eight savings banks at that time, and their total deposits were less than one million dollars.

The terms of the commissioners continued to be of one year each until 1881, when the number was reduced from three to two and the terms made two years each. In 1889, the law was amended and a board of three commissioners was created with terms of three years each, the terms being so arranged that one expired each year. The board of commissioners was abolished in 1913 and one commissioner and a deputy provided by the legislature. In 1915, a board of three commissioners was restored, with one commissioner designated as chairman; and the terms were extended to six years, with one expiring every two years. The legislature, in 1925, again abolished the commission and established the offices of bank commissioner and deputy bank commissioner, each with a term of six years, and authorized the commissioner to employ two examiners and two accountants, in addition to the clerical force of the office.

Until 1881 the commissioners were paid for their examina-

tions by the banks at the rate, at first, of two dollars per day and ten cents a mile for travel. Subsequently the per diem was increased to three dollars, and in 1885 to five dollars. Salaries were first established in 1889.

## PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION

The public service commission was formerly known as the railroad commission, and was created by the legislature in 1844. Previous to that there had been a regulation of railroads by the state and as early as 1838 a law was passed authorizing the governor and council to appoint three commissioners in each county. The first state commission, however, was named in 1844, and in 1855 election by popular vote was substituted for appointment. In 1883 election was abolished and appointment restored. In 1911 the name was changed to public service commission and the powers and duties of the board enlarged. Previous to 1911 commissioners were appointed or elected one at a time for three-year terms, but since that year the term has been six years. Special commissioners have served from time to time, but were not regarded as members of the state board and are not listed below in the following list of commissioners from the beginning, with the residence of each and term served.

## FISH AND GAME DEPARTMENT

## DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH

The state board of health was established by the legislature in 1881. The personnel consists of the governor and attorney-general, by virtue of their offices, a civil engineer, and three physicians. The active head of the department is the secretary, who is chosen by the board, and he is registrar of vital statistics, with authority to enforce the registration laws.

In 1889 a law was enacted making the board of health a board of commissioners of lunacy, and in 1899 the board was constituted a board of examiners of embalmers. In 1901 the laboratory of hygiene was established, under the authority and management of the board of health.

## DEPARTMENT OF INSTITUTIONS

The department of institutions was created in 1913 and reorganized in 1915, and included the government of five institutions, the prison, hospital, sanatorium for consumptives, industrial school and school for feeble-minded children. Ten trustees were appointed by the governor and council, two each

year for five-year terms. The trustees employed a purchasing agent who did the buying for all the state departments and such institutions as requested the privilege. From 1913 to 1915 the department was governed by a board of control.

In 1917 there was created a board of trustees of state institutions for the management of the above institutions, the making of repairs of all state buildings except the state house and the buildings of the University of New Hampshire and for the purchase of supplies for all institutions and departments except the University. This board of trustees consisted of five members appointed by the governor and council for five-year terms. In 1919 the law was again amended placing the ultimate authority over and supervision of the institutions and departments in the governor and council who were authorized to appoint seven trustees for each institution consisting of five appointed members for five-year terms and two ex-officio members. The purchasing agent was appointed by the trustees until 1919 when the governor and council were authorized to appoint one for a three-year term. #### NEW HAMPSHIRE STATE HOSPITAL

The first legislative act to provide personal care for the insane was passed in 1822, providing that any insane person who had committed a crime and was not guilty by reason of insanity, and who would be dangerous to be at large, should be committed by court to prison until restored or discharged by due process of law. Soon after this, agitation throughout the state developed for some better method of care and treatment of the insane. Newspapers enlisted in the cause. In 1836 the legislature passed an act requesting the governor to issue a precept to the selectmen of the towns "to take the sense of the qualified voters on the following question: Is it expedient for the state to grant an appropriation to build an insane hospital?" So successful was this appeal that not only were private funds raised, but in 1838 an act of incorporation was passed, entitled, "An Act to incorporate 'The New Hampshire Asylum for the Insane.' "

The management of the institution was at first semi-private and public, and was vested in a board of trustees, represented in part by the donors and in part by appointees selected by the governor and council, under an act of the legislature of 1839. In the following year, 1840, the legislature repealed the act providing for mutual representation of the donors and the

state on the board of trustees, and providing that all trustees should be appointed by the state. With this act of legislation of 1840 the erection of an asylum for the insane was assured, and the trustees, with the assistance of state and private aid, began the erection of an institution at Concord, which was opened in 1843.

The early construction of the hospital was after the plan of the solid or block type of building. In the case of the asylum there was an administration center, with wings extending from either side. Additional wings have from time to time been added to the original unit, as the exigencies demanded. Modern construction calls for the erection of detached groups of buildings, and in 1882 the first detached building was erected for the care of convalescent, appreciative and intelligent women patients, and is known as the Bancroft building.

## STATE PRISON

The old prison was built in 1812 and the present prison in 1880, and is governed by a warden appointed by the trustees of institutions. From 1913 to 1915 the prison was under the board of control, which was abolished. Previous to 1913 there was usually a board of prison trustees, who acted under the governor and council and by their appointment.

## INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL

The industrial school at Manchester was established by the legislature in 1855 and opened in 1858. Its original name was the house of reformation for juvenile and female offenders and was conducted along the lines of a penal institution. It was situated on part of the homestead of General John Stark of the Revolutionary army. In 1881 the name was changed to the industrial school and the policy of its management was changed from that of a penal to that of an educational reformatory. During the last ten years the cottage system of housing the

inmates has been carried out, and the present value of the property is over \$250,000.

The management of the institution was at first vested in a board of trustees appointed by the governor and council. In 1913 the trustees were succeeded by the board of control, and this board was in turn succeeded in 1915 by the trustees of state institutions.

## NEW HAMPSHIRE STATE SANATORIUM

The sanatorium for consumptives, officially known as the New Hampshire state sanatorium, is at Glencliff, on the southern slope of Mount Moosilauke in the White Mountains. It was established by the legislature in 1907 and opened in 1909. Its establishment resulted from the recommendation of a commission which was authorized by the legislature in 1901 and which consisted of Dr. Ezra Mitchell of Lancaster, Dr. Nathaniel G. Brooks of Charlestown and Dr. Irving A. Watson of Concord, secretary of the state board of health.

The commission made its report and recommendation in 1902, and five years later the legislature established the sanatorium. It is 1,650 feet above the sea and it enjoys an average of 170 perfectly clear days every year. In 1909 the two wards, one for men and one for women, were opened; in 1912 they were enlarged and a service building was added; and in 1913 and 1914 a barn, piggery, refrigerating plant, coal pocket and shack were added.

The sanatorium has a capacity of over one hundred patients now and there are 411 acres of land. The value of the property is nearly \$150,000, and its management is vested with the board

### LACONIA STATE SCHOOL

The school for feeble-minded was created by the legislature in 1901. Previous to that the feeble-minded children were supported by the state at the Massachusetts School for Feeble-Minded at Waverly, Mass. The New Hampshire school was established at Laconia, and its government vested in a board of trustees, consisting of the governor and five others appointed by the governor and council. In 1913 the trustees were abolished and the institution placed under the board of control. In 1915 this board was abolished and the institution placed under the trustees of state institutions and two members, Rev. John J. Brophy of Concord and William H. Moses of Tilton, were designated to look after this institution especially.

The school is situated on the slope of a ridge, two miles from the railroad and the city. It is bounded by the Belknap county farm on the south, Lake Opeeche on the east and Lake Winnisquam on the west. The school was opened in 1903, and the following year its only brick dormitory was burned. The school was rapidly rebuilt and has expanded since then.

While the school has grown steadily by new construction and the acquirement of land, the social, ethical and educational side shows equal development. Suitable social amusement and entertainment, with varied healthful occupations, such as approved by Seguin, Montessori and Dr. Fernald, are provided. The children are taught folk and other dancing, games, drills, music, basketry, knitting, weaving and the usual mental school work as far as each one is able to progress. Manual training, cobbling and the domestic sciences are also taken up. As all the vegetables, as well as the milk, for the entire school are raised on the grounds, the boys are given valuable instruction in gardening, farming and the care of the stock. The legislature of 1925 changed the name of the institution from "School for Feeble-Minded" to "Laconia State School."

The age of admission, by application and physician's certificate, is from three to twenty-one years, but women up to the age of forty-five may be committed by probate court.

### UNIVERSITY OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

New Hampshire college was founded in 1866 and is known as New Hampshire College of Agriculture and the Mechanic Arts. It was situated at Hanover and connected with Dartmouth college, both having the same president, for twenty-six years. The legislature of 1885 took steps to move the college, on the ground that it had graduated "less than forty agricultural students" in twenty years. In 1892 the college was removed to Durham.

Government of the college is vested in a board of trustees, consisting of the governor, the president of the college, two members elected by the alumni and nine appointed by the governor and council, making thirteen in all. The nine appointive members who may be men or women must represent both major political parties, and two of them must be farmers. The term of office is three years.

### STATE LIBRARY

The library was established in 1823, when all the books that had been accumulating for years in the state house were deposited in the department of state, and for forty-two years the secretary of state was librarian also. In 1865 the legislature

officially established the library as a separate institution, and a board of library trustees was created the following year. It consisted of three men, one appointed each year by the governor and council for a term of three years. The board appoints a librarian, who serves at the pleasure of the trustees and is the active head of the library. In 1891 the legislature created a library commission, consisting of the librarian and four others, and the commission was consolidated with the trustees in 1901. In 1913 a legislative reference bureau was created by the legislature and is a part of the library. The board was reorganized in 1917, and now consists of three trustees appointed by the governor and council, each for the term of six years.

### HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES, 1789-1927

Under the constitutional apportionment which provided for a house of representatives in congress, New Hampshire was allotted three seats. The national census of 1790 (first census) increased this to four, the second census of 1800 to five and the third census of 1810 to six seats. The census of 1830 reduced it to five, that of 1840 to four and that of 1850 to

three. The census of 1870 reduced it to two, but the seat taken away was restored until the next census of 1880, since when the state has had two representatives.

# Presidential Conventions

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Four sets of Presidential electors appeared on the New Hampshire ballots used in the general election of November, 1928. The Republican and Democratic electors were nominated at State conventions held September 25 and September 26 at Concord and the Workers and Socialist parties were named by petitions filed with the Secretary of State as provided by the election laws.

## REPUBLICAN NATIONAL CONVENTION

The Republican National Convention was held at Kansas City the second week in June, the delegates and alternates elected at the Presidential Primary in March, attending. Due to the resignation of National Committeeman Fred W. Estabrook, of Nashua, Albert Hislop of Portsmouth was elected to the honor. Governor Huntley N. Spaulding was made Chairman of the New Hampshire Delegation.

The Convention nominated Herbert Hoover of Palo Alto, California for President and Charles R. Curtis of Kansas City for Vice President. At the Republican State Convention the Hoover and Curtis electors named, were: Harriet M. Spaulding of Rochester, Blanche Weymouth of Laconia, Ernest M. Hopkins of Hanover and Arthur E. Moreau of Manchester.

## DEMOCRATIC NATIONAL CONVENTION

The Democratic National Convention was held at Houston, Texas, the week following the Republican National Convention at Kansas City. Robert Jackson was elected National Committeeman from New Hampshire and Henri T. Ledoux was made Chairman of the New Hampshire Delegation.

Governor Alfred E. Smith of New York was nominated for President and United States Senator Joseph T. Robinson of Arkansas for Vice President by the convention. The Smith and Robinson electors nominated at the Democratic State Convention were: Iva H. Drew of Colebrook, Gustave LaFontaine of Manchester, George D. Lord of Hanover and Arthur F. Stearns of Mont Vernon.

## WORKERS PARTY

The Workers Party of New Hampshire, by petition chose for electors to be placed upon the November ballot the following names: Victor H. Carlson, Concord; William Wentilla, Con-

cord; Elba Korb Chase, Washington; and Victor Rimpila, Concord. William Z. Foster and Benjamin Gitlow were standard bearers for the Workers Party.

### SOCIALIST PARTY

The Socialist Party of New Hampshire, like the Workers Party, was given a space on the November ballot through the petitions submitted to the Secretary of State. The national candidates were Thomas and Maurer. The Presidential electors for the Socialist Party named by petition were James F. Bean of Portsmouth, William H. Wilkins of Claremont, Walter M. Wood of Greenfield and George C. Brooks of Franklin. This party also placed upon the ballot for the office of Governor of the State, Frank T. Butler of Franklin and George W. Greene of Portsmouth for Representative in Congress in the first district. Eli Bourdon of Claremont was placed upon the ballot as a candidate for Congress in the second congressional district.

# Direct Primary 1928

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The direct primary election was held September 11, 1928, with candidates of the Democratic and Republican parties participating.

The returns are given in detail in the following tables. In the summary the full names and addresses of the candidates, with their total vote, is given. The other tables, carrying the vote in detail, give only the last name of the candidates.

The first tables gives, by counties, the votes for governor, and representative in Congress of each party. The second table gives the votes for county officers. The third table gives the votes for councilors, by districts; and the fourth table the votes for state senators by districts.

## RECOUNTS AFTER THE PRIMARY

After the primary election four recounts were conducted by the secretary of state, all in Republican contests.

In the 20th senatorial district the returns gave Sen. Harry H. Meader of Rochester, candidate for renomination, 1871 votes and Rep. Ralph L. Seavey of Rochester, 1812. The recount gave Senator Meader, 1857 and Mr. Seavey, 1834.

In the second ward of Manchester for representative, the returns gave Miss Ann Story, 488 votes and John W. Todd, 487. The recount gave Miss Story, 489 votes and Mr. Todd, 485.

In Belknap county for commissioners, the returns gave Arthur C. S. Randlett, 1423 and Fred R. Weeks, 1427. The recount gave Mr. Randlett, 1421 and Mr. Weeks, 1432, and there was no change in the result.

The recount of the Hillsborough county commissioner vote was the only recount which changed the result. The official returns gave: Edward H. Labine, 4,017 and Arthur P. Smith, 4,011; the recount reversed the standing of the two candidates, giving Mr. Smith, 3,977 and Mr. Labine, 3,957. Mr. Smith was declared the nominee.

# Republican Organization, 1928

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The Republican state convention met at Concord, Tuesday, September 25, 1928, with Ralph W. Davis of Manchester as president, and adopted the following platform:

## Platform of the Republican Party

The Republican Party under the wise leadership of our New England President, Calvin Coolidge, has given the Country four more years of prosperous growth. Steady reductions in the National debt have been made and at the same time the tax burden has been substantially lessened. Costs of living have been lowered and stabilized and wages have been held at high levels to the continued improvement of the standards of living of the people. In the Kellogg Peace Treaties we have made the outstanding contribution during this period to the movement for world peace.

We are now offering as our candidate for the Presidency one of the most conspicuous and effective supporters of the Coolidge administration, a man known and loved in two continents as the executive head of great organized charitable enterprises; a man with unexampled training, experience and qualifications for the high office of President. To Herbert Hoover and Senator Charles Curtis, our party candidate for Vice President, we pledge our undivided and enthusiastic support.

## National Platform

We endorse the platform adopted by the Republican National Convention at Kansas City and we propose to return to office our two experienced and able Republican Congressmen, Edward R. Wason and Fletcher Hale, to support the Hoover leadership.

The Spaulding Administration has added to the record of the Republican Party for honest and efficient government in the State. Under the leadership of our Governor prompt and effective relief has been brought to the areas stricken during the recent devastating flood. The financial policy inaugurated in the Winant Administration, establishing an accounting system since continued, reflects both the cash position of the Treasury and all contingent liabilities and resources. We stand ready to be judged on the record of these two administrations.

A spirited primary in which an unprecedented number of Republicans participated has demonstrated the vital interest of the rank and file of our voters in the affairs of their party this year. ## Economy in Government

The Republican Party pledges itself to continue the sound policy of a careful and economical appropriation and expenditure of the people's money to the work of the government.

## Taxation

The Recess tax commission is charged with the duty of reporting its findings with respect to a more equitable distribution of the tax burden to the next Legislature. We promise careful consideration of its recommendations and pledge our active efforts to enact such laws as will make our system of taxation more equitable. To mention one problem of many, the present method of taxing growing timber is admittedly unscientific. If under constitutional limitations no relief can be secured, we favor a constitutional amendment to make relief possible. With these possibilities in view we favor the calling of a constitutional convention.

## Natural Resources

We believe that a wise use of the natural resources of the State particularly our water power will tend to equalize our manufacturing conditions in competition with other localities so that New Hampshire may steadily increase its industrial output. The problem of retaining control to insure a maximum of development and use together with low rates to the consumer and safety to the investor, challenges the best thoughts of our Legislators. Any solution must include the provision that all power developed in the State, shall at all times be available for use in the State. We recommend that every intelligent effort to keep pace with the rapidly developing situation in this field, be encouraged and supported until a comprehensive policy can be formulated and enacted into law.

## Railroads

We pledge assistance to all communities of the State threatened with loss or curtailment of railroad facilities to the end that their needs may be adequately presented before the tribunals having jurisdiction over the subject.

## Prohibition

We pledge the party to maintain and strengthen the existing prohibition law and to its wholehearted enforcement.

## Agriculture—Industry

We promise to support the agricultural, industrial and commercial interests of the state in all their branches and we favor a comprehensive economic survey of all the resources of the state. We shall continue appropriations to further the work of the Publicity Bureau; we shall give effective support to the program of the New Hampshire Council of the New England Council and we commend especially its efforts to provide useful employment

for our young people within the state; we shall provide for the continued improvement of the highways and their maintenance under an equitable distribution of the burden; we favor the taking over of the maintenance of trunk lines by the state and increasing the aid now given to towns for rural roads, we shall maintain the present high standards of our schools and the State University, as well as the State Institutions for the dependent and delinquent in order that the coming generation may have an opportunity to develop to full physical and intellectual capacity, that the wants of the unfortunate may be relieved, and that our State may continue to hold its fair name in the sisterhood of states.

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## Democratic Organization, 1928

These standards are typified by the enactment by our party in the nation of the Federal Reserve Act, the creation of the Federal Trade Commission, the Tariff Commission and the passage of the Rural Credits Law; and in the State by the constructive acts of the Samuel D. Felker and Fred H. Brown administrations.

We believe that with Alfred E. Smith and Joseph T. Robinson as our leaders in the nation, and Eaton D. Sargent, Francis Clyde Keefe and Alfred W. Levensaler in the state, supported by our other candidates, the Democratic party can be depended upon to place upon the statute books further progressive legislation for the benefit of all the people.

## Law Enforcement

**NEW HAMPSHIRE TURNPIKE ROADS**

By Otis G. Hammond, Supt. N. H. Historical Society

**Amherst Turnpike, incorporated June 18, 1812.**

Beginning at the end of the Second New Hampshire Turnpike on Amherst plain, thence running to the line between the State of New Hampshire and the Commonwealth of Massachusetts in a direction to meet the turnpike road in Tyngsborough in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, conforming to the survey lately made by Daniel Warner as near as the nature of the ground will permit.

**Andover Turnpike, incorporated June 17, 1812.**

From Republican bridge, so called, in Salisbury to the Fourth New Hampshire Turnpike in Andover, at or near the dwelling house of Samuel Kimball.

**Ashuelot Turnpike, incorporated June 18, 1807.**

From the turnpike road in Winchester to Fitzwilliam Village, leading to Boston.

**Bath Turnpike, incorporated December 11, 1804.**

From Connecticut River, at or near the southerly line of Lyman, through the towns of Lyman, Bath, Landaff, Coventry\*, Peeling†, and Thornton to the easterly line of Sandwich.

\*Now Benton.

†Now Woodstock.

**Charlestown Turnpike, incorporated December 27, 1803.**

From the easterly bank of Connecticut River, near the center part of Charlestown, to the Second Turnpike road in Lempster.

**Cheshire Turnpike, incorporated December 13, 1804.**

From Connecticut River, near Charlestown meeting-house, where a bridge may be erected over said river, through said Charlestown, Langdon and Surry to the Third New Hampshire Turnpike near the court-house in Keene.

**Chester Turnpike, incorporated June 19, 1804.**

From the highway leading to Pembroke, about a mile above Chester east meeting-house, unto Chester line on a direction to Pembroke Street.

Charter extended Dec. 5, 1804, to permit passing through Allens-town about one mile, and through land in Pembroke about one quarter of a mile, in a line to Pembroke Street.

**Chesterfield Turnpike, incorporated June 21, 1804.**

From Connecticut River in Chesterfield, or from the village near the meeting-house in said Chesterfield, through said Chesterfield and Winchester to the line of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts.

**Chocorua Mountain Road, incorporated August 9, 1889.**

From near the dwelling-house of Charles Durrell in said Tamworth (where said road is now located and constructed) to the line between the towns of said Tamworth and Albany, thence to the top of Chocorua Mountain in said town of Albany.

**Coos Turnpike, incorporated December 19, 1805.**

Beginning at Haverhill Corner, so called, thence in such route or tract as shall in their best skill and judgment combine shortness of distance with the most practicable ground, through a part of said Haverhill, Piermont, and Warren to the waters of Baker's River, so called, at or near Merrill's mill in said Warren.

**Coos Turnpike, incorporated July 1, 1837.**

From or near the mouth of John's River in the town of Dalton, thence following the valley of said John's River through said Dalton, Whitefield, to Jefferson, thence on the most practicable route through said Jefferson, Kilkenney, Randolph, to the Androscoggin River near Gilman Lang's in the town of Gorham.

**Cornish Turnpike, incorporated December 9, 1808.**

From or near Cornish bridge, so called, in Cornish to intersect the Croydon Turnpike road in Newport.

**Coventry Turnpike, incorporated December 29, 1803.**

From or near the guide post in Warren (at the fork of the roads, one leading to Haverhill Corner, the other to Coventry\*) unto or near the old court-house in Haverhill.

\*Now Benton.

**Coventry Turnpike, incorporated July 6, 1839.**

From the east line of the town of Haverhill to the north line of the town of Warren through the Oliverian Valley in said Coventry.\*

\*Now Benton.

**Croydon Turnpike, incorporated June 21, 1804.**

From or near the branch turnpike road from Hanover, where it intersects the Fourth Turnpike road in Lebanon, thence southerly through part of Lebanon, part of Enfield or Plainfield, New Grant-ham\*, Croydon, Newport, until it strikes the Second New Hampshire Turnpike road in Lempster or Washington.

\*Now Grantham.

**Dalton Turnpike, incorporated December 11, 1804.**

From the mouth of John's River in said Dalton to meet the Tenth Turnpike road in this state.

**Dover Turnpike, incorporated December 23, 1803.**

From Dover Landing, near the bridge, through Somersworth to Salmon Falls River, to such a place on said river as shall by them be thought best and most convenient for public travelling, to meet the turnpike road leading from Kennebeck River through Portland in the District of Maine to New Hampshire line.

In an amendment to the charter, passed Dec. 1, 1804, the Maine turnpike mentioned is described as "contemplated."

**Fifth New Hampshire Turnpike, incorporated June 17, 1802.**

From Plymouth to Piscataqua bridge, (Durham.)

**Fitzwilliam Village Turnpike, incorporated December 9, 1808.**

From Fitzwilliam Village to the Worcester Turnpike, on the Massachusetts line.

**Fourth Turnpike, incorporated December 8, 1800.**

From the east bank of Connecticut River in the town of Lebanon, nearly opposite to the mouth of White River, eastwardly to the west bank of Merrimack River in the town of Salisbury or Boscawen, and also from the east abutment of White River Falls bridge in Hanover southeastwardly till it intersects the road first mentioned, and to be a branch thereof.

**Franconia Turnpike, incorporated December 29, 1828.**

Beginning near the dwelling-house of Jonas Tyler in Franconia, following in the valley through which the mountain and pond brooks pass, to the fishing pond, thence round said pond intersecting the road as now travelled in the most convenient place in the Franconia Notch.

**Franconia and White Mountain Notches Turnpike, incorporated June 24, 1870**

From such a point near Sawyer's bridge, so called, in the town of Bethlehem, by such route and to such point in or near the notch of the Franconia Mountains as may be deemed best by said corporation.

**Grafton Turnpike, incorporated June 21, 1804.**

From or near Orford bridge on Connecticut River to the Fourth Turnpike road in Andover at or near Harriman's bridge, so called.

**Great Ossipee Turnpike, incorporated December 11, 1804.**

From the most convenient place in the town of Sandwich to the line of the District of Maine in Effingham, to meet the contemplated turnpike from the counties of York and Cumberland.

**Great Sunapee Turnpike, incorporated June 23, 1809.**

From the Croydon Turnpike in Newport southeasterly through Wendell\*, Fishersfield†, Bradford, and Sutton to Bean's mills in Warner.

\*Now Sunapee.

†Now Newbury.

**Hampton Causeway Turnpike, incorporated December 23, 1808.**

From Sanborn's Hill, so called, in Hampton Falls to the causeway in Hampton, and from said causeway to the town or corner of the road near the house of James Leavitt in Hampton.

**Hancock Turnpike, incorporated June 18, 1805.**

From Stoddard through Hancock, Greenfield, and Lyndeborough to Milford.

**Hillsborough Turnpike, incorporated December 13, 1804.**

From the Fourth New Hampshire Turnpike road in Andover, by the easterly end of Kearsarge Mountain, to the line of Massachusetts in a direction for Boston.

**Hinsdale Bridge and the Sixth New Hampshire Turnpike, incorporated June 17, 1802.**

To erect a bridge over Connecticut River at any place from Dummer's ferry to the ferry at Barrett's Island, so called, and also at any place on said island or within one mile above the same.

Road from Connecticut River in Hinsdale, intending to meet the aforesaid bridge when erected, through said Hinsdale and Winchester to the line of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts at Warwick.

**Jefferson Turnpike, incorporated December 11, 1804.**

From the northern extremity of the Tenth Turnpike road through Bretton Woods\*, Jefferson, and Lancaster to Lancaster meeting-house.

\*Now Carroll.

**Kearsarge Summit Road, incorporated July 14, 1864.**

From such a point in the vicinity of Kearsarge as it may deem the most favorable to the top of the said mountain by such route and in such direction as it may deem best, said road to begin, however, near the east part of Kearsarge Village in Bartlett, and thence to the top of Kearsarge Mountain.

**Lincoln Turnpike, incorporated July 11, 1871.**

From such point near the Flume House on the main road in Lincoln, by such route and to such point near the Flume, so called, as may be deemed best by said corporation.

**Litchfield Turnpike, incorporated June 10, 1808.**

From the termination of the Second New Hampshire Turnpike in the town of Amherst to the state line, in direction with Andover bridge.

**Littleton Turnpike, incorporated December 8, 1804.**

From the termination of the tenth New Hampshire Turnpike road near the notch of the White Hills, through the towns of Bretton Woods\*, Bethlehem, and Littleton, to strike Connecticut River at the place agreed upon to build Littleton bridge.

The charter was amended June 13, 1807, by adding after "Littleton bridge" the words "or at any other place on the eastwardly bank of said river which shall be directly opposite to the termination of the Northern Vermont Turnpike road on the westwardly bank of said river;" again amended June 19, 1812, providing that instead of extending to Connecticut River the road go only to Noah Sweat's house in Bethlehem.

\*Now Carroll.

**Londonderry Turnpike, incorporated June 20, 1804.**

From Butler's Corner in Concord to the state line near Andover bridge.

The charter was amended Dec. 20, 1805, to allow the proprietors to build a bridge over Merrimack River near Hooksett Falls.

**Londonderry Branch Turnpike, incorporated June 17, 1812.**

From or near Moses Bailey's in Hopkinton through said Hopkinton, Bow, and Dunbarton to the Londonderry Turnpike road at or near Isle of Hooksett Falls in Dunbarton.

**Mayhew Turnpike, incorporated December 29, 1803.**

From or near Peter Peaslee's in New Chester\* to the east side of Newfound Pond, from thence on to a road leading from Plymouth to Coos in Rumney.

\*Now Hill.

**Milford Turnpike, incorporated June 23, 1815.**

From the line dividing the town of Pepperell in Massachusetts from the town of Hollis in this State, through Hollis, Milford, and Mont Vernon to the Second New Hampshire Turnpike, and to meet the same at a point which may be deemed most suitable somewhere between the meeting-house of Mont Vernon and the first turnpike gate.

**Monadnoc Turnpike, incorporated December 19, 1805.**

From the head of the canal at the county bridge in Milford, through the towns of Wilton, Temple, and through the notch of the mountain dividing Temple from Peterborough to the Third New Hampshire Turnpike road at the foot of Marlborough hills, near Phineas Farrar's dwelling-house in said Marlborough.

**Moosilauke Mountain Road, incorporated June 24, 1870.**

From such a point in the vicinity of the dwelling-house of Nathaniel Merrill, 2d, in the town of Warren as they may deem most favorable to the top of said Moosilauke Mountain, by such route and in such direction as they may deem best.

**Moosilauke Mountain Road, incorporated July 22, 1881.**

From such point in the vicinity of the dwelling-house of Amos Merrill in the town of Warren as they may deem most favorable to the top of said Moosilauke Mountain, by such route and in such direction as they may deem best; and may in a similar manner also lay out, construct, and keep in repair a bridle-path and carriage road from such point in the vicinity of the Tunnel Stream road, so called, in the town of Benton to the top of said Moosilauke Mountain; and in a similar manner may lay out, construct, and keep in repair a bridle-path and carriage road from such point in the vicinity of the High Street school-house, so called, in said Benton to the top of Moosilauke Mountain.

**Mount Hayes Turnpike, incorporated July 7, 1866.**

From such a point as may be selected by it on the county road, so called, in Shelburne or Gorham, by such route as may be deemed best, to the summit of Mount Hayes.

**Mount Lafayette Road, incorporated July 3, 1866.**

From such a point in the vicinity of Mount Lafayette, in the town of Franconia, as they may deem most favorable to the top of said mountain, by such route and in such direction as they may deem best, said path and road to begin, however, in or near the highway on which the Profile and Flume houses are situated, and proceed thence to the top of Mount Lafayette.

**Mount Washington Road, incorporated July 1, 1853.**

From such a point in the vicinity of Mount Washington as they may deem most favorable to the top of said mountain, by such route and in such direction as they may deem best, said road to begin, however, in or near Peabody River Valley, and thence to the top of Mount Washington, and from thence to some point on the northwesterly side of said mountain between the Notch of the White Mountains, in Crawford's Grant, and the Cherry Mountain.

**Mount Washington Summit Road, incorporated June 27, 1859.**

From such point in the vicinity of Mount Washington as it may deem most favorable to the top of said mountain, by such route and in such direction as it may deem best, said road to begin, however, in or near Peabody River Valley, and thence to the top of Mount Washington, and thence down the northwesterly side thereof to the road leading through the Crawford Notch of the White Mountains at some point between Cherry Mountain and the Notch, so called.

**Mount Washington Turnpike, incorporated July 3, 1838.**

Commencing at or near the northwesterly termination of the Tenth Turnpike road in New Hampshire, and thence running in an easterly direction to the Table Rock, so called, on Mount Washington.

**Mount Washington Turnpike, incorporated July 5, 1867.**

From such a point near the site of the Fabyan Hotel, formerly so known, by such a route and to such a point at or near the foot of Mount Washington as may be deemed best, with the right to connect with any railroad\* extending on to Mount Washington on such terms and conditions as may be agreed upon by the parties.

\*This charter included the right to build a horse railroad.

**Mount Willard Turnpike, incorporated July 7, 1869.**

From such a point near the Crawford House at the White Mountain Notch by such a route, and to such a point on or near the summit of Mount Willard as may be deemed best by said corporation.

**New Chester and Danbury Turnpike, incorporated Dec. 6, 1808.**

From New Chester\* Union bridge, so called, to Grafton Turnpike at or near George Niles' in Danbury.

\*Now Hill.

**New Hampshire Turnpike, incorporated June 14, 1796.**

From Piscataqua bridge in Durham to Merrimack River in Concord.

**Newport Turnpike, incorporated December 10, 1805.**

From the Croydon Turnpike road in Newport southerly through Newport, Unity, and Lempster until it intersects the Second New Hampshire Turnpike road near the meeting-house in Lempster, thence southerly through part of Lempster and Marlow until it intersects the Stoddard Turnpike road in Marlow, thence southwardly through part of Marlow, in that route or tract which said corporation shall judge best, until it intersects the Third New Hampshire Turnpike road in Keene.

**Northern Haverhill Turnpike, incorporated June 14, 1808.**

From a point in the public highway near the dwelling-house of Stephen Morse, Jr., in Haverhill, thence north or northeasterly till it shall strike Wild Ammonoosuc River, so called, at Sargent's saw-mill, or within a mile east of it, and from thence to the bath Turnpike.

**Orford Turnpike, incorporated December 27, 1803.**

From Orford bridge on Connecticut River through Orford and a part of Wentworth to Aiken's bridge on Baker's River.

The charter was amended June 18, 1805, to permit the use of the county road, "as now laid out," between Orford bridge and said Aiken's bridge for said intended turnpike.

**Pemigewasset Turnpike**, incorporated December 21, 1820.

From the north line of Peeling\* to the upper pond in Franconia Notch, so called, in the town of Franconia.

\*Now Woodstock.

**Pemissewasset Middle Branch Turnpike**, incorporated June 26, 1809.

Beginning at the northern line of Thornton and running thence through Peeling\*, Lincoln, and Franconia, along the passage in Franconia Mountain near the iron works, and on the most direct route to Lancaster.

\*Now Woodstock.

**Piermont Turnpike Branch**, incorporated December 21, 1805.

From the Orford Turnpike road at Baker's Pond in the easterly part of Orford, extending and passing through a part of Orford and Piermont until the same shall intersect or form a connection with the Coos Turnpike road.

**Pinkham Turnpike**, incorporated July 4, 1834.

From the south line of the lot or farm now occupied by George Perkins in the town of Jackson, through the Pinkham Grant to the north line of a lot of land owned by Jonas Green, lying on the Pinkham road in Randolph, being a distance of thirteen miles.

**Pittsfield Turnpike**, incorporated June 13, 1806.

From Charles Hodgdon's in Barnstead to Jenness' Pond, so called, in Pittsfield near the line of Northwood.

**Richmond Turnpike**, incorporated June 21, 1804.

From the northerly line of Royalston, in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, near a turnpike road in said Royalston leading to Worcester and Providence, to the south line of Swanzey, to such place on said line as by them shall be thought best and convenient for public travelling, to the plain land in said Swanzey in the most direct route to Keene and Charlestown.

**Rindge Turnpike**, incorporated June 12, 1807.

From the state line between Massachusetts and New Hampshire at or near the southwest corner of New Ipswich to the branch turnpike which leads from Keene to the north line of Fitzwilliam.

**Saco and Swift River Turnpike**, incorporated July 2, 1873.

From such a point as may be selected by it on the White Mountain Notch road, so called, in Bartlett, by such route as may be deemed best, to such a point on the main road in Albany as may be deemed advisable.

**Sanborn Turnpike, incorporated July 3, 1872.**

From such point on the highway leading by the dwelling-house of Ephraim S. Wadleigh in Northfield, by such route and to such point on the highway leading by the dwelling-house formerly occupied by Demore Wyatt in said town as may be deemed best by said corporation.

**Sanbornton Turnpike, incorporated June 13, 1808.**

From Pemigewasset bridge on Pemigewasset River through New Hampton, part of Meredith, and to Jonathan Calley's in Sanbornton.

**Sandwich Turnpike, incorporated December 13, 1804.**

From Sandwich to Norway Plain in Rochester, and from thence to Dover Landing.

**Second Turnpike, incorporated December 26, 1799.**

From the Lottery bridge in Claremont to the plain in Amherst near the court-house.

**Seventh Turnpike, incorporated June 18, 1802.**

From the north part of Charlestown, near William Henry's tavern, by Alstead meeting-house to Asa Wilcox's tavern in Surry.

**Sixth New Hampshire Turnpike.**

See Hinsdale Bridge.

**Starr King Mountain Road, incorporated July 7, 1881.**

From such point on the Jefferson road in the town of Jefferson, by such route and to such point on said Starr King Mountain as may be deemed best by said corporation.

**Stoddard Turnpike, incorporated June 21, 1804.**

From the Third Turnpike road near Whiteman's tavern in Walpole to the Second Turnpike road near Gibson's tavern in Francestown, and from thence to the Amoskeag Falls in Merrimack River.

**Sunapee Turnpike, incorporated June 21, 1804.**

From the south end of Sunapee Pond through that part of the towns of Fishersfield\*, Bradford, and Hillsborough to unite with the Second Turnpike road where it will best accommodate the public.

\*Now Newbury.

**Sunapee Turnpike, incorporated June 23, 1815.**

**Tenth Turnpike, incorporated December 28, 1803.**

From the upper line in Bartlett through the notch in the White Hills, containing twenty miles.

**Third Turnpike, incorporated December 27, 1799.**

From Bellows Falls in Walpole on Connecticut River through Keene toward Boston to Massachusetts line.

Charter amended Dec. 13, 1808, to permit the construction of a road commencing at or near the house of Paul Newton in Marlborough, and terminating in said turnpike road at or near a bridge about one hundred rods southeast of Marlborough meeting-house.

From the southerly end of the upper pond in Franconia Notch, so called, in the town of Franconia, to Ammonoosuc River near Whipple's mills in Bethlehem.

**Warner and Kearsarge Road, incorporated July 6, 1866.**

From some point on the southerly side of Kearsarge Mountain, deemed most favorable, to the top of said mountain by such route and in such direction as is most practicable, said road to begin, however, near the residence of Caleb Wells in Warner, or of George F. Quimby in Salisbury, and thence to the summit of Kearsarge Mountain.

The charter was revived and amended March 9, 1893, to include a branch road from some point on the southeast side of Kearsarge Mountain, connecting with the highway near Smith's Corner, so called, deemed most favorable, in the town of Salisbury, to some point on Kearsarge Mountain so as to intersect with the main line of the present road.

**Waumbeck Road, incorporated July 2, 1868.**

From or near the Stillings place, so called, in Jefferson southerly to the line of the Mount Washington railroad.

The charter was amended June 24, 1869, by substituting the word "Randolph" for the word "Jefferson."

**Westmoreland Turnpike, incorporated June 21, 1804.**

From the Third Turnpike road in Walpole through Westmoreland, Chesterfield, and Hinsdale to the line of Massachusetts.

**White Mountains Plank Road, incorporated January 8, 1853.**

A plank road from the track of the White Mountains railroad, as surveyed in the town of Littleton or Whitefield, to or near the notch of the White Mountains, on such route as said corporation deem best to accommodate the public.

**Wilmot and Kearsarge Road, incorporated July 1, 1873.**

From some point of the northerly side of Kearsarge Mountain deemed most favorable to the top of said mountain, by such route and in such direction as is most practicable, said road to begin, however, at the Winslow House in the town of Wilmot, and thence to the summit of Kearsarge Mountain.

**Winnipisseege Turnpike, incorporated June 14, 1808.**

From the foot of Currier's Hill in the town of Gilmanton to the Pemigewasset River nearly opposite the dwelling-house of Robert Craig in Bridgewater.

**Winnipisseege and White Mountain Turnpike, incorporated January 7, 1853.**

Commencing at such point as they may deem expedient near Birch Intervale, so called, in Tamworth, and extending through a portion of Albany and Elkins' Grant, a distance of about fourteen miles to the White Mountain Turnpike road in Hart's Location, about two miles below the old Crawford House.

**Woodsville and Lincoln Turnpike, incorporated August 13, 1885.**

From some convenient point near the terminus of the Pemigewasset Valley railroad at North Woodstock to the summit of the Pemigewasset Mountain, so called, in Lincoln, and to such other points of interest in the towns of Woodstock and Lincoln and vicinity (where roads do not now exist) as the directors of said corporation shall deem the public convenience to require to accommodate the summer pleasure travel.
