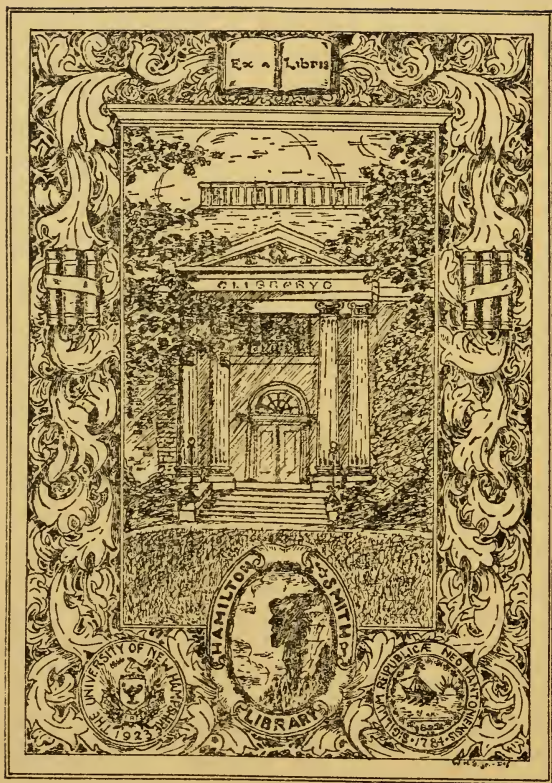
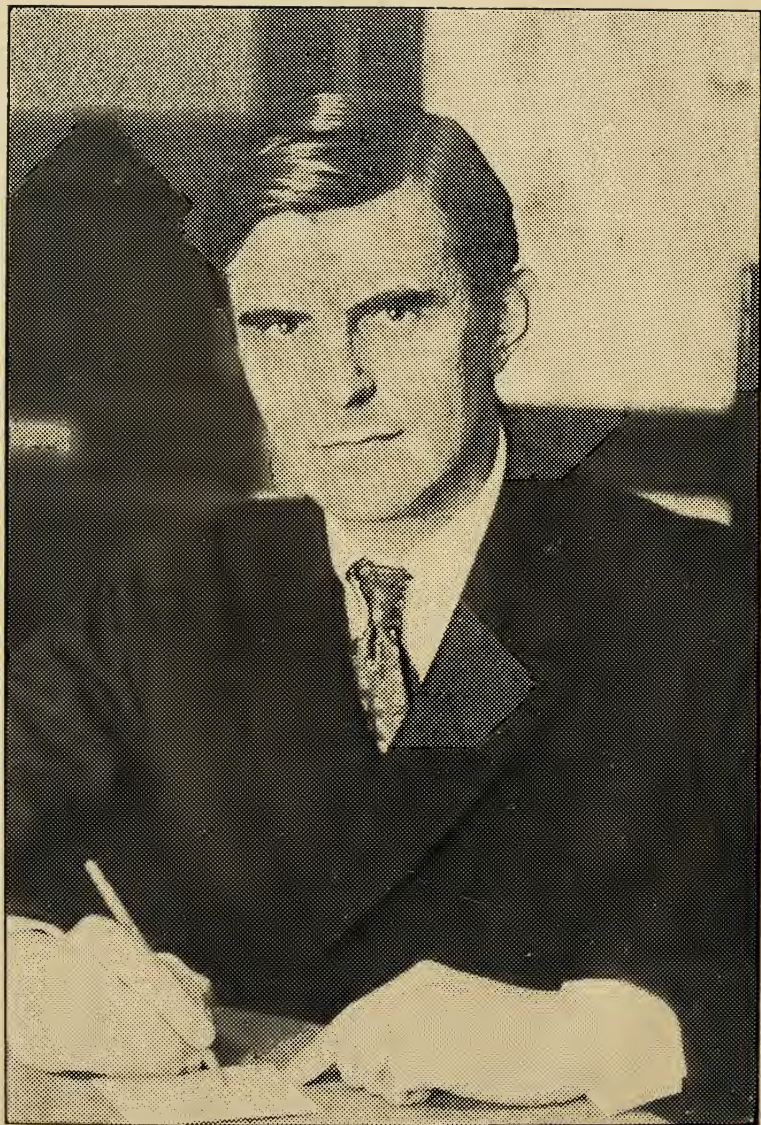

of the

State of New Hampshire

ESTABLISHED OCTOBER 31, 1783, TO TAKE EFFECT JUNE 2, 1784,
AS SUBSEQUENTLY AMENDED AND IN FORCE JANUARY 1, 1931.*

All amendments are shown by notes at the bottom of the page indicating the year in which they took effect. The amendments of 1792, "so far as relates to the choice of the members of the legislature and the executive officers of the state, county treasurer and recorder of deeds," took effect on February 1, 1793, and all others on the first Wednesday of June, 1793.

The amendments of 1850 took effect September 16, 1852; those of 1876, August 1, 1877, October 1, 1878, and the first Wednesday of June, 1879, as indicated in the foot notes; those of 1889, April 2, 1889; those of 1902 on March 26, 1903; and those of 1912 on November 20, 1912.

The numbering of the sections of Part II first appeared in the Revised Statutes of 1842. In 1889, when the tenth section of Part II was stricken out, all subsequent sections were renumbered, with the result of making much confusion in citations. In this copy the original numbering has been placed in parenthesis at the side of the revised number.

PART FIRST

BILL OF RIGHTS.

ARTICLE 1ST. All men are born equally free and independent: Therefore, all government, of right, originates from the people, is founded in consent, and instituted for the general good.

[ART.] *2d. All men have certain natural, essential, and inherent rights—among which are, the enjoying and defending life and liberty; acquiring, possessing, and protecting, property; and, in a word, of seeking and obtaining happiness.

[ART.] 3d. When men enter into a state of society, they surrender up some of their natural rights to that society, in order to ensure the protection of others; and, without such an equivalent, the surrender is void.

[ART.] 4th. Among the natural rights, some are, in their very nature unalienable, because no equivalent can be given or received for them. Of this kind are the Rights of Conscience.

[ART.] 5th. Every individual has a natural and unalienable right to worship God according to the dictates of his own conscience, and reason; and no subject shall be hurt, molested, or restrained, in his person, liberty, or estate, for worshipping God in the manner and season most agreeable to the dictates of his own conscience; or for his religious profession, sentiments, or persuasion: provided he doth not disturb the public peace or disturb others in their religious worship.

[ART.] 6th. As morality and piety, rightly grounded on evangelical principles, will give the best and greatest security to government, and will lay, in the hearts of men, the strongest obligations to due subjection; and as the knowledge of these is

most likely to be propagated through a society, by the institution of the public worship of the Deity, and of public instruction in morality and religion; therefore, to promote those important purposes, the people of this state have a right to empower, and do hereby fully empower, the legislature, to authorize, from time to time, the several towns, parishes, bodies corporate, or religious societies, within this state, to make adequate provision, at their own expense, for the support and maintenance of public Protestant teachers of piety, religion, and morality:

Provided notwithstanding, that the several towns, parishes, bodies corporate, or religious societies, shall, at all times, have the exclusive right of electing their own public teachers, and of contracting with them for their support and maintenance. And no person, of any one particular religious sect or denomination, shall ever be compelled to pay towards the support of the teacher or teachers of another persuasion, sect, or denomination.

And every denomination of Christians, demeaning themselves quietly, and as good subjects of the state, shall be equally under the protection of the law: And no subordination of any one sect or denomination to another, shall ever be established by law.

And nothing herein shall be understood to affect any former contracts made for the support of the ministry; but all such contracts shall remain, and be in the same state as if this constitution had not been made.

[ART.] 7th. The people of this state have the sole and exclusive right of governing themselves as a free, sovereign, and independent state; and do, and forever hereafter shall, exercise and enjoy every power, jurisdiction, and right, pertaining thereto, which is not, or may not hereafter be, by them expressly delegated to the United States of America in congress assembled.

[ART.] 8th. All power residing originally in, and being derived from, the people, all the magistrates and officers of government are their substitutes and agents, and at all times accountable to them.

[ART.] 9th. No office or place whatsoever, in government, shall be hereditary—the abilities and integrity requisite in all, not being transmissible to posterity or relations.

[ART.] 10th. Government being instituted for the common benefit, protection, and security, of the whole community, and not for the private interest or emolument of any one man, family, or class of men; therefore, whenever the ends of government are perverted, and public liberty manifestly endangered, and all other means of redress are ineffectual, the people may, and of right ought, to reform the old, or establish a new government. The doctrine of nonresistance against arbitrary power, and oppression, is absurd, slavish, and destructive of the good and happiness of mankind.

[ART.] 11th. All elections ought to be free, and every inhabitant of the state, having the proper qualifications, has equal right to elect, and be elected, into office; [but no person shall have the right to vote or be eligible to office under the constitution of this state who shall not be able to read the constitution in the English language and to write; *provided, however*, that this provision shall not apply to any person prevented by a physical disability from complying with its requisitions, nor to any person who now has the right to vote, nor to any person who shall be sixty years of age or upwards on the first day of January, A. D. 1904;]* [and *provided further*, that no person shall have the right to vote, or be eligible to office under the constitution of this state who shall have been convicted of treason, bribery, or any wilful violation of the election laws

of this state or of the United States; but the supreme court may, on notice to the attorney-general restore the privileges of an elector to any person who may have forfeited them by conviction of such offences.]†

[ART.] 12th. Every member of the community has a right to be protected by it, in the enjoyment of his life, liberty, and property; he is therefore bound to contribute his share in the expense of such protection, and to yield his personal service, when necessary, or an equivalent. But no part of a man's property shall be taken from him, or applied to public uses, without his own consent, or that of the representative body of the people. Nor are the inhabitants of this state controllable by any other laws than those to which they, or their representative body, have given their consent.

[ART.] 13th. No person, who is conscientiously scrupulous about the lawfulness of bearing arms, shall be compelled thereto, provided he will pay an equivalent.

[ART.] 14th. Every subject of this state is entitled to a certain remedy, by having recourse to the laws, for all injuries he may receive in his person, property, or character; to obtain right and justice freely, without being obliged to purchase it; completely, and without any denial; promptly, and without delay; conformably to the laws.

[ART.] 15th. No subject shall be held to answer for any crime, or offense, until the same is fully and plainly, substantially and formally, described to him; or be compelled to accuse or furnish evidence against himself. And every subject shall have a right to produce all proofs that may be favorable to himself; to meet the witnesses against him face to face, and to be fully heard in his defense, by himself,

and counsel. And no subject shall be arrested, imprisoned, despoiled, or deprived of his property, immunities, or privileges, put out of the protection of the law, exiled or deprived of his life, liberty, or estate, but by the judgment of his peers, or the law of the land.

[ART.] 16th. No subject shall be liable to be tried, after an acquittal, for the same crime or offense. Nor shall the legislature make any law that shall subject any person to a capital punishment, (excepting for the government of the army and navy, and the militia in actual service) without trial by jury.

[ART.] 17th. In criminal prosecutions, the trial of facts, in the vicinity where they happened, is so essential to the security of the life, liberty, and estate, of the citizen, that no crime or offense ought to be tried in any other county than that in which it is committed; —except in cases of general insurrection in any particular county, when it shall appear to the judges of the superior court, that an impartial trial cannot be had in the county where the offense may be committed, and upon their report, the [legislature]* shall think proper to direct the trial in the nearest county in which an impartial trial can be obtained.

[ART.] 18th. All penalties ought to be proportioned to the nature of the offense. No wise legislature will affix the same punishment to the crimes of theft, forgery, and the like, which they do to those of murder and treason. Where the same undistinguishing severity is exerted against all offenses, the people are led to forget the real distinction in the crimes themselves, and to commit the most flagrant with as little compunction as they do† the lightest [offenses].‡ For the same reason a

multitude of sanguinary laws is both impolitic and unjust. The true design of all punishments being to reform, not to exterminate mankind.

[ART.] 19th. [Every subject hath a right to be secure from all unreasonable searches and seizures of his person, his houses, his papers, and all his possessions. Therefore, all warrants to search suspected places, or arrest a person for examination or trial, in prosecutions for criminal matters, are contrary to this right, if the cause or foundation of them be not previously supported by oath or affirmation; and if the order, in a warrant to a civil officer, to make search in suspected places, or to arrest one or more suspected persons or to seize their property, be not accompanied with a special designation of the persons or objects of search, arrest, or seizure; and no warrant ought to be issued, but in cases, and with the formalities, prescribed by law.]*

[ART.] 20th. In all controversies concerning property—and in all suits between two or more persons, except in cases in which it has been heretofore otherwise used and practiced, [and except in cases in which the value in controversy does not exceed one hundred dollars, and title of real estate is not concerned]† the parties have a right to a trial by jury and this method of procedure shall be held sacred, unless, in cases arising on the high seas and such as relates to mariners' wages, the legislature shall think it necessary hereafter to alter it.

[ART.] 21st. In order to reap the fullest advantage of the inestimable privilege of the trial by jury, great care ought to be taken, that none but qualified persons should be appointed to serve; and such ought to [be]‡ fully compensated for their travel, time, and attendance.

- [ART.] 22d. The *liberty of the press* is essential to the security of freedom in a state: it ought, therefore, to be inviolably preserved. Liberty of the press.
- [ART.] 23d. Retrospective laws are highly injurious, oppressive, and unjust. No such laws therefore, should be made, either for the decision of civil causes, or the punishment of offenses. - [ART.] 24th. A well regulated militia is the proper, natural, and sure defense, of a state. Militia.
- [ART.] 25th. Standing armies are dangerous to liberty, and ought not to be raised, or kept up, without the consent of the legislature. Standing armies.
- [ART.] 26th. In all cases, and at all times, the military ought to be under strict subordination to, and governed by, the civil power. Military, subject to civil power.
- [ART.] 27th. No soldier in time of peace, shall be quartered in any house, without the consent of the owner; and in time of war, such quarters ought not to be made but by the civil magistrate, in a manner ordained by the legislature. Quartering of soldiers.
- [ART.] 28th. No subsidy, charge, tax, impost, or duty, shall be established, fixed, laid, or levied, under any pretext whatsoever, without the consent of the people, or their representatives in the legislature, or authority derived from that body. - [ART.] 29th. The power of suspending the laws, or the execution of them, ought never to be exercised but by the legislature, or by authority derived therefrom, to be exercised in such particular cases only as the legislature shall expressly provide for. Suspension of laws by the legislature only.
- [ART.] 30th. The freedom of deliberation, speech, and debate, in either house of the legislature, is so essential to the rights of the people, that it cannot be the foundation of any action, complaint, or prosecution, in any other court or place whatsoever. Freedom of speech.

[ART.] 31st. [The legislature shall assemble for the redress of public grievances, and for making such laws as the public good may require.]*

[ART.] 32d. The people have a right, in an orderly and peaceable manner, to assemble and consult upon the common good, give instructions to their representatives, and to request of the legislative body, by way of petition or remonstrance, redress of the wrongs done them, and of the grievances they suffer.

[ART.] 33d. No magistrate, or court of law, shall demand excessive bail or sureties, impose excessive fines, or inflict cruel or unusual punishments.

[ART.] 34th. No person can, in any case, be subjected to law martial, or to any pains or penalties by virtue of that law, except those employed in the army or navy, and except the militia in actual service, but by authority of the legislature.

[ART.] 35th. [It is essential to the preservation of the rights of every individual, his life, liberty, property, and character, that there be an impartial interpretation of the laws, and administration of justice. It is the right of every citizen to be tried by judges as impartial as the lot of humanity will admit. It is therefore not only the best policy, but for the security of the rights of the people, that the judges of the supreme judicial court should hold their offices so long as they behave well; subject, however, to such limitations, on account of age, as may be provided by the constitution of the state; and that they should have honorable salaries, ascertained and established by standing laws.]†

[ART.] 36th. Economy being a most essential virtue in all states, especially in a young one; no pension shall be granted, but in consideration of actual services; and such pensions ought to be granted with great caution, by the legislature, and never for more than one year at a time.

[ART.] 37th. In the government of this state, the three essential powers thereof, to wit, the legislative, executive, and judicial, ought to be kept as separate from, and independent of, each other, as the nature of a free government will admit, or as is consistent with that chain of connection that binds the whole fabric of the constitution in one indissoluble bond of union and amity.

[ART.] 38th. A frequent recurrence to the fundamental principles of the constitution, and a constant adherence to justice, moderation, temperance, industry, frugality, and all the social virtues, are indispensably necessary to preserve the blessings of liberty and good government; the people ought, therefore, to have a particular regard to all those principles in the choice of their officers and representatives, and they have a right to require of their law-givers and magistrates, an exact and constant observance of them, in the formation and execution of the laws necessary for the good administration of government.

PART SECOND

FORM OF GOVERNMENT.

[ART. 1.]* The people inhabiting the territory formerly called the province of New Hampshire, do hereby solemnly and mutually agree with each other, to form themselves into a free, sovereign and independent body-politic, or state, by the name of THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

[ART. 2.] The supreme legislative power, within this state, shall be vested in the senate and house of representatives, each of which shall have a negative on the other.

[ART. 3.] The senate and house shall assemble [biennially],† on the first Wednesday of [Janu-

ary]* and at such other times as they may judge necessary; and shall dissolve and be dissolved, seven days next preceding the said first Wednesday of [January]* [biennially];† and shall be styled THE GENERAL COURT OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

[ART. 4.] The general court shall forever have full power and authority to erect and constitute judicatories and courts of record, or other courts, to be holden, in the name of the state, for the hearing, trying, and determining, all manner of crimes, offenses, pleas, processes, complaints, actions, causes, matters and things whatsoever, arising or happening within this state, or between or concerning persons inhabiting or residing, or brought, within the same, whether the same be criminal or civil, or whether the crimes be capital, or not capital, and whether the said pleas be real, personal, or mixed; and for the awarding and issuing execution thereon. To which courts and judicatories, are hereby given and granted, full power and authority, from time to time, to administer oaths or affirmations, for the better discovery of truth in any matter in controversy, or depending before them.

[ART. 5.] And further, full power and authority are hereby given and granted to the said general court, from time to time, to make, ordain, and establish, all manner of wholesome and reasonable orders, laws, statutes, ordinances, directions, and instructions, either with penalties, or without, so as the same be not repugnant or contrary to this constitution, as they may judge for the benefit and welfare of this state, and for the governing and ordering thereof, and of the subjects of the same, for the necessary support and defense of the government thereof; and to name and settle [biennially],‡ or

provide by fixed laws for the naming and settling, all civil officers within this state; such officers excepted, the election and appointment of whom are hereafter in this form of government otherwise provided for; and to set forth the several duties, powers, and limits, of the several civil and military officers of this state, and the forms of such oaths or affirmations as shall be respectively administered unto them, for the execution of their several offices and places, so as the same be not repugnant or contrary to this constitution; and also to impose fines, mulcts, imprisonments, and other punishments; and to impose and levy proportional and reasonable assessments, rates, and taxes, upon all the inhabitants of, and residents within, the said state; and upon all estates within the same; to be issued and disposed of by warrant, under the hand of the [governor]* of this state for the time being, with the advice and consent of the council, for the public service, in the necessary defense and support of the government of this state, and the protection and preservation of the subjects thereof, according to such acts as are, or shall be, in force within the same; [provided that the general court shall not authorize any town to loan or give its money or credit directly or indirectly for the benefit of any corporation having for its object a dividend of profits or in any way aid the same by taking its stock or bonds.]†

[ART. 6.] [The public charges of government, or any part thereof, may be raised by taxation upon polls, estates, and other classes of property, including franchises and property when passing by will or inheritance; and there shall be a valuation of the estates within the state taken anew once in every five years, at least, and as much oftener as the general court shall order.]‡

[ART. 7.] [No member of the general court shall take fees, be of counsel, or act as advocate, in any cause before either branch of the legislature; and upon due proof thereof, such member shall forfeit his seat in the legislature.]**

Legislature to sit with open doors.

[ART. 8.] [The doors of the galleries, of each house of the legislature, shall be kept open to all persons who behave decently, except when the welfare of the state, in the opinion of either branch, shall require secrecy.]**

[ART. 23 (24).] The journals of the proceedings, and all public acts of both houses, of the legislature, shall be printed and published immediately after every adjournment or prorogation; and upon motion made by any one member, the yeas and nays, upon any question, shall be entered, on the journal: And any member of the senate, or house of representatives, shall have a right, on motion made at the time for that purpose to have his protest, or dissent, with the reasons, against any vote, resolve, or bill passed, entered on the journal.

And every officer, impeached for bribery, corruption, malpractice or maladministration in office, shall be served with an attested copy of the impeachment, and order of senate thereon with such citation as the senate may direct, setting forth the time and place of their sitting to try the impeachment; which service shall be made by the sheriff, or such other sworn officer as the senate may appoint, at least fourteen days previous to the time of trial; and

such citation being duly served and returned, the senate may proceed in the hearing of the impeachment, giving the person impeached, if he shall appear, full liberty of producing witnesses and proofs, and of making his defense, by himself and counsel, and may also, upon his refusing or neglecting to appear hear the proofs in support of the impeachment, and render judgment thereon, his non-appearance notwithstanding; and such judgment shall have the same force and effect as if the person impeached had appeared and pleaded in the trial.

[ART. 38 (39).] Their judgment, however, shall not extend further than removal from office, disqualification to hold or enjoy any place of honor, trust, or profit, under this state; but the party so convicted, shall nevertheless be liable to indictment, trial, judgment, and punishment, according to the laws of the land.

And the qualifications of electors of the governor shall be the same as those for senators; and if no person shall have a [plurality]‡ of votes, the senate and house of representatives shall, by joint ballot elect one of the two persons having the highest number of votes, who shall be declared governor. And no person shall be eligible to this office, unless, at the time of his election, he shall have been an inhabitant of this state for seven years next preceding, and unless he shall be of the age of thirty years.‡

[ART. 42 (43).] In cases of disagreement between the two houses, with regard to the time or place of adjournment or prorogation, the governor, with advice of council, shall have a right to adjourn or prorogue the general court, not exceeding ninety days at any one time, as he may determine the public good may require, and he shall dissolve the same seven days before the said first Wednesday of [January].* And, in case of any infectious distemper prevailing in the place where the said court at any time is to convene, or any other cause, whereby dangers may arise to the health or lives of the members from their attendance, the governor may direct the session to be holden at some other the most convenient place within the state.

[ART. 43 (44).] Every bill which shall have passed both houses of the general court, shall, before it become a law, be presented to the governor, if he

approve, he shall sign it, but if not, he shall return it, with his objections, to that house in which it shall have originated, who shall enter the objections at large on their journal, and proceed to reconsider it; if after such reconsideration, two thirds of that house shall agree to pass the bill, it shall be sent, together with such objections, to the other house, by which it shall likewise be reconsidered, and, if approved by two thirds of that house, it shall become a law. But in all such cases the votes of both houses shall be determined by yeas and nays, and the names of the persons, voting for or against the bill, shall be entered on the journal of each house respectively. If any bill shall not be returned by the governor, within five days (Sundays excepted) after it shall have been presented to him, the same shall be a law in like manner as if he had signed it unless the legislature, by their adjournment, prevent its return, in which case it shall not be a law.

[ART. 44 (45).] Every resolve shall be presented to the governor, and before the same shall take effect, shall be approved by him, or being disapproved by him, shall be repassed by the senate and house of representatives, according to the rules and limitations prescribed in the case of a bill.

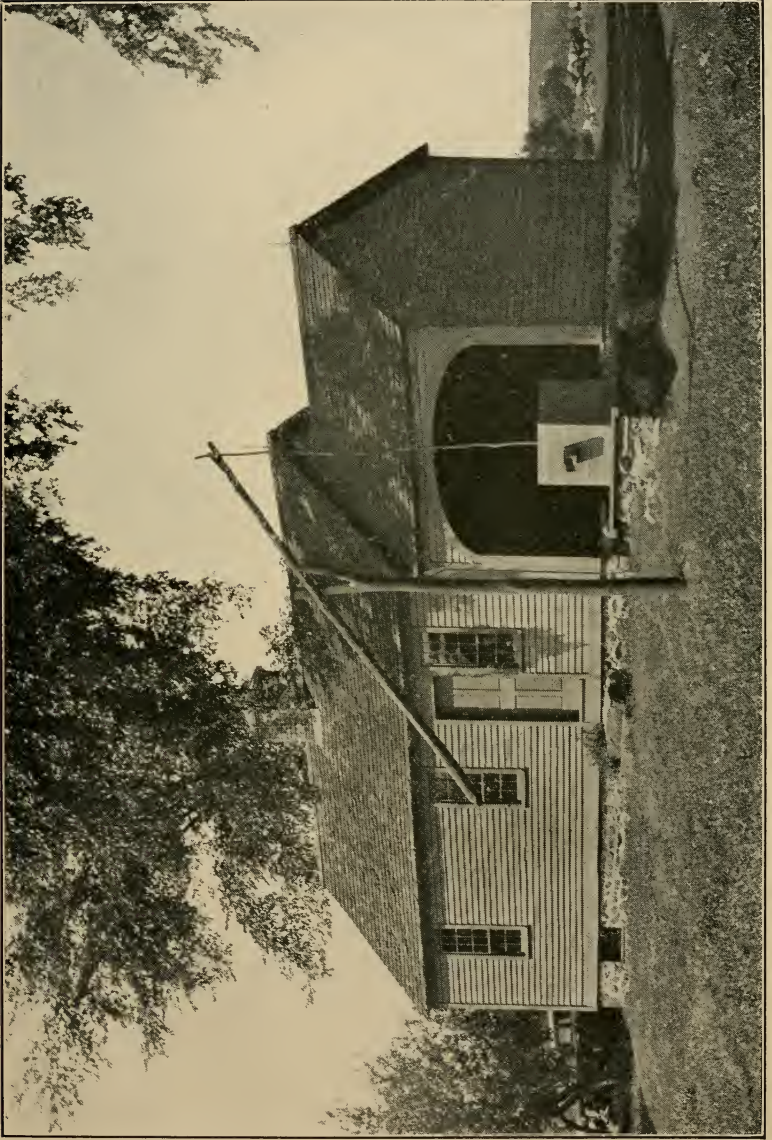

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two houses may desire, and to call it together sooner than the time to which it may be adjourned, or prorogued, if the welfare of the state should require the same.

[ART. 50 (51).] The governor of this state for the time being, shall be commander-in-chief of the army and navy, and all the military forces of the state, by sea and land; and shall have full power by himself, or by any chief commander, or other officer, or officers, from time to time, to train, instruct, exercise and govern the militia and navy; and for the special defense and safety of this state, to assemble in martial array, and put in warlike posture, the inhabitants thereof, and to lead and conduct them, and with them to encounter, repulse, repel, resist and pursue by force of arms, as well by sea as by land, within and without the limits of this state; and also to kill, slay, destroy, if necessary, and conquer by all fitting ways, enterprise and means, all and every such person and persons as shall, at any time hereafter, in a hostile manner, attempt or enterprise the destruction, invasion, detriment or annoyance of this state; and to use and exercise over the army and navy, and over the militia in actual service, the law martial in time of war, invasion, and also in rebellion, declared by the legislature to exist, as occasion shall necessarily require: And surprise, by all ways and means whatsoever, all and every such person or persons, with their ships, arms, ammunition, and other goods, as shall in a hostile manner invade, or attempt the invading, conquering or annoying this state; and in fine, the governor hereby is entrusted with all other powers incident to the office of captain-general and commander-in-chief, and admiral, to be exercised agreeably to the rules and regulations of the constitution, and the laws of the land; *provided*, that the governor shall not, at any time hereafter, by virtue of any power by this constitution granted, or hereafter to be granted to him by the legislature, transport any

of the inhabitants of this state, or oblige them to march out of the limits of the same, without their free and voluntary consent, or the consent of the general court, nor grant commissions for exercising the law martial in any case, without the advice and consent of the council.

[ART. 51 (52).] The power of pardoning offenses, except such as persons may be convicted of before the senate, by impeachment of the house, shall be in the governor, by and with the advice of council: But no charter or pardon, granted by the governor, with advice of council, before conviction, shall avail the party pleading the same, notwithstanding any general or particular expressions contained therein, descriptive of the offense or offenses intended to be pardoned.

being, by and with the advice and consent of the council, for the necessary support and defense of this state, and for the necessary protection and preservation of the inhabitants thereof, agreeably to the acts and resolves of the general court.

[ART. 56 (57).] All public boards, the commissary-general, all superintending officers of public magazines and stores belonging to this state, and all commanding officers of forts and garrisons within the same, shall, once, in every three months, officially, and without requisition, and at other times when required by the governor, deliver to him an account of all goods, stores, provisions, ammunition, cannon, with their appendages and all small arms, with their accoutrements, and of all other public property under their care respectively; distinguishing the quantity and kind of each, as particularly as may be; together with the condition of such forts and garrisons: And the commanding officer shall exhibit to the governor, when required by him true and exact plans of such forts, and of the land and sea, or harbor or harbors adjacent.

[ART. 57 (58).] The governor and council shall be compensated for their services, from time to time, by such grants as the general court shall think reasonable.

freeholders and other inhabitants in each county, qualified to vote for senators, shall some time in the month of [November],‡ give in their votes for one councilor; which votes shall be received, sorted, counted, certified, and returned to the secretary's office, in the same manner as the votes for senators, to be by the secretary laid before the senate and house of representatives on the first Wednesday of [January].§

JUDICIARY POWER.

[ART. 72 (73).] The tenure that all commissioned officers shall have by law in their offices shall be expressed in their respective commissions, all judicial officers duly appointed commissioned and sworn, shall hold their offices during good behavior excepting those concerning whom there is a different provision made in this constitution. *Provided nevertheless* the [governor]** with consent of council, may remove them upon the address of both houses of the legislature.

[ART. 73 (74).] Each branch of the legislature as well as the [governor]** and council shall have authority to require the opinions of the justices of the superior court upon important questions of law and upon solemn occasions.

ality, sincerity, sobriety, and all social affections, and generous sentiments, among the people: [*Provided, nevertheless*, that no money raised by taxation shall ever be granted or applied for the use of the schools or institutions of any religious sect or denomination.]* [Free and fair competition in the trades and industries is an inherent and essential right of the people and should be protected against all monopolies and conspiracies which tend to hinder or destroy it. The size and functions of all corporations should be so limited and regulated as to prohibit fictitious capitalization and provision should be made for the supervision and government thereof. Therefore, all just power possessed by the state is hereby granted to the general court to enact laws to prevent the operations within the state of all persons and associations, and all trusts and corporations, foreign or domestic, and the officers thereof, who endeavor to raise the price of any article of commerce or to destroy free and fair competition in the trades and industries through combination, conspiracy, monopoly, or any other unfair means; to control and regulate the acts of all such persons, associations, corporations, trusts, and officials doing business within the state; to prevent fictitious capitalization; and to authorize civil and criminal proceedings in respect to all the wrongs herein declared against.]**

The delegates to be chosen in the same manner, and proportioned, as the representatives to the general court; *provided* that no alterations shall be made in this constitution, before the same shall be laid before the towns and unincorporated places, and approved by two thirds of the qualified voters present and voting on the subject.

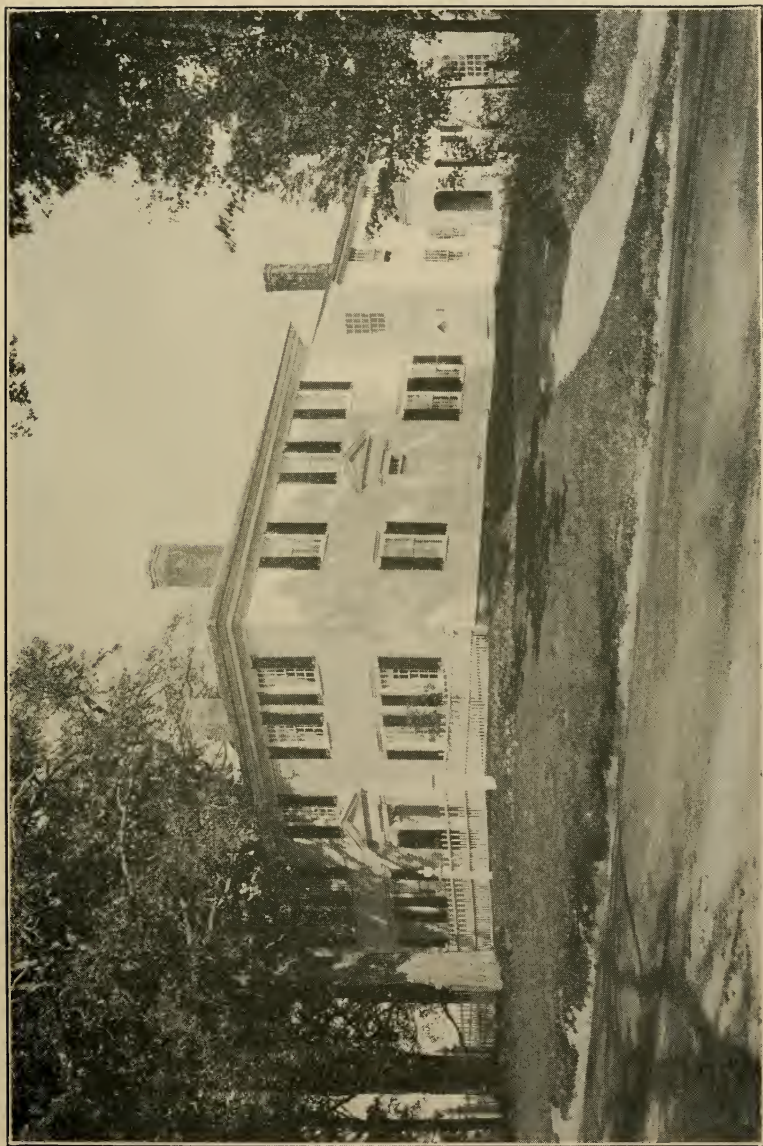

HISTORY OF THE CONSTITUTION

After the withdrawal of the royal governor, John Wentworth, in May, 1775, this province was governed, so far as there was any state government, by a convention, of which Matthew Thornton was president.

On the fifth day of January, 1776, a temporary constitution was adopted, which was the first written constitution adopted by any of the states now constituting the American Union. Under this constitution, Meshech Weare was unanimously elected president of the council and chairman of the committee of safety; and the state was prosperously governed for eight years.

In June, 1784, a new constitution, which had been approved by the people and established by the convention, October 31, 1783, took effect, and continued in force until 1793. In 1792, a new constitution was submitted to the people and adopted by them, and took effect in June, 1793. Most of its provisions were similar to those in the constitution of 1784, with several important amendments. This constitution remained unchanged until 1852.

The constitutional convention of 1850 proposed several important amendments, but they were all rejected by the people. At an adjourned meeting in 1851, the convention proposed three amendments, only one of which was adopted, the one removing the property qualification in the case of governor, senator, and representative. The governor, by his proclamation of September 16, 1852, gave notice that this amendment had been adopted.

In 1876, a new convention was called and holden, which proposed amendments changing the constitution in thirteen particulars, all of which, except two, were adopted by the people in March, 1877, as appeared by the proclamation of the governor of April 17, 1877. By legislative enactment, most of these amendments took effect on the first day of August, 1877, and the rest were to take effect at such times that the election in March, 1878, should be held under the old constitution, and the officers then elected should hold one year, till June, 1879, and that, in November, 1878, the first election should be held under the new constitution, and officers elected who should hold two years from June, 1879.

The constitutional convention of 1889 proposed seven amendments, five of which were adopted. The governor gave notice of their adoption by proclamation dated April 2, 1889.

The sense of the people on the question of holding a constitutional convention was taken in 1894 and again in 1896, in each instance with a negative result.

In 1900, a majority voted in favor of a convention, and the legislature called one to meet on the first Tuesday in December, 1902. This convention proposed ten amendments, four of which were adopted in March, 1903.

In 1910, the vote was in favor of a convention, which was called and held on the first Wednesday in June, 1912. It submitted twelve amendments, four of which were adopted in November, 1912.

In 1916, the vote was again for a convention. It was called to be held on the first Wednesday in June, 1918. After a session of three days, it adjourned, to reassemble at the call of a committee consisting of the president and one delegate from each county. It reassembled at the call of the committee on Tuesday, January 13, 1920. It proposed seven amendments, and adjourned to the call of the president. All the proposed amendments were rejected in November, 1920.

In January, 1921, the legislature appropriated funds for the expenses of the convention, and, on the call of the president, it met on Friday, January 28, 1921. It proposed four amendments, all of which were rejected in March, 1921.

In 1924, the vote was against calling a convention.

On November 6, 1928, a majority voted in favor of a convention which the legislature called to meet on Wednesday, June 4, 1930.

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT

Concord, November 14, 1930. .

Be it known, that I, Charles W. Tobey, Governor of the State of New Hampshire, in obedience to the request of the Constitutional Convention held in June, 1930, do hereby proclaim to the people of New Hampshire that the Constitution of the State is not amended, as proposed by said Convention, because none of the questions covering the amendments submitted to vote of the people at the biennial election, November 4, 1930, were approved by the necessary two-thirds vote.

Given under my hand and the Seal of the State, at the council chamber, this fourteenth day of November, 1930, and of the Independence of the United States of America, the one hundred and fifty-fifth.

Population of New Hampshire

NUMBER AND DISTRIBUTION OF INHABITANTS

Population of the State.—New Hampshire was one of the original thirteen States. Its population on April 1, 1930, according to the Fifteenth Census, was 465,293, which represents an increase of 22,210, or 5.0 per cent, as compared with the population on January 1, 1920. The total land area of the State, as shown in Table 3, is 9,031 square miles. The average number of inhabitants per square mile in 1930 was 51.5, as compared with 49.1 in 1920.

Table 1 shows the population of New Hampshire from 1790, the year of the first Federal census, to 1930, together with the increase in each decade.

Counties, cities, and minor civil divisions.—In the tables which follow (Tables 2 to 6) the population of New Hampshire is shown by counties, cities, and other minor civil divisions, with some comparative figures from previous censuses.

Cities of 10,000 or more.—There are nine cities in the state which had a population of 10,000 or more in 1930. Table 2 shows for these cities the population at each census for which figures are available, together with the increase during each decade. The figures shown for the earlier censuses represent, in many cases, the population of the town prior to its incorporation as a city. Manchester, the largest city, first attained a population of 10,000 between 1840 and 1850. Rochester is the only city added to this group following the census of 1920.

Minor civil divisions.—Table 4 shows the population of each county by towns, cities, and other minor civil divisions. The more thickly settled counties are divided into towns and cities, but in Carroll County there are 2 “locations” and in Coos County there are 8 “grants,” 6 “purchases,” 6 “townships,” and 3 “locations.” Of the civil divisions known as “grants” and “purchases,” 7 have had no population returned at any of the last three censuses and so are omitted from the list of minor civil divisions in Table 4.

NEW HAMPSHIRE STATE FLAG

The state flag was authorized by an act of the Legislature of 1909, New Hampshire prior to that never having had a state flag duly authorized and described by law.

The provisions of the act were that "the body or field of the flag shall be blue, and shall bear upon its center in suitable proportion and colors a representation of the state seal. The motto shall include the date 1784. Said seal shall be surrounded by a wreath of laurel leaves with nine stars interspersed. When used for military purposes said flag shall conform to the regulations of the United States."

In this act which was approved February 24, 1909, it was further provided:

"Said flag shall be displayed upon the State House whenever the legislature is in session, and during meetings of the Governor and Council when expedient, and upon such other occasions as the Governor may designate."

The inscription upon the field of blue, together with the wreath surrounding it, is laid on in gilt. A gold fringe surrounds the body of the flag, and either a yellow silk or gold cord is used to attach it to the staff.

NEW HAMPSHIRE STATE GOVERNMENT

The constitution divides the government into three branches. They are the executive branch, the legislative branch, and the judicial branch. The executive department consists of the governor and council, the secretary of state, the deputy secretary of state, the treasurer, the commissary-general and such other officers as the legislature has established. The legislative branch consists of a senate and house of representatives. The judicial branch consists of a system of courts established by the legislature. The military establishment is part of the executive branch and the governor is the commander-in-chief of the military establishment.

In addition to the several constitutional officers mentioned above, the legislature has, from time to time, arranged and organized new offices so that the government now includes the following departments:

In subsequent chapters will be given brief sketches of the histories of these departments in order given, together with a list of the men who have occupied the more important posts in the government from the time of earliest provincial days to the present.

THE GOVERNOR

The governor is the chief executive and his title is "His Excellency". Provincial governors were appointed by the king of England and they had various titles such as "president," "lieutenant-governor," "deputy-governor" and "governor". For the first eighty years governors frequently did not reside in the province.

When the revolution broke out the royal governor withdrew, in 1775, and the province was ruled by a revolutionary convention headed by a president. The next year a temporary constitution provided for a president of a council and chairman of a committee of safety to be the chief executive. The constitution of 1784 provided for a president to be elected by popular vote and in 1792 the title was changed to governor. By amendment to the constitution in 1912, the election of the governor was changed from the majority-vote system to the plurality-vote system. Previous to that the failure of a candidate to receive a majority vote threw the election into the legislature.

THE COUNCIL

Article 59 (60) of the second part of the constitution provides for an executive council of five men to advise and act with the governor. Before the constitution there was a council both under the temporary constitution of the Revolution and under the provincial government. Since amendment to the constitution, November, 1912, councilors have been elected by plurality vote to represent population but previously they were elected by majority vote to represent property, and in the colonial days they were appointed.

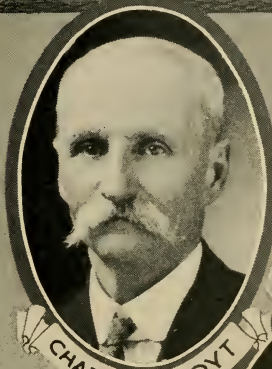

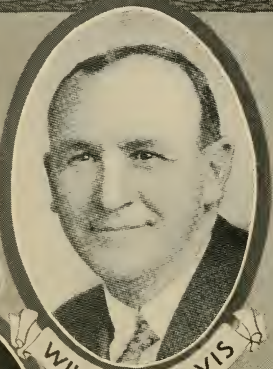

DEPARTMENT OF STATE

Articles 66 (67) and 69 (70) of the second part of the constitution, provide for a department of state with a secretary of state who is elected biennially by the legislature and a deputy secretary of state appointed by the secretary. In the colonial period there was a secretary appointed by the chief executive, but no deputy. During the revolutionary period and under the constitution of 1784 the secretary was chosen by the legislature and given authority to have several deputies, but in 1793 the constitution was changed to provide for a single deputy.

THE TREASURY

Article 66 (67) of the second part of the constitution provides for a treasurer who is elected biennially by the legislature. In the colonial period the treasurer was appointed by the chief executive and frequently the same man was secretary of the province and treasurer. In 1891 the legislature created the office of deputy treasurer.

THE MILITIA

The constitution vests all military authority in the governor, who is by virtue of his office commander-in-chief of the militia or national guard. He appoints an adjutant-general as his chief of staff and active head of the military establishment, and the office carries with it the rank of brigadier-general. THE SENATE

The senate began under the constitution and first met in 1784. There were at first twelve senators who represented the five counties that then existed, five senators from Rockingham county, two from Strafford, two from Hillsborough, two from Cheshire, and one from Grafton. In 1793 senatorial districts were created to take the place of county representation and each district elected one senator. The elections during the early years took place in March and the legislature met in June annually.

The senatorial districting of 1793 was changed in 1803 and several times subsequently. In 1878 the senate was doubled in size. Owing to the amendment to the constitution in November 1912, senators of 1915 were elected by plurality instead of majority vote. A list of the senators from the beginning, showing the name and residence of each member of each senate, arranged in the order of districts from 1793, when the districts were created, and previous to that year, in the order of counties, may be found in the Manuals of 1927 and 1929. 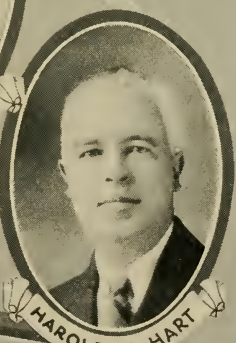

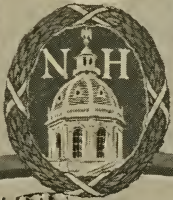

THE JUDICIARY

The constitution in article 4, part II, gives the legislature full authority to establish courts. There is a supreme court with a chief justice and four associate justices; a superior court with a chief justice and five associate justices; a probate court in each county, with a probate judge; and municipal courts in the cities and many of the towns.

Previous to the Revolution there was a superior court of judicature for the province, which sat from 1693 to 1776, eighty-three years. This was succeeded by the superior court of judicature, which sat from 1776 to 1813, thirty-seven years. The supreme judicial court took its place in 1813 and lasted three years, until 1816. Then the superior court of judicature was re-established and sat until 1855, thirty-nine years. This was succeeded in 1855 by the supreme judicial court, which lasted until 1874, nineteen years. Then the superior court of judicature was restored for two years, to be succeeded in 1876 by the supreme court, which since has been the highest court in the state.

The superior court was first known as the court of common pleas, which was established in 1813 with two circuits, eastern and western. In 1816 the circuits were abolished and two districts were established, and in 1820 these were merged into the court of sessions. In 1824 the court of common pleas was re-established to sit, until in 1833, after an existence of nine years, the court went out of existence. In 1842 the circuit court was re-established without any circuits or districts, and it sat for seven years, until 1849, when it was abolished. In 1851 it was again re-established and was reorganized in 1855 and abolished in 1859. It was once more re-established in 1874 and lasted two years. In 1901, after a lapse of twenty-five years, a secondary court was established under the name of superior court, which since has been maintained.

All judges under the constitution are appointed by the governor and council to hold office until they are seventy years of age. The following is a list of the chief justices of the supreme court under its various names and organizations from the beginning, with the residence and term of service of each chief justice:

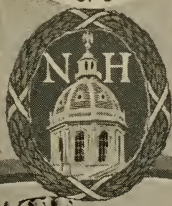

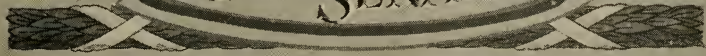

BANK COMMISSIONERS

The first act relating to the bank commissioners was passed in 1837. It provided for the appointment of three commissioners for a term of one year each. Prior to 1837, such examination of the banks of the state as was made, was performed by committees of the legislature. As early as 1814, the banks were required to make returns of their condition to the governor and council, who submitted the same to the legislature.

The work of these legislative committees and of the bank commissioners was confined to banks of issue and discount until 1841, when the commissioners were directed by the legislature to make examinations of the savings banks of the state. There were, however, only eight savings banks at that time, and their total deposits were less than one million dollars.

The terms of the commissioners continued to be of one year each until 1881, when the number was reduced from three to two and the terms made two years each. In 1889, the law was amended and a board of three commissioners was created with terms of three years each, the terms being so arranged that one expired each year. The board of commissioners was abolished in 1913 and one commissioner and a deputy provided by the legislature. In 1915, a board of three commissioners was restored, with one commissioner designated as chairman; and the terms were extended to six years, with one expiring every two years. The legislature, in 1925, again abolished the commission and established the offices of

bank commissioner and deputy bank commissioner, each with a term of six years, and authorized the commissioner to employ two examiners and two accountants, in addition to the clerical force of the office.

Until 1881 the commissioners were paid for their examinations by the banks at the rate, at first, of two dollars per day and ten cents a mile for travel. Subsequently the per diem was increased to three dollars, and in 1885 to five dollars. Salaries were first established in 1889. 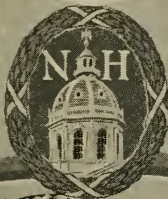

STATE SENATE

PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION

The public service commission was formerly known as the railroad commission, and was created by the legislature in 1844. Previous to that there had been a regulation of railroads by the state and as early as 1838 a law was passed authorizing the governor and council to appoint three commissioners in each county. The first state commission, however, was named in 1844, and in 1855 election by popular vote was substituted for appointment. In 1883 election was abolished and appointment restored. In 1911 the name was changed to public service commission and the powers and duties of the board enlarged. Previous to 1911 commissioners were appointed or elected one at a time for three-year terms, but since that year the term has been six years. Special commissioners have served from time to time, but were not regarded as members of the state board and are not listed below in the following list of commissioners from the beginning, with the residence of each and term served:

DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH

The state board of health was established by the legislature in 1881. The personnel consists of the governor and attorney-general, by virtue of their offices, a civil engineer, and three physicians. The active head of the department is the secretary, who is chosen by the board, and he is registrar of vital statistics, with authority to enforce the registration laws.

In 1889 a law was enacted making the board of health a board of commissioners of lunacy, and in 1899 the board was constituted a board of examiners of embalmers. In 1901 the laboratory of hygiene was established, under the authority and management of the board of health.

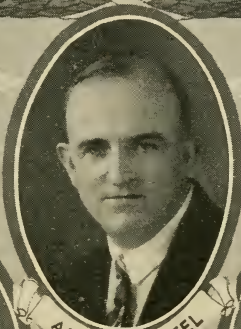

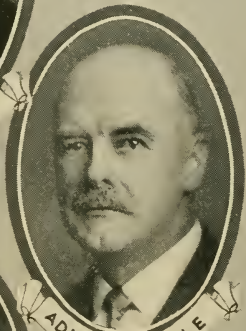

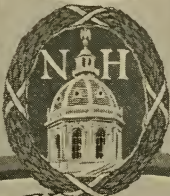

The office of secretary of the commission was created, one of the commissioners being salaried secretary and active head of the department. The governor was a commissioner by virtue of his office. In 1909 the department was reorganized and reduced to three in number, who are appointed by the governor and council, one each year for a term of three years. The governor is not a commissioner, and instead of an active secretary the commission appoints a forester, who serves at the pleasure of the commission. BUREAU OF LABOR

The bureau of labor was created by the legislature in 1893 and the labor commissioner is its head. It was reorganized in 1911 and a board of conciliation and arbitration created in 1913 to work with the bureau. DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WELFARE

The department of charities and correction was created by the legislature of 1895, which provided for a board of five members to be appointed, one annually, by the governor and council. BOARD OF REGISTRATION IN MEDICINE

DEPARTMENT OF INSTITUTIONS

The department of institutions was created in 1913 and was governed by a board of control. It was reorganized in 1915, and included the government of five institutions, the state hospital, the school for feeble-minded children, the industrial school, the state sanatorium for consumptives and the state prison. Ten trustees were appointed by the governor and council. They employed a purchasing agent who did the buying for all the state departments and such institutions as requested the privilege. In 1917 there was created a board of trustees of state institutions for the management of the above institutions, which consisted of five members appointed by the governor and council for five-year terms.

In 1919 the law was again amended placing the ultimate authority over, and supervision of, the institutions and departments, in the governor and council who were authorized to appoint seven trustees for each institution consisting of five appointed members for five-year terms and two *ex-officio* members. The purchasing agent was appointed by the trustees until 1919 when the governor and council were authorized to appoint one for a three-year term.

NEW HAMPSHIRE STATE HOSPITAL

The first legislative act to provide personal care for the insane was passed in 1822, providing that any insane person who had committed a crime and was not guilty by reason of insanity, and who would be dangerous to be at large, should be committed by court to prison until restored or discharged by due process of law. Soon after this, agitation throughout the state developed for some better method of care and treatment of the insane. Newspapers enlisted in the cause. In 1836 the legislature passed an act requesting the governor to issue a precept to the selectmen of the towns "to take the sense of the qualified voters on the following question: Is it expedient for the state to grant an appropriation to build an insane hospital?" So successful was this appeal that not only were private funds raised, but in 1838 an act of incorporation was passed, entitled, "An Act to incorporate 'The New Hampshire Asylum for the Insane.'"

The management of the institution was at first semi-private and public, and was vested in a board of trustees, represented in part by the donors and in part by appointees selected by the governor and council, under an act of the legislature of 1839. In the following year, 1840, the legislature repealed the act providing for mutual representation of the donors and the state on the board of trustees, and providing that all trustees should be appointed by the state. With this act of legislation of 1840 the erection of an asylum for the insane was assured, and the trustees, with the assistance of state and private aid, began the erection of an institution at Concord, which was opened in 1843.

The early construction of the hospital was after the plan of the solid or block type of building. In the case of the asylum there was an administration center, with wings extending from either side. Additional wings have from time to time been added to the original unit, as the exigencies demanded. Modern construction calls for the erection of detached groups of buildings, and in 1882 the first detached building was erected for the care of convalescent, appreciative and intelligent women patients, and is known as the Bancroft building.

LACONIA STATE SCHOOL

The school for feeble-minded was created by the legislature in 1901. Previous to that the feeble-minded children were supported by the state at the Massachusetts School for Feeble-Minded at Waverly, Mass. The New Hampshire school was established at Laconia, and its government vested in a board of trustees, consisting of the governor and five others appointed by the governor and council. In 1913 the trustees were abolished and the institution placed under the board of control. In 1915 this board was abolished and the institution placed under the trustees of state institutions and two members, Rev. John J. Brophy of Concord and William H. Moses of Tilton, were designated to look after this institution especially, until the law was changed in 1917.

The school is situated on the slope of a ridge, two miles from the railroad and the city. It is bounded by the Belknap county farm on the south, Lake Opechee on the east and Lake Winnisquam on the west. The school was opened in 1903, and the following year its only brick dormitory was burned. The school was rapidly rebuilt and has expanded since then.

While the school has grown steadily by new construction and the acquirement of land, the social, ethical and educational side shows equal development. Suitable social amusement and entertainment, with varied healthful occupations, such as approved by Seguin, Montessori and Dr. Fernald, are provided. The children are taught folk and other dancing, games, drills, music, basketry, knitting, weaving and the usual mental school work as far as each one is able to progress. Manual training, cobbling and the domestic sciences are also taken up. As all the vegetables, as well as the milk, for the entire school are raised on the grounds, the boys are given valuable instruction in gardening, farming and the care of the stock. The legislature of 1925 changed the name of the institution from "School for Feeble-Minded" to "Laconia State School."

The age of admission, by application and physician's certificate, is from three to twenty-one years, but women up to the age of forty-five may be committed by probate court.

INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL

The industrial school at Manchester was established by the legislature in 1855 and opened in 1858. Its original name was the house of reformation for juvenile and female offenders and was conducted along the lines of a penal institution. It was situated on part of the homestead of General John Stark of the Revolutionary army. In 1881 the name was changed to the industrial school and the policy of its management was changed from that of a penal to that of an educational reformatory. During the last ten years the cottage system of housing the inmates has been carried out, and the present value of the property is over \$250,000.

The management of the institution was at first vested in a board of trustees appointed by the governor and council. In 1913 the trustees were succeeded by the board of control, and this board was in turn succeeded in 1915 by the trustees of state institutions.

NEW HAMPSHIRE STATE SANATORIUM

The sanatorium for consumptives, officially known as the New Hampshire state sanatorium, is at Glencliff, on the southern slope of Mount Moosilauke in the White Mountains. It was established by the legislature in 1907 and opened in 1909. Its establishment resulted from the recommendation of a commission which was authorized by the legislature in 1901 and which consisted of Dr. Ezra Mitchell of Lancaster, Dr. Nathaniel G. Brooks of Charlestown and Dr. Irving A. Watson of Concord, secretary of the state board of health.

The commission made its report and recommendation in 1902, and five years later the legislature established the sanatorium. It is 1,650 feet above the sea and it enjoys an average of 170 perfectly clear days every year. In 1909 the two wards, one for men and one for women, were opened; in 1912 they were enlarged and a service building was added; and in 1913 and 1914 a barn, piggery, refrigerating plant, coal pocket and shack were added.

The sanatorium has a capacity of over one hundred patients now and there are 411 acres of land. The value of the property is over \$350,000, and its management is vested in the board of trustees. The following is a list of the superintendents of the sanatorium from the beginning, with the name of the place from which each came to Glencliff, and the term served.

The old prison was built in 1812 and the present prison in 1880, and is governed by a warden appointed by the trustees of institutions. From 1913 to 1915 the prison was under the board of control, which was abolished. UNIVERSITY OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

New Hampshire college was founded in 1866 and is known as New Hampshire College of Agriculture and the Mechanic Arts. It was situated at Hanover and connected with Dartmouth college, both having the same president, for twenty-six years. The legislature of 1885 took steps to move the college, on the ground that it had graduated "less than forty agricultural students" in twenty years. In 1892 the college was removed to Durham.

Government of the college is vested in a board of trustees, consisting since 1929 of the governor, the commissioner of

agriculture, the president of the college, two members elected by the alumni and eight appointed by the governor and council, making thirteen in all. The eight appointive members who may be men or women must represent both major political parties, and two of them must be farmers. The term of office is now four years.

STATE LIBRARY

The library was established in 1823, when all the books that had been accumulating for years in the state house were deposited in the department of state, and for forty-two years the secretary of state was librarian also. In 1865 the legislature officially established the library as a separate institution, and a board of library trustees was created the following year. It consisted of three men, one appointed each year by the governor and council for a term of three years. The board appoints a librarian, who serves at the pleasure of the trustees and is the active head of the library. In 1891 the legislature created a library commission, consisting of the librarian and four others, and the commission was consolidated with the trustees in 1901. In 1913 a legislative reference bureau was created by the legislature and is a part of the library. The

board was reorganized in 1917, and now consists of three trustees appointed by the governor and council, each for the term of six years.

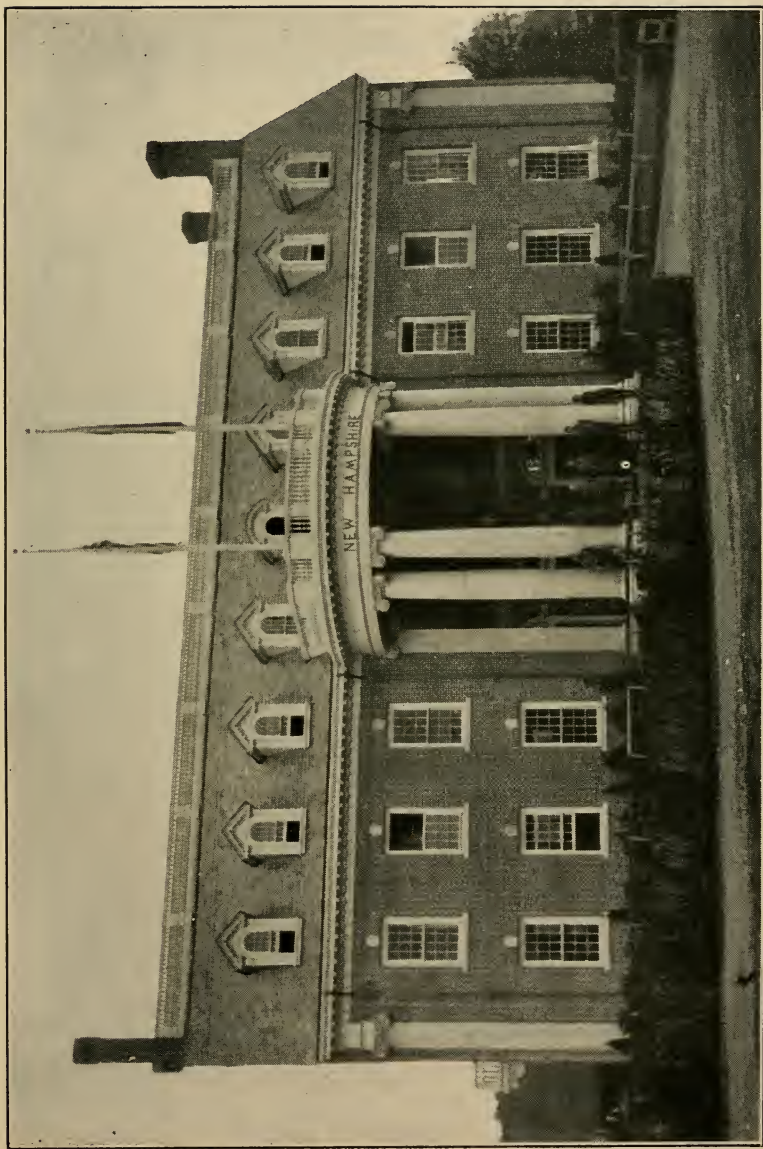

One of the first senators, John Langdon, was chosen president pro tempore of the first national senate in 1789 and presided over that body until Vice-President John Adams qualified as president of the senate by virtue of his office as vice-president. Senator Langdon was again elected president in the second senate in 1792-3. Senator Samuel Livermore was elected president of the fourth senate in 1795-6 and of the sixth senate in 1799-1800. Senator Daniel Clark was elected

The census of 1870 reduced it to two, but the seat taken away was restored until the next census of 1880, since which time the state has had two representatives.

RECOUNTS AFTER THE PRIMARY

After the primary election eight recounts were conducted by the secretary of state, three being in Democratic contests, and five in Republican contests.

In the Democratic gubernatorial contest, the return gave Frederic E. Small of Rochester 4,657 votes, and Albert W. Noone of Peterborough 4,472 votes. A failure to return the votes cast for Mr. Noone and an incorrect return for Mr. Small, from one ward, when corrected gave Albert W. Noone 4,731 votes and Frederic E. Small 4,537 votes. Additional returns brought the total for Mr. Noone to 4,844 and for Mr. Small to 4,685 (pages 179, 195), but the recount gave Albert W. Noone 4,789 votes and Frederic E. Small 4,680 votes.

In the seventh ward of Manchester the returns for Democratic representatives gave James Vincent Broderick, 283 votes, Michael J. Cady 233, Edward J. Doherty 200, John A. Foley 535, Emile D. Guertin 140, Jeremiah B. Healy 465, John J. Horan 343, Patrick McQueeney 222, Lawrence A. O'Connor 74, Thomas B. O'Malley 304, Patrick J. Ryan 449, Dennis Sullivan 208. The recount gave James Vincent Broderick 284 votes, Michael J. Cady 250, Edward J. Doherty 218, John A. Foley 455, Emile D. Guertin 189, Jeremiah B. Healy 375, John J. Horan 319, Patrick McQueeney 302, Lawrence A. O'Connor 125, Thomas B. O'Malley 306, Patrick J. Ryan 344, and Dennis Sullivan 268. The change in the results gave the nominations to John A. Foley, Jeremiah B. Healy, John J. Horan, Patrick McQueeney, Thomas B. O'Malley and Patrick J. Ryan.

In the second ward of Dover, returns were not given for Democratic representatives and supervisor. On a petition for recount, which was granted, votes were counted giving nominations for Democratic representatives to George M. Randall and Bernard J. Martin. William Gouin and Albert Marcotte were tied for nomination. Albert Marcotte withdrew, leaving William Gouin the third Democratic nominee for representative to the general court. The recount also established Archie T. Jewell as Democratic nominee for supervisor.

Republican Contests

In Coos county, for county solicitor, the return gave Robert Rich of Berlin 1,713 votes and Frank P. Blais 1,709. The recount gave Mr. Rich 1,705 votes and Mr. Blais 1,701 votes, and there was no change in the nomination.

In the eighth senatorial district the returns gave James W. Davidson of Charlestown 866 votes, William Hall of Langdon 467 votes, Ernest A. Robinson of Newport 898 votes. The recount gave Mr. Davidson 885 votes, Mr. Hall 469, and Mr.

Robinson 898 votes, and there was no change in the nomination.

In the sixteenth senatorial district the returns gave Joel S. Daniels, Sr., of Manchester 841 votes, Dana A. Emery of Manchester 896, George Allen Putnam of Manchester 696 votes. Johnson 390, Alphonse E. Michaud 457, William K. Robbins 455, Carl O. Seaman 338, Ann Story 487, John W. Todd 385 votes. The recount gave Mr. Bartlett 519 votes, Mr. Dolloff 452, Mr. Hammond 458, Mr. Hopkins 548, Mr. Johnson 393, Mr. Michaud 431, Mr. Robbins 474, Mr. Seaman 342, Miss Story 509, Mr. Todd 343. The change in the results gave the nominations to Oscar F. Bartlett, Charles E. Hammond, George I. Hopkins, William K. Robbins and Ann Story.

In the sixth ward of Concord the return for representatives gave Arthur E. Bean 666 votes, Ernest S. Brooks 582, Edward C. Dutton 534, George H. Nash 560, Arthur F. Sturtevant 476 votes. The recount gave Mr. Bean 681 votes, Mr. Brooks 590, Mr. Dutton 539, Mr. Nash 572, Mr. Sturtevant 582. The change in the results gave the nominations to Mr. Bean, Mr. Brooks, Mr. Nash and Mr. Sturtevant.

DEMOCRATIC ORGANIZATION, 1930

The Democratic state convention met at Concord, Tuesday, September 23, 1930, with F. Clyde Keefe of Dover as president, and adopted the following:

PLATFORM OF STATE DEMOCRATS

Natural Resources

We believe in the preservation of the rights of the public in all of our natural resources, including water powers.

We believe also in the strict supervision of the cost to the consumer of power developed by these water powers, whether to the householder, the merchant or the manufacturer, with sufficient authority in the Public Service Commission and the appropriation of adequate funds to carry out these purposes.

Income Tax

We favor the amendment to the constitution giving to the general court power to exempt from any income tax so much income as they deem just provided that no tax upon income shall be assessed at a rate greater than the average rate of taxation.

House of Representatives

We believe in and declare for the election of members of the House of Representatives upon the present basis of representation.

Railroads

We condemn the policy of the Boston & Maine Railroad which has resulted in curtailment and loss of service to the serious damage of many of the communities of our State. We also condemn the attempt of said railroad, in violation of the law of the State, to remove their railroad shops from the State, and we pledge the Democratic party to the enactment of a law that will provide the necessary funds to present these matters to the proper tribunals to the end that the State be not further handicapped and also to the end that the Boston & Maine Railroad shall be made to obey the law of the State.

Unemployment

We deplore the lack of prosperity and the widespread unemployment throughout the nation under the present Republican administration, and call attention to its failure to bring about improvement.

Savings Banks

We demand more efficient supervision of Savings Banks and a careful scrutiny of the laws relating to savings banks investments.

Labor

We believe that the establishment of the forty-eight hour week for women and children in manufacturing plants is necessary for their welfare.

Old Age Pensions

We favor the adoption of a constitutional amendment which will permit the legislature to enact a law providing for old age pensions.

Agriculture

We favor adequate financial support for the Department of Agriculture in all its activities, including its allied agricultural associations, and the Agricultural Extension service.

Highways

We favor further amendment to Chapter 110, Laws of 1925, in order that more towns may be helped in the maintenance of their class five roads.

University of New Hampshire

We look with disfavor upon any attempt to impair the policy of the State, enacted into law by the Legislature of 1925, for the support and maintenance of the University of New Hampshire, which provides a higher education at moderate expense for the young people of our State.

Law Enforcement

The Democratic party is unalterably opposed to the return of the saloon.

Believing, however, that the Eighteenth Amendment and enforcement laws after more than ten years of trial have proved ineffectual in promoting temperance throughout the Nation, and believing the time has come to make a change in the law in the interest of true temperance, good government and respect for all law, we, the Democracy of the State of New Hampshire, in Convention assembled, declare we are in favor of submitting to the legislatures of the several states an amendment to the Constitution of the United States which if adopted

will permit the people of each state to vote in a referendum in their state as to whether the sale of alcoholic beverages in such state shall be permitted, such sale to be solely under the supervision of the Government of the United States, and with a provision in such amendment that each state voting against permitting the sale of alcoholic beverages within its borders shall be protected in that decision by the full power of the Federal Government, to the end that the will of the people of such state shall be made effective and to the end also that the open saloon shall be forever prohibited in every part of the United States.

In General

If placed in power we promise the people of New Hampshire to conduct the affairs of the State wisely, economically and efficiently, as we have in the past, neglecting no necessary public enterprise for the welfare of the State and its citizens in matters of education, transportation, taxation, highways, agriculture, state publicity and the care of the unfortunate.
