The Declaration of Independence is generally regarded as one of the most famous documents in the history of the world. On June 10, 1776, the Continental Congress appointed a committee, consisting of Thomas Jefferson, Benjamin Franklin, John Adams, Roger Sherman and Robert R. Livingston to draft a Declaration of Independence.

Jefferson wrote out a rough draft of the Declaration, which was carefully revised by the committee and presented to Congress for adoption. After some further slight revisions by that body, it was adopted on July 4, 1776, at Philadelphia.

The parchment with the original signatures was deposited with the Department of State when the government was organized in 1789.

The original Declaration of Independence is now on public exhibition in the Library of Congress at Washington, D. C. It was transferred from the Department of State by direction of the late President Warren G. Harding.

# THE DECLARATION OF INDEPENDENCE

---

MADE BY THE ORIGINAL THIRTEEN STATES  
IN CONGRESS AT PHILADELPHIA

---

UNANIMOUSLY ADOPTED JULY 4, 1776

---

When, in the course of human events, it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another, and to assume, among the powers of the earth, the separate and equal station to which the laws of nature and of nature's God entitle them, a decent respect to the opinions of mankind requires that they should declare the causes which impel them to the separation.

We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed, by their Creator, with certain unalienable rights, that among these are life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness. That to secure these rights, governments are instituted among men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed, that whenever any form of government becomes destructive of these ends, it is the right of the people to alter or to abolish it, and institute new government, laying its foundation on such principles, and organizing its powers in such form as to them shall seem most likely to effect their safety and happiness. Prudence, indeed, will dictate that governments long established, should not be changed for light and transient causes; and accordingly all experience hath shown that mankind are more disposed to suffer, while evils are sufferable, than to right themselves by abolishing the forms to which they are accustomed. But when a long train of abuses and usurpations, pursuing invariably the same object, evinces a design to reduce them under absolute despotism, it is their right, it is their duty, to throw off such government, and to provide new guards for their future security. Such has been the patient sufferance of these Colonies, and such is now the necessity which constrains them

to alter their former systems of government. The history of the present King of Great Britain is a history of repeated injuries and usurpations, all having in direct object the establishment of an absolute tyranny over these States. To prove this, let facts be submitted to a candid world.

He has refused his assent to laws, the most wholesome and necessary for the public good.

He has forbidden his governors to pass laws of immediate and pressing importance, unless suspended in their operation till his assent should be obtained; and when so suspended, he has utterly neglected to attend to them.

He has refused to pass other laws for the accommodation of large districts of people, unless those people would relinquish the right of representation in the legislature, a right inestimable to them, and formidable to tyrants only.

He has called together legislative bodies at places unusual, uncomfortable, and distant from the depository of their public records, for the sole purpose of fatiguing them into compliance with his measures.

He has dissolved representative houses repeatedly, for opposing with manly firmness his invasions on the rights of the people.

He has refused for a long time, after such dissolutions, to cause others to be elected, whereby the legislative powers, incapable of annihilation, have returned to the people at large for their exercise; the State remaining, in the meantime, exposed to all the dangers of invasion from without, and convulsions within.

He has endeavored to prevent the population of these States; for that purpose obstructing the laws for naturalization of foreigners; refusing to pass others to encourage their migrations hither, and raising the conditions of new appropriations of lands.

He has obstructed the administration of justice by refusing his assent to laws for establishing judiciary powers.

He has made judges dependent on his will alone, for the tenure of their offices, and the amount and payment of their salaries.

He has erected a multitude of new offices, and sent hither swarms of officers to harass our people, and eat out their substance.

He has kept among us, in times of peace, standing armies, without the consent of our legislatures.

He has affected to render the military independent of and superior to the civil power.

He has combined with others to subject us to a jurisdiction foreign to our constitution and unacknowledged by our laws; giving his assent to their acts of pretended legislation:

For quartering large bodies of armed troops among us:

For protecting them, by a mock trial, from punishment for any murders which they should commit on the inhabitants of these States:

For cutting off our trade with all parts of the world:

For imposing taxes on us without our consent:

For depriving us, in many cases, of the benefits of trial by jury:

For transporting us beyond seas to be tried for pretended offenses:

For abolishing the free system of English laws in a neighboring province, establishing therein an arbitrary government, and enlarging its boundaries, so as to render it at once an example and fit instrument for introducing the same absolute rule into these colonies:

For taking away our charters, abolishing our most valuable laws, and altering fundamentally the forms of our governments:

For suspending our own legislatures, and declaring themselves invested with power to legislate for us in all cases whatsoever.

He has abdicated government here, by declaring us out of his protection, and waging war against us.

He has plundered our seas, ravaged our coasts, burnt our towns, and destroyed the lives of our people.

He is, at this time, transporting large armies of foreign mercenaries to complete the works of death, desolation, and tyranny, already begun, with circumstances of cruelty and perfidy, scarcely paralleled in the most barbarous ages, and totally unworthy the head of a civilized nation.

He has constrained our fellow citizens, taken captive on the high seas, to bear arms against their country, to become the executioners of their friends and brethren, or to fall themselves by their hands.

He has excited domestic insurrections amongst us, and has endeavored to bring on the inhabitants of our frontiers, the merciless Indian savages, whose known rule of warfare is an undistinguished destruction of all ages, sexes, and conditions.

In every stage of these oppressions we have petitioned for redress in the most humble terms: our repeated petitions have been answered only by repeated injury. A prince whose character is thus marked by every act which may define a tyrant, is unfit to be the ruler of a free people.

Nor have we been wanting in attentions to our British brethren. We have warned them, from time to time, of attempts by their legislature to extend an unwarrantable jurisdiction over us. We have reminded them of the circumstances of our emigration and settlement here. We have appealed to their native justice and magnanimity, and we have conjured them by the ties of our common kindred to disavow these usurpations, which would inevitably interrupt our connections and correspondence. They too have been deaf to the voice of justice and of consanguinity. We must, therefore, acquiesce in the necessity which denounces our separation, and hold them, as we hold the rest of mankind, enemies in war, in peace friends.

We, therefore, the Representatives of the United States of America, in General Congress assembled, appealing to the Supreme Judge of the world for the rectitude of our intentions, do in the name, and by authority of the good people of these Colonies, solemnly publish and declare, That these United Colonies, are, and of right ought to be, *free and independent States*; that they are absolved from all allegiance to the British crown, and that all political connexion between them and the State of Great Britain, is, and ought to be, totally dissolved; and that as *free and independent States*, they have full power to levy war, conclude peace, contract alliances, establish commerce, and to do all other acts and things which *independent States* may of right do. And for the support of this declaration,

with a firm reliance on the protection of Divine Providence, we mutually pledge to each other our lives, our fortunes, and our sacred honour.

The United States Constitution is the oldest federal constitution in existence. It was so well framed that it has served as the basis for this government for a century and a half. Only once has it been seriously endangered, this being during the Civil War. Many of its principles have been adopted by other countries.

The Constitution was the outgrowth of a convention of delegates from the different states that met in Philadelphia in May, 1787, Rhode Island not being represented. George Washington presided over the convention, which lasted from May to September.

The Constitution was then submitted to the then existing states for ratification, with a provision that it should become effective when ratified by nine states. New Hampshire was the ninth state to ratify, June 21, 1788, and the Constitution went into effect in 1789.

The states ratified the Constitution in the following order: Delaware, Dec. 7; Pennsylvania, Dec. 12, and New Jersey, Dec. 18, 1787; Georgia, Jan. 2; Connecticut, Jan. 9; Massachusetts, Feb. 6; Maryland, Apr. 28; South Carolina, May 23; New Hampshire, June 21; Virginia, June 26, and New York, July 26, 1788; North Carolina, Nov. 21, 1789, and Rhode Island, May 29, 1790.

**CONSTITUTION**  
**OF THE**  
**UNITED STATES OF AMERICA.**

The Constitution originally consisted of a Preamble and seven Articles, and in that form was completed and signed at a convention of the States, Sept. 17, 1787. The Government under the Constitution was declared in effect on the first Wednesday in March, 1789.

---

**ARTICLE I.**

**SECTION 1.** Legislative powers; in whom vested.

**SEC. 2.** House of Representatives, how and by whom chosen — Qualifications of a Representative — Representatives and direct taxes, how apportioned — Enumeration — Vacancies to be filled — Power of choosing officers, and of impeachment.

**SEC. 3.** Senators, how and by whom chosen — How classified — State Executive, when to make temporary appointments, in case, etc. — Qualifications of a Senator — President of the Senate, his right to vote — President pro tem, and other officers of the Senate, how chosen — Power to try impeachments — When President is tried, Chief Justice to preside — Sentence.

**SEC. 4.** Times, etc., of holding elections, how prescribed — At least one Session in each year.

**SEC. 5.** Membership — Quorum — Adjournments — Rules — Power to punish or expel — Journal — Time of adjournments, how limited, etc.

**SEC. 6.** Compensation — Privileges — Disqualification in certain cases.

**SEC. 7.** House to originate all revenue bills — Veto — Bill may be passed by two thirds of each house, notwithstanding, etc. — Bill, not returned in ten days, to become a law — Provisions as to orders, concurrent resolutions, etc.

**SEC. 8.** Powers of Congress.

**SEC. 9.** Provision as to migration or importation of certain persons — Habeas Corpus — Bills of attainder, etc. — Taxes, how apportioned — No export duty — No commercial preference — Money, how drawn from treasury, etc. — No titular nobility — Officers not to receive presents, etc.

**SEC. 10.** States prohibited from the exercise of certain powers.

**ARTICLE II.**

**SECTION 1.** President; his term of office — Electors of President; number and how appointed — Electors to vote on same day — Qualification of President — On whom his duties devolve in case of his removal, death, etc. — President's compensation — His oath of office.

**SEC. 3.** President shall communicate to Congress — He may convene and adjourn Congress, in case of disagreement, etc. — Shall receive ambassadors, execute laws, and commission officers.

**SEC. 4.** All civil offices forfeited for certain crimes.

THE CONSTITUTION.

---

**Preamble.**—WE THE PEOPLE of the United States, in Order to form a more perfect Union, establish Justice, insure domestic Tranquility, provide for the common defence, promote the general Welfare, and secure the Blessings of Liberty to ourselves and our Posterity, do ordain and establish this Constitution for the United States of America.

## ARTICLE I.

## SECTION 1.

**Legislative powers vested in Congress.**—All legislative Powers herein granted shall be vested in a Congress of the United States, which shall consist of a Senate and House of Representatives.

## SECTION 2.

**Composition of the House of Representatives.**—1. The House of Representatives shall be composed of Members chosen every second Year by the People of the several States, and the Electors in each State shall have the Qualifications requisite for Electors of the most numerous Branch of the State Legislature.

**Qualifications of Representatives.**—2. No Person shall be a Representative who shall not have attained to the Age of twenty-five Years, and been seven Years a Citizen of the United States, and who shall not, when elected, be an Inhabitant of that State in which he shall be chosen.

**Apportionment of Representatives and direct taxes—census.**—\*3. [Representatives and direct Taxes shall be apportioned among the several States which may be included within this Union, according to their respective Numbers, which shall be determined by adding to the whole Number of free Persons, including those bound to Service for a Term of Years, and excluding Indians not taxed, three fifths of all other persons.] The actual Enumeration shall be made within three Years after the first Meeting of the Congress of the United States, and within every subsequent Term of ten Years, in such Man-

ner as they shall by Law direct. The Number of Representatives shall not exceed one for every thirty thousand, but each State shall have at Least one Representative; and until such enumeration shall be made, the State of New Hampshire shall be entitled to chuse three, Massachusetts eight, Rhode-Island and Providence Plantations one, Connecticut five, New York six, New Jersey four, Pennsylvania eight, Delaware one, Maryland six, Virginia ten, North Carolina five, South Carolina five, and Georgia three.

**Filling of vacancies in representation.**—4. When vacancies happen in the Representation from any State, the Executive Authority thereof shall issue Writs of Election to fill such Vacancies.

**Selection of officers; power of impeachment.**—5. The House of Representatives shall chuse their Speaker and other Officers; and shall have the sole Power of Impeachment.

## \*SECTION 3.

**The Senate.**—[1. The Senate of the United States shall be composed of two Senators from each State, chosen by the Legislature thereof, for six Years; and each Senator shall have one Vote.]

**Classification of Senators; filling of vacancies.**—2. Immediately after they shall be assembled in Consequence of the first Election, they shall be divided as equally as may be into three Classes. The Seats of the Senators of the first Class shall be vacated at the expiration of the second Year, of the second Class at the Expiration of the fourth Year, and of the third Class at the Expiration of the sixth Year, so that one-third may be chosen every second Year; and if Vacancies happen by Resignation, or otherwise, during the Recess of the Legislature of any State, the Executive thereof may make temporary Appointments [until the next Meeting of the Legislature, which shall then fill such Vacancies.]

ARTICLE I — *Continued.*

**Qualification of Senators.**—3. No Person shall be a Senator who shall not have attained to the Age of thirty Years, and been nine Years a Citizen of the United States, and who shall not, when elected, be an Inhabitant of that State for which he shall be chosen.

**Vice President to be President of Senate.**—4. The Vice President of the United States shall be President of the Senate, but shall have no Vote, unless they be equally divided.

**Selection of Senate officers; President pro tempore.**—5. The Senate shall chuse their other Officers, and also a President pro tempore, in the absence of the Vice President, or when he shall exercise the Office of President of the United States.

**Senate to try impeachments.**—6. The Senate shall have the sole Power to try all Impeachments. When sitting for that Purpose, they shall be on Oath or Affirmation. When the President of the United States is tried, the Chief Justice shall preside: And no Person shall be convicted without the Concurrence of two thirds of the Members present.

**Judgment in cases of impeachment.**—7. Judgment in Cases of Impeachment shall not extend further than to removal from Office, and disqualification to hold and enjoy any Office of honor, Trust, or Profit under the United States: but the Party convicted shall nevertheless be liable and subject to Indictment, Trial, Judgment and Punishment, according to Law.

## SECTION 4.

**Control of congressional elections.**—1. The Times, Places and Manner of holding Elections for Senators and Representatives, shall be prescribed in each State by the Legislature thereof; but the Congress may at any time by Law make or alter such Regulations, except as to the Places of chusing Senators.

**\*Time for assembling of Congress.**—2. The Congress shall assemble at least once in every Year, and such Meeting shall be on the first Monday in December, unless they shall by Law appoint a different Day.

ARTICLE I — *Continued.*

## SECTION 5.

**Each House to be the judge of the election and qualifications of its members; regulations as to quorum.—1.** Each House shall be the Judge of the Elections, Returns and Qualifications of its own Members, and a Majority of each shall constitute a Quorum to do Business; but a smaller Number may adjourn from day to day, and may be authorized to compel the Attendance of absent Members, in such Manner, and under such Penalties as each House may provide.

**Each House to determine its own rules.—2.** Each House may determine the Rules of its Proceedings, punish its Members for disorderly Behavior, and, with the Concurrence of two thirds, expel a Member.

**Journals and yeas and nays.—3.** Each House shall keep a Journal of its Proceedings, and from time to time publish the same, excepting such Parts as may in their judgment require Secrecy; and the Yeas and Nays of the Members of either House on any question shall, at the Desire of one fifth of those Present, be entered on the Journal.

**Adjournment.—4.** Neither House, during the Session of Congress shall, without the Consent of the other, adjourn for more than three days, nor to any other Place than that in which the two Houses shall be sitting.

## SECTION 6.

**Compensation and privileges of Members of Congress.—**

**1.** The Senators and Representatives shall receive a Compensation for their Services, to be ascertained by Law, and paid out of the Treasury of the United States. They shall in all Cases, except Treason, Felony and Breach of the Peace, be privileged from Arrest during their Attendance at the Session of their respective Houses, and in going to and returning from the same; and for any Speech or Debate in either House, they shall not be questioned in any other Place.

**Incompatible offices; exclusions.—2.** No Senator or Representative shall, during the Time for which he was elected, be appointed to any civil Office under the Authority of the

United States, which shall have been created, or the Emoluments whereof shall have been encreased during such time; and no Person holding any Office under the United States, shall be a Member of either House during his Continuance in Office.

## SECTION 7.

**Revenue bills to originate in House.**—1. All Bills for raising Revenue shall originate in the House of Representatives; but the Senate may propose or concur with Amendments as on other Bills.

**Manner of passing bills; veto power of President.**—2. Every Bill which shall have passed the House of Representatives and the Senate, shall before it becomes a Law, be presented to the President of the United States; If he approve he shall sign it, but if not he shall return it, with his Objections to that House in which it shall have originated, who shall enter the Objections at large on their Journal, and proceed to reconsider it. If after such Reconsideration two thirds of that House shall agree to pass the Bill, it shall be sent, together with the Objections, to the other House, by which it shall likewise be reconsidered, and if approved by two thirds of that House, it shall become a Law. But in all such Cases the Votes of both Houses shall be determined by Yeas and Nays, and the Names of the Persons voting for and against the Bill shall be entered on the Journal of each House respectively. If any Bill shall not be returned by the President within ten days (Sundays excepted) after it shall have been presented to him, the Same shall be a Law, in like Manner as if he had signed it, unless the Congress by their Adjournment prevent its Return, in which Case it shall not be a Law.

**Concurrent orders or resolutions, to be passed by President.**—3. Every Order, Resolution, or Vote to which the Concurrence of the Senate and House of Representatives may be necessary (except on a question of adjournment) shall be presented to the President of the United States; and before the Same shall take Effect, shall be approved by him, or being disap-

ARTICLE I — *Continued.*

proved by him, shall be repassed by two thirds of the Senate and House of Representatives, according to the Rules and Limitations prescribed in the Case of a Bill.

## SECTION 8.

**\*General powers of Congress.**

The Congress shall have Power.—1. To lay and collect Taxes, Duties, Imposts and Excises, to pay the Debts and provide for the common Defence and general Welfare of the United States; but all Duties, Imposts and Excises shall be uniform throughout the United States.

**Borrowing of money.**—2. To borrow money on the credit of the United States.

**Regulation of commerce.**—3. To regulate Commerce with foreign Nations, and among the several States, and with the Indian tribes.

**Naturalization and bankruptcy.**—4. To establish an uniform Rule of Naturalization, and uniform Laws on the subject of Bankruptcies throughout the United States.

**Money, weights and measures.**—5. To coin Money, regulate the Value thereof, and of foreign Coin, and fix the Standard of Weights and Measures.

**Counterfeiting.**—6. To provide for the Punishment of counterfeiting the Securities and current Coin of the United States.

**Post offices.**—7. To establish Post Offices and post Roads.

**Patents and copyrights.**—8. To promote the Progress of Science and useful Arts, by securing for limited Times to Authors and Inventors the exclusive Right to their respective Writings and Discoveries.

**Inferior courts.**—9. To constitute Tribunals inferior to the supreme Court.

**Piracies and felonies.**—10. To define and punish Piracies and Felonies committed on the high Seas, and Offenses against the Law of Nations.

ARTICLE I — *Continued.*

**War; marque and reprisal.**—11. To declare war, grant Letters of Marque and Reprisal, and make Rules concerning Captures on Land and Water.

**Armies.**—12. To raise and support Armies, but no Appropriation of Money to that Use shall be for a longer Term than two Years.

**Navy.**—13. To provide and maintain a Navy.

**Land and naval forces.**—14. To make Rules for the Government and Regulation of the land and naval Forces.

**Calling out militia.**—15. To provide for calling forth the Militia to execute the Laws of the Union, suppress Insurrections and repel Invasions.

**Organizing, arming and disciplining militia.**—16. To provide for organizing, arming, and disciplining the Militia, and for governing such Part of them as may be employed in the Service of the United States, reserving to the States, respectively, the Appointment of the Officers, and the Authority of training the Militia according to the discipline prescribed by Congress.

**Exclusive legislation over District of Columbia.**—17. To exercise exclusive Legislation in all Cases whatsoever, over such District (not exceeding ten Miles square) as may, by Cession of particular States, and the acceptance of Congress, become the Seat of the Government of the United States, and to exercise like Authority over all Places purchased by the Consent of the Legislature of the State in which the Same shall be, for the Erection of Forts, Magazines, Arsenals, dock-Yards, and other needful Buildings;—and

**To enact laws necessary to enforce Constitution.**—18. To make all Laws which shall be necessary and proper for carrying into Execution the foregoing Powers, and all other Powers vested by this Constitution in the Government of the United States, or in any Department or Officer thereof.

## SECTION 9.

**Migration or importation of certain persons not to be prohibited before 1808.**—1. The Migration or Importation of such Persons as any of the States now existing shall think proper to

admit, shall not be prohibited by the Congress prior to the Year one thousand eight hundred and eight, but a tax or duty may be imposed on such Importation, not exceeding ten dollars for each Person.

**Writ of habeas corpus not to be suspended; exception.**— 2. The privilege of the Writ of Habeas Corpus shall not be suspended, unless when in Cases of Rebellion or Invasion the public Safety may require it.

**Bills of attainder and ex post facto laws prohibited.**— 3. No Bill of Attainder or ex post facto Law shall be passed.

**Capitation and other direct taxes.** —\*4. No capitation, or other direct tax shall be laid, unless in Proportion to the Census or Enumeration herein before directed to be taken.

**Exports not to be taxed.**—5. No Tax or Duty shall be laid on Articles exported from any State.

**No preference to be given to ports of any State; interstate shipping.**—6. No Preference shall be given by any Regulation of Commerce or Revenue to the Ports of one State over those of another: nor shall Vessels bound to, or from, one State, be obliged to enter, clear, or pay Duties in another.

**Money, how drawn from treasury; financial statements to be published.**—7. No Money shall be drawn from the Treasury, but in Consequence of Appropriations made by Law; and a regular Statement and Account of the Receipts and Expenditures of all public Money shall be published from time to time.

**Titles of nobility not to be granted; acceptance by government officers of favors from foreign powers.**—8. No Title of Nobility shall be granted by the United States: And no Person holding any Office of Profit or Trust under them, shall without the Consent of the Congress, accept of any present, Emolument, Office, or Title, of any kind whatever, from any King, Prince, or foreign State.

## SECTION 10.

**Limitations of the powers of the several States.**—1. No State shall enter into any Treaty, Alliance, or Confederation; grant Letters of Marque and Reprisal; coin Money; emit Bills of Credit;

make any Thing but gold and silver Coin a Tender in Payment of Debts; pass any Bill of Attainder, ex post facto Law, or Law impairing the Obligation of Contracts or grant any Title of Nobility.

**State imposts and duties.**—2. No State shall, without the Consent of the Congress, lay any Imposts or Duties on Imports or Exports, except what may be absolutely necessary for executing its inspection Laws; and the net Produce of all Duties and Imposts, laid by any State on Imports or Exports, shall be for the Use of the Treasury of the United States; and all such Laws shall be subject to the Revision and Control of the Congress.

**Further restrictions on powers of States.**—3. No State shall, without the consent of Congress, lay any duty of Tonnage, keep Troops, or Ships of War in time of Peace, enter into any Agreement or Compact with another State, or with a foreign Power, or engage in War, unless actually invaded, or in such imminent Danger as will not admit of delay.

## ARTICLE II.

## SECTION 1.

**The President; the executive power.**—1. The executive Power shall be vested in a President of the United States of America. He shall hold his Office during the Term of four Years, and, together with the Vice-President, chosen for the same Term, be elected, as follows:

**Appointment and qualifications of presidential electors.**—2. Each State shall appoint, in such Manner as the Legislature thereof may direct, a Number of Electors, equal to the whole Number of Senators and Representatives to which the State may be entitled in the Congress: but no Senator or Representative, or Person holding an Office of Trust or Profit under the United States, shall be appointed an Elector.

**Original method of electing the President and Vice-President.**—\*[The Electors shall meet in their respective States, and vote by Ballot for two persons, of whom one at least shall not be an Inhabitant of the same State with themselves. And they shall make a List of all the Persons voted for, and of the

Number of Votes for each; which List they shall sign and certify, and transmit sealed to the Seat of the Government of the United States, directed to the President of the Senate. The President of the Senate shall, in the Presence of the Senate and House of Representatives, open all the Certificates, and the Votes shall then be counted. The Person having the greatest Number of Votes shall be the President, if such Number be a Majority of the whole Number of Electors appointed; and if there be more than one who have such Majority, and have an equal Number of Votes, then the House of Representatives shall immediately chuse by Ballot one of them for President; and if no Person have a Majority, then from the five highest on the list the said House shall in like Manner chuse the President. But in chusing the President, the Votes shall be taken by States, the Representation from each State having one Vote; A quorum for this Purpose shall consist of a Member or Members from two-thirds of the States, and a Majority of all the States shall be necessary to a Choice. In every Case, after the Choice of the President, the Person having the greatest Number of Votes of the Electors shall be the Vice President. But if there should remain two or more who have equal Votes, the Senate shall chuse from them by Ballot the Vice-President.]

Congress may determine time of choosing electors and day for casting their votes.—3. The Congress may determine the Time of chusing the Electors, and the Day on which they shall give their Votes; which Day shall be the same throughout the United States.

\*Qualifications for the office of President.—4. No person except a natural born Citizen, or a Citizen of the United States, at the time of the Adoption of this Constitution, shall be eligible to the Office of President; neither shall any Person be eligible to that Office who shall not have attained to the Age of thirty-five Years, and been fourteen Years a Resident within the United States.

ARTICLE II — *Continued.*

**\*Filling vacancy in the office of President.**—5. In Case of the Removal of the President from Office, or of his Death, Resignation, or Inability to discharge the Powers and Duties of the said Office, the same shall devolve on the Vice President, and the Congress may by Law provide for the Case of Removal, Death, Resignation or Inability, both of the President and Vice President, declaring what Officer shall then act as President, and such Officer shall act accordingly, until the Disability be removed, or a President shall be elected.

**Compensation of the President.**—6. The President shall, at stated Times, receive for his Services, a Compensation, which shall neither be increased nor diminished during the Period for which he shall have been elected, and he shall not receive within that Period any other Emolument from the United States, or any of them.

**Oath to be taken by the President.**—7. Before he enter on the Execution of his Office, he shall take the following Oath or Affirmation:—"I do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will faithfully execute the Office of President of the United States, and will to the best of my Ability, preserve, protect and defend the Constitution of the United States."

## SECTION 2.

**The President to be commander-in-chief of army and navy and head of executive department;** may grant reprieves and pardons.—1. The President shall be Commander-in-Chief of the Army and Navy of the United States, and of the Militia of the several States, when called into the actual Service of the United States; he may require the Opinion, in writing, of the principal Officer in each of the executive Departments, upon any subject relating to the Duties of their respective Offices, and he shall have Power to grant Reprieves and Pardons for Offenses against the United States, except in Cases of Impeachment.

**President may, with concurrence of Senate, make treaties, appoint ambassadors, etc.; appointment of inferior officers,**

**authority of Congress over.**—2. He shall have Power, by and with the Advice and Consent of the Senate to make Treaties, provided two-thirds of the Senators present concur; and he shall nominate, and by and with the Advice and Consent of the Senate, shall appoint Ambassadors, other public Ministers and Consuls, Judges of the supreme Court, and all other Officers of the United States, whose Appointments are not herein otherwise provided for, and which shall be established by Law; but the Congress may by Law vest the Appointment of such inferior Officers, as they think proper, in the President alone, in the Courts of Law, or in the Heads of Departments.

**President may fill vacancies in office during recess of Senate.**—3. The President shall have Power to fill up all Vacancies that may happen during the Recess of the Senate, by granting Commissions which shall expire at the End of their next Session.

## SECTION 3.

**President to give advice to Congress; may convene or adjourn it on certain occasions; to receive ambassadors, etc.; have laws executed and commission all officers.**—He shall from time to time give to the Congress Information of the State of the Union, and recommend to their Consideration such Measures as he shall judge necessary and expedient; he may, on extraordinary Occasions, convene both Houses, or either of them, and in Case of Disagreement between them, with Respect to the Time of Adjournment, he may adjourn them to such Time as he shall think proper; he shall receive Ambassadors and other public Ministers; he shall take Care that the Laws be faithfully executed, and shall Commission all the Officers of the United States.

## SECTION 4.

**All civil officers removable by impeachment.**—1. The President, Vice-President and all civil Officers of the United States, shall be removed from Office on Impeachment for, and Conviction of, Treason, Bribery, or other high crimes and Misdemeanors.

## ARTICLE III.

## SECTION 1.

**Judicial power; how vested; term of office and compensation of judges.**—The judicial Power of the United States, shall be vested in one supreme Court, and in such inferior Courts as the Congress may from time to time ordain and establish. The Judges, both of the supreme and inferior Courts, shall hold their Offices during good Behaviour, and shall, at stated Times, receive for their Services a Compensation which shall not be diminished during their Continuance in Office.

## SECTION 2.

**\*Jurisdiction of Federal courts.**—1. The judicial Power shall extend to all Cases, in Law and Equity, arising under this Constitution, the Laws of the United States, and Treaties made, or which shall be made, under their Authority;—to all Cases affecting Ambassadors, other public Ministers and Consuls;—to all Cases of Admiralty and maritime Jurisdiction;—to Controversies to which the United States shall be a Party;—to Controversies between two or more States;—between a State and Citizens of another State;—between Citizens of different States;—between Citizens of the same State claiming Lands under Grants of different States, and between a State, or the Citizens thereof, and foreign States, Citizens or Subjects.

**Original and appellate jurisdiction of Supreme Court.**—2. In all Cases affecting Ambassadors, other public Ministers and Consuls, and those in which a State shall be Party, the Supreme Court shall have original Jurisdiction. In all the other Cases before mentioned, the supreme Court shall have appellate Jurisdiction, both as to Law and Fact, with such Exceptions, and under such Regulations as the Congress shall make.

**Trial of all crimes, except impeachment, to be by jury.**—3. The trial of all Crimes, except in Cases of Impeachment, shall be by Jury; and such Trial shall be held in the State where the said Crimes shall have been committed; but when not committed within any State, the trial shall be at such Place or Places as the Congress may by Law have directed.

## SECTION 3.

**Treason defined; conviction of.**—1. Treason against the United States, shall consist only in levying War against them, or, in adhering to their Enemies, giving them Aid and Comfort. No Person shall be convicted of Treason unless on the Testimony of two Witnesses to the same overt Act, or on Confession in open Court.

**Congress to declare punishment for treason; proviso.**—2. The Congress shall have power to declare the Punishment of Treason, but no Attainder of Treason shall work Corruption of Blood, or Forfeiture except during the Life of the Person attainted.

## ARTICLE IV.

## SECTION 1.

**Each State to give full faith and credit to the public acts and records of other States.**—Full Faith and Credit shall be given in each State to the public Acts, Records, and judicial Proceedings of every other State. And the Congress may by general Laws prescribe the Manner in which such Acts, Records and Proceedings shall be proved, and the Effect thereof.

## SECTION 2.

**Privileges of citizens.**—1. The Citizens of each State shall be entitled to all Privileges and Immunities of Citizens in the several States.

**Extradition between the several States.**—2. A Person charged in any State with Treason, Felony, or other Crime, who shall flee from Justice, and be found in another State, shall on demand of the executive Authority of the State from which he fled, be delivered up, to be removed to the State having Jurisdiction of the Crime.

**\*Persons held to labor or service in one State, fleeing to another, to be returned.**—3. No Person held to Service or Labour in one State, under the Laws thereof, escaping into another, shall, in Consequence of any Law or Regulation therein, be dis-

charged from such Service or Labour, but shall be delivered up on Claim of the Party to whom such Service or Labour may be due.

## SECTION 3.

**New States.**—1. New States may be admitted by the Congress into this Union; but no new State shall be formed or erected within the Jurisdiction of any other State; nor any State be formed by the Junction of two or more States, or parts of States, without the Consent of the Legislatures of the States concerned as well as of the Congress.

**Regulations concerning territory.**—2. The Congress shall have Power to dispose of and make all needful Rules and Regulations respecting the Territory or other Property belonging to the United States; and nothing in this Constitution shall be so construed as to Prejudice any Claims of the United States, or of any particular State.

## SECTION 4.

**Republican form of government and protection guaranteed the several States.**—1. The United States shall guarantee to every State in this Union a Republican Form of Government, and shall protect each of them against Invasion; and on Application of the Legislature, or of the Executive (when the Legislature cannot be convened) against domestic violence.

## ARTICLE V.

**Ways in which the Constitution can be amended.**—The Congress, whenever two-thirds of both Houses shall deem it necessary, shall propose Amendments to this Constitution, or, on the Application of the Legislatures of two-thirds of the several States, shall call a Convention for proposing Amendments, which, in either Case, shall be valid to all Intents and Purposes, as part of this Constitution, when ratified by the Legislatures of three-fourths of the several States, or by Conventions in three-fourths thereof, as the one or the other Mode of Ratification may be proposed by the Congress; Provided that no Amendment which may be made prior to the Year One thousand eight hundred and eight shall in any Manner affect

the first and fourth Clauses in the Ninth Section of the first Article; and that no State, without its Consent, shall be deprived of its equal Suffrage in the Senate.

## ARTICLE VI.

**Debts contracted under the confederation secured.**—1. All Debts contracted and Engagements entered into, before the Adoption of this Constitution, shall be as valid against the United States under this Constitution, as under the Confederation.

**Constitution, laws and treaties of the United States to be supreme.**—2. This Constitution, and the Laws of the United States which shall be made in Pursuance thereof; and all Treaties made, or which shall be made, under the Authority of the United States, shall be the supreme Law of the Land; and the Judges in every State shall be bound thereby, any Thing in the Constitution or Laws of any State to the Contrary notwithstanding.

**Who shall take constitutional oath; no religious test as to official qualification.**—3. The Senators and Representatives before mentioned, and the Members of the several State Legislatures, and all executive and judicial Officers, both of the United States and of the several States, shall be bound by Oath or Affirmation, to support this Constitution; but no religious Test shall ever be required as a Qualification to any Office or public Trust under the United States.

## ARTICLE VII.

**Constitution to be considered adopted when ratified by nine States.**—The Ratification of the Conventions of nine States shall be sufficient for the Establishment of this Constitution between the States so ratifying the Same.

Done in Convention by the Unanimous Consent of the States present the Seventeenth Day of September in the Year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and Eighty seven and of the Independence of the United States of America the Twelfth. In Witness whereof We have hereunto subscribed our Names.

## AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES.

The following amendments from articles I to X inclusive, were proposed at the first session of the first Congress of the United States, which was begun and held at the city of New York on the 4th day of March, 1789, and were adopted by the requisite number of states, as follows: New Jersey, Nov.

20, 1789; Maryland, Dec. 19, 1789; North Carolina, Dec. 22, 1789; South Carolina, Jan. 19, 1790; New Hampshire, Jan. 25, 1790; Delaware, Jan. 28, 1790; Pennsylvania, March 10, 1790; New York, March 27, 1790; Rhode Island, June 15, 1790; Vermont, Nov. 3, 1791, and Virginia, Dec. 15, 1791.

The following preamble and resolution preceded the original proposition of the amendments, and as they have been supposed by a high equity judge to have an important bearing on the construction of those amendments, they are here inserted. They will be found in the journals of the first session of the first congress.

### CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES.

*Begun and held at the city of New York, on Wednesday, the 4th day of March, 1789.*

The conventions of a number of the states having, at the time of their adopting the Constitution, expressed a desire, in order to prevent misconstruction or abuse of its powers, that further declaratory and restrictive clauses should be added, and as extending the ground of public confidence in the government will best insure the beneficent ends of its institution:

*Resolved*, By the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America, in congress assembled, two-thirds of both houses concurring, that the following articles be proposed to the legislatures of the several states, as amendments to the constitution of the United States; all or any of which articles, when ratified by three-fourths of the said legislatures, to be valid to all intents and purposes, as part of the said constitution, namely:

#### ARTICLE I.

**Freedom of religion, of speech, of the press, and right of petition.**—Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press; or the right of the people peaceably to assemble, and to petition the Government for a redress of grievances.

## ARTICLE II.

**Right of people to bear arms not to be infringed.**—A well regulated Militia, being necessary to the security of a free State, the right of the people to keep and bear Arms, shall not be infringed.

## ARTICLE III.

**Quartering of troops.**—No Soldier shall, in time of peace be quartered in any house, without the consent of the Owner, nor in time of war, but in a manner to be prescribed by law.

## ARTICLE IV.

**Persons and houses to be secure from unreasonable searches and seizures.**—The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers, and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated, and no Warrants shall issue, but upon probable cause, supported by Oath or affirmation, and particularly describing the place to be searched, and the persons or things to be seized.

## ARTICLE V.

**Trials for crimes; just compensation for private property taken for public use.**—No person shall be held to answer for a capital, or otherwise infamous crime, unless on a presentment or indictment of a Grand Jury, except in cases arising in the land or naval forces, or in the Militia, when in actual service in time of War or public danger; nor shall any person be subject for the same offence to be twice put in jeopardy of life or limb; nor shall be compelled in any criminal case to be a witness against himself, nor be deprived of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law; nor shall private property be taken for public use, without just compensation.

## ARTICLE VI.

**Civil rights in trials for crimes enumerated.**—In all criminal prosecutions, the accused shall enjoy the right to a speedy and public trial, by an impartial jury of the State and district wherein the crime shall have been committed, which district shall have been previously ascertained by law, and to be informed of the nature and cause of the accusation; to be confronted with the witnesses against him; to have compulsory

process for obtaining witnesses in his favor, and to have the Assistance of Counsel for his defence.

## ARTICLE VII.

**Civil rights in civil suits.**—In suits at common law, where the value in controversy shall exceed twenty dollars, the right of trial by jury shall be preserved, and no fact tried by a jury, shall be otherwise re-examined in any Court of the United States, than according to the rules of the common law.

## ARTICLE VIII.

**Excessive bail, fines and punishments prohibited.**—Excessive bail shall not be required, nor excessive fines imposed, nor cruel and unusual punishments inflicted.

## ARTICLE IX.

**Reserved rights of people.**—The enumeration in the Constitution, of certain rights, shall not be construed to deny or disparage others retained by the people.

## ARTICLE X.

**Powers not delegated, reserved to States and people respectively.**—The powers not delegated to the United States by the Constitution, nor prohibited by it to the States, are reserved to the States respectively, or to the people.

[The eleventh amendment, which follows, was proposed to the legislatures of the several states by the third Congress on March 5, 1794, and was declared in force January 8, 1798.]

## ARTICLE XI.

**Judicial power of United States not to extend to suits against a State.**—The Judicial power of the United States shall not be construed to extend to any suit in law or equity, commenced or prosecuted against one of the United States by Citizens of another State, or by Citizens or Subjects of any Foreign State.

[The twelfth amendment, which follows, was proposed to the legislatures of the several states by the eighth Congress on December 12, 1803, and was declared in force September 25, 1804.]

## ARTICLE XII.

**\*Present mode of electing President and Vice-President by electors.**—The Electors shall meet in their respective states and vote by ballot for President and Vice-President, one of whom, at least, shall not be an inhabitant of the same state with themselves; they shall name in their ballots the person voted for as President, and in distinct ballots the person voted for as Vice-President, and they shall make distinct lists of all persons voted for as President, and of all persons voted for as Vice-President, and of the number of votes for each, which lists they shall sign and certify, and transmit sealed to the seat of the government of the United States, directed to the President of the Senate;—The President of the Senate shall, in the presence of the Senate and House of Representatives, open all the certificates and the votes shall then be counted;—The person having the greatest number of votes for President, shall be the President, if such number be a majority of the whole number of electors appointed; and if no person have such majority, then from the persons having the highest numbers not exceeding three on the list of those voted for as President, the House of Representatives shall choose immediately, by ballot, the President. But in choosing the President, the votes shall be taken by states, the representation from each State having one vote; a quorum for this purpose shall consist of a member or members from two-thirds of the states, and a majority of all the states shall be necessary to a choice. And if the House of Representatives shall not choose a President whenever the right of choice shall devolve upon them, before the fourth day of March next following, then the Vice-President shall act as President, as in the case of the death or other constitutional disability of the President. The person having the greatest number of votes as Vice-President, shall be the Vice-President, if such number be a majority of the whole number of electors appointed, and if no person have a majority, then from the two highest numbers on the list, the Senate shall choose the Vice-President; a quorum for the purpose shall consist of two-thirds of the whole number of Senators, and a majority

of the whole number shall be necessary to a choice. But no person constitutionally ineligible to the office of President shall be eligible to that of Vice-President of the United States.

[The thirteenth amendment, which follows, was proposed to the legislatures of the several states by the thirty-eighth Congress on February 1, 1865, and was declared in force December 18, 1865.]

## ARTICLE XIII.

## SECTION 1.

**Slavery prohibited.**—Neither slavery nor involuntary servitude, except as a punishment for crime whereof the party shall have been duly convicted, shall exist within the United States, or any place subject to their jurisdiction.

## SECTION 2.

**Congress given power to enforce this article.**—Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

[The fourteenth amendment, which follows, was proposed to the legislatures of the several states by the thirty-ninth Congress on June 16, 1866, and was declared in force July 28, 1868.]

## ARTICLE XIV.

## SECTION 1.

**Citizenship defined; privileges of citizens.**—All persons born or naturalized in the United States, and subject to the jurisdiction thereof, are citizens of the United States and of the State wherein they reside. No State shall make or enforce any law which shall abridge the privileges or immunities of citizens of the United States; nor shall any State deprive any person of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law; nor deny to any person within its jurisdiction the equal protection of the laws.

## SECTION 2.

**Apportionment of Representatives.**—Representatives shall be apportioned among the several States according to their respective numbers, counting the whole number of persons in each State, excluding Indians not taxed. But when the right to vote at any election for the choice of electors for President and Vice-President of the United States, Representatives in

ARTICLE XIV — *Continued.*

Congress, the Executive and Judicial officers of a State, or the members of the Legislature thereof, is denied to any of the male inhabitants of such State, being twenty-one years of age, and citizens of the United States, or in any way abridged, except for participation in rebellion, or other crime, the basis of representation therein shall be reduced in the proportion which the number of such male citizens shall bear to the whole number of male citizens twenty-one years of age in such State.

## SECTION 3.

**Disqualification for office; removal of disability.**—No person shall be a Senator or Representative in Congress, or elector of President and Vice-President, or hold any office, civil or military, under the United States, or under any State, who, having previously taken an oath, as a member of Congress, or as an officer of the United States, or as a member of any State legislature, or as an executive or judicial officer of any State, to support the Constitution of the United States, shall have engaged in insurrection or rebellion against the same, or given aid or comfort to the enemies thereof. But Congress may by a vote of two-thirds of each House, remove such disability.

## SECTION 4.

**Public debt not to be questioned; payment of debts and claims incurred in aid of rebellion forbidden.**—The validity of the public debt of the United States, authorized by law, including debts incurred for payment of pensions and bounties for services in suppressing insurrection or rebellion, shall not be questioned. But neither the United States nor any State shall assume or pay any debt or obligation incurred in aid of insurrection or rebellion against the United States, or any claim for the loss or emancipation of any slave; but all such debts, obligations and claims shall be held illegal and void.

## SECTION 5.

**Congress given power to enforce this article.**—The Congress shall have power to enforce, by appropriate legislation, the provisions of this article.

[The sixteenth amendment, which follows, was proposed to the legislatures of the several states by the fortieth Congress on February 27, 1869, and was declared in force March 30, 1870.]

## ARTICLE XV.

### SECTION 1.

**Right of certain citizens to vote established.**—The right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State, on account of race, color, or previous condition of servitude.

### SECTION 2.

**Congress given power to enforce this article.**—The Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

[The sixteenth amendment, which follows, was proposed to the legislatures of the several states by the sixty-first Congress on July 12, 1909, and was declared in force February 25, 1913.]

## ARTICLE XVI.

**Taxes on income; Congress given power to lay and collect.**—The Congress shall have power to lay and collect taxes on incomes, from whatever source derived, without apportionment among the several States, and without regard to any census or enumeration.

[The seventeenth amendment, which follows, was proposed to the legislatures of the several states by the sixty-second Congress on May 16, 1912, and was declared in force May 31, 1913.]

## ARTICLE XVII.

**Election of United States Senators; filling of vacancies; qualifications of electors.**—The Senate of the United States shall be composed of two Senators from each State, elected by the people thereof, for six years; and each Senator shall have one vote. The electors in each State shall have the qualifications requisite for electors of the most numerous branch of the State legislatures.

2. When vacancies happen in the representation of any State in the Senate, the executive authority of such State shall issue writs of election to fill such vacancies: Provided, that the legislature of any State may empower the executive thereof to make temporary appointment until the people fill the vacancies by election as the legislature may direct.

ARTICLE XVII — *Continued.*

3. This amendment shall not be so construed as to affect the election or term of any Senator chosen before it becomes valid as part of the Constitution.

[The eighteenth amendment, which follows, was proposed to the legislatures of the several states by the sixty-fifth Congress, and was declared on January 29, 1919, as going into full force and effect on January 16, 1920.]

## \*ARTICLE XVIII.

**Manufacture, sale or transportation of intoxicating liquors, for beverage purposes, prohibited.**—1. After one year from the ratification of this article the manufacture, sale, or transportation of intoxicating liquors within, the importation thereof into, or the exportation thereof from the United States and all territory subject to the jurisdiction thereof for beverage purposes is hereby prohibited.

Congress and the several States given concurrent power to pass appropriate legislation to enforce this article.—2. The Congress and the several States shall have concurrent power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

**Provisions of article to become operative, when adopted by three-fourths of the States.**—3. This article shall be inoperative unless it shall have been ratified as an amendment to the Constitution by the legislatures of the several States, as provided in the Constitution, within seven years from the date of the submission hereof to the States by the Congress.

[The nineteenth amendment, which follows, was proposed to the legislatures of the several states by the sixty-sixth Congress on May 19, 1919, and declared in force August 26, 1920.]

## ARTICLE XIX.

**The right of citizens to vote shall not be denied because of sex.**—The right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of sex.

Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

[The twentieth amendment, which follows, was proposed to the legislatures of the states by the seventy-second Congress, Senate Joint Res. 14, passed by the House of Representatives on March 1, 1932; the Senate March 2, 1932; signed by the Speaker of the House March 2, 1932, by the Vice President of the U. S. and the President of the Senate March 3, 1932. Ratification by the thirty-sixth state occurred January 23, 1933. Sections 1 and 2 of the amendment became effective October 15, 1933.]

## ARTICLE XX.

### SECTION 1.

**Terms of President, Vice President, Senators and Representatives.**—The terms of the President and Vice President shall end at noon on the 20th day of January, and the terms of Senators and Representatives at noon on the 3d day of January, of the years in which such terms would have ended if this article had not been ratified; and the terms of their successors shall then begin.

### SECTION 2.

**Time of assembling Congress.**—The Congress shall assemble at least once in every year, and such meeting shall begin at noon on the 3d day of January, unless they shall by law appoint a different day.

### SECTION 3.

**Filling vacancy in office of President.**—If, at the time fixed for the beginning of the term of the President, the President elect shall have died, the Vice President elect shall become President. If a President shall not have been chosen before the time fixed for the beginning of his term, or if the President elect shall have failed to qualify, then the Vice President elect shall act as President until a President shall have qualified; and the Congress may by law provide for the case wherein neither a President elect nor a Vice President elect shall have qualified, declaring who shall then act as President, or the manner in which one who is to act shall be selected, and such person shall act accordingly until a President or Vice President shall have qualified.

### SECTION 4.

**Power of Congress in Presidential succession.**—The Congress may by law provide for the case of the death of any of the persons from whom the House of Representatives may choose

a President whenever the right of choice shall have devolved upon them, and for the case of the death of any of the persons from whom the Senate may choose a Vice President whenever the right of choice shall have devolved upon them.

#### SECTION 5.

**Time of taking effect.**—Sections 1 and 2 shall take effect on the 15th day of October following the ratification of this article.

#### SECTION 6.

**Ratification.**—This article shall be inoperative unless it shall have been ratified as an amendment to the Constitution by the legislatures of three-fourths of the several States within seven years from the date of its submission.

[The twenty-first amendment, which follows, was proposed by the seventy-second Congress, second session beginning December 5, 1932. Senate Joint Resolution 211, passed February 20, 1933, provided for ratification by conventions in three-fourths of the states. The amendment became effective with ratification by Utah, the thirty-sixth state, on December 5, 1933.]

### ARTICLE XXI.

#### SECTION 1.

**Repeal of Prohibition Amendment.**—The eighteenth article of amendment to the Constitution of the United States is hereby repealed.

#### SECTION 2.

**Transportation of intoxicating liquors.**—The transportation or importation into any State, Territory, or possession of the United States for delivery or use therein of intoxicating liquors, in violation of the laws thereof, is hereby prohibited.

#### SECTION 3.

**Ratification.**—This article shall be inoperative unless it shall have been ratified as an amendment to the Constitution by conventions in the several States, as provided in the Constitution, within seven years from the date of the submission hereof to the States by the Congress.

## STATUS OF ACTION ON PROPOSED FEDERAL CHILD LABOR AMENDMENT

Department of State, Washington, May 1, 1937.

By Joint Resolution of Congress, June 2, 1924, the following amendment to the Constitution of the United States was proposed:

"Section 1. The Congress shall have power to limit, regulate, and prohibit the labor of persons under eighteen years of age.

"Section 2. The power of the several States is unimpaired by this article except that the operation of State laws shall be suspended to the extent necessary to give effect to legislation enacted by the Congress."

### RATIFICATION.

Twenty-eight states have ratified; approval by 36 states necessary. \*Kansas, Kentucky, Nevada and New Mexico ratified in 1937.

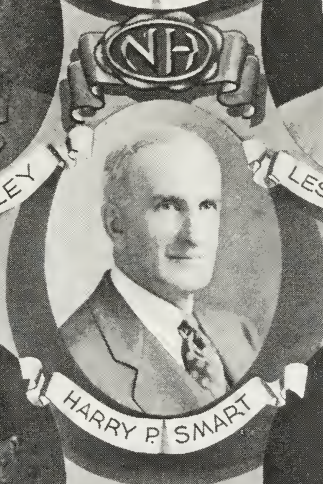

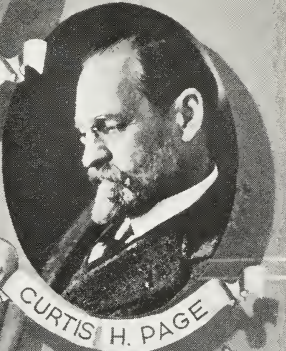

All amendments are shown by notes at the bottom of the page indicating the year in which they took effect. The amendments of 1792, "so far as relates to the choice of the members of the legislature and the executive officers of the state, county treasurer and recorder of deeds," took effect on February 1, 1793, and all others on the first Wednesday of June, 1793.

The amendments of 1850 took effect September 16, 1852; those of 1876, August 1, 1877, October 1, 1878, and the first Wednesday of June, 1879, as indicated in the foot notes; those of 1889, April 2, 1889; those of 1902 on March 26, 1903; and those of 1912 on November 20, 1912.

The numbering of the sections of Part II first appeared in the Revised Statutes of 1842. In 1889, when the tenth section of Part II was stricken out, all subsequent sections were renumbered, with the result of making much confusion in citations. In this copy the original numbers have been restored.

# PART FIRST

## BILL OF RIGHTS.

ARTICLE 1<sup>st</sup>. All men are born equally free and independent: Therefore, all government, of right, originates from the people, is founded in consent, and instituted for the general good.

[ART.] \*2<sup>d</sup>. All men have certain natural, essential, and inherent rights—among which are, the enjoying and defending life and liberty; acquiring, possessing, and protecting, property; and, in a word, of seeking and obtaining happiness.

to be propagated through a society, by the institution of the public worship of the Deity, and of public instruction in morality and religion; therefore, to promote those important purposes, the people of this state have a right to empower, and do hereby fully empower, the legislature, to authorize, from time to time, the several towns, parishes, bodies corporate, or religious societies, within this state, to make adequate provision, at their own expense, for the support and maintenance of public Protestant teachers of piety, religion, and morality:

The people of this state have the sole and exclusive right of governing themselves as a free, sovereign, and independent state; and do, and forever hereafter shall, exercise and enjoy every power, jurisdiction, and right, pertaining thereto, which is not, or may not hereafter be, by them expressly delegated to the United States of America in congress assembled.

[ART.] 8th. All power residing originally in, and being derived from, the people, all the magistrates and officers of government are their substitutes and agents, and at all times accountable to them.

[ART.] 9th. No office or place whatsoever, in government, shall be hereditary—the abilities and integrity requisite in all, not being transmissible to posterity or relations.

Government being instituted for the common benefit, protection, and security, of the whole community, and not for the private interest or emolument of any one man, family, or class of men; therefore, whenever the ends of government are perverted, and public liberty manifestly endangered, and all other means of redress are ineffectual, the people may, and of right ought, to reform the old, or establish a new government. The doctrine of nonresistance against arbitrary power, and oppression, is absurd, slavish, and destructive of the good and happiness of mankind.

[ART.] 11th. All elections ought to be free, and every inhabitant of the state, having the proper qualifications, has equal right to elect, and be elected, into office; [but no person shall have the right to vote or be eligible to office under the constitution of this state who shall not be able to read the constitution in the English language and to write; *provided, however,* that this provision shall not apply to any person prevented by a physical disability from complying with its requisitions, nor to any person who now has the right to vote, nor to any person who shall be sixty years of age or upwards on the first day of January, A. D. 1904;]\* [and *provided further* that no person shall have the right to vote, or be eligible to office under the constitution of this state who shall have been convicted of treason, bribery, or any wilful violation of the election laws

Therefore, all warrants to search suspected places, or arrest a person for examination or trial in prosecutions for criminal matters, are contrary to this right, if the cause or foundation of them be not previously supported by oath or affirmation; and if the order, in a warrant to a civil officer, to make search in suspected places, or to arrest one or more suspected persons or to seize their property, be not accompanied with a special designation of the persons or objects of search, arrest, or seizure; and no warrant ought to be issued, but in cases, and with the formalities, prescribed by law.]\*

[ART.] 20<sup>th</sup>. In all controversies concerning property—and in all suits between two or more persons, except in cases in which it has been heretofore otherwise used and practiced, [and except in cases in which the value in controversy does not exceed one hundred dollars, and title of real estate is not concerned]† the parties have a right to a trial by jury and this method of procedure shall be held sacred, unless, in cases arising on the high seas and such as relates to mariners' wages the legislature shall think it necessary hereafter to alter it.

[ART.] 21<sup>st</sup>. In order to reap the fullest advantage of the inestimable privilege of the trial by jury, great care ought to be taken, that none but qualified persons should be appointed to serve; and such ought to [be]‡ fully compensated for their travel, time, and attendance.

- [ART.] 27<sup>th</sup>. No soldier in time of peace, shall be quartered in any house, without the consent of the owner; and in time of war, such quarters ought not to be made but by the civil magistrate, in a manner ordained by the legislature. Quartering of soldiers.
- [ART.] 28<sup>th</sup>. No subsidy, charge, tax, impost, or duty, shall be established, fixed, laid, or levied, under any pretext whatsoever, without the consent of the people, or their representatives in the legislature, or authority derived from that body. [ART.] 34<sup>th</sup>. No person can, in any case, be subjected to law martial, or to any pains or penalties by virtue of that law, except those employed in the army or navy, and except the militia in actual service, but by authority of the legislature.

[ART.] 35<sup>th</sup>. [It is essential to the preservation of the rights of every individual, his life, liberty, property, and character, that there be an impartial interpretation of the laws, and administration of justice. It is the right of every citizen to be tried by judges as impartial as the lot of humanity will admit. It is therefore not only the best policy, but for the security of the rights of the people, that the judges of the supreme judicial court should hold their offices so long as they behave well; subject, however, to such limitations, on account of age, as may be provided by the constitution of the state; and that they should have honorable salaries, ascertained and established by standing laws.]†

[ART.] 36<sup>th</sup>. Economy being a most essential virtue in all states, especially in a young one; no pension shall be granted, but in consideration of actual services; and such pensions ought to be granted with great caution, by the legislature, and never for more than one year at a time.

### FORM OF GOVERNMENT.

[ART. 1.]\* The people inhabiting the territory formerly called the province of New Hampshire, do hereby solemnly and mutually agree with each other, to form themselves into a free, sovereign and independent body-politic, or state, by the name of THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

[ART. 4.] The general court shall forever have full power and authority to erect and constitute judicatories and courts of record, or other courts, to be holden, in the name of the state, for the hearing, trying, and determining, all manner of crimes, offenses, pleas, processes, complaints, actions, causes, matters and things whatsoever, arising or happening within this state, or between or concerning persons inhabiting or residing, or brought, within the same, whether the same be criminal or civil, or whether the crimes be capital, or not capital, and whether the said pleas be real, personal, or mixed; and for the awarding and issuing execution thereon. To which courts and judicatories, are hereby given and granted, full power and authority, from time to time, to administer oaths or affirmations, for the better discovery of truth in any matter in controversy, or depending before them.

[ART. 5.] And further, full power and authority are hereby given and granted to the said general court, from time to time, to make, ordain, and establish, all manner of wholesome and reasonable orders, laws, statutes, ordinances, directions, and instructions, either with penalties, or without, so as the same be not repugnant or contrary to this constitution, as they may judge for the benefit and welfare of this state, and for the governing and ordering thereof, and of the subjects of the same, for the necessary support and defense of the government thereof; and to name and settle [biennially], † or

provide by fixed laws for the naming and settling, all civil officers within this state; such officers excepted, the election and appointment of whom are hereafter in this form of government otherwise provided for; and to set forth the several duties, powers, and limits, of the several civil and military officers of this state, and the forms of such oaths or affirmations as shall be respectively administered unto them, for the execution of their several offices and places, so as the same be not repugnant or contrary to this constitution; and also to impose fines, mulcts, imprisonments, and other punishments; and to impose and levy proportional and reasonable assessments, rates, and taxes, upon all the inhabitants of, and residents within, the said state; and upon all estates within the same; to be issued and disposed of by warrant, under the hand of the [governor]\* of this state for the time being, with the advice and consent of the council, for the public service, in the necessary defense and support of the government of this state, and the protection and preservation of the subjects thereof, according to such acts as are, or shall be, in force within the same; [*provided* that the general court shall not authorize any town to loan or give its money or credit directly or indirectly for the benefit of any corporation having for its object a dividend of profits or in any way aid the same by taking its stock or bonds.]†

[ART. 6-a. All revenue in excess of the necessary cost of collection and administration accruing to the state from registration fees, operators' licenses, gasoline road tolls or any other special charges or taxes with respect to the operation of motor vehicles or the sale or consumption of motor vehicle fuels shall be appropriated and used exclusively for the construction, reconstruction and maintenance of public highways within this state, including the supervision of traffic thereon and payment of the interest and principal of obligations incurred for said purposes; and no part of such revenues shall, by transfer of funds or otherwise, be diverted to any other purpose whatsoever.]\*

[ART. 13.] All persons, qualified to vote in the election of senators, shall be entitled to vote, within the\* district† where they dwell, in the choice of representatives.

[ART. 14.] Every member of the house of representatives shall be chosen by ballot; and, for two years, at least, next preceding his election shall have been an inhabitant of this state;‡ shall be, at the time of his election, an inhabitant of the town, parish or place he may be chosen to represent\*\* and shall cease to represent such town, parish or place immediately on his ceasing to be qualified as afore-said.

[ART. 17.] The house of representatives shall be the grand inquest of the state; and all impeachments made by them, shall be heard and tried by the senate.

And every officer, impeached for bribery, corruption, malpractice or maladministration in office, shall be served with an attested copy of the impeachment, and order of the senate thereon with such citation as

the senate may direct, setting forth the time and place of their sitting to try the impeachment; which service shall be made by the sheriff, or such other sworn officer as the senate may appoint, at least fourteen days previous to the time of trial; and such citation being duly served and returned, the senate may proceed in the hearing of the impeachment, giving the person impeached, if he shall appear, full liberty of producing witnesses and proofs, and of making his defense, by himself and counsel, and may also, upon his refusing or neglecting to appear hear the proofs in support of the impeachment, and render judgment thereon, his non-appearance notwithstanding; and such judgment shall have the same force and effect as if the person impeached had appeared and pleaded in the trial.

[ART. 39.] Their judgment, however, shall not extend further than removal from office, disqualification to hold or enjoy any place of honor, trust, or profit, under this state; but the party so convicted, shall nevertheless be liable to indictment, trial, judgment, and punishment, according to the laws of the land.

And the qualifications of electors of the governor shall be the same as those for senators; and if no person shall have a [plurality]‡ of votes, the senate and house of representatives shall, by joint ballot elect one of the two persons having the highest number of votes, who shall be declared governor. And no person shall be eligible to this office, unless, at the time of his election, he shall have been an inhabitant of this state for seven years next preceding, and unless he shall be of the age of thirty years.‡

[ART. 43.] In cases of disagreement between the two houses, with regard to the time or place of adjournment or prorogation, the governor, with advice of council, shall have a right to adjourn or prorogue the general court, not exceeding ninety days at any one time, as he may determine the public good may require, and he shall dissolve the same seven days before the said first Wednesday of [January].\* And, in case of any infectious distemper prevailing in the place where the said court at any time is to convene, or any other cause, whereby dangers may arise to the health or lives of the members from their attendance, the governor may direct the session to be holden at some other the most convenient place within the state.

[ART. 44.] Every bill which shall have passed both houses of the general court, shall, before it become a law, be presented to the governor, if he

approve, he shall sign it, but if not, he shall return it, with his objections, to that house in which it shall have originated, who shall enter the objections at large on their journal, and proceed to reconsider it; if after such reconsideration, two thirds of that house shall agree to pass the bill, it shall be sent, together with such objections, to the other house, by which it shall likewise be reconsidered, and, if approved by two thirds of that house, it shall become a law. But in all such cases the votes of both houses shall be determined by yeas and nays, and the names of the persons, voting for or against the bill, shall be entered on the journal of each house respectively. If any bill shall not be returned by the governor within five days (Sundays excepted) after it shall have been presented to him, the same shall be a law in like manner as if he had signed it unless the legislature, by their adjournment, prevent its return, in which case it shall not be a law.

[ART. 45.] Every resolve shall be presented to the governor, and before the same shall take effect, shall be approved by him, or being disapproved by him, shall be repassed by the senate and house of representatives, according to the rules and limitations prescribed in the case of a bill.

may desire, and to call it together sooner than the time to which it may be adjourned, or prorogued, if the welfare of the state should require the same.

[ART. 51.] The governor of this state for the time being, shall be commander-in-chief of the army and navy, and all the military forces of the state, by sea and land; and shall have full power by himself, or by any chief commander, or other officer, or officers, from time to time, to train, instruct, exercise and govern the militia and navy; and for the special defense and safety of this state, to assemble in martial array, and put in warlike posture, the inhabitants thereof, and to lead and conduct them, and with them to encounter, repulse, repel, resist and pursue by force of arms, as well by sea as by land, within and without the limits of this state; and also to kill, slay, destroy, if necessary, and conquer by all fitting ways, enterprise and means, all and every such person and persons as shall, at any time hereafter, in a hostile manner, attempt or enterprise the destruction, invasion, detriment or annoyance of this state; and to use and exercise over the army and navy, and over the militia in actual service, the law martial in time of war, invasion, and also in rebellion, declared by the legislature to exist, as occasion shall necessarily require: And surprise, by all ways and means whatsoever, all and every such person or persons, with their ships, arms, ammunition, and other goods, as shall in a hostile manner invade, or attempt the invading, conquering or annoying this state; and in fine, the governor hereby is entrusted with all other powers incident to the office of captain-general and commander-in-chief, and admiral, to be exercised agreeably to the rules and regulations of the constitution, and the laws of the land; *provided*, that the governor shall not, at any time hereafter, by virtue of any power by this constitution granted, or hereafter to be granted to him by the legislature, transport any of

the inhabitants of this state, or oblige them to march out of the limits of the same, without their free and voluntary consent, or the consent of the general court, nor grant commissions for exercising the law martial in any case, without the advice and consent of the council.

Pardoning power.

[ART. 52.] The power of pardoning offenses, except such as persons may be convicted of before the senate, by impeachment of the house, shall be in the governor, by and with the advice of council: But no charter of pardon, granted by the governor, with advice of council, before conviction, shall avail the party pleading the same, notwithstanding any general or particular expressions contained therein, descriptive of the offense or offenses intended to be pardoned.

[ART. 53.] No officer duly commissioned to command in the militia shall be removed from his office, but by the address of both houses to the governor, or by fair trial in courtmartial, pursuant to the laws of the state for the time being.

[ART. 54.] The commanding officers of the regiments shall appoint their adjutants and quartermasters; the brigadiers, their brigade-majors; the major-generals, their aids; the captains and subalterns, their non-commissioned officers.

[ART. 55.] The division of the militia into brigades, regiments and companies, made in pursuance of the militia laws now in force, shall be considered as the proper division of the militia of this state, until the same shall be altered by some future law.

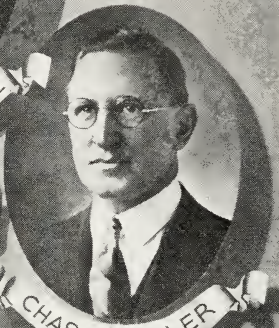

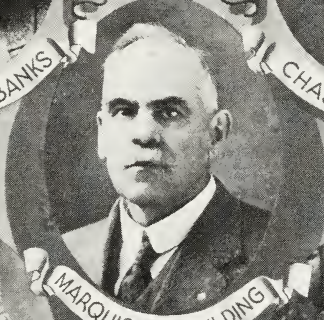

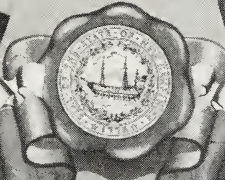

by and with the advice and consent of the council, for the necessary support and defense of this state, and for the necessary protection and preservation of the inhabitants thereof, agreeably to the acts and resolves of the general court.

[ART. 57.] All public boards, the commissary-general, all superintending officers of public magazines and stores belonging to this state, and all commanding officers of forts and garrisons within the same, shall, once, in every three months, officially, and without requisition, and at other times when required by the governor, deliver to him an account of all goods, stores, provisions, ammunition, cannon, with their appendages and all small arms, with their accoutrements, and of all other public property under their care respectively; distinguishing the quantity and kind of each, as particularly as may be; together with the condition of such forts and garrisons: And the commanding officer shall exhibit to the governor, when required by him true and exact plans of such forts, and of the land and sea, or harbor or harbors adjacent.

[ART. 58.] The governor and council shall be compensated for their services, from time to time, by such grants as the general court shall think reasonable.

[ART. 59.] Permanent and honorable salaries shall be established by law, for the justices of the superior court.

ers and other inhabitants in each county, qualified to vote for senators, shall some time in the month of [November],\* give in their votes for one councilor; which votes shall be received, sorted, counted, certified, and returned to the secretary's office, in the same manner as the votes for senators, to be by the secretary laid before the senate and house of representatives on the first Wednesday of [January].†

[ART. 61.] And the person having a [plurality]‡ of votes in any county, shall be considered as duly elected a councilor: But if no person shall have a [plurality]‡ of votes in any county, the senate and house of representatives shall take the names of the two persons who have the highest number of votes in each county, and not elected, and out of those two shall elect by joint ballot, the councilor wanted for such county, and the qualifications for councilors shall be the same as for senator.

[ART. 62.] If any person thus chosen a councilor, shall be elected governor or member of either branch of the legislature, and shall accept the trust: or if any person elected a councilor, shall refuse to accept the office, or in case of the death, resignation, or removal of any councilor out of the state, the governor may issue a precept for the election of a new councilor in that county where such vacancy shall happen and the choice shall be in the same manner as before directed. And the governor shall have full power and authority to convene the council, from time to time, at his discretion; and, with them, or the majority of them, may, and shall, from time to time hold a council, for ordering and directing the affairs of the state, according to the laws of the land.

[ART. 63.] The members of the council may be impeached by the house, and tried by the senate, for bribery, corruption, malpractice, or maladministration.

[ART. 64.] The resolutions and advice of the council shall be recorded by the secretary, in a register, and signed by all the members present agreeing thereto; and this record may be called for at any time, by either house of the legislature; and any member of the council may enter his opinion contrary to the resolutions of the majority, with the reasons for such opinion.

[ART. 71.] [The county treasurers [registers of probate, solicitors, sheriffs]\*\* and registers of deeds, shall be elected by the inhabitants of the several towns, in the several counties in the state, according to the method now practiced, and the laws of the state. *Provided nevertheless* the legislature shall have authority to alter the manner of certifying the votes, and the mode of electing those officers; but not so as to deprive the people of the right they now have of electing them.]††

#### JUDICIARY POWER.

[ART. 73.] The tenure that all commissioned officers shall have by law in their offices shall be expressed in their respective commissions, all judicial officers duly appointed commissioned and sworn, shall hold their offices during good behavior excepting those concerning whom there is a different provision made in this constitution. *Provided nevertheless* the [governor],† with consent of council, may remove them upon the address of both houses of the legislature.

[ART. 74.] Each branch of the legislature as well as the [governor]† and council shall have authority to require the opinions of the justices of the superior court upon important questions of law and upon solemn occasions.

[ART. 75.] In order that the people may not suffer from the long continuance in place of any justice of the peace who shall fail in discharging the important duties of his office with ability and fidelity, all commissions of justices of the peace shall become void at the expiration of five years from their respective dates, and upon the expiration of any commission, the same may if necessary be renewed or another person appointed as shall most conduce to the well being of the state.‡

#### ENCOURAGEMENT OF LITERATURE, TRADES, ETC.

[ART. 83.] Knowledge and learning, generally diffused through a community, being essential to the preservation of a free government; and spreading the opportunities and advantages of education through the various parts of the country, being highly conducive to promote this end; it shall be the duty of the legislators and magistrates, in all future periods of this government, to cherish the interest of literature and the sciences, and all seminaries and public schools, to encourage private and public institutions, rewards, and immunities for the promotion of agriculture, arts, sciences, commerce, trades, manufactures, and natural history of the country; to countenance and inculcate the principles of humanity and general benevolence, public and private charity, industry and economy, honesty and punctuality, sincerity, sobriety, and all social affec-

tions, and generous sentiments, among the people: [Provided, nevertheless, that no money raised by taxation shall ever be granted or applied for the use of the schools or institutions of any religious sect or denomination.]\* [Free and fair competition in the trades and industries is an inherent and essential right of the people and should be protected against all monopolies and conspiracies which tend to hinder or destroy it. The size and functions of all corporations should be so limited and regulated as to prohibit fictitious capitalization and provision should be made for the supervision and government thereof. Therefore, all just power possessed by the state is hereby granted to the general court to enact laws to prevent the operations within the state of all persons and associations, and all trusts and corporations, foreign or domestic, and the officers thereof, who endeavor to raise the price of any article of commerce or to destroy free and fair competition in the trades and industries through combination, conspiracy, monopoly, or any other unfair means; to control and regulate the acts of all such persons, associations, corporations, trusts, and officials doing business within the state; to prevent fictitious capitalization; and to authorize civil and criminal proceedings in respect to all the wrongs herein declared against.]†

treasurer of the state, attorney-general, commissary-general, military officers receiving pay from the continent, or this state (excepting officers of the militia, occasionally called forth on an emergency), register of deeds, sheriff, or officers of the customs, including naval officers, collectors of excise, and state and continental taxes, hereafter appointed, and not having settled their accounts with the respective officers with whom it is their duty to settle such accounts, members of congress, or any person holding any office under the United States, shall at the same time hold the office of governor, or have a seat in the senate, or house of representatives, or council; but his being chosen and appointed to, and accepting the same, shall operate as a resignation of their seat in the chair, senate, or house of representatives, or council; and the place so vacated shall be filled up. [ART. 99.] It shall be the duty of the selectmen, and assessors, of the several towns and places in this state, in warning the first annual meetings for the choice of senators, after the expiration of seven years from the adoption of this constitution, as amended, to insert expressly in the warrant this purpose, among the others for the meeting, to wit, to take the sense of the qualified voters on the subject of a revision of the constitution; and, the meeting being warned accordingly, and not otherwise, the moderator shall take the sense of the qualified voters present as to the necessity of a revision; and a return of the number of votes for and against such necessity, shall be made by the clerk sealed up, and directed to the general court at their then next session; and if it shall appear to the general court by such return, that the sense of the people of the state has been taken, and that, in the opinion of the majority of the qualified voters in the state, present and voting at said meetings, there is a necessity for a revision of the constitution, it shall be the duty of the general court to call a convention for that purpose, otherwise the general court shall direct the sense of the people to be taken, and then proceed in the manner before mentioned. The delegates to be chosen in the same manner, and proportioned, as the representatives to the general court; *provided* that no alterations shall be made in this constitution, before the same shall be laid before the towns and unincorporated places, and approved by two thirds of the qualified voters present and voting on the subject.

## Population of New Hampshire

### NUMBER AND DISTRIBUTION OF INHABITANTS

Population of the State.—New Hampshire was one of the original thirteen States. Its population on April 1, 1930, according to the Fifteenth Census, was 465,293, which represents an increase of 22,210, or 5.0 per cent, as compared with the population on January 1, 1920. The total land area of the State, as shown in Table 3, is 9,031 square miles.\* The average number of inhabitants per square mile in 1930 was 51.5, as compared with 49.1 in 1920.

Table 1 shows the population of New Hampshire from 1790, the year of the first Federal census, to 1930, together with the increase in each decade.

**Counties, cities, and minor civil divisions.**—In the tables which follow (Tables 2 to 6) the population of New Hampshire is shown by counties, cities, and other minor civil divisions, with some comparative figures from previous censuses.

**Cities of 10,000 or more.**—There are nine cities in the state which had a population of 10,000 or more in 1930. Table 2 shows for these cities the population at each census for which figures are available, together with the increase during each decade. The figures shown for the earlier censuses represent, in many cases, the population of the town prior to its incorporation as a city. Manchester, the largest city, first attained a population of 10,000 between 1840 and 1850. Rochester is the only city added to this group following the census of 1920.

Minor civil divisions.—Table 4 shows the population of each county by towns, cities, and other minor civil divisions. The more thickly settled counties are divided into towns and cities, but in Carroll County there are 2 “locations” and in Coos County there are 8 “grants,” 6 “purchases,” 6 “townships,” and 3 “locations.” Of the civil divisions known as “grants” and “purchases,” 7 have had no population returned at any of the last three censuses and so are omitted from the list of minor civil divisions in Table 4.

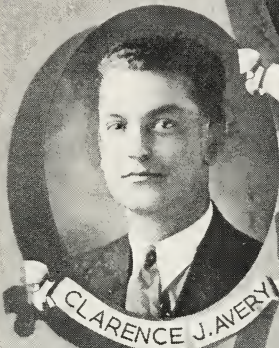

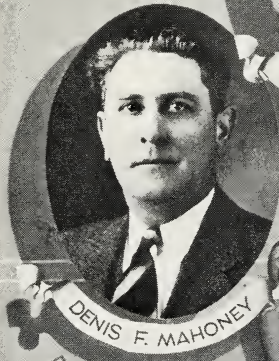

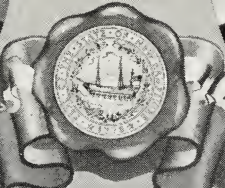

## STATE EMBLEMS

Sections 1 and 4 of Chapter 8 of the Public Laws of New Hampshire were amended by Chapter 133 of the Laws of 1931, so that said Chapter 8 now reads as follows:

### STATE EMBLEMS

1. **Flag.** The state flag shall be of the following color and design: The body or field shall be blue and shall bear upon its center in suitable proportion and colors a representation of the state seal; the seal shall be surrounded by a wreath of laurel leaves with nine stars interspersed. When used for military purposes the flag shall conform to the regulations of the United States.

2. **When Displayed.** It shall be displayed above the state house whenever the legislature is in session and during meetings of the governor and council when expedient, and upon such other occasions as the governor may designate.

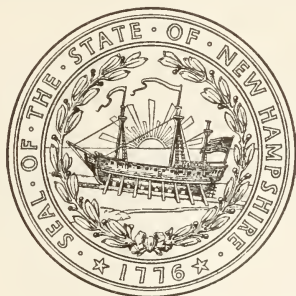
3. **Flower.** The purple lilac, *Syringa vulgaris*, is the state flower of New Hampshire.

4. **Seal.** The seal of the state shall be two inches in diameter, circular, with the following detail and no other: A field crossed by a straight horizon line of the sea, above the center of the field; concentric with the field the rising sun, exposed above the horizon about one third of its diameter, the field encompassed with laurel; across the field for the full width within the laurel a broadside view of the frigate Raleigh, on the stocks; the ship's bow dexter and higher than the stern; the three lower masts shown in place, together with the fore, main and mizzen tops, shrouds and mainstays; an ensign staff at the stern flies the United States flag authorized by act of Congress June 14, 1777; a jury staff on the mainmast and another on the foremast each flies a pennant; flags and pennants are streaming to the dexter side; the hull is shown without a rudder; below the ship the field is divided into land and water by a double diagonal line whose





highest point is sinister; no detail is shown anywhere on the water, nor any on the land between the water and the stocks except a granite boulder on the dexter side; encircling the field is the inscription, SEAL . OF . THE . STATE . OF . NEW HAMPSHIRE, the words separated by round periods, except between the parts of New Hampshire; at the lowest point of the inscription is the date 1776, flanked on either side by a five-pointed star, which group separates the beginning and end of the inscription; the whole form and design to be as follows:



OFFENSES AGAINST THE NATIONAL AND STATE FLAGS  
(Chapter 381, Public Laws.)

---

1. **Marking Flags, etc.** No person shall in any manner, for exhibition or display, place or cause to be placed any inscription, design, device, symbol, name, advertisement, words, character marks or notice whatever upon the national flag, or upon any flag, standard, color or ensign of the United States, or upon the flag of this state, or upon any state flag or ensign of any other state, or upon any flag or ensign evidently purporting to be either of said flags, standards, colors or ensigns.

2. **Affixing to Flags, etc.** No person shall in any manner append, annex or affix, or cause the same to be done, to any such flag, standard, color or ensign, any inscription, design, device, symbol, name, advertisement, words, marks or notice whatever, or exhibit or display, or cause to be exhibited or displayed, any such flag, standard, color or ensign or any flag or ensign evidently purporting to be either of the same, upon which shall in any manner be placed, attached, annexed or affixed any inscription, design, device, symbol, name, advertisement, words, marks or notice whatever.

3. **Using as Advertisement.** No person shall expose, or cause to be exposed, to public view, manufacture, sell, expose for sale, give away or have in possession for sale or to give away or for use for any purpose, any article or substance, being an article of merchandise or a receptacle of merchandise or article or thing for carrying or transporting merchandise, upon which shall have been printed, painted, attached or otherwise placed a representation of any such flag, standard, color or ensign, to advertise, call attention to, decorate, mark or distinguish the article or substance.

4. **Mutilation, etc.** No person shall publicly mutilate, trample upon, defile, deface or cast contempt upon, either by words or acts, any of said flags, standards, colors or ensigns, whether the same are public or private property.

5. **Penalty.** Whoever violates any of the foregoing provisions shall be fined not more than fifty dollars, or imprisoned not more than thirty days, or both.

6. **Exceptions.** Flags, standards, colors or ensigns, the property of, or used in the service of, the United States or of this state, may have inscriptions, names, actions, words, marks or symbols placed thereon, pursuant to law or authorized regulations.

### Display of Foreign Flags

7. **Regulation.** It shall not be lawful to display the flag of any foreign country upon any state, county or municipal buildings; provided, that whenever any foreigners shall become the guests of the United States, the state or any city, upon public proclamation by the governor or the mayor of such city, the flag of the country of which such public guest shall be a citizen may be displayed upon such public buildings.

8. **Penalty.** If any person shall violate any of the provisions of the preceding section he shall be fined not more than one hundred dollars, or imprisoned not more than one year, or both.

RECOUNTS AFTER THE PRIMARY

After the primary election, seventeen recounts of ballots were conducted by the secretary of state, eight of these being in republican contests and nine in democratic contests. By only two of these recounts were the nominations of candidates affected, while an additional recount by the ballot law commission made a third change, as follows:

The republican recount for Croydon showed a tie of 52 votes for both candidates for representative, which was won by lot by Asa D. Cutting.

The democratic recount, Dover, Ward 5, showed Edward Durnin, candidate for representative, with his 110 votes, placed above Emmet J. Fanagan who lost two votes.

In Nashua, Ward 8, by decision of the ballot law commission, that three of the disputed democratic ballots for representative could be counted for Anthony W. Joyce, he was raised to fourth position in place of Thomas A. Chamberland.

Other changes which may be noted in the tabulation of figures did not affect the nomination of candidates whose names appear with the figures of the return after the primary, followed by the figures of the "recount." The asterisks indicate the nominees of the party.

# REPUBLICAN ORGANIZATION, 1938

---

The Republican state convention met at Concord, Tuesday, October 4, 1938, with Harold K. Davison of Haverhill, presiding officer, and adopted the following platform:

## PLATFORM OF THE REPUBLICAN PARTY

The delegates of the Republican party in New Hampshire, assembled in lawful convention at Concord, this fourth day of October, 1938, do hereby solemnly affirm their abiding faith in the Republic of our fathers, and they dedicate themselves to the preservation of the Constitution of the United States and of the State of New Hampshire, to the maintenance of law and order, to the safeguarding of American ideals and American institutions, and to the perpetuation for posterity of the blessings which have accrued from the upholding of the great principles of human rights and human liberties.

### Peace and National Defense

We are happy for all the peoples of Europe that the immediate perils of major warfare have been averted and we pledge the Republican members of the New Hampshire delegation in the Congress to be watchful and to exert every effort in order that our country may continue to enjoy peace it has so long known. But peace is a state which must be safeguarded against those who desire war. Therefore, we insist that the United States at all times maintain a system of national defense sufficiently strong to defend its territory and to provide full protection to its people.

In New Hampshire, the progress which has been made in the last half century is the result of Republican initiative and Republican administration. After two more years of successful conduct of the state's affairs—proud of its record of platform promises faithfully redeemed, of the effective manner in which newly-arisen problems have been solved, and of the high standards which have been maintained in fiscal affairs—the party confidently presents itself before the voters and solicits a renewal of their support in the coming election.

### The Republican Candidates

We commend, without reservation, the efficient, businesslike administration which Governor Francis P. Murphy has given the state, and take pride in his noteworthy record of legislative and administrative accomplishment. We look forward with every

assurance to his election for another term so that he may carry forward to completion the projects and policies which he has already initiated and which embody so much of assured performance and benefit to the state.

We warmly commend the work of our Republican members in Congress, Senator H. Styles Bridges and Congressmen Charles W. Tobey and Arthur B. Jenks, in maintaining the best traditions of the Republican party and for their active representation of New Hampshire's interests in the Congress at Washington.

We condemn the action of the Democratic Congress in unseating Congressman Jenks for purely political reasons after he had served a great portion of his term. We are confident that the voters of the First Congressional District, at the polls in November, will in unmistakable fashion express their disapproval of this ruthless violation of their right of freely choosing representatives.

The candidates of the Republican party have been selected by the free voice of our party membership and we commend the ticket, from the Governor and the candidates for national office down to the candidates for local office, as able and entirely worthy of support.

### Fiscal Policies

Government in all levels is confronted today by conflicting demands for a reduction of costs and for new and extended public services. In the conduct of the state's fiscal affairs, we pledge the party, first and foremost, to the sound principle of the balanced budget whereby the expenses of government will continue to be restricted to the limits of its income. We commit ourselves to a policy of rigid economy and thrift in administration without curtailing any essential function of government. We commend the practice of the present administration in submitting major contracts for competitive bidding and we favor the enactment of legislation designed to make that method a permanent feature of the state's system of managing such transactions.

### Taxation

The principle of "taxation for essential government needs only" is sound Republican doctrine and to it we reaffirm our allegiance. Being aware of the heavy burden of taxes which rests upon the owner of real estate, we definitely commit ourselves to the theory that the levying of such taxes should be exclusively reserved to the cities and towns and that, at the earliest practical moment, the direct state tax should be eliminated.

### Amendments to Constitution

We praise the work of the Constitutional Convention and its non-partisan deliberations and recommend a careful study of the several amendments submitted to the people. We particularly recommend the adoption of the Fourth Amendment, intended to relieve the tax burden of the farmer, the manufacturer, the merchant, and the home owner.

### Unemployment and Relief

Unemployment is the most serious of our problems and its only real solution lies in the restoration of business confidence, and stabilized re-employment in private industry. To meet the immediate problem of relief, we pledge the full financial co-operation of the state to the end that every man, woman and child shall be assured food, shelter and human comforts. The use of relief money and the exploitation of human misery by the New Deal Administration for political purposes we utterly condemn. It is our belief that, if the people are to derive maximum benefits from expenditures for relief, responsibility for their administration should be vested in non-political agencies familiar with local problems and that the contribution of the federal government to the states' relief burden should take the form of supplementary grants-in-aid to the state.

### Labor

We proclaim the dignity of labor's partnership in the industrial system and recognize the right of those who work, including all of us, to a just share in the profits of business, based upon the relative extent of their contribution. With equitable participation in the results of increased industrial efficiency, labor is entitled to reasonable leisure for the enjoyment of its fruits, and we endorse, as a right, its desire to bargain collectively, without coercion, through representatives of its own choosing.

Believing strongly in the humane concept of minimum wage and maximum hours, we pledge ourselves to insure just enforcement of the existing minimum wage statute and its extension to provide for the application of minimum wage and maximum hour standards to those industries in the state which are not subject to federal regulation. Furthermore, it is our belief that, if the mutual interests of employee and employer are justly to be served and protected a larger degree of uniformity must diligently be sought everywhere in the enactment of state labor legislation, and the rich potentialities which lie in the field of interstate compacts should be more thoroughly explored and developed.

### Social Security

We are committed to the principle that it is the duty of society as a whole to promote social security and New Hampshire has with prudence availed itself of every opportunity to co-operate in federal undertakings to that end. We object to and severely condemn as a fraud upon the people the policy of the federal government in utilizing for current expenses payroll taxes collected from the workers of our state for the purpose of creating a reserve for social security.

In New Hampshire, unemployment compensation is operating on a "pay-as-you-go" basis, and has already proved a great boon to our workers. Ours was the first state in the Union to qualify under the Social Security Act. The original statute, enacted in 1935, was revised two years ago so that New Hampshire now has the most modern statute of the kind in the entire country. By eliminating employee contributions, it has in effect placed a great sum of money in the pockets of the workers in our factories and mills.

We intend to maintain New Hampshire's leadership in this field and believe that an important way to accomplish that is by constructive improvement of the statute, especially by liberalizing its provisions relative to waiting periods for the benefit of the employee and by simplifying the administrative process for the benefit of the employer.

We are heartily in sympathy with efforts being made to insure to all an honest measure of protection against dependency in old age. From the principles of laws already enacted to that end there can be no retreat. However, the system of old age pensions established under the Social Security Act falls far short of meeting actual needs and there are grave defects in its financial provisions. We stand squarely on this plan, embodied in the Republican National platform of 1936:

"We propose a system of old age security, based on the following principles: (1) We approve a pay-as-you-go policy, which requires of each generation the support of the aged and the determination of what is just and adequate. (2) Every American citizen over 65 should receive the supplementary payment necessary to provide a necessary income sufficient to protect him or her from want. (3) Each state and territory, upon complying with simple and general minimum standards, should receive from the federal government a graduated contribution in proportion to its own, up to a fixed maximum. (4) To make this program consistent with sound fiscal policy the federal revenues for this purpose must be provided from the proceeds of a direct tax widely distributed. All will be benefited and all should contribute."

### Agriculture

Believing that the stabilization of agriculture is an economic and not a political problem, we pledge the continuance, with lib-

eral appropriations, of the state's campaign for the eradication of infectious and contagious diseases among farm live stock; the utilization of every avenue of assistance in meeting the serious problems of flood and storm losses; the initiation of a definite program of research, built around the laboratories at the University of New Hampshire, intended to develop new and extended uses for milk, woods, potatoes, and other farm products; the further correlation of the work of the state police with that of local authorities for the better protection of life and property in the rural and recreational districts; and so far as funds will permit we commit the state to a continuance of its program of betterment in the field of rural roads.

### Recreation

Nature has endowed New Hampshire with great beauty, which should be safeguarded, and with many climatic advantages. Age has lent it much charm and historical lore. Upon these assets, a great industry, providing for those who come for recreation and health, has been built up. During the administration of Governor Murphy, the state has made outstanding additions to the recreational attractions of New Hampshire. Within the limits of funds available, we pledge ourselves to continue this wholesome and economically sound program of balanced development and to maintain the state's program of advertising these recreational attractions.

### Hunting and Fishing

Among all the varied recreational resources of New Hampshire, none are more appreciated by our own citizens or are more attractive to the hundreds of thousands of visitors from other states than the opportunities for fishing and hunting afforded by our great woods, our lakes, ponds and streams. However, the maintenance of these resources cannot be left to nature alone. Neither can the state hope to finance adequate programs of fish stocking and wild life conservation solely with funds collected from sportsmen in the form of license fees. If the regular income available to the Department of Fish and Game proves insufficient to accomplish these desirable purposes, it should be supplemented by a reasonable appropriation out of state funds raised otherwise.

### Manufacturing Industry

Since the manufacturing industry is the dominant source of the wealth and income of our New Hampshire people and the principal field of their employment, variations in its prosperity and extensity are reflected in the prosperity and the well-being of the state as a whole. Consequently, industries already existing in the state should receive every possible encouragement

and help, and a continuous effort should be made to interest reputable out-of-state organizations in the advantages of New Hampshire as an industrial location.

### Flood Control

For a second time within the space of three years, the people of New Hampshire have suffered calamitous losses due to floods—damages to property and to physical well-being which would have been greatly lessened, and might have been avoided entirely, had the state been able to execute the comprehensive flood control program to which the Republican party committed itself in the last campaign.

We condemn the action of the New Deal administration in dictatorially blocking ratification of the inter-state compacts entered into by Massachusetts, Connecticut, Vermont, and New Hampshire and in subsequently failing to initiate greatly needed flood control projects under a federal statute which was finally enacted as a substitute for the compacts. The compacts were drafted in accordance with the Flood Control Act of 1936, by which the federal government pledged co-operation with the states in the construction of flood control projects. They were adopted by the legislatures of the four states, Democrats and Republicans uniting in their support; approved by the Secretary of War and recommended for ratification by committees in both branches of Congress.

We commend Governor Murphy for undertaking, through the New Hampshire Water Resources Board, the construction upon the Connecticut River of a flood control and conservation reservoir which is to be self-liquidating and we pledge ourselves to continued efforts to protect life and property from destructive floods and generally to conserve and develop our natural resources.

### Education

Since education is the foundation upon which good citizenship and every means of economic advancement are based, the upholding of the high standards which exist in our school system is a prime duty, and the maintenance and improvement of these facilities and the broadening of educational objectives to meet the changing circumstances of life are paramount responsibilities. The present plan of equalizing elementary school costs among the various towns by allocating state funds to towns where the burden is abnormally heavy has proved of great value and ought to be continued.

### Veterans' Legislation

The New Deal administration has been exceedingly negligent in failing to provide necessary hospital facilities for our sick and

suffering ex-service men. Among all the states in the Union, New Hampshire is one of two which do not have a veterans' hospital, and New Hampshire veterans are obliged to undergo great inconvenience and suffering in traveling long distances to other states in order to secure the medical care and attention which this nation owes the men who fought in the Great War. This situation has excited the indignation of thoughtful citizens everywhere and, under the leadership of Governor Murphy and Congressman Tobey, this callous disregard of the right of afflicted New Hampshire soldiers to be cared for with kindness and given the best possible medical attention has been made an issue which the public will no longer overlook and which the veterans themselves will insist the federal authorities answer by the construction in New Hampshire as soon as possible of a first-class veterans' hospital.

For the benefit of the thousands of veterans who annually visit and enjoy the campground at The Weirs, Governor Murphy has undertaken, through a special committee appointed by him early this year, to study and recommend a plan for modernizing the facilities at the campground so that to a far greater extent than ever before it may be a place where New Hampshire veterans may hold their reunions with pleasure and comfort and where they can happily bring their families for vacation periods.

New Hampshire published an official record of the soldiers who fought in its Civil War but nothing has yet been done to perform a similar needed service for those who participated in the Spanish American War, in the Philippine Campaign, in the Boxer Rebellion, in Mexico or in the World War. To correct this situation, a state committee on military records and history has been appointed, provided with funds, and is engaged in the preparation of a volume of personal military records which will be proposed to the next legislature for publication. Finally, the satisfactory and highly necessary work performed by the Veterans' Service Officer as a part of the activities of the Board of Public Welfare, has been continued and given every possible support.

### Highways

Good highways with year round maintenance are vitally essential to the economy of our state. For many years, especially during the last five, a great program of development of primary, secondary and rural roads building has been carried out. As far as funds will permit, the same sensible highway policies to which the state has adhered in the past should be followed in future.

### Vocational Training

One of the disturbing problems which have grown out of the period of depression is the plight of large numbers of ambitious

and well-trained young men and women who today are unable to find useful and permanent employment for their talents and energies. The economic reorientation, by means of special vocational training, of the lives of adults who have suffered technological displacement is another serious educational question which, like that of insuring opportunity for the youth of New Hampshire, can only be answered by the co-operative effort of our industries, and of the state and federal agencies concerned. We pledge ourselves to encourage this helpful program and promise full co-operation on the part of the state.

#### Merit System

Measures designed to protect those who constitute the civil service, through national and state laws, have been an achievement of the Republican party. We pledge ourselves to the enactment of a merit service law which will standardize and classify wages, hours, and working conditions in all state departments and institutions; and which will afford equal opportunities to all citizens to obtain employment in the state service, to seek advancement on a basis of personal qualifications, and to protect state employees from political influences.

#### The 1938 Flood and Storm

To those innumerable citizens whose property was destroyed or damaged during the recent disastrous flood and wind storm, the Republican party offers its heartfelt sympathy. We commend the prompt action of Governor Murphy in creating an effective agency of reconstruction, in directly and quickly presenting to the federal authorities the problems of rehabilitating private as well as public losses due to the flood and storm, and in securing promises of generous financial assistance which will obviate major increases in the burden on the taxpayers of New Hampshire. We pledge the complete co-operation of every agency of the state in the work of repairing the damage occasioned by the recent storm and in preventing unnecessary subsequent loss, especially those sustained by the owners of woodlands and orchards, where prompt and effective salvaging methods will be productive of untold good.

#### Platform Pledges to be Kept

Finally, we solemnly express our belief in the integrity of contracts, whether public or private, especially those in the form of party pledges and declaration of policies made to the voters during the period of campaign. Standing firmly upon the Republican party's proud record of pledges redeemed in the past, we present this platform to the voters with the formal assurance of the party and of every one of the candidates on its ticket that these obligations will be respected with the same honesty and the same faithfulness in performance as mark the fulfillment of other contractual engagements.

# DEMOCRATIC ORGANIZATION, 1938

---

The Democratic state convention met at Concord, October 4, 1938, with John J. Sheehan of Manchester, presiding officer, and adopted the following platform:

## DEMOCRATIC STATE PLATFORM

Viewing with pride the accomplishments of the National Administration under our great President, Franklin Delano Roosevelt, to further the equitable security of all American citizens through such humanitarian legislation as old age assistance and help for youth, unemployment insurance, minimum wages and maximum hours, insurance of savings bank deposits, regulation of stock exchanges and the sale of securities, and the relief of unemployment through federal projects and federal assistance to state, city and town projects, we pledge our continuing support of these measures and endorse the support to them by Senator Fred H. Brown. We commend the recent successful efforts of our President to dissuade the world from resorting to war, and we join with him in his determination that America be free of foreign entanglements. America must be kept out of war.

### Economy

The widespread destruction of taxable property in the recent catastrophe makes imperative the utmost possible economy without the impairment of the vital functions of State Government. We pledge the efforts of our candidates to co-operate to the fullest extent with the Federal Government to secure relief for those people who suffered from destruction of property and timber in the recent disaster.

### Taxes

Recognizing the disproportionate burden upon real estate, we recommend that all new revenue from any sources whatsoever be applied in reduction of present real estate taxes.

### Labor

In the state as well as in the nation the Democratic party has always espoused the cause of labor. This year to place intra-state labor on the same basis as inter-state labor, we advocate the adoption of a law to provide minimum wages and maximum hours and to guarantee to intra-state labor the same right to organize now enjoyed by inter-state labor. Because of the increasing volume and complexity of the various laws and regulations pertaining to labor and the benefits to labor, we recommend that the Labor Department be adapted to meet modern conditions and to solve modern problems.

All records of the Labor Department, as well as those of the Comptroller's office and all State Departments, must be made available to the public at all times.

### **Agriculture**

(1) We recommend the appropriation of sufficient funds to match federal contributions for eradication of livestock and poultry diseases.

(2) The financing of the highway department must be re-arranged so that this department will be able to match grants available to the state from the federal government for highway purposes.

(3) We approve the present allocation of state funds to equalize the cost of elementary schools among the towns where the burden is abnormally heavy. We believe, however, that the law should be so modified that the funds appropriated may be available for equalization of high school costs as well as elementary school costs.

### **Liquor**

Proud of the intelligent manner in which the state of New Hampshire has until now handled the problem of the sale of intoxicating beverages, and believing that the advantage of state liquor stores lies in the control it gives to the state over a grave social problem, we vigorously condemn the change in policy which indicates that henceforth the state will engage in the liquor business for profit rather than for control. Believing that it is not a governmental function to try to increase the per capita alcoholic consumption by the people of New Hampshire, we denounce the recently executed contract providing for advertising in state liquor stores; and we do further proclaim that no private interest should participate with the state in the sale, advertising or merchandising of liquor in New Hampshire's state stores.

### **Old Age Assistance**

Recognizing that of the 35,000 people in New Hampshire over the age of seventy, many are in destitute circumstances through no fault of their own, and because of the loss of savings which they set aside to support themselves in their declining years are in need of assistance, we demand a sympathetic and efficient administration of the present old age assistance laws for the equal benefit of all who are qualified.

### **Mothers' Aid**

Although Mothers' Aid has been recognized for several years to be the most constructive and economic solution of the de-

pendent child problem, adequate funds for this type of relief have never been available. We urge that the appropriation for this work be increased so that all eligible for this help may preserve their family unity in their own home.

### **Cripples**

We recommend that the functions of the Department of Public Welfare—which now administers assistance to the aged, the blind, the dependent children, and the widowed mothers with children of school age—be broadened to enable this department to extend help to those unfortunate cripples, adult and minor, who are in need.

### **Flood Control**

Recognizing the jeopardy to the lives of our citizens and the extensive property damage that results from major floods in this state, we approve the measures already adopted by the Federal Government with relation to flood control and urge that they be carried out as soon as possible.

### **Unemployment**

We pledge the co-operation of our candidates with the Federal authorities in all efforts to relieve unemployment in New Hampshire.

### **Education**

Proud of the support the Democratic Party has always given to the educational institutions of the state, we pledge our continuing assistance to the University of New Hampshire, the Normal Schools, and our state educational system.

### **Recreational Activities**

Proud of New Hampshire's natural charm, and recognizing our outdoor attractions as one of our greatest assets, we urge an increase in the efforts to make known to non-residents New Hampshire facilities for recreation throughout the year.

### **Fish and Game**

Recognizing that fishing and hunting annually bring into New Hampshire millions of dollars, we urge the further development of the activities of this department, and we recommend to the legislature a consideration of the desirability of supporting the department with specific appropriations.

### **Housing Administration**

Recognizing that there are communities in New Hampshire which might at some future date wish to take advantage of federal assistance in providing better living facilities for their underprivileged citizens, we recommend the passage of an enabling act which will permit them to avail themselves of the benefits under the Federal Housing Act.

### **State Contracts**

We urge that all state contracts be awarded after free and open discussion of all of their provisions; that all construction contracts specify New Hampshire labor and materials insofar as obtainable; and we recommend the adoption of a building code for all state buildings.

### **State Employees**

The right of all American citizens to vote as they choose without coercion from any source is guaranteed by the Constitution. We recommend the enactment of legislation to protect this right for all state employees.

### **Graves Registration**

We pledge the efforts of our candidates to co-operate with the Federal Government in approving the project for the registration of the graves of the veterans of all wars.

### **Amendments to Constitution**

We approve the work of the Constitutional Convention and recommend adoption of the amendments proposed. Particularly do we point out that the tax burden in New Hampshire is not only heavy but also unfairly distributed, and as a result, an excessive burden is placed on all classes of real property. This is a serious menace to the economic future of the state, since it discourages our industries, home building and home owning, and the future development of our forest and agricultural resources.

If this tax amendment is approved the additional powers should be used for the purpose of affording all possible relief to real property.

The Democratic party and candidates announce their determination to oppose the enactment of any legislation which provides for any kind of sales tax.

We pledge our support to our candidates and invite the electorate of New Hampshire regardless of party affiliation to join us in electing these men.

Section 35, Chapter 3 of the Laws of the Special Session of 1934, requires the following questions to be submitted to the voters in cities and towns on the usual ballot at each biennial election:

"Shall state stores be operated by permission of the State Liquor Commission in this city or town, under the provisions of 'An Act to regulate the traffic in intoxicating liquor,' passed at the 1934 special session of the general court?"

"Shall beverages be sold in this city or town under permits granted by the State Liquor Commission under the provisions of chapter 99 of the Laws of 1933, and amendments thereto?"

# GOVERNOR'S PROCLAMATION

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT

Concord, November 29, 1938

Be it known that I, Francis P. Murphy, Governor of the State of New Hampshire, in obedience to the request of the Constitutional Convention holden at Concord, beginning with May 11, 1938, do hereby proclaim to the people of this state that the Constitution of New Hampshire is amended as provided for in the second question which was submitted by the said Constitutional Convention to the qualified voters of the state at the meetings held in the several towns, city wards, and places in this state, on the Tuesday next following the first Monday in November, 1938. The alteration and amendment in said Constitution covered by said second question has been approved and adopted and, the Constitution is thus amended by the suffrages of more than two-thirds of the qualified voters present at the said meetings, and voting upon the said question.

I do further proclaim to the people of the state that the Constitution of New Hampshire is not amended, as provided for in the first, third, and fourth questions submitted by the said Constitutional Convention to the qualified voters of the state at the meetings held in the several towns, city wards, and places in this state, on the Tuesday next following the first Monday in November, 1938, as none of these last mentioned questions, nor the amendments to the Constitution covered by the same, were adopted by the suffrages of two-thirds of the qualified voters present at said meetings, and voting upon said questions.

Given under my hand and the seal of said state, at the council chamber, this twenty-ninth day of November, A. D. 1938, and of the Independence of the United States of America, the one hundred and sixty-third.
