HISTORIC EVENTS IN 1979-80 BIENNIUM

New Hampshire's state government faces an impressive array of historic milestones in its 1979-80 biennium.

There will be the 300th anniversary of its royal creation by the King of England on September 18, 1679.

There will also be the 300th anniversary of establishment of New Hampshire's Legislature on March 16, 1680.

The 1979-80 biennium includes the 200th anniversary of New Hampshire's proposed creation of the world's first free Constitution, of the people, for the people, and by the people, on June 5, 1779.

Also included will be the 100th anniversary of the state government's going onto a biennial basis on June 4, 1879.

SETTLERS OPPOSED OWN GOVERNMENT

When King Charles II decreed a provincial government upon New Hampshire on September 18, 1679, it was against the wishes of its settlers. They had been affiliated with Massachusetts, by their own choice, for some 40 years, and they resented the severance.

There was no friendliness in the royal edict. Its basic purpose was to reactivate ownership of the New Hampshire territory for an heir to Captain John Mason, to whom it had been granted half a century earlier.

The 4,000-word Royal Commission which forced New Hampshire to assume its own government, emphasized that Grandson Robert Tufton Mason of England was to become the undisputed owner of the entire area. It also spelled out that all property owners of Portsmouth, Dover, Hampton and Exeter, which were then New Hampshire's only settled areas, would be required to pay annual rentals to young Mason on all their developed holdings.

Edward Randolph, Mason's cousin, who played a major role in reviving the Masonian claim, was delegated to deliver the Royal Commission, and supervise its implementation. He did so in Portsmouth, via New York, on January 1, 1680, and was understandably as unwelcome as his missive. Five years earlier, this minor British official had generated the enmity of New Hampshire's leading citizens when he toured the four towns, under royal sponsorship, in an effort to muster support for restoration of the Mason proprietorship.

LEADING MEN FORCED TO SERVE

The Royal Commission named a President and a nine-member Executive Council to head up the new government. Interestingly, the leading citizens of the four towns were appointed without their knowledge. Source of these selections remain unrecorded. But whether or not Randolph had a part, they were obviously of clever design.

Elderly John Cutt, wealthy Portsmouth merchant, was named President. He and two brothers from Wales settled in the Portsmouth area forty years earlier, and all of them became rich and influential. The Council appointees were equally prominent and respected, and some of them openly denounced the new government because of its Masonian threat to their properties. But Randolph countered with an

ultimatum. He warned that the royal assignments had to be accepted within twenty days, to avoid possible fines or imprisonment.

Cutt and his associates weighed the prospect of less desirable men heading up the new government. So they bowed to the royal decree on January 21, 1680, just before the deadline, and were sworn into office.

The Royal Commission designated six men to serve on the Council. They were Richard Martyn, William Vaughan and Thomas Daniels of Portsmouth; Major Richard Waldron of Dover, John Gilman of Exeter and Christopher Hussey of Hampton. They, in turn, were charged with naming three additional Councilors, who became Elias Stileman of Portsmouth, Samuel Dalton of Hampton and Job Clements of Dover.

ELEVEN IN FIRST ASSEMBLY

The Council's first duty was creation of an Assembly. So it ordered the four towns to submit lists of their property owners by February 15. From these data the Council posted special lists of "freemen" to vote for "Deputies" to this pioneer Legislature. They totalled only 209 men, with 71 for Portsmouth, 61 for Dover, 57 for Hampton, and only 20 for Exeter. The Council also decreed that the three larger townships were each entitled to elect three legislators, while Exeter was limited to two members.

New Hampshire's first legislative election was on March 1, 1680, at 9 A.M., and the winners were to report for duty at Portsmouth on March 16, also at 9 A.M. The eleven men elected to this historic Assembly were John Pickering, Robert Elliot and Philip Lewis of Portsmouth; Peter Coffin, Anthony Nutter and Richard Waldron, Jr., of Dover; Anthony Stanyan, Thomas Marston and Edward Gove of Hampton, and Captain Bartholemew Tippen and Lieutenant Ralph Hall of Exeter. Scene of the opening session remains unknown, but historians have suggested it probably was in a tavern. Young Waldron, 30, became Speaker. Reverend Joshua Moody of Portsmouth, staunch Puritan like President Cutt and most of the Councilors, gave the invocation, and later a sermon, on opening day.

VOTE REGRETS AND DEFIANCE

This tiny Legislature of the people quickly asserted independence, and voted strong issue with the Royal Commission. It expressed formal regrets to Massachusetts Bay Colony for being severed from its rule, and defied King Charles' order that they pay young Mason for the properties they had developed through half a century.

The resolution of regrets, in which President Cutt and his Council concurred, read in the following quaint manner:

The late turn of Providence made among us by the all-ordering Hand has given occasion for this present application, wherein we crave leave as we are duty bound —

1 — Thankfully to acknowledge your great care for us and your kindness towards us while we dwelt under your shadow, owning ourselves deeply obliged that you were pleased, upon our earnest request and supplication to take us under your government and ruled us well whilst we so remained, so that we cannot give the least countenance to those reflections that have been cast upon you, as if you had dealt injuriously with us.

2 — That no dissatisfaction with your government, but merely our submission to Divine Providence to his Majestie's Commands, to whom

we owe allegiance, without any seeking of our own, or desire of change, was the only cause of our complying with that present separation from you that we are now under, but should have heartily rejoiced if it had seemed good to the Lord and His Majesty to have settled in the same capacity as formerly.

The freshmen legislators firmly rebuffed the Masonian rental fees, with the approval of president Cutt and his Council, in the following law:

TOWNSHIPS & CONFIRMED — To prevent contention & controversy, that may arise amongst us by reason of the late change of Government; It Is Ordered by this Assembly and the Authority thereof; THAT all Lands, Townships, Town-grants, with all the other grants, lying within the limits of this province; and all other rights and properties: SHAL stand good, & are hereby confirmed to the Towns and persons concerned, in the same state & condition as they did before this late Alteration.

BASIC AUTHORITY INITIATED

The tiny Legislature declared itself the basic source of governmental power and authority — a policy which continues to this day. The Royal Commission decreed that all votes of the legislators were subject to approval or rejection by the President and Council, and they readily endorsed the following statute, in which the phrase “General Assembly” became first used:

It is ordered and enacted by this General Assembly “including the Council) and the authority thereof, that no act, imposition, law or ordinance be made or imposed upon us, but shall be made by the same Assembly, and approved by the President and Council, from time to time; that justice and right be impartially administered unto all; not sold, denied or causelessly deferred unto any.

This pioneer legislative session enacted an array of basic laws, with rigid restrictions on personal conduct, as copied from the Puritanical statutes of Massachusetts. The four towns were given authority to elect “Select Men” to supervise their own affairs. A voter, or Freeman, was defined as a male Protestant of at least 24 years of age and possessed of property valued at a minimum of 20 pounds sterling. There was also this definition of drunkenness:

It is to be understood as one that lips or falters in his speech by reason of over much drink; or that staggers in his going; or that vomits by reason of excessive drinking; or that cannot by reason thereof follow his calling.

The Royal Commission reserved for the royal government at London the final say, or approval, of the General Assembly laws, and it has been recorded that King Charles never endorsed the actions of this first Legislature.

MASON FIRMLY REBUFFED

The 48-year-old Randolph, who had settled at Boston with the lucrative titles of Surveyor General and Collector of Customs, protested the brashness of New Hampshire’s new government, and London officialdom swung into action. Young Mason was given authority to rush to Portsmouth, with the title of Lord Proprietor and a seat on the Council, to press his rental claims. He arrived late in December of 1680, and was politely greeted even as his personal bid for proprietary payments were firmly snubbed.

President Cutt became ill in the spring of 1681 and died of old age on March 27, even as Mason fled back to London to escape threatened reprimands from Cutt's government for pressing his rental demands. The 11-man Assembly was in session as these developments occurred, and Councilor Waldron, an old Indian fighter and father of speaker Waldron, became Acting President.

New Hampshire's dauntless pioneering government was replaced late in 1682 by a royal Governor from London with dictatorial powers designed to once again impose the Masonian claim upon the settlers. He was Edward Cranfield, a penniless scion of a royal court family, with the imposing title of Lieutenant Governor and Commander-in-Chief. And he was accompanied to Portsmouth by young Mason.

CRANFIELD WREAKS HAVOC

The Assembly offered friendship to Cranfield and voted a substantial annual salary of 250 pounds for him. It then approved his request for an adjustment in his authority, which to the legislators later dismay, gave Cranfield complete control over judicial and law enforcement personnel, and the right to replace Councilors as he wished.

The Assembly soon learned, to its astonishment, that Mason had bribed both King Charles and Governor Cranfield, with private pledges to share his profits, in return for their support in renewing his rental demands. From then on there developed open warfare between Cranfield and the Assembly.

By late 1683, Cranfield dissolved the Assembly after it had repeatedly refused to vote new taxes, and this triggered open revolt. Assemblyman Edward Gove of Hampton launched a one-day armed rebellion which failed dismally as fellow dissidents declined to join that rash action. He was arrested and sentenced to death for treason, as Cranfield confiscated the properties of this wealthy Hampton leader, but the penalty was never carried out.

Governor Cranfield then imposed new taxes by Council decree and employed special constables to collect them. But the embattled populace held firm, and on occasion even caused the constables to flee for their very lives, as they tried to carry out their new duties.

Cranfield's arrogance led to his downfall. As he learned of a possible recall by his London superiors, he fled to the West Indies, where he was given another royal appointment. From 1685 into 1692, New Hampshire continued without an Assembly, and the Masonian controversy became dormant in that period.

N.H. ONCE RULED MASSACHUSETTS

New Hampshire returned to Massachusetts' jurisdiction for a brief period, in 1689 into 1692, when the London royal government became beset with civil strife and temporarily abandoned supervision of the New England area.

This was a far cry from 1623 when New Hampshire was settled by young David Thomson, an aide to the newly-created Council of New England, with the title of Acting Governor of New England. Thomson, who pioneered Portsmouth (first called Pascataway) and Dover, held that title for most of the five years up to his sudden death, at 35, in 1628, on Thompson's Island, in Boston harbor, where he had taken up residence to better carry out his gubernatorial functions.

As Pascataway became the Capital of New England, Governor Thomson's principal duty was to guard the area's seacoast from possible intrusion by ships of other European countries. Massachusetts then comprised only the settlements of

Plymouth and what is now Salem; the Maine area comprised only Monhegan, which was abandoned in 1626, and Piscataway shared the New Hampshire territory with nearby Dover, a fishing center.

New Hampshire history never recorded Thomson as a Governor, until this interesting historical fact was reported in 1973 by two of his descendants, as they researched their family genealogy. The details were presented in an authenticated pamphlet to Governor Meldrim Thomson, Jr., by Matthew R. Thompson of Salem, Oregon, retired educator and Navy Commander, and Ralph E. Thompson of Fairview, N.J., a retired civil engineer.

WORLD HISTORY IN CONCORD

It was two centuries ago, on June 5, 1779, that New Hampshire developed the first free Constitution of the people, by the people, and for the people, in world history.

It had been drafted during the previous year by an interim committee of the first Constitutional Convention of delegates elected by the people for that sole and express purpose, ever recorded in the history of mankind. This convention convened at Concord on June 10, 1778, and its historic significance has never been emphasized by Granite State historians, nor observed in any manner for that reason.

This pioneer Constitution, which was submitted to the people on June 5, 1779, was of popular origin. The handful of faculty members of then tiny Dartmouth College (created in 1769) sparked a public demand for a government of the people, for the people and by the people, because of dissatisfaction with operations of the temporary, war-time Constitution of January 5, 1776, which was created by the Legislature and never submitted to popular referendum. As the Legislature assigned its members to virtually all the lucrative offices in the temporary government, public resentment forced the 1777 Legislature to vote to authorize the unique convention. The Dartmouth-sparked demand also set the session for Concord, to make it within easier travel distance for the delegates, than Exeter or Portsmouth, where the state Capitol was located through the first century.

VOTERS KILL FIRST PERMANENT DOCUMENT

New Hampshire's first proposed permanent Constitution was rebuffed by the people it was designed to serve. Copies of the document, made up of a modest Bill of Rights of seven paragraphs, and a form of government covering only 32 paragraphs, were sent to each town, and published in the handful of tiny newspapers which then served only the seacoast area.

When the convention delegates reconvened on September 22, to tabulate the voting results, it was announced the proposed Constitution had been rejected. No Journal records of this convention, or the voting results, were ever preserved for history. But the convention then adjourned.

Time has yielded reasons why the people rebuffed this pioneer free government of their own making. One was that a man had to be 24 years of age, a member of the Protestant faith, and possessed of 300 pounds of wealth, to serve in the Legislature. Another proviso of the rejected Constitution retained for the Legislature the right to appoint court officials and a wide range of other government officers. Then, it created a 12-member Executive Council, elected by the people, to serve as the upper branch of what became labelled the "General Court." In addition, the towns were granted a House of Representatives seat for every 100 families, but the smaller towns were required to merge, if necessary to meet that requirement, and they understandably resented this curb on their right to individual legislative representation, regardless of sparse population.

Massachusetts launched a Constitutional Convention patterned after the New Hampshire innovation, in the latter part of 1779, which in 1780 successfully produced that state's present Constitution as the oldest in the nation. Other states utilized this unique manner of creating a government of the people, for the people and by the people, and then the historic federal Constitution of the United States was developed in the same manner. Finally President Abraham Lincoln immortalized this New Hampshire-born lodestone of American democracy as his Gettysburg Speech in 1863 enshrined the phrase "Government Of The People, For The People, And By The People," into world history.

The New Hampshire Legislature authorized a new Constitutional Convention for 1781, with a special requirement that it remain in session until it produced a Constitution acceptable by the voters. This requirement proved its worth because New Hampshiremen voted down two new government drafts, in 1781 and in 1782, before the convention finally approved a Constitution to their liking. This Constitution won a two-thirds approval, which was announced on October 31, 1783, the new government was launched on June 2, 1784, and continues to this day.

WARTIME PROBLEMS OF 1779

New Hampshire's legislative life was unique two centuries ago. The main problem of the 1779 Legislature, which comprised an 84-member House of Representatives under Speaker John Langdon of Portsmouth, and a 12-member Council (predecessor to the Senate), headed by President Meshech Weare of Hampton Falls, was helping to finance the Revolutionary War.

Early in 1779 the Legislature voted 250,000 pounds sterling, in taxes, of which 150,000 pounds was given to the Continental Congress, to finance the war effort at both the state and national levels. Later in 1779 the Continental Congress asked New Hampshire for an additional \$1.5 million, but the Legislature contributed only \$450,000.

While these wartime appropriations, in reflection, would appear to have been substantial, they were padded by the most rampant inflationary period in American history. Both New Hampshire's state government and the Continental Congress had begun printing paper money by the ton, to finance the war costs, and its value deteriorated virtually as fast as it was produced.

The 1779 Legislature prohibited the hoarding of corn. Selectmen were given authority to seize all corn held by any man, beyond the needs of his family, and sell it to those having none. The exportation of food or livestock was also prohibited by legislative decree, except by express permission of the Legislature or the Committee of Safety.

Several new townships were incorporated by the 1779 Legislature. "Addition of Alexandria" became New London; New Briton became Andover and Society Land became Hancock. Northumberland and Stratford were also incorporated in 1779.

EARLY LEGISLATIVE BESMIRCHMENT

There's nothing new about legislative besmirchment.

Back in 1779, when New Hampshire's new-born free Legislature was still wet behind the ears, so to speak, the Reverend Jeremy Belknap of Dover, revered compiler of the state's first history, wrote to Ebenezer Hazard, a Philadelphia printer:

A member of our late House of Representatives in their last session at Exeter, returning from the Court to his lodgings in the close of the day, passed by a house where a joiner had been shingling, just as he had thrown down his hammer and was descending the ladder.

The Representative picked up the hammer, carried it to his lodgings (which were in a tavern) and pawned it for a jill of rum. The joiner, finding on inquiry which way the hammer went, followed it to the tavern and demanded it, but was obliged to pay for the rum before he could have it.

Being a man of spirit, he then publicly, in the crowded room, and in the presence of divers brother Representatives, warned the landlord against receiving stolen goods from the members of the General Court. This is a specimen of the little villiany of the cattle by whom we are . . . governed; for as the Assembly is dissolved, 'tis no blasphemy to tell the truth.

BIENNIAL GOVERNMENT IN 1879

New Hampshire's state government went biennial in 1879, as the people imposed drastic constitutional reforms upon operations of the Legislature, because of its political shennanigans.

These adjustments were recommended by an historic nine-day Constitutional Convention in December of 1876, and approved by the voters on annual March town meeting day in 1877. They resulted from political machinations by both Republican and Democratic legislators.

The Republicans were censured even by their own party leadership for sponsoring improper increases in House membership from the smaller towns, to maintain majority control over that legislative branch.

When the Democrats suddenly won control of the 1874 Legislature, with Democrat James A. Weston of Manchester as Governor, they voted wholesale dismissal of all the Republican judges and other state and county officials, and blandly replaced them with party partisans. The Republicans denounced this political ploy as contrary to public trust. Then, two years later, when the Republicans regained control of the Legislature in 1876, under Republican Governor Person C. Cheney of Manchester, they promptly ousted all the new Democratic judges and other officials, in a reverse repetition of the Democrats' 1874 upheaval.

The political dumpings were simple and to the point. The judges were ousted by the abolishment of their courts and their replacement with tribunals under new names. The Democrats in 1874 killed the Supreme Judicial Court and replaced it with a Superior Court of Judicature and a Circuit Court. Then in 1876 the Republicans abolished these Democratic court systems and replaced them with a State Supreme Court, which continues to this day. The other officials were dismissed by the Governor and Council, following House and Senate concurrence on special resolutions calling for each removal, by name, as for "the public good."

There were other political manipulations in this period that led to the legislative reforms. The Democrats revamped the state Senate and Councilor districts in 1874, to improve election prospects for their candidates. And the Republicans readjusted the same districts in 1876 to restore their political advantages.

TWO ELECTIONS IN 1878

It was in 1878 that New Hampshire's state government was shifted from its traditional annual basis, to biennial operations with the legislative reforms. Two state elections were required to implement the adjustments.

In a final March election, Benjamin F. Prescott of Epping was reelected to become the state's last annual Governor, starting June 5, 1878. Then the new system was launched in the first November biennial election, in which Natt Head of Hooksett became the first Governor given a two-year term, beginning on June 4, 1879.

The House membership was slashed from 391 to 280, as the apportionment

formula was changed from taxpayers to population. Governor Cheney had urged this adjustment when he first took office in 1875. He warned that the Legislature had suffered loss of public esteem by the "padding" of taxpayers' lists in the smaller towns to gain unfair House representation. In denouncing this policy, Cheney emphasized that the House membership had swollen from 327 in 1860, when the federal census showed a population of 326,073, to 373 when he took office, even though the 1870 census had disclosed a population decline to 318,300, because of the ravages of the Civil War. Despite his exhortations, the House membership was manipulated to the 391 total in the 1876 legislative session.

Under the new apportionment, which became effective in 1879, each town was allowed a House seat for an initial population of 600 and double that amount was required for each additional seat. The old formula had been 150 and 300 "rateable polls," respectively.

As New Hampshire shifted its House representation formula to population, it followed the example of 28 of the then 34 states in the nation. Meanwhile, Indiana's legislative representation was keyed to "white males," and Kentucky, Massachusetts, Mississippi and Tennessee tied their legislative seats to qualified voters.

Several county government offices were turned over to the people, for a first time, to terminate legislative manipulations of them for political gain. The positions of Sheriff, Register of Probate, and Solicitor (now Attorney), were transferred from Governor and Council appointment to biennial election by the people.

The state Senate membership was also increased from 12 to 24 in this constitutional legislative overhaul. Convention records indicate this was done primarily because, after a century of growth of state affairs, the Senate had developed 13 standing committees of three members each, and their work loads were considered too much for only a dozen men to handle. But while the state was then divided into 24 Senate districts, the apportionment formula continued to remain based upon wealth, the yardstick being property assessments.

CATHOLIC BAN ALSO REPEALED

As the state government went biennial a century ago, the constitutional ban against Catholics being elected to the Legislature or the Governorship, was also repealed. This historic action was approved by the people in an extraordinary manner, and by a margin of only six votes.

First off, when the 1876 Constitutional Convention convened on December 6, with Judge Daniel Clark of Manchester, veteran Justice of New Hampshire's United States District Court, as President, the delegates agreed to dispense with the customary oath of qualification. This unique action was voted without discussion and by unanimous consent, because some Catholics had been elected as delegates, and no one desired to challenge their presence, even though the Constitution still required that only Protestants could so serve.

This unprecedented convention circumvention of the Constitution reflected popular sentiments at that time against the Catholic ban. While it was not, understandably, officially recorded, Catholics had begun to sit in the Legislature without challenge. One of them was John Leddy, Epping merchant and native of Ireland, who served in the House for two terms, in 1874 and 1875, and then was elected to the state Senate in 1900.

New Hampshire voters abolished this Catholic ban in March of 1877 by 28,477 to 14,231, or a six-vote margin for the required two-thirds majority. This historic vote total was 42,708 and two-thirds approval, as required by the Constitution of any amendment, would have been a minimum of 28,472 votes.

FRUGALITY LAUDED IN 1879

Governor Head, whose palatial brick residence on Head's Hill in Hooksett has become a Funeral Home, expressed unusual praise for the Legislature, as he became the first biennial Chief Executive. In his 1879 inaugural address before Senate President Jacob H. Gallinger of Concord and House Speaker Henry H. Huse of Manchester, and the members of their branches, Head lauded the Legislature for its frugality with state spendings. He said:

The frugal character of the people of this state has always been so faithfully reflected by the legislative branch of their government, that, during a period when extravagant expenditures in public affairs has been the rule almost everywhere, our ordinary expenses have been kept very nearly within the limits set by the wisdom and prudence of the Fathers, and we are therefore relieved of the task of readjusting our laws to meet the requirement of reduced values.

Few, if any, of the officers of the state receive more for the discharge of their duties than a similar service would command in private business, and, as far as I know, there are none whose services can profitably be dispensed with.

Our public institutions are generally doing the work for which they were designed as economically as it can be done well, and the state debt which grew out of the late war is being taken care of without placing heavy burdens upon the people.

But it still becomes us to respect universal demands for rigid economy and such careful consideration in appropriating public money as a prudent man gives to his own disbursements.

No person or association should be authorized or permitted to draw a dollar from the treasury until it is clearly shown, not only that such person or association will earn the money, but that the people of the state will receive its full value.

Paying for work that is not needed is nearly as profitless, and sometimes as wrong, as paying for work that is not done. In public affairs, waste and stealing are twin evils.

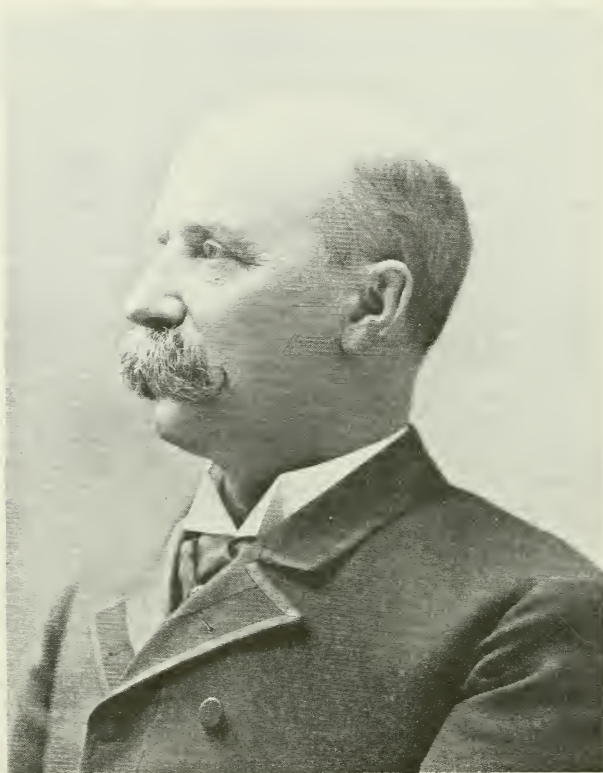
ADJUSTMENTS AS SENATE ENLARGED

New Hampshire's State Senate underwent several adjustments as its membership was doubled, to twenty-four, when the state government went onto a biennial basis in 1879.

Hosea Ballou Carter of Hampstead, often employed by the Legislature to adjust election districts for political purposes, laid out the new senatorial districts to insure continued Republican control of the Senate, and came up with a numerical reversal. Ever since the 1784 birth of the Senate, the districts were numbered from the Portsmouth area, as No. 1, up to what became Coos county, as No. 12. Then in the 1879 enlargement, the furthest north district became No. 1, Portsmouth wound up in District No. 24, and this has continued to this day.

The twenty-four members of the 1879 Senate had new furniture. The Concord Monitor of February 21, 1879, reported that "The chairs were of black walnut frame, with cane seats and the desks were of black walnut, with this new furniture being similar in make and style to those used in City Hall at Boston." The Stephen Smith Company of Cornhill, Boston, furnished the new furniture.

Memberships of the Senate's dozen standing committees were increased from three to five, in the doubled Senate size.

UNUSUAL 1879 SENATE ELECTION

Dr. Jacob Harold Gallinger of Concord became president of the first biennial State Senate in a most unusual manner. He won over Attorney Charles H. Burns of Wilmot in a Republican caucus, only after four men not yet elected to the Senate were allowed to vote. The caucus was held in Phenix Hotel, the night before the new biennial Legislature convened on June 4, and the historic details were recorded in the Concord Monitor.

The 1878 biennial election had given the Republicans 16 to 4 control of the Senate, with no winners in four other districts because no Senate candidate got a majority of all votes cast, which was then a constitutional requirement. The four losing Republican candidates were present as the caucus opened, and after a protracted debate, they were allowed, by a 9 to 7 vote, to participate in the proceedings. But the quartet declined, as their spokesman, Emmons B. Philbrick of Rye, a farmer who

catered to summer boarders, explained they had anticipated a unanimous invitation to join the caucus.

The presidential voting quickly developed a 7 to 7 stalemate, as both Gallinger and Burns modestly refrained from the voting. This led to a suggestion by Orren C. Moore, founder and publisher of the Nashua Daily Telegraph, that the quartet join in the balloting, to break the deadlock, but his motion met with strenuous objects from Charles E. Smith, Dover hotelman.

As the 7 to 7 stalemate continued through a dozen ballots, Moore was repeatedly rebuffed on motions to have the quartet join in the voting, and he finally prevailed on the 14 ballot. As a result, Gallinger was nominated for Senate president by a 10 to 7 vote, as Philbrick abstained.

Casting the tie-breaking votes were Hiram Hodgdon, Ashland merchant; Dudley C. Coleman, Brookfield grain dealer, and Charles F. Cate, Northwood bachelor farmer. The next day they, with Philbrick, were elected to the Senate by a joint session of the House and Senate.

The four Democrats of the 1879 Senate included the youngest and oldest members. They were Edward F. Mann, 33-year-old Benton railroad conductor, and Sherburne R. Merrill, 69-year-old Colebrook starch manufacturer. The other Democrats were Attorney Isaac N. Blodgett of Franklin, and Cornelius Cooledge of Hillsboro, retired from successful participation in the California gold rush.

The dozen other members of the historic 1879 Senate were: Albert N. Shaw, Lebanon railroad contractor; Albert Pitts, Charlestown commercial traveler; Nehemiah G. Ordway, Warner politico and Sergeant-at-Arms of the national Congress for a dozen years; Luther Hayes, Milton lumberman; Edward Gustine, Keene civil engineer; Charles J. Amidon, Hinsdale wood manufacturer; George W. Todd, Mont Vernon educator; Elbridge C. Hayes, Manchester stone mason; William G. Perry, Manchester mill superintendent; William H. Shepard, Derry farmer; Greenleaf Clark, Atkinson farmer, and John H. Broughton, Portsmouth lumber dealer.

RED BOOK MANUAL NOW IN 92ND YEAR

The state government's biennial Red Book Manual was initiated 92 years ago by the 1887 Legislature to expedite information on New Hampshire's public affairs.

The state government had for a century depended upon the privately-compiled annual New Hampshire Registers to disseminate election statistics and legislative details. But the publishers of the pocket-sized Registers had been forced to develop other types of information to support their annual editions, when the Legislature and the state government in general, went onto a biennial basis in 1879. So this was the reason why the 1887 Legislature voted to compile and publish its own vital state information, and attempt to resurrect the Granite State historic lore for which the Registers had long been popular.

The Red Book was launched for the 1889 session of the General Court, and it was an enterprising and amazing Democrat who instilled the biennial Red Book with worthwhile meaning and invaluable historical data. Hosea Ballou Carter of Hampstead, a political jack-of-all-sorts, compiled the early editions, and his 1891 issue continues most remarkable to this day. Not only was it the greatest single source of state government lore ever produced in New Hampshire, but it was the only blue-hued Red Book ever published.

Democrat Carter, presumably named for the Reverend Hosea Ballou of Richmond, N.H., a pioneer patriarch of the Universalist Church, was a juggler of political mathematics, among his varied ventures.

The Republican Legislature often hired Carter to revamp political districts, to safeguard party control of both the House of Representatives and the Senate. As attest to his political proclivities, it is recorded that in 1880, he served as chairman of the Committee on Credentials in the Republican State Convention, and the following day he filled the same position in the Democratic State Convention.

CARTER LIKED TO LIST OWN PROGRESS IN LIFE

Carter was a self-styled swinger who, in retrospect, it must have been a delight to know. He had no formal schooling, labelled himself "Hozee," and at 58, when given to wearing a skull cap in public, wrote of himself:

Hozee has hustled as a cyclopedia canvasser, a patent medicine manufacturer, a sewing machine agent, a safe salesman, a desk drummer, a typewriter expert, an editor, a statistician, a detective, a railroad commissioner, a publisher, a politician, a candidate, an office-holder, and even now (1892) he is hustling as chief clerk of the newly created New Hampshire Bureau of Labor.

Carter's personal pride was production of the handsomely illustrated 1892 "Town and Country Atlas of New Hampshire," sixteen by eighteen inches in size, which has become a prized collectors' item and currently commands a price in excess of \$100. His blue-covered Red Book of 1891 (a red-covered edition was later printed because of demand for its valuable contents) continues to be an amazing compendium covering two centuries of legislative records, in particular, and the state government in general. Historians have come to consider it a fitting memorial to Hosea Ballou Carter and his incomparable contribution to the lore of Granite State officialdom.

NEW DISTRICTS SHOWN WITH COLORED MAPS

Carter's 1891 Red Book was personally copyrighted and sold to the Legislature. It listed himself as "Actuary of Political Statistics and Editor of State Manual," a self-sponsored title never again displayed in his later editions.

The 1891 Red Book featured colored maps showing how Carter gerrymandered the various House and Senate, and Executive Council, districts, which the 1891 Legislature enacted, to reinsure Republican dominations in state affairs. He also juggled a new law on House seats, as a new constitutional amendment terminated district groupings for towns of less than 600 population, and put all the tinier towns on a part-time representation basis.

Carter's 1891 gerrymandering proved its worth. While the Republican majorities had up to then declined to 186-170 in the House and 14-10 in the Senate, they respectively soared to 214-134 and 15-9 in 1893, and to 264-99 and 21-3 in the 1895 session.

Democrat Carter's Republican service as a political mathematician covered many years. The Granite Monthly magazine of 1886 told how he "displayed his statesmanship," in a readjustment of House seats, when an 1877 constitutional amendment changed the apportionment base from poll taxpayers to population. The Legislature was then required to district smaller towns to qualify for the 600 population minimum for a full-time House seat, but there was a loophole by which it could grant part-time seats to precincts of less than 600, if they could not be advantageously grouped.

Three dozen tinier towns won part-time representation and Carter neatly gerrymandered the Democratic units into the "off" sessions, while those of Republican persuasion sat in the biennial sessions when a United States Senator was to be elected by the General Court (a custom which continued until 1914 when such officials became elected by the people.)

NEW HAMPSHIRE DRAWS 2ND, 3RD CLASS SENATORS

The 1891 Red Book listed New Hampshire's good luck in having second and third class United States Senators, thanks to a lottery which launched the national Senate in 1789.

John Langdon, Portsmouth's 37-year-old shipbuilder and Revolutionary War hero, and the Reverend Paine Wingate, Stratham's 39-year-old farmer, clergyman and political patriot, the state's first federal Senators, played leading roles in this lottery, and came out winners. Langdon, chosen as the first Senate President pro tem, and Wingate were designated to handle a Senate seating lottery, along with Tristram Dalton, a Massachusetts Senator. This was the device used for initial allotment of two, four and six-year terms, so that one-third of the Senate membership would ever afterward come up for election in each biennium.

Langdon and Wingate survived the first one-third of names drawn, which was for the least desirable two-year terms, and Dalton fell into this first class. Wingate came up in the second class of the lottery, for a four-year term while Langdon was the most fortunate, lasting into the third class of the drawings, for a six-year term.

The biennial Red Books have always furnished election tabulations and state government data in general. But the early editions pioneered historic information never before available in such popular form. They also presented statistics on the Legislature, and the state and federal governments, delving back to 1680 creation of New Hampshire's provincial government, and its constitutional life founded in 1776.

The first Red Book of 1889 featured constitutional lore. It presented the temporary constitution of 1776; the first proposed permanent constitution of 1778 (of five pages) which the people voted down, and the permanent constitution as finally

ratified in 1783, after two more rebuffs by the people (of 24 pages). Interestingly, this first edition listed the names of 3,000 Justices of the Peace then in service within the state. There was also a tabulation showing that 91 per cent of the 99, 432 names on the voter checklists cast ballots for Governor in 1888, a record never since equalled in New Hampshire.

The 1893 Red Book listed New Hampshire's participation in all the quadrennial national political conventions, which began in 1831. This issued also contained details of the 436 land grants covering two centuries, out of which the state's cities and towns developed.

The 1893 edition presented an initial report on the portraits which have been a distinctive feature of the Capitol, since nearly 200 of them were mustered in the decade following the Civil War by Secretary of State Benjamin Franklin Prescott of Epping (later Governor), long an ardent champion of Granite State historic life. The portraits were crammed ceiling-high upon the walls of both the House and Senate chambers; into the somewhat small offices of the then few state agencies, and later even over into the new State Library building when it opened in 1895.

PORTRAITS ONCE CROWDED BOTH HOUSE AND SENATE

Almost difficult to imagine these days, there were 27 portraits upon the Senate walls, and another 21, many of them next to the ceiling, in the House chamber. All this changed, of course, when the State House was doubled in size, for a second time, in 1910, and provided another three stories of spacious corridors for the paintings of Governors, war heroes, and other political figures.

The 1895 Red Book presented 40 pages of biographical sketches of prominent state personages of the previous century. And the 1897 edition offered a condensed outline of the state's provincial and colonial public life, up through the Revolutionary War period.

An important compilation of the rolls of the New Hampshire men who dominated the Battle of Bunker Hill at Boston covers 60 pages of the 1899 Red Book. This was the work of George C. Gilmore, Manchester historian and publicist, by order of Governor Charles H. Sawyer of Dover and his Executive Council.

Gilmore's purpose was to furnish a first complete listing of the Granite Staters who participated in that immortal confrontation with the British, to be inscribed upon a tablet at the site. But Massachusetts officials refused to permit such special tribute to the New Hampshire men. So Gilmore's compilation was inserted into the 1899 Red Book, with his expressed hope the names would become enblazoned upon the State House lawn in Concord, which never bore fruit.

The 1901 Red Book is of special historic value for it identifies the 85 Civil War battle flags which grace the Capitol's main entrance Hall of Flags. They were permanently encased by order of the 1899 Legislature, and the exhibit included two flags from the brief Spanish American war, then just terminated.

The display covers regiments numbered from one through eighteen, but there are no emblems from the 17th Regiment because it was merged into the 2nd Regiment before going to the front. Single units of heavy and light artillery, and cavalry, are also identified with battle flags, while the state's three companies of sharpshooters were part of the First and Second Regiments.

The 85 tattered and battle torn emblems hang as tribute to the 32,750 Granite State men, nearly 10 per cent of the population, who served in that 1861-1865 conflict to preserve the Union of the United States.

ONLY BATTLE TATTERED FLAGS PLACED IN HALL

There were hundreds of other flags carried by the New Hampshire forces in the

Civil War, but the State House did not have room for them all, so the 1864 Legislature voted the following restrictions, to be carried out by the House and Senate doorkeepers:

They shall procure and tastefully display in the rotunda beneath Representatives Hall, the state regimental ensigns tattered in battle, such to bear the number of its respective regiment, and to be there preserved forever, as relics of war.

The 1866 Legislature forbade removal of any of the flags "from the State House, except to prevent their destruction from some unusual cause." It seems that patriotic groups had been borrowing them for special public events.

It was on May 23, 1868 that the flags were placed on permanent display in the rotunda, long called Doric Hall because of its columns, but ever since known as Hall of Flags.

The 1903 Red Book included rolls of New Hampshire's Revolutionary soldiers in Massachusetts regiments, etc., and other additions to Gilmore's important statistics of the 1899 edition.

The 1905 manual launched the custom of listing the political committees and platforms of parties participating in the biennial state elections, which continued into the 1977 edition.

The 1909 edition contained two unusual features. One was a reprint of an 1829 "Catechism of the History of New Hampshire," of 43 pages, compiled by John Farmer, Concord druggist and the state's first official historian. The other was a general index of the first ten issues of the Red Book, a service never since implemented.

The 15th issue of the Red Book in 1917 was a monumental production. It reflected the enthusiasm for history of Hobart Pillsbury of Manchester, youthful deputy Secretary of State, who a decade later authored an updated four-volume history of the state.

This 1917 edition comprised nine sections; updated much of the statistics of Carter's 1891 classic, and for a first time presented a thumbnail history of each state agency, all of which made this book the first to exceed 500 pages since the 1891 issue.

The 1921 Red Book contained a rearrangement of the Capitol's portraits, by then numbering more than 220, with detailed identification.

These details were compiled by Legislative Historian Leon W. Anderson, under supervision of Secretary of State William M. Gardner. This edition is condensed by legislative mandate, because of inflationary publishing costs. February, 1979.

UNITED STATES SENATORS FROM NEW HAMPSHIRE

The following is a list of the senators from this state, and the years of service. One of the first senators, John Langdon, was chosen president *pro tempore* of the first national senate in 1789 and presided over that body until Vice-President John Adams qualified as president of the senate by virtue of his office as vice-president. Senator Langdon was again elected president in the second senate in 1792-3. Senator Samuel Livermore was elected president of the fourth senate in 1795-6 and of the sixth senate in 1799-1800. Senator Daniel Clark was elected president of the thirty-eighth senate in 1863-4. Senator Jacob H. Gallinger was elected president of the sixty-second senate in 1911-13. Senator George H. Moses was elected president *pro tempore* in 1925, re-elected 1927, 1929, 1931.

Senator Styles Bridges was elected president *pro tempore* of the eighty-third congress, 1953-1954.

First election results showed Louis C. Wyman, Manchester, the winner — recount requested by John A. Durkin, Manchester, resulted in favor of Durkin — Appeal to the Ballot Law Commission resulted in favor of Wyman — appeal to the U.S. Senate by Durkin. U.S. Senate sent the appeal back to the State of New Hampshire, declaring a vacancy as of August; 8, 1975; and under Chapter I, Laws of 1975, a special election was held September 16, 1975, in which the final results were:

Durkin	140,778 Votes
Wyman	113,007 Votes

In this period, Norris Cotton, Lebanon, was appointed U.S. Senator from August 8, 1975 until Durkin was sworn into office by the U.S. Senate, September 18, 1975.

*Died in office. Irving W. Drew, Lancaster, appointed by the Governor to serve until the 1918 November election, when George H. Moses was elected for the unexpired term of Senator Gallinger.

**Died in office. Robert W. Upton, Concord, appointed by the Governor to serve until the 1954 November election, when Norris Cotton was elected for the unexpired term.

***Died in office. Maurice J. Murphy, Jr., Portsmouth, appointed by the Governor to serve until the 1962 November election, when Thomas J. McIntyre was elected for the unexpired term of Senator Bridges.

****Norris Cotton retired three days before his final term officially ended, and Louis C. Wyman was appointed by Governor Thomson to serve these three days.

UNITED STATES HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

Under the constitutional apportionment which provided for a house of representatives in congress, New Hampshire was allotted three seats. The national census of 1790 (first census) increased this to four, the second census of 1800 to five and the third census of 1810 to six seats. The census of 1830 reduced it to five, that of 1840 to four and that of 1850 to three. The census of 1870 reduced it to two, but the seat taken away was restored until the next census of 1880, since then the state has had two representatives.

**Special Session.

DEPARTMENT OF STATE

Articles 67 and 68 of the second part of the constitution provide for a department of state with a secretary of state who is elected biennially by the legislature and a deputy secretary of state appointed by the secretary. In the colonial period there was a secretary appointed by the chief executive, but no deputy. During the revolutionary period and under the constitution of 1784 the secretary was chosen by the legislature and given authority to have several deputies, but in 1793 the constitution was changed to provide for a single deputy.

The following is a list of the secretaries of state from the beginning, together with the term which each served and a list of the deputy secretaries.

THE TREASURY

Article 67 of the second part of the constitution provides for a treasurer who is elected biennially by the legislature. In the colonial period the treasurer was appointed by the chief executive and frequently the same man was secretary of the province and treasurer. In 1891 the legislature created the office of deputy treasurer.

STATE EMBLEMS

CHAPTER 3

State Emblems, Flags, etc.

REVISED STATUTES ANNOTATED

3:1 State Emblem. The state emblem shall be of the following design: Within an elliptical panel, the longest dimension of which shall be vertical, there shall appear an appropriate replica of the Old Man of the Mountains; surrounding the inner panel, and enclosed within another ellipse, there shall be at the bottom of the design the words of any state motto which may be adopted by the general court; and at the top of the design, between the inner and outer elliptical panels, the words, New Hampshire, appropriately separated from the motto, if adopted, by one star on each side. Said emblem may be placed on all printed or related material issued by the state and its subdivisions relative to the development of recreational, industrial, and agricultural resources of the state.

3:2 State Flag. The state flag shall be of the following color and design: The body or field shall be blue and shall bear upon its center in suitable proportion and colors a representation of the state seal. The seal shall be surrounded by a wreath of laurel leaves with nine stars interspersed. When used for military purposes the flag shall conform to the regulations of the United States.

3:3 When Displayed. It shall be displayed above the state house whenever the legislature is in session and during meetings of the governor and council when expedient, and upon such other occasions as the governor may designate.

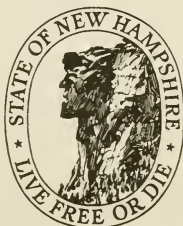
3:4 Permission to Use. The governor is authorized to make rules and regulations governing the use and display of the state flag not inconsistent with the provisions of RSA 573, and it shall be lawful to use and display said flag in accordance with such rules and regulations. This section shall be construed to encourage the display of the state flag on public buildings.

3:5 State Flower. The purple lilac, *Syringa Vulgaris*, is the state flower of New Hampshire.

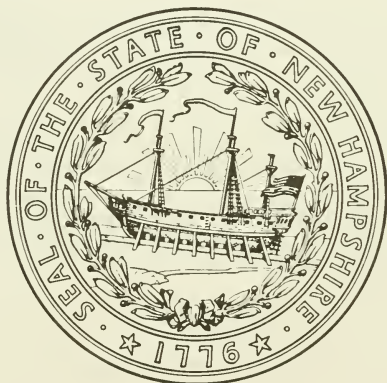
3:6 State Tree. The white birch tree, *Betula Papyrifera*, is the state tree of New Hampshire.

3:7. State Song. The song "Old New Hampshire" with words by Dr. John F. Holmes and music by Maurice Hoffmann is hereby declared to be the state song of New Hampshire.

3:8 State Motto. The words "Live Free or Die," written by General John Stark, July 31, 1809, shall be the official motto of the state.



3:9. State Seal. The seal of the state shall be two inches in diameter, circular, with the following detail and no other: A field crossed by a straight horizon line of the sea, above the center of the field; concentric with the field the rising sun, exposed above the horizon about one third of its diameter; the field encompassed with laurel; across the field for the full width within the laurel a broadside view of the frigate Raleigh, on the stocks; the ship's bow dexter and higher than the stern; the three lower masts shown in place, together with the fore, main and mizzen tops, shrouds and mainstays; an ensign staff at the stern flies the United States flag authorized by act of Congress June 14, 1777; a jury staff on the mainmast and another on the foremast each flies a pennant; flags and pennants are streaming to the dexter side; the hull is shown without a rudder; below the ship the field is divided into land and water by a double diagonal line whose highest point is sinister; no detail is shown anywhere on the water, nor any on the land between the water and the stocks except a granite boulder on the dexter side; encircling the field is the inscription, SEAL . OF . THE . STATE . OF . NEW HAMPSHIRE, the words separated by round periods, except between the parts of New Hampshire; at the lowest point of the inscription is the date 1776, flanked on either side by a five-pointed star, which group separates the beginning and end of the inscription; the whole form and design to be as follows:



3:9-a [New] Unauthorized Use Prohibited. The state seal shall be the property of the state of New Hampshire. No person shall manufacture, sell, expose for sale, or have in his possession for sale any article or substance, being an article of merchandise or receptacle of merchandise or article or thing for carrying or transporting merchandise, or sell, expose for sale, give away, or have in possession for sale or to give away or for any purpose any article or thing to advertise or promote services, upon which shall have been printed, painted, attached, or otherwise placed a representation or likeness of the state seal, provided, however, that upon application, the secretary of state may authorize the use of the state seal. Once such approval is given, such use shall be exempt from the provisions of this section until or unless such approval is revoked or suspended by the secretary of state.

3:10. State Bird. The purple finch is hereby designated as the official state bird of New Hampshire.

3:11 State Insect. The ladybug, also known as the ladybird and the lady beetle, is hereby designated as the official state insect of New Hampshire.

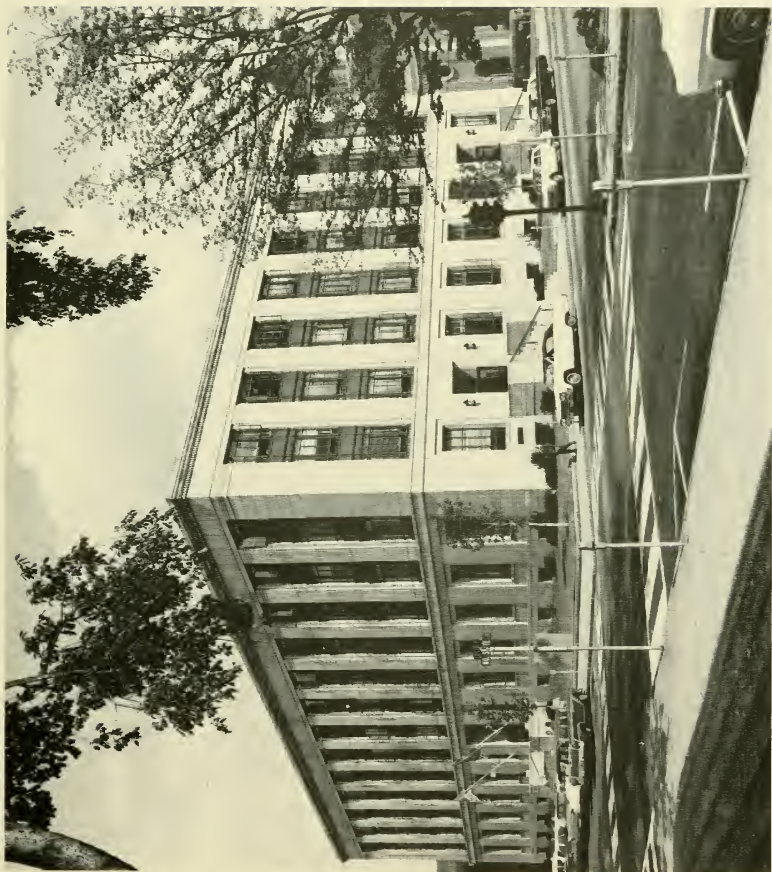

RECOUNTS AFTER THE PRIMARY

After the Primary, fifteen requests for recounts were received.

Fifteen recounts of ballots were conducted by the Secretary of State on September 25 and 26, 1978; ten recounts were Republican and five were Democratic contests. Two recounts of the ballots cast — Councilor District No. 1, Republican, and Hillsborough County Commissioner District No. 3, Republican, were conceded by Raymond S. Burton and William L. Edwards, respectively, before completion of the count.

One of the recounts resulted in a change in the Strafford County Commissioner race — Democratic. Other changes were in the races for Representative to the General Court in Dover Ward 2 — Republican, and Representative to the General Court in Manchester Ward 6 — Democratic.

The other recounts did not result in a change of nominees.

The result of the write-in votes for Representative to the General Court in Cheshire County District No. 11 was a tie, which was won by Daniel A. Eaton. The recount of this district ended in a tie, broken by drawing lots, and again Daniel A. Eaton won the tie.

The alteration and amendments in said Constitution covered by these questions have been approved and adopted, and the Constitution is thus amended by the suffrages of more than two-thirds of the qualified voters present at the said meetings, and voting upon the said questions.

Given under my hand and the seal of said State, at the Council Chambers, this 22nd day of November, A.D., 1978, and of the Independence of the United States of America, the two hundred and third.

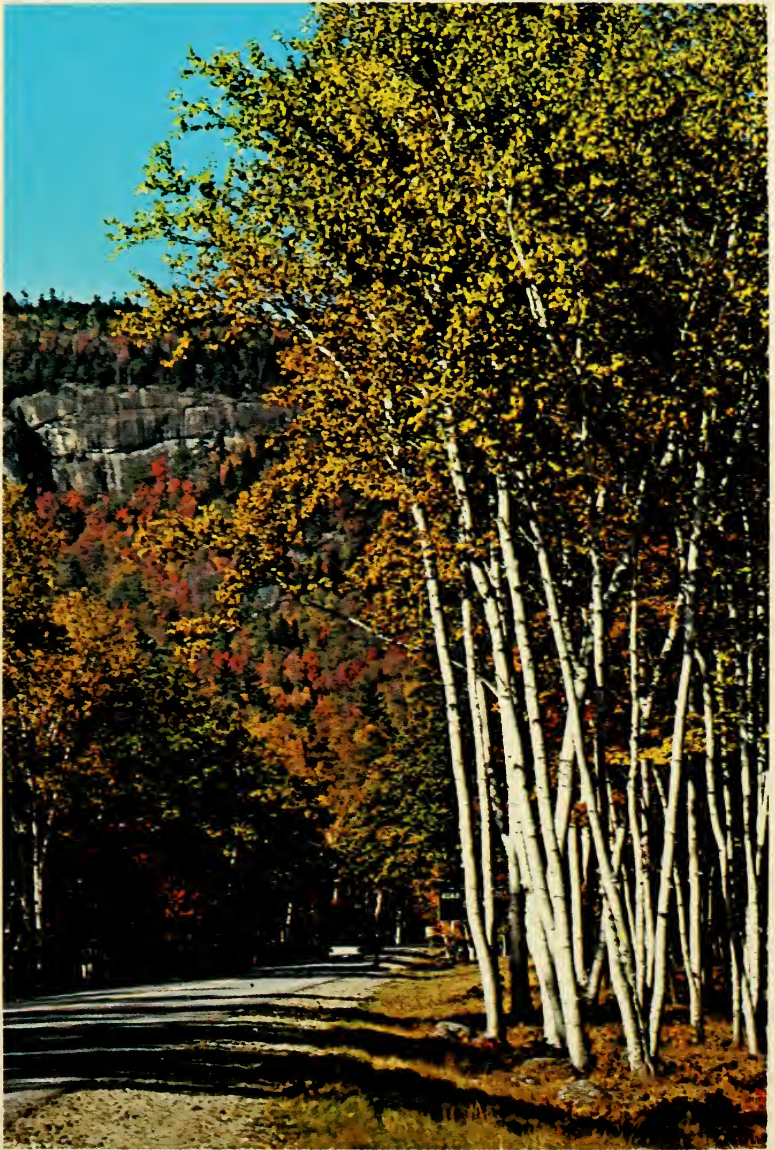

RECOUNTS AFTER THE GENERAL ELECTION

After the general election, there were nine requests for recounts received.

On November 20, 1978, two senatorial district races were recounted, Senate District No. 7 and Senate District No. 14. In Senate District No. 7, John P. H. Chandler, Jr. was declared the winner; however, Peter Allen won the recount. There was no change in the Senate District No. 14 race.

One recount, for Representative to the General Court in Merrimack County, District No. 7 (Allenstown, Pembroke), was conducted on November 21, 1978. There was no change.

On November 27, 1978, five recounts for Representative to the General Court were conducted: Keene Ward 1, Keene Ward 4, Windham, Salem, and Merrimack County District No. 5 (Bow, Dunbarton). After the recount in Keene Ward 4, Floyd Kohl and Albert Munichiello were tied. The tie was determined by lot and Albert Munichiello was the winner.** There were no changes in the other Representative races.

The final recount was held November 27, 1978. This was for Strafford County Commissioner and there was no change.

**Breaking the tie by lot was appealed to the Ballot Law Commission and the Commission ordered a run-off election. The Ballot Law Commission decision was appealed to the House of Representatives. On January 3, 1979, the House of Representatives ordered a run-off election.

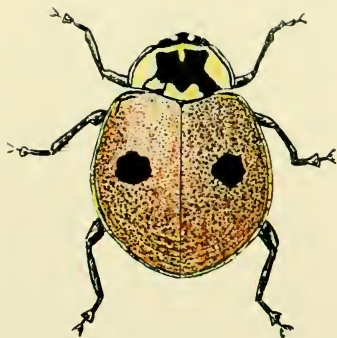

FISH AND GAME COMMISSION

Commission consists of eleven members, each qualified pursuant to RSA 206:2-a, appointed by the Governor and Council. When an appointment is to be made to the commission, the Governor shall cause to be published the name of his nominee in a newspaper of statewide daily circulation for two consecutive days beginning on the day after the name of the nominee is submitted to the Council. The Council may not consent to an appointment under this section sooner than thirty days after the name of the nominee is submitted to them. Members of the commission shall be residents of different counties except that one commission member shall be a resident of one of the coastal towns of Portsmouth, Seabrook, Rye, Hampton, North Hampton or New Castle, and not more than six commissioners shall be members of the same political party. Each member shall also be qualified in the following manner: (a) well informed on fish and wildlife conservation and restoration; (b) dedicated to the conservation and protection of the state's fish and wildlife resources and of an environment conducive to the welfare of the same; (c) committed to a fish and game program providing reasonable balance between research, habitat management and law enforcement; (d) an active outdoorsman with a resident fishing or hunting license in at least five of the ten years preceding his appointment; (e) personal record free of convictions of violation of fish and game laws and regulations of this state or any other jurisdiction within five years preceding his appointment; (f) at least five years experience in one or a combination of the following fields: (1) Forestry; (2) Agriculture; (3) Management of wild lands; (4) Soils conservation; (5) Conservation of water resources; (6) Fish and game management or propagation; (7) Conservation engineering; (8) Conservation law; (9) Wildlife education; (10) Active membership in a conservation or sportsmen's organization in this state. (g) in the case of the coastal commission member, a general knowledge of all crustaceans and bivalves in coastal waters and salt water fishing in general. Upon nomination by the Governor, each nominee shall forthwith file with the secretary of state an affidavit, duly signed and sworn to, setting forth in detail how he complies with the qualifications cited above and affirming his belief in the aims of subparagraphs (b) and (c). Appointments shall not be confirmed by the Council until such affidavit has been examined by them and such appointee has been found qualified. Each member shall hold office for a *term of five years* and shall continue until his successor is appointed and qualified. Each year, at least two, and not more than three, members shall be appointed. Vacancies in the commission shall be filled for the unexpired term in the same manner as the original appointment. VACANCY

JUDICIAL COUNCIL

A justice of the supreme court selected by the justices thereof; a justice of the superior court selected by the justices thereof; a judge of probate selected by the judges thereof; the president of the New Hampshire Municipal and District Court Justices Association; the attorney general; the president of the New Hampshire Bar Association; a clerk of the superior court, selected by the Superior Court Clerk's Association; and seven other members appointed by the Governor and Council, four of whom shall be members of the bar of the state of wide experience who have been admitted to practice in the state for more than five years. The *term* of each member except the attorney general, the president of the New Hampshire Bar Association, and the president of the New Hampshire Municipal and District Court Justices Association, shall be for *three years* and until his successor is appointed and qualified. However, whenever any member attains the age of seventy years, the office held by him becomes vacant and the vacancy shall be filled according to law. Vacancies shall be filled for the remainder of any term in the same manner and from the same group as the original appointment. The attorney general, the president of the New Hampshire Bar Association, and the president of the New Hampshire Municipal and District Court Justices Association shall be *ex officio* members.
